General Manager Cullati Resigns

After serving 6 years as Leisure Village Association Bob Cullati resigned the post to pursue other business opportunities in Santa Maria. Bob submitted his letter of resignation to the Board of Directors on October 25. The letter was accepted with regret by the Board and he left the position immediately, by mutual consent.

Bob assumed the post of General Manager for the Association on November 14, 1988. He was previously employed as Manager of Finance and administration at Prime Computer, Inc. in Woodland Hills. He was chosen for the Manager's job from over 160 other applicants.

Members of the Board of Directors will assume duties of the General Manager by taking turns in the Administration office on a daily basis until a replacement is hired.

A search committee, consisting of Karl Joehnck, Ann Levey and George Pisors, was appointed by the LVA Board to do the preliminary screening of candidates for the General Manager's position.

Emergency Radio Room Completed By Bob Atz

Leisure Village Emer-General Manager for the gency Communications Control Center was formally placed in service during a dedication ceremony held at 12:30 p.m. November 1 at the Recreation Center.

> The dedication ceremony was conducted by Jules Nayfack. He introduced a series of speakers, each of whom described different facets of the Center's development.

Herb Arnold first gave a brief history of the Amateur Radio Club, citing how it was organized in 1990 and how it has become the communications arm of the Emergency Services Organization.

Dick Travis, current President of the Amateur Radio Club, described how the club's activities mesh with the amateur radio network within Ventura County. He then directed a demonstration of how the Radio Club would function in Leisure Village during an emergency. Eleven "ham" operators were dispatched to their area posts within the village and radio contact was established with the Command Center. Those in the audience were then able to hear the messages transmitted between the area posts and the Command Center. (In an emergency an additional operator would be placed in the administration office and a roving operator would service the Main Gate.)

Be Prepared

For years the Boy Scouts of America have had the slogan "Be Prepared" emblazoned on their uniforms and publications. Similarly, the term "Semper Paratus" (Always Ready) has been the motto for the United States Coast Guard.

Over the years our Emergency Services Organization has urged villagers to prepare themselves for coping with unforeseen events. The earthquake of January 17 underscored the wisdom of their recommendations. While we in the Village suffered relatively minor damage from the earthquake there is no guarantee that we will be so lucky next time.

In this issue and in coming months ILV will carry articles discussing different facets of our ESO, including functions of Village coordinators, availability of CPR and Red Cross training and numerous tips for personal safety and comfort. There is no such thing as being "Over Prepared" when dealing with emergency situations.

As with all issues, there are residents in two camps - the overzealous, gung-ho enthusiast who goes all-out versus the ostrich with its head in the sand who wants to ignore it all. Let's hope we can find a third, middle path. The moderate person will be aware, take reasonable precautions and prepare individual supplies to meet his/her own household needs to cope with potential disasters. After taking reasonable precautions, this person does not dwell on the doom and gloom aspects of life, but pursues the enjoyment and participation in currently pleasant events.

The schools perform routine fire drills and earthquake drills, for example, but these practice sessions are only a small part of the school curriculum; it does not dominate the school day. We should aim for such a perspective.

Stock your closet with necessary supplies and then let the subject drop. Get on with your life.

Leisure Village residents have phoned me (referring to my letter concerning malathion in last month's Inside Leisure Village) to indicate chest /

mucous congestion. How about you? Have you been feeling any unusual symptoms?

Many in Leisure Village communicate only within our particular circles of friends. No central repository for information about any unusual health responses to the malathion spraying exists nor has one been set up within Leisure Village.

Do we not need to know if there are unusual ailments, particularly affecting breathing, during this period of malathion spraying? Your Neighbors Care Group indicates to me that it is not capable of such monitoring of health responses. The Board of Directors seems disinterested in the subject.

Who is keeping any data? The County Health Department, which supports the malathion spraying, is quoted as saying they have few complaints. When I phoned them (652-5914), and asked about the citizen illness report, I was referred to the Medfly Hotline.

Do you have symptoms such as: breathing difficulty, loss of coordination, abdominal cramps or diarrhea, headaches, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, anxiety, restlessness, muscle twitching, an unusual weaknesses. Have you chest congestion or coughing without usual symptoms of flu? Have you lost your voice without reasons? Has your breathing become labored without clear cause?

If you think that the Board of Directors of Leisure Village should be setting up monitoring procedures concerning any health effects from malathion, please so indicate to them.

Your Emergency Services Committee is very near to achieving its Number One Priority that of establishing a complete staff of Village Coordinators and Assistant Coordinators. This is a group of about 160 residents, all dedicated to making us safer from disaster.

It is hoped that all residents will become acquainted with the Coordinators and Assistants in their villages and give them the encouragement and support they richly deserve.

The Leisure Village phone book has several pages devoted to suggestions for survival during a disaster. On one of these pages lines are provided for entry of the Name, Phone Number and Address of Village Coordinators and Assistant Coordinators. This could be a vital reference should help be needed. Additionally, a reference card providing the same information has been designed and will soon be distributed.

Priority Number Two, a telephone network for early warning, is now being addressed. This plan works similarly to a chain letter in that each resident involved is expected to make not more than five contacts in passing a message along. It has the virtue of speed without the problems of other quick systems such as the use of sirens or "bull horns."

Our conversations with L. V. Security and the City of Camarillo have confirmed that this plan is our best available choice for the present. The importance of an early warning system is not obvious when one thinks of an earthquake, but when considering the effect of a toxic spill and the speed and silence with which it would approach, it is more apparent. In such an event, the ability to gain even a few seconds could prevent tragic occur-

rences.

The phone "tree" is not a perfect answer, naturally, being subject to mistakes, absenteeism and panic, but until a better solution arises your ESC Committee will continue its effort to get it in service as soon as possible. A toxic spill is very unlikely to disrupt phone service, but the plan envisions callers as being close neighbors able to reach each other on foot if the unlikely comes to pass.

The network has other uses, each of which alone could justify the effort. One such use augments the socalled "buddy system" in which neighbors agree to help each other even when an emergency doesn't exist. The buddy system also is a high-priority item and will be explained more fully in a subsequent article.

Due to the large number of persons needed to complete such a network, it is probable that you will be asked to be a phone helper.

FIRST AID AND CPR CLASS



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
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LOCATION OF EMERGENCY PHONES

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

Leisure Technology continued in their attempts to keep the bus they were furnishing in operating condition.


A project called "Paramedics for Camarillo" was initiated in the village to provide paramedic services in the village and the city of Camarillo.



DO hang all outdoor lights on hooks under the eves if possible to protect from the rain.


