Board Members Check Out Main Gate

"I'm from Missouri, you have to show me." Board members George Pisors and Moe Kadish are not Missourians, but this maxim from the "Show Me State" may have been their motivation to spend an hour in the main gate house recently.

For some time the LV Security Department has maintained that a larger staff is needed at the main gate during certain hours. George and Moe had heard the pros and cons concerning work load at the main gate and held their own views on the subject. But rather than going on hearsay and opinion, they had to be shown and chose to observe 60 minutes of action in person at the main entrance gate house.

To say Moe and George were surprised after "hands on" experience at the main gate is understating the case. They were almost overwhelmed by the constant demands for services from the two security

Here is George's summary of one hour in the gate house.

"The better to understand the operation of the various services in our Village, Moe Kadish and I spent an hour in the main gate house.

"My personal expectation was that someone would be taking phone calls from residents and completing guest passes. I supposed that the other man would stand or sit at the entrance and occasionally push a button to open one of the gates. Probably both would be watching television during the idle periods.

"The above expectation was so far from the actual conditions that I decided that every resident should know the facts as we saw them,

"The first thing we noticed, was that there were no idle periods. There was a steady stream of traffic entering the Village. The right hand entrance gate for residents was fairly easy to handle, except that pedestrians coming through from Village 11 determined when the gate could be safely opened.

'The visitor lane was something else. There was a wide variety of trucks, buses and cars, and all seemed to present a different set of problems for the guard. Many were visitors of residents who had failed to call for a pass. Such situations really waste time and cause problems. All during the above proceedings, the phone was ringing with overflow calls, which neither guard really had time to handle, but somehow did.

'The second officer was doing at least two or three things at any given time. Between taking pass requests, entering them in a log book, completing the passes, answering questions from residents, and checking identification of shoppers from Santa Rosa Plaza, he also managed to do several other jobs. Two emergency calls required his immediate attention. In addition, residents and guests were picking up six-month passes. Then the officers showed us four check lists that must be kept up to date.

"In spite of the hectic pace, the extreme pressure, and the arrogance of some of the callers, the guards remained calm, polite, courteous and extremely efficient.

"If these two men are examples of our security department, we are in very capable hands."

ILV commends George Pisors and Moe Kadish for taking the initiative to understand better the operation of services in the Village. It's this kind of 110% volunteer effort which makes Leisure Village the hallmark of active senior communities.



They met in New York City in 1924 and went together for three years, and were married in 1927.







On The Move With Karl And Henrietta Joehnck

No wonder Karl and Henrietta Joehnck heaved a sigh of relief when they moved from Westlake into Village 13 on February 28, 1976. Karl's successful and productive business career had led them from Ontario, CA to five East coast cities and then cross country to four California locations.

Moving experiences were never strange to Karl Joehnck. After graduating from high school in his home town of Rocky Ford, Colorado, Karl moved on to the University of Colorado to earn a BS degree in Electrical Engineering. In the manner of a mover and shaker, his next stop was the Harvard Business School where finances forced him to leave after one year. (Some years later he earned his MBA from UCLA.)

After successfully operating Rimat for nine years, a division of Bendix Corporation Karl's first job after bought the company. So what moves do Karl and Henrietta make after becoming villagers in February 1976. THE CERAMIC **PLUS CLUB**

The Ceramic Plus Marty Ettinger's demonstration on making latex Stearns, a landscape garmolds of objects and then casting in the molds, and a tape of last year's Albuquerque Ballooon Festival, which was brought in by Bernice Wells and shown on Channel 12's portable equipment by Al Pachter. This the same trip which the Travel Committee has arranged for villagers to go on this year, departing September 30.

Marty showed us how he first sculpts a clay figure, then forms a latex mold around it by pouring and painting the latex, actually a silicone material, until it is abut an inch thick. When this is set, he removes it from the original, reinforces it so it holds its shape, and then casts plaster into it, thereby duplicating his original. Any three dimensional object could be used, and any reasonable number of casts can be made. Latex is used for the mold material becasue it is flexible and can be removed from undercuts. By coating the inside of the latex mold with modeling wax, from a quarter to a half an inch thick, you then have the basic mold for casting metal by the lost-wax pro-



Guidelines For Contributors to ILV

Reporters and publicity people submitting material tob used in Inside Leisure Village will help the staff (and may enhance the reception of their material) if they will follow basic guidelines. These include:

- 1. Type all material if at all possible. If handwritten copy is absolutely necesary, submit it early, so that we can get it typed.
- 2. Use full size 8" x 11" sheets of paper. Odd size sheets can get lost.
- 3. DO NOT TYPE IN ALL CAPS: stories in all caps must be redone.
- 4. Put writer's name, address, and phone number in upper left corner.
- 5. Leave 2" of space at top of page for our nota-
- 6. Type group's name and writer's byline.
- 7. Double space between lines and indent each paragraph. (If we sound like English teachers, you're right!)
- 8. Put the name of your group into the FIRST sentence of your story. This makes it easier to match with the right logo.
- 9. Be sure your copy can be easily read. Do you need a new typewriter ribbon? Do the keys need

cleaning? No red ribbons or Xerox copies, please. Clean copy prevents misunderstandings. We suggest that you keep an accurate copy of your submission.

- 10. Submit your story on time. Deadline is on Monday at 5:00 p.m, usually the first Monday of the month. Deadlines for the next paper are listed on page 2 of each issue. Please check the exact date and meet it. All material should be placed in the ILV mailbox in the east hall of the Rec Cen-
- 11. If your story must be late, call the coordinator to see if a special arrangement can be made. Coordinator has the option to accept or refuse the copy.
- 12. Call the coordinator to arrange in advance for a photographer to cover your event. Do not call the photographer directly; he works on assignment from the coordinator only. Planning for each issue. including pictures, starts the first week of each month, so if you want pictures, we need notice.

There are about 70 items submitted to ILV for each issue. If writers use these standard rules, the result might be a better paper.





Therefore an update on the status of their archenemies, the crows; After checking with several persons in V 15, where their first invasion was, and V 11, where the tiny warblers were often seen chasing them so belligerantly at nesting time, there seem to be only a few crows left. They have moved farther west into the vicinity of V 4.

However, after questioning residents in Villages 15 and 11 we have not been able to find anyone who has seen a single songbird nestling learning to fly! In former years that activity has been a joy to watch in July and August. Mature robins, linnets, mocking birds, and warblers are still here, but there are no juveniles to






