THE Reverend William E. Gordon Gilkey, D.D., of the Mount Vernon Congregational Church, Springfield, Massachusetts. On commencement day, June 24, which completed the four-day reunion, the local pastor had the honor of serving as one of the aids to Hugh Lawrence Gaddis of Cleveland, Ohio, chief marshal of the day. **ST. PAUL'S WILL
RESUME IN FALL**

**Need of Repairs Reason for
Discontinuing Services
at Church Early**

In order that some much needed repairs to the church fabric may be started within a few days, services at St. Paul's Protestant Episcopal Church will be discontinued until the second Sunday in September, the Reverend William E. Patrick, rector, announced to his congregation at the morning service yesterday. This action was voted at the stated meeting of the rector, wardens and vestrymen held last week, when the finance committee consisting of Glen E. Stanfield, Dr. Fred J. Crease and C. E. Wakefield, Jr., reported that sufficient funds had been pledged to warrant a beginning of the alterations.

The present building, standing on the site of the first St. Paul's Church erected by the Reverend H. Horace Clapham in 1836 and later moved to East Bakersfield, was built under the rectorship of the Reverend Edward Morgan in 1901, being opened by the Right Reverend William F. Nichols, D. D., Bishop of California, January 1, 1902. The passage of time has caused several cracks in the masonry especially in the chancel arch and the arch over the west front door. The strengthening of these arches will be one of the main undertakings this summer.

Another item which will involve dismantling the nave of the church and removing all the pews, will be the removal of the two platforms on which the pews stand. These platforms have for years been a source of danger to members of the congregation through catching their heels in stepping down to the floor proper. It is planned to give the floor a thorough scraping and retouching and to put down a new carpet for the center aisle.

Later in the year the finance committee hopes to raise additional funds to take care of additional repairs to the church and Guild hall which should be done, but can wait a while longer.

The Reverend Mr. Patrick left today to join his family at their Rincon del Mar beach cottage, near Carpinteria where he can be reached by telephone in the case of emergency calls.

REPORT OF ST. PAUL'S ALTAR GUILD 1936

It has been said that all the Altar Guild does is polish the brass once or twice a year. For that reason, I'd like to give a detailed account of the many interesting duties that we perform weekly. The flowers or berries for the altar have to be gone after, as a rule, before the altar can be decorated. The communion vessels are arranged, the credence shelf is put in order, and so on.

On an average of two surplices are washed and ironed weekly by the members on duty for that particular month, and as the congregation leaves the church, some members of the Altar Guild go to the back to put things in order. We do try to polish the brass twice a year, besides arranging the altar for weddings, funerals and extra communion services that are held during the year. There is one member that takes as her responsibility the laundering of the Fair Linen Cloths, and we consider this quite a responsibility. At the end of every month, the cut-glass cruets for the wine and water are polished, also the silver that we use; and the extra pieces of linen, such as the corporals, purificators, etc., are left freshly laundered for the next members who will serve the following month.

The Altar Guild work is quite a responsibility, but it is such a vital part of our church life that it is thoroughly enjoyed by those who are willing and able to give the time to it. We would welcome some new members. There are no dues and very few formal meetings--we had only one during 1936 for election of new offers; but there was a working meeting forty-eight Saturday afternoons during 1936. We may not have money-making events, so, our linens, ribbons, silver and glass are all donations. There are only five "Saturday afternoon members" at present, but we are hoping for some new members in the near future.

The officers for 1937 are: Laura Covell, Secretary and Treasurer, Katherine S. Wakefield, President.

ARMISTICE SPEAKER



Major General Paul B. Malone, retired, father of Paul B. Malone, Jr., of the Anglo-California National Bank in Bakersfield, who will be the Armistice day speaker here in memorial services at 11 o'clock next Thursday morning in Fox theater. He will be introduced by the Rev. William E. Patrick, once chaplain in his regiment.

**Man of Many Decorations
to Speak Here November 14**

FORMER commander of the Third corps area and the Fourth field army, Major Paul B. Malone, Armistice day speaker here who is widely known as a public speaker, had a distinguished record of service in France during the World War, receiving many decorations for bravery.

The distinguished service cross was awarded him in 1921 for extraordinary heroism in the battle of Soissons in July, 1918. He also won the distinguished service medal in 1919 for exceptionally meritorious services in France; four silver stars citations for gallantry in action; the Croix de Guerre of France with two palms and one star; and has been named an officer of the Legion of Honor of France and a commander of the Crown of Italy. He holds the victory and other American campaign medals for service in battle.

Lieutenant-Colonel in 1917

Leaving for France as lieutenant-colonel in July, 1917, General Malone served with the operations section, GHQ; was promoted to colonel and became chief of the training section on the general-staff; and in February, 1918, was assigned to command the Twenty-third U. S. infantry, second division, and commanded his regiment in the trenches south of Verdun, in the Aisne-Marne defensive, in the Chateau-Thierry operations, and in the Aisne-Marne offensive.

By coincidence, the Reverend William E. Patrick, who will introduce General Malone on Armistice day, was chaplain of the regiment which he commanded in France. The Reverend Patrick, past national chaplain of the American Legion, also won the distinguished service cross.

Brigade Commander

General Malone in August, 1918, was assigned to command the Tenth brigade of the Fifth division, leading it in the St. Mihiel offensive and Meuse-Argonne offensive, and in forcing the Meuse river and capturing the high ground to the east. In October he was made brigadier general temporarily, an appointment made permanent in 1922, and commanded the Tenth brigade after the Armistice in Luxembourg, and later the Third brigade on the Rhine.

The speaker is a member of the Rotary Club, San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, the Baltimore Association of Commerce, the Elks, Pacific Union Club of San Francisco, the Army and Navy Club of San Francisco and the American Legion. He is well known as a public speaker on many subjects, such as insurance, transportation, unemployment, community welfare, art, music and religions, according to Z. V. Hoskins, Legion chairman in charge of Armistice day preparations.

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
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

Canon Graves presented the principles underlying the Christian Nurture Course, laying emphasis on the training in worship and service and in Church loyalty, the education of the emotional life of the child, a part of the Christian Nurture principle which is so often neglected for the informational side of the work. Mrs. Carrie G. Templeton, at one time director of Religious Education for the Diocese of Oklahoma, presented the subject of the preparation of the teacher for her work, the preparation of the lesson, and the general subject of the standards to teacher training set by the department of Religious Education of the National Council. She told of the National Accredited Teachers Association, and how it was possible for teachers to acquire credits looking toward the receiving of diplomas.

Miss Gardett was the only administrative officer present, so the Rev. Otis L. Mason, courteously waived his place on the program, and held a personal conference with her.

After the institute the teachers of the school entertained the group at a pleasant and bountiful luncheon in the parish hall. It was a great satisfaction to us all that the bishop was able to be present for part of the session, and the luncheon, but a disappointment that neither Porterville, Lindsay, Visalia or Taft were represented.

The institute for the Central Deanery proved to be less successful.

The Birthday Offering

The children of the Church have shown their love and loyalty by their splendid Birthday Thank Offering of \$32,386.29. It was presented to Bishop Creighton and will be used for Hooker School. There is an old saying "The King is Dead: long live the King"—which means that as soon as one ruler has passed away, allegiance must be transferred to the one who succeeds him.

It is so with the Birthday Thank Offering. Just as soon as one Offering is presented we must begin gathering the next one, and we shall have a splendid cause for which to save our birthday money during the next three years. The next Birthday Thank Offering will be used to build and equip a ward for children in St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo.

St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, was begun by Dr. Rudolf B. Teusler a quarter of a century ago in an old building with eight patients. Dr. Teusler is one of the outstanding missionaries in our Church. His name is known all through the Orient. Under his leadership the hospital grew to be the best-known one in the Far East, with many beds and a training school for nurses. He had just laid the foundation of another building which should be large enough to take in all who came for help when the terrible earthquake and fire of September, 1923, destroyed St. Luke's and nearly all the other buildings belonging to our Church in Tokyo.

Nothing daunted, Dr. Teusler hastily assembled an impromptu hospital barracks and tents and went on with his work of mercy. Now plans have been made for a fine new hospital which shall be "quakeproof" and fireproof.

It is for the children's ward in this new hospital that the Birthday Thank Offering to be presented in 1931 will be given.

The Department hopes that all teachers will interest themselves in this work. From time to time pictures and stories will appear in the Missionary Magazine of the Young Churchman. We hope that these will be emphasized in distributing them to the children. Also, there is a very appealing story called "We Must All Work Together" which tells in story form of St. Luke's Hospital and its work for children. It may be had of the Book Store 281 Fourth Ave., New York City.

Another matter in regard to the Birthday Offering has been brought to the attention of the department. It seems that in some parishes at least there has grown up a custom for the boys to avoid making their birthday offerings for fear of the traditional way that boys have for celebrating each

CHANGE IN THE CANONS

In accordance with the rule of convocation the committee on canons here reports the changes in the canons which it expects to introduce at the coming convocation.

Article III of the Constitution: The Ecclesiastical Authority of this Missionary District is vested in and exercised by its Bishop, or in case of his disability, through absence or otherwise, and while such disability lasts, shall be vested in and exercised by the Council of advice, acting under and in subordination to the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, its General Convention, Constitution, Canons and Regulations.

(This change is intended to bring our constitution into conformity with the canons of General Convention).

Canon XLIII, Sec. 432 (c) Repeal the section and substitute the following: (c) The Parishes and Missions shall be classified, and the amount required shall be distributed among them in a proportion which shall be determined by the Executive Council, subject to the review of the Convocation.

Canon XXIV, Sec. 246. Repeal the section and substitute the following: Sec. 246. The books of the Treasurer of the District shall be audited to the close of each fiscal year by a public accountant, not a member of convocation, to be appointed by the Executive Council. The Auditor's certificate that he has examined all the accounts of the Treasurer, with the result of his findings, shall be transmitted to the Executive Council within sixty days of the end of the fiscal year, and a copy of such certificate shall be appended to the Treasurer's Report as published in the Diocesan Journal.

Canon XLI, Sec. 415, Delete the last sentence and substitute the following:

Such report shall be audited by a public accountant, not a member of the convocation, to be appointed by the Executive Council. The auditor's certificate that he has examined such report, with the result of his findings, shall be transmitted to the Executive Council within sixty days of the end of the fiscal year, and a copy appended to the report as published in the Diocesan Journal.

Mrs. Ikin has asked Mrs. Adams, of St. John's Service League, Stockton, to write of the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary for the Bulletin. She writes as follows:

"No word could do the Convention and the meeting of the Auxiliary justice. The opening meeting in the open air amphitheater on Mt. St. Alban was a magnificent sight, one never to be forgotten by those who were fortunate enough to be there. The amphitheater seats twenty thousand and every seat was taken

"There were fifteen hundred in the procession. First came the vested orchestra of twenty-five pieces, then the choirs, led by the Crucifers and flag bearers, then the clergy and bishops. It was a most beautiful and colorful procession. President Coolidge was escorted by a delegation of bishops and seated on the speaker's platform. Bishop Freeman opened the service, followed by an address by the president, who spoke convincingly. He was then escorted out by three bishops, and Bishop Anderson, of Chicago, preached a splendid sermon.

"The following day more than four thousand and five hundred women attended the United Thank Offering Communion Service at half past seven in the morning at the cathedral. Thirty women dressed in white cassocks, with purple ribbons on their shoulders, and purple mortar-boards, acted as ushers. They were most dignified and performed their office in a beautiful manner. A number of bishops took part in this service, among them was our own beloved Bishop Sanford. It was a proud moment when the Thank Offering was presented.

"The meetings were all very helpful. The noon-day meditations by Miss Grace Lindley, were most inspiring. The religious pageant, "The Cross Triumphant," written by Mrs. Minnegerode Andrews, was a magnificent sight, a thousand people taking part in it.

Bishop and Mrs. Freeman gave several teas in their lovely garden. They were most gracious hosts.

"I do not know of a more beautiful place for a convention than Washington. The Washington women were very cordial, and everything was done for our pleasure and comfort. I am sure the delegates all went home feeling inspired and happy and grateful that they had been permitted to be present on so many memorable occasions."

The Store Room

Mrs. Young writes, "much interest is being manifested throughout the diocese in the store room which was founded by the supply department this fall.

"A great deal of good used clothing has been collected. Many groups are sewing on various articles, some are patching quilts, others making altar linens. A very gratifying report of the contents of the store room will be sent to headquarters the first of the year, and it is hoped that every unit of the league will have some part in that report."

THE REV. MR. BELLISS

Mr. Belliss, who was associated with us for so long, at Selma, Coalinga, and Lindsay is now chaplain of the City Missions Society of San Diego.

The society has placed a car at his disposal, and during the past year he has traveled 8,138 miles in the prosecution of the work of the society. In a report presented recently he told of 2698 visits with the sick and lonely folk in the institutions of that city and county, 61 services in the county hospitals, 1333 radio services, 41 drives in which he gave 130 patients a breath of the outside world, and many other ministrations. Through his solicitation friends have given victrolas, records, comfortable chairs and other comforts to the inmates of these institutions.

This will give a little picture of his life and work to those who are interested in him. Mrs. Belliss and their daughter Margaret are with him. His son, Cyril and daughter Dorothy are both in Manila, where Cyril is rector of the cathedral, and Dorothy in teaching in a Church school.

THE BISHOP'S LETTER

The General Convention of 1928 is over. There were enthusiastic gatherings, both religious and social, some able reports and constructive legislations, and a fine Pastoral Letter from the bishops which illuminates the two great problems which face us as Christians and citizens: church and world unity.

We are grateful for the completion of prayer book revision. The new book will be available in February. The cloth bound edition for the pews will cost twenty-five cents but will not be handled through the trade. A pertinent notice appears in another column. I am suggesting that in those parishes and missions where some other method of placing copies in the pews is not preferred, that each person buy two books, one for himself and one for his neighbor, and donate them to the congregation.

The General Convention adopted a missionary budget for the coming three years and has apportioned next year's quota to the several dioceses. We here have added to our share of the general obligation so much as is needed to supplement the salaries of the diocesan clergy and have apportioned the sum to the parishes and missions in proportion to their relative ability as measured by the item "current expenses" in the annual parichial report. And by this time the parishes and missions will have added their local budget to the parish's share of the general and diocesan expense, and will have begun to canvass their membership. I hope the canvass in each congregation will be a thorough one; for I am convinced that where the parishioners are adequately informed as to the use made of their contributions and asked personally to share in the enterprise there is no difficulty in meeting the budget.

The new church year began with this month and our eyes are turned towards Christmas. Many people think of Christmas with a sigh because the burden of giving presents has increased until what started as a spontaneous expression of affection has become a wearisome chore. When for any of us it becomes that, it is time to stop. It requires courage to fly in the face of a social convention but unless our gifts are prompted by the same urgency of love which we attribute to the Father who so loved the world that He gave his only begotten Son, they would better not be made. I am pleading for sincerity. The extravagance and sordidness of so much of the social exchange at Christmas tide is a perversion of the Christmas spirit. Nevertheless, underneath the social custom, though often deeply buried by trash, lies the motive which is pure and wholesome and beneficial. Let us relate our giving to that motive.

With the hope that in our social intercourse as well as in our fellowship at the Altar we may learn anew the joy of sharing in the love of the Heavenly Child who came to us as at this season, I wish you all a blessed Christmas.

History of the Diocese



ST. LUKE'S CHURCH, MERCED
(The Rev. W. A. Cash, Vicar).

We all know Merced as the Gate Way to Yosemite, know it by the dome of the court house which is the first thing we see as we approach it on the highway. But how many know it by St. Luke's Church, with its beautiful plant and its well kept lawn and gardens?

Merced, and St. Luke's mission with it, has not developed as rapidly as some others of our county town and missions. The reason for this lies in the great ranches, with their manor houses, which surround it, and occupy a large part of the arable land about it.

The division of these great ranches, and their settlement as small farms has been very slow, so the city has not grown as rapidly as have Modesto, Hanford, Visalia and Fresno.

The Mission

Merced was one of the many places where Church work was begun by the Rev. D. O. Kelley when he came to the San Joaquin Valley forty-nine years ago. In those days it seemed far from Fresno, the base of his operations. He held occasional services and began to get acquainted, but it was two years before regular services were begun.

In the fall of 1880, the Rev. L. Mott came to assist Mr. Kelley. He made his home in Modesto and began regular ministrations at Merced, organized a ladies guild and on the 20th of August, 1881, the Mission of St. Luke. During the summer of 1883, chiefly by the efforts of Mr. Mott, lots were secured facing the court house park, and a considerable building fund was raised for a chapel. Mr. Mott died suddenly in September of this year, not seeing the completion of the building, which was well under way. The chapel was completed, and the first service was held in it by the Rev. Kelley on Sunday, December 30, 1883. Mr. Kelley remained in charge until the following October.

Then came evil days to the county and the mission. A series of dry years discouraged everybody, and the few Church people who remained in Merced became disheartened and for a time the chapel itself was abandoned to the ravages of the weather and roaming beasts.

It was in this condition when Bishop Nichols found it at the time he made his first visitation five years later. Immediately determining to rescue the mission and the chapel from its forlorn state, he asked Mr. Kelley, who had again become general missionary of the valley, to give it his first interest.

It was not easy to persuade the discouraged people to try again, but with the promise of continued and consistent help from Bishop Nichols, they were gradually won to helpfulness, and within eight months Sunday School, guild and regular parish work were going smoothly, the chapel had been refitted, and a fine confirmation class presented.

Mr. Kelley then turned his attention to other fields, and was followed in Merced by a number of men, the most of whom did not stay very long.

Bishop Sanford Comes

When Bishop Sanford came in 1911, he called the Rev. W. L. Greenwood to become vicar, and during his ministry the present vicarage, one of the most adequate and pleasant in the diocese was built.

In May, 1913, the Rev. W. H. Hawken became vicar. During his tenure the old chapel was moved to the rear of the church grounds, made over into a parish hall, and the present splendid church edifice erected, and beautified with many memorial gifts, secured by him. Gradually the debt was paid, and in the Spring of 1917, the mission celebrated the end of that work. With the convocation of the diocese as its guest, the Church was presented to Bishop Sanford, and consecrated.

Mr. Hawken continued the ministry of the mission four years longer, and then, at the request of Bishop Sanford, resigned to become archdeacon of the diocese, and was succeeded at Merced by the Rev. W. H. Pond. Four years ago the Rev. W. A. Cash became vicar and is still in charge.

The chief difficulty under which the mission labors is the tendency of its people to move. Last year the mission had a strong Church School, but when Mr. Cash began his work this fall, he found that half the families who had been represented in the school had moved away.

There has come a change in the character of the county and city. Gradually the big ranches are being subdivided, and the city is improving in economic status, and in appearance. With this change has come a new hope for the work of St. Luke's Mission, and it is the expectation of the executive council that the next five years will make a great change in its life.

CHURCH INFORMATION
(How the Church does her work)

Christmas! "Peace, good will to men." It is with this thought that the Church Information column turns to:

Social Service

One of the departments of the National Council is devoted to social service, and most of the dioceses have social service departments.

Social Service is a very old thing. It is only the name that is new. It is the effort to apply the ethics of Christ to all our social and business relationships, and to the institutions of our nation and the world. For all its life the church has been trying to make human society Christian.

It is impossible to understand modern social service without some understanding of what is called the "Industrial revolution."

The industrial revolution was the change in human life and relationships that came with the invention of power tools. It began about the year 1800.

(1) Gradually steam and electricity drove out the small hand tools of previous generations. Craftsmen could no longer own the tools of their crafts. Fancy a locomotive driver owning his engine, and a right to run it on the tracks. Workman became dependent on those who could own the tools, for opportunity to work, for livelihood for their families.

Another example: Of old a man could own a grist mill, driven by water, the wind, or his own horses, own it and work it. No man could own and operate the great flour mills of today.

(2) Men had to live near their tools, the factories, so great industrial cities grew, and with them the slums.

(3) The owners of factory and mine ran them for their own profits, and repudiated any social responsibility for the people who were dependent on the operation of the tools.

Religion and the Revolution

At the time that this great change came upon our world, social religion was at low ebb. For two hundred years the emphasis of protestant religion had been on personal salvation, personal holiness. Even today our social ethics has not caught up with the problems of our industrial life.

The workers banded together in unions to secure fair play from the owners of their means of livelihood. There were great industrial wars. It is a long sad story.

Then came two great churchmen in England, Charles Kingsley and Frederick Maurice. They began an awakening of the Church to its duty to the people who were dependent on the owners of coal mines, factories, whatnots.

In our country there was formed the Church Association in the interests of Labor, to help bring industrial justice and peace, and to educate the people who were independent of "jobs."

The National Council

When the National Council was organized, the leaders of the movement tried to coordinate all the societies that were serving the Church, and put them under one budget, the idea that is followed in our community chests.

So well had the C. A. I. L., and others, done their work of educating Church folk, that Social Service became one of the departments of the National Council. Dean Charles Lathrop, a nationally known social service worker, became its executive secretary.

The work of the department has developed into five "Divisions."

(1) Educational work. Only as we, the common members of the Church scattered throughout the land, serve, can the Church serve. The officers in New York cannot take magazines to our jail, etc. The officers in New York can only awaken and guide us. So the department tries by publications, in-

CHANGES IN THE DIOCESE

There are to be a number of changes in the diocese with the coming of the new year.

The Rev. Ernest A. Shapland, who for the past six years has been vicar of the Chapel of the Holy Spirit, in the cathedral parish is going to an independent work as Vicar of St. John's Church, Lodi.

A new office of student pastor of Fresno State College has been created, and the Rev. Lee A. Wood, who has been vicar of St. John's Church, Porterville, for the past sixteen years has been appointed student pastor, and that he may have a base from which to work, he was elected vicar of the chapel of the Holy Spirit, at a meeting of the Cathedral Chapter held on the tenth of December.

The Rev. John Burleson, a brother of the Bishop Burleson who is nationally known as the Bishop of the Indians in South Dakota, and the author of "The Conquest of the Continent," and "Our Church and Our Country," is coming to Porterville to succeed Mr. Wood.

stitutes, summer schools and other ways to train the diocesan leaders, clergy and candidates for the ministry.

(2) Work in the public institutions like the county farms, jails, and sanitoriums, especially the county jails. The spirit of officialism often makes these inhuman institutions. The National Council Department is ready and eager to help local Christians, of parish social service departments deal with the problems rising from these institutions.

(3) Rural life. The drift to the cities has changed the character of our farms. They have been left in a back-water of our national life, where the work is incessant and cheerless and Christianity is disappearing. The department has been trying to waken the Church to its responsibility to the farmers and the rural communities, and is training both clergy and candidates for this work.

(4) Church Institutions. Our Church has always been foremost among Christian Communions in the number of its institutions for the less fortunate members of our communities. It has now 77 Church hospitals, 54 homes for the aged, 82 children's institutions, 11 houses of mercy, and many settlement houses.

In all institutions of this kind there is a tendency for the spirit of loving service to grow cold and impersonal, and the unfortunate inmates cannot do much to help themselves. It is part of the work of the department to keep the spirit of Christ alive, and to keep those in control in touch with the newest methods.

(5) Industrial Relations. A change for the better is coming over the spirit of many industrial managers, and the department is developing a division of industrial relationship that promises to be of great help in the humanizing and Christianizing of relations between employer and employee, a relationship that for many years has been held to be purely commercial.

In addition to these words the department has tried to keep before the conscience of men the horror and sin of war and to foster a spirit of good will between ours and other nations.

In our own diocese the Executive Council has a Department of Social Service consisting of the Dean, the Rev. A. L. Walters, and Messrs. Geo. A. Osborn, and F. A. Eckstrom, whose duties are similar to those of the National Department.

"O COME LET US SING"

The Good Manners of the House of God
(By Bishop Sanford)

A correspondent has asked whether the congregation should keep on singing the recessional hymn after the choir has left the church. What has already appeared in this column has doubtless been read by many with disapproval. But if the choir is to come in or go out singing a hymn it is the privilege of the congregation to join in it. The custom which prevails in some places of asking the congregation to be silent when the choristers are outside the door is intended to prevent the awkwardness caused by the congregation singing in one tempo and the choir in another while the distracted organist tries in vain to pull the two together. There is no rule about it. It is the privilege of any

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St. Paul's Parish Sixty Years

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The Protestant Episcopal Church in Bakersfield is the second of the non-Roman Catholic churches to be established, the first being the First Methodist Church.

Occasional services had been held prior to 1879 by the Reverend Messrs. W. H. Hill, A. Todhunter D. O. Kelley. The latter, indefatigable founder of San Joaquin Valley Churches, was appointed missionary-in-charge by the first Bishop of California, the Rt. Rev. Wm. Ingraham Kip, D. D. and in November 1879 organized St. Paul's Mission with D. G. McLean as warden. The Reverend Thomas A. Griffiths was the first clergyman to take up residence in Bakersfield as Archdeacon Kelley looked after such, contiguous places as Fresno, Modesto and Bakersfield, often travelling by buckboard.

When the third pastor, the Reverend H. Horace Clapham (1884-1892) was using what is now the Emerson School for services, Mrs. Alfred Harrell, then superintendent of the school and now the venerable publisher of the Bakersfield Californian for these forty years past and sometime vestryman of St. Paul's Church and Mrs. H. P. Bender, who as a young girl drove into Bakersfield from Greenfield to sing in the choir with the late Mrs. C. M. Chittenden as organist and still sixty years later an active communicant, - were teaching in the school.

On the third visit of Bishop Kip to Bakersfield in 1886 the first St. Paul's Church was opened on the 17th. Street site. SUFFRAGAN BISHOP HERON

Sleep Sharpens Brain, New Suffragan Bishop Declares

BISHOP BREWSTER

Dr. Heron Advocates Rest for Building Nerve Energy

The new Episcopal suffragan bishop of Massachusetts, whose election was approved by every diocese throughout the world, is a cleric who thinks people ought to have more sleep.

Consecrated in Trinity Church the Rev. Raymond A. Heron of Lawrence became today a top official in one of the wealthiest most powerful Protestant denominations.

Bishop Heron is an unusual clergyman. He is the rare combination of piety, frankness and clerical modernism.

In one breath he tells you that consecration ceremonies ought to be compressed to an elopement that sleep improves the intelligence of many Christians and that planting onions in a truck garden (without a robe) is good for a bishop's state of mind.

SYMBOLIZES ERA

The new suffragan bishop is a symbol of streamlined Christianity. He flicks a Phi Beta Kappa key in strong, firm hands. He speaks modestly of the fact that he was lifted—not from a fashionable parish—but from a congregation of mill workers.

He skips lightly over his "unemployment center" in Lawrence which carried 2000 communicants over the depression bumps in 1929.

He had a "good time" recently organizing a market-garden on the property of a summer camp which has been named Camp Heron.

Funds for the market were supplied by the comfortable parishioners as jobless mill workers burrowed in the garden. When Bishop Heron had time—and if he has time in the future—he would strip off his robe, roll up his sleeves and get going on onions, broccoli and potatoes.

BUILDING RESERVE

As for sleep to sharpen brains?

Bishop Heron advises: "Sleep is a much more active thing than we suspect. There are, of course, familiar examples of men waking up in the middle of the night to find that the sleeping mind has solved some problem they have wrestled with.


"More sleep builds physical and nerve reserve for the wide-awake mind. The mind, when it is awake, must have confidence. The human intellect's scope is much less limited than we think.

"A simple example of this is the self-conscious person who is sometimes capable of sallies of penetrating brilliance."

But the bishop insists a person who proceeds with calm, unworried assurance will constantly outstrip previous efforts.

As for today's consecration exercises.

"I wish," he said flatly, "that I could have been consecrated like some people who get married and just elope."

bishop at the consecration ceremonies. Co-consecrators were Bishop William Lawrence and Bishop Sherrill, with the latter also the preacher.

SEES WORLD FLIGHT

Bishop Sherrill said, in part, in his sermon:

"No special intellectual brilliance is required to see that the world of our day is in a serious condition. The fact is blazoned before us daily, in newspaper headlines, magazine articles and in many other ways.

"The world places the blame upon extreme nationalism, competitive armaments, racial antagonisms and high tariff barriers. The plain truth is that we are now paying the inevitable price of the breaking of the spiritual law of God. The law of God abides from generation to generation and continues to operate whether we are conscious of it or not.

"Our life has become increasingly secularized. As a positive force, God has been neglected in the realm of business as He has been ignored in the affairs of the family.

"Education has become so sophisticated that in a large measure religion in intellectual life has been killed by indifference."

The church itself is to blame in part for these conditions, Bishop Sherrill said. One reason it is to blame, he said, is that it has admitted "too many of the defects current in our generation and civilization."

ANOTHER REASON

Another reason for present-day conditions, Bishop Sherrill declared, is that people, nowadays, have come to place "too great stress on their own economic security."

The presenting bishops were Bishops Babcock and Moulton, and attending presbyters were the Rev. Malcolm Endicott Peabody, rector of St. Paul's Church, Chestnut Hill, Philadelphia, and the Rev. Archie Henry Crowley, rector of Grace Church, Lawrence.


Bishop William Appleton Lawrence read the litany and the Rev. Charles Hastings Brown, rector of Grace Church, Norwood, was deputy registrar.

2 Girl Bandits Get
Life at Hard Labor

One Weeps; Other Stolid as Judge Gives Sentence for \$2.10 Killing

NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 16—Hard-faced Ethel Sohl and flut-
tery Genevieve Owens reached the end of their thrill today.
Found guilty of slaying William Barhorst, suburban bus
driver, in a \$2.10 holdup last December, both girls were sen-
tenced to life imprisonment at hard labor.

Genevieve burst into tears and
buried her face in a handkerchief
when Judge Daniel J. Brennan pro-
nounced sentence. Ethel, true to
type, received the sentence without
a quiver in her pale, set face.

OLDER SISTER SHAKEN

Genevieve's older sister, Mrs. Min-
nie Koval, screamed and collapsed
with loud sobs.
"Oh, how awful—how awful,"
cried the heart-broken sister, as
attendants with difficulty half-
dragged her, screaming and hys-
terical, outside.
Ethel dabbed at her eyes as she
realized the penalty she and Gene-
vieve must pay for the \$2.10 hold-
up murder of Bus Driver William
Barhorst on Dec. 21—the culmina-
tion of their brief career of crime.
But no tears came.

When Genevieve began sobbing,
Ethel turned and looked at her dis-
dainfully, as if with her widely her-
alded Svengali influence she would
control the childish weeping of her
dark-haired Trilby.

SLEW BUS DRIVER

The two girls, pals in a weird
companionship that led them to
emulate the gun molls glorified in
gangland movies, waylaid Barhorst
in his passengerless bus at Belle-
ville, just outside of Newark, on
the night of December 21.

Stalking the bus in a stolen auto-
mobile the girls overtook it as its
last passenger departed. Parking
their car on a side street, Ethel
Sohl hailed the bus. Then, with
a .22 caliber rifle concealed be-
neath her cloak, she greeted Bar-
horst with:

"This is a stickup."
Before he could resist she fired,
the bullet piercing his heart. She
then snatched his change-carrier,
containing \$2.10, and fled.

Returning to their car, she threw
the change carrier into the lap of
her pal—whom she considered her
one-girl mob—and took the wheel.

"NOW HE CAN'T TALK"

"I shot him," she said calmly.
"Good," Genevieve replied.
"Now he can't talk."

Captured when Chippy reported
to her probation officer—she was
on parole—she first mentioned
casually that a boy friend had
killed Barhorst. Turned over to de-
tectives, she finally identified
Ethel's picture in a rogues' gallery
group.

Their trial began ten days ago.
Ethel based her defense on her
addiction to marijuana cigarettes—
they doped her, she said.

Chippy said she had been a dupe,
a pliant Trilby to the Svengali-like
influence of her dominating
"leader."

WASHINGTON—Jimmy Roosevelt, who once sold a quar-
ter million dollar insurance policy to the Columbia Broadcasting
Company, now has come quietly to the aid of the big broad-
casters in the fight over a government radio station.

Representatives of the State, War
and Navy departments have been
holding secret conferences lately
with a view to erecting a govern-
ment radio station. Chief factor
behind this is the German and
Italian radio programs in South
America and the necessity of doing
something to counteract the spread
of Nazism below the Rio Grande.
The War and Navy departments
also are anxious for a government
station as an aid to national de-
fense.

Accordingly, most of the details
for the station had been worked
out. Roosevelt had given his O. K.
and the departments were plan-
ning to throw administration sup-
port to the Celler bill authorizing
the construction of such a station.
Then suddenly son Jimmy stepped
in.

Jimmy summoned Chairman Mc-
Ninch and T. A. M. Craven of the
Federal Communications Commis-
sion and asked what they thought
of the government radio station
idea. Craven, always considered
friendly to the big broadcasters,
expressed his emphatic opposition.
McNinch did not express himself
very definitely either way.

However, Jimmy Roosevelt did.
Very pleasantly but pointedly, he
indicated that he thought the gov-
ernment radio station bill should
be tabled.

This word went across the street
to the State Department where
Judge R. Walton Moore, its trouble-
dodging counselor, seized it as a
good opportunity to side-track the
whole business.

The President, however, is under-
stood to be strong for building a
government station. So State, War
and Navy officials are planning a
showdown to see whether he or his
son is the real boss on the New
Deal radio policy.

ROOSEVELT RADIO LOBBY—
When Frank McNinch was asked
by the President to become chair-
man of the FCC, a job which he did
not greatly relish, he inquired if he
was to have a completely free hand.
The President replied that he
would. "Tasha McNinch, remember.

ing that Elliott Roosevelt had been
criticized for appearing before the
FCC regarding the transfer of some
Southwest radio stations, asked:

"Does that apply to the family
too?"

The President laughed and as-
sured him that it did.

STOCK MARKET STAMPEDE

—News that ex-Governor O. Max
Gardner of North Carolina was
slated to be the new czar of the
New York Stock Exchange touched
off such a storm from Wall Street
die-hards that the whole plan for
reorganizing the exchange is
threatened.

The denizens of Wall Street are
divided into three groups: liberals,
middle-of-the-roaders and die-hards.
In the latter category is the House
of Morgan, of which Charles Gay,
retiring head of the exchange, is
unofficial spokesman.

This group has let out a bellow
of indignation at the idea of being
ruled by anyone remotely friendly
to Roosevelt, and now is pushing
General Ironpants" Johnson or
Lewis O. Douglas, former director
of the budget (not to be confused
with William O. Douglas, head of
SEC) for the job. Both men have
turned bitterly against Roosevelt.
So die-hard brokers think they can
be trusted.

New Bishop Consecrated at Solemn Ceremony

Elected on Dec. 15 to succeed Suffragan Bishop Samuel G. Babcock, retired, Bishop Heron was elevated to his high office by a laying on of hands in which six bishops participated.

Presiding over the ceremony which filled Trinity to the eaves and through which hundreds stood to pay homage to the incoming bishop, was the presiding bishop of the National Episcopal Church, the Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, D. D., of Virginia, who is bishop as well of that Commonwealth. It was his first official act and his first consecration in the role of presiding bishop, so the diocese of Massachusetts was doubly honored.

The processional, led by the crucifer and the choir of Trinity, focused all eyes because of the dignity of those composing it, and the pageantry and color it contributed to an otherwise sombre scene. Brilliant hoods signifying the honorary degrees possessed by many in this long line varied from salmon pink through cardinal to deep purple, with here a green hood and there a blue one and frequently a combination. These, and the white vestments of the clergy, the choir, the white altar, and the ascension lilies upon it, with the flickering tapers were the relieving notes.

First came the masters of ceremonies who were the Rev. William E. Gardiner, D. D., of Trinity; the Rev. Henry McF. B. Ogilby of Brookline; the Rev. Wolcott Cutler of Charlestown, and the Rev. Arthur C. Lichtenberger of Brookline. These were followed by the students, faculty and trustees of the Episcopal Theological School. Representatives of the class of 1916, which was Bishop Heron's class, had special place in the line, also the vestry of Grace Church in Lawrence, Bishop Heron's last rectorship which turned out 200 parishioners for his consecration.

Other celebrants in the line were the

Rev. Francis Ellsworth Webster, secretary of the convention who read the certificate of Bishop Heron's election at his consecration; Archdeacon Howard Key Barstow of New Bedford and Archdeacon Arthur O. Phinney of Lowell; Judge Philip S. Parker, chancellor of the diocese; the Very Rev. Philemon F. Sturges, dean of the Cathedral Church of St. Paul, and then the attending presbyters, the Rev. Malcolm Endicott Peabody, rector of St. Paul's Church, Chestnut Hill, Philadelphia, and the Rev. Archie Henry Crowley, who is rector of Grace Church in Lawrence.

Hierarchy in Procession

The bishop to be consecrated, Raymond A. Heron, was followed in the procession by the presenting bishops, the suffragan bishop retired, Samuel G. Babcock, D. D., and Bishop Arthur Wheelock Moulton, D. D., missionary bishop of Utah; the co-consecrators, Bishop William Lawrence, D. D., LL. D., D. L. C. and Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill, D. D., LL. D., bishop of Massachusetts, who preached the consecration sermon with Presiding Bishop Henry St. George Tucker, last.

In the church sat Mrs. Virginia Heron, watching with proud, tear filled eyes the consecration of her son as a bishop of his church. Afterward, at the luncheon at the Copley-Plaza Hotel, Bishop Heron paid open tribute to his mother, saying that she had entered the ministry with him when he became a curate in 1916 and now she would begin her life as a bishop with him.

Another group in the church which gave Suffragan Bishop Heron happiness was a detail from the headquarters of the Boston fire department. He has been their Memorial Day orator and is held in high esteem by the whole department. Captain Patrick Mahoney of Enigne 1, president of the Officers' Club; Lieutenant Thomas M. Manning of Engine 12, of the Officers' Club, and William Ryan, Edward Coveney and George Fraser, representing the Russell Club and the Boston Firemen's Charitable Association, after the consecration service offered their congratulations in a body.

In all 10 bishops participated in the ceremony of consecration, four of whom had seen service at Grace Church in Lawrence. The four were Bishop William Lawrence; his son, Bishop William Appleton Lawrence of Western Massachusetts, Bishop Arthur W. Moulton of Utah and Suffragan Bishop Heron. Other bishops of the church taking part were Bishop Benjamin Brewster of Maine, Bishop John T. Dallas of New Hampshire and Bishop Vedder Van Dyck of Vermont.

1000 at Luncheon

At the luncheon which followed at the Copley-Plaza Hotel more than 1000 clergy and laity attended.

Bishop Tucker in the principal address declared this to be a real time of crisis for Christianity; with what we do at home and the example we set individually as Christians to prove that Jesus Christ can uplift and save in these modern times counting more than anything missionaries can do.

"There were more Christians in Japan in 1600 than there are today but it is not because missionaries have not done their work but because of the example of Christian countries in Europe, continually at war," said Bishop Tucker.

Depends on Example

"China and Japan are asking whether Christianity is worth adopting under conditions today. Whether either country becomes Christian depends on the example set by the Christian countries."

Bishop Sherrill presided at the luncheon and both Bishop Lawrence and Bishop Babcock testified to the high spiritual and ministerial qualities of Bishop Heron.

When it came his turn to speak, Bishop Heron took as his text—"This is the day that the Lord has made. We will rejoice and be glad in it."

"It is glorious and as much yours as mine. There is no group I would rather be with. God bless you all for giving this privilege to me."

Society Welfare

Later, he said that the church must be more effective in service and more vital in religion.

"The church must be very conscious of the welfare of society, for society is the heart of democracy and the church has a great responsibility to so interpret it," said Bishop Heron.

A reception in the crypt of the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in the late afternoon closed the day's programme. In the receiving line with Bishop Heron were Bishop and Mrs. Sherrill and Dean and Mrs. Sturges.

POLICEMAN SLAIN OVER \$7.70 FINE

Man Shoots Officer After Conviction as Drunk

ROCKLAND, Me., Feb. 16—Patrolman John D. Chapman, of the local police force, was shot and killed in the business section here tonight, by a man he had arrested earlier in the day, after he tried in vain to befriend him.

The man, police announced, is Harry B. Hall, 60, a former cattle dealer. Eight hours before police arrested him with a smoking revolver near the policeman's body, Hall had been found guilty of a drunkenness charge in court and ordered to pay \$7.70 costs.

AT BUSY CORNER

The shooting occurred at Park and Main streets in the heart of the business section. The policeman had gone on duty at 6 p. m. and 25 minutes later he lay dead on his beat.

Eye witnesses to the shooting, police said, told them that Hall walked behind the officer for several feet and suddenly shouted, "Chapman."

Officer Chapman turned around and heard the man say: "You fool with me and I'll fix you . . ."

Then a shot rang out. The policeman fell against a business block, reaching for his gun. Before he could draw, he dropped dead, the bullet having struck him above the right eye.

Horrified citizens ran for cover, while others telephoned to the police station. Hall, police said, stood 10 feet away from the policeman's body until three officers arrived and took him into custody. He handed a pearl-handled .32 calibre revolver over to a local policeman.

Chapman was a member of the police force for five years and was on his usual beat when slain. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

The only explanation police could offer for the shooting tonight was that Hall was angered over his arrest.

Ironical was the fact that Hall, police declared, was apparently unaware that the officer had tried in vain to befriend him earlier in the day before he arrested him.

Tried to Take Him Home

Hall was arrested early this morning by Officer Chapman, after the latter had been sent to a local hotel, where there had been a disturbance.

The officer reported to his superiors that he had "coaxed" Hall to the street and was about to take him home in his own automobile, when Hall became abusive and the officer was forced to arrest him.

In court later, Hall pleaded guilty to the drunkenness charge and was ordered to pay \$7.70 costs. The fine was waived by the court.

Officer Chapman was not in court. Tonight at 6 p. m. the officer reported for duty. Before going on the street he told his three brother officers of the night shift of his experience with Hall earlier in the day.

At 6:25 the officer was dead. Officials trying to piece the shooting together tonight expressed the opinion that Hall had encountered Officer Chapman on Maine street and followed him. The officer, officials believe, was walking away from the man, rather than argue with him.

After the shooting, Michael Armata, owner of a clothing store, told police that he was one of the eye witnesses. He said that he heard Hall mumble, "you fool with me and I'll fix you . . ." before the gun went off.

Armata said the policeman slumped to the sidewalk, dead, before he could get his revolver out from under his uniform.

Officer Chapman, after the early-morning arrest, told brother officers that Hall had been drinking in the hotel with a traveling man, and that he had acted all right until Chapman tried to take him home, after walking him out of the hotel. Arrest became necessary because of Hall's abusive actions at that time, he said.

Charged With Murder

Patrolmen Myron Drinkwater, Forrest Hatch and Robert Sadler, were quickly on the scene, following the shooting. Officer Drinkwater took the revolver away from Hall, he said.

Hall was taken to the county jail for questioning by Sheriff C. Earl Ludwick and County Attorney Jerome Burrows. Sheriff Ludwick said that Hall will be arraigned in court in the morning on a charge

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 16 (AP)—

Paul A. Wright, former airport executive who killed his wife and his best friend, was technically freed today by the same jury which convicted him last week on two counts of manslaughter.

The jury convicted Wright in three hours on his straight plea of innocence, but deliberated 18 hours before it found him innocent by reason of insanity. He had been charged with the murder of Mrs. Wright and John Kimmel.

WRIGHT COLLAPSES

"It appears to the court that the defendant has regained his sanity," Superior Judge Ingall W. Bull announced. "I therefore remand the defendant to the custody of the sheriff until his sanity has been decided in the manner prescribed by law."

Under routine legal procedure, Wright's case will be referred to a psychopathic court for a hearing. If, at that hearing, it is determined that he is sane, he will be given his freedom.

The court indicated later that Wright will be in custody for only a day or two, or until the examination to determine his present mental condition is held.

The courtroom was in an uproar after the verdict was read. Halted by bailiffs, cheering broke out again after Judge Bull left the bench.

Wright collapsed and was carried from the courtroom, where he had spent the last month fighting for his life.







"To honor the dead who made the supreme sacrifice, to affirm a new duty to the disabled and to determine to build a firmer structure for the safeguarding of peace—these are the obligations upon all Americans." Such was the statement of the Reverend William E. Patrick, past national chaplain of the American Legion, addressing a crowd of approximately 500 persons at a special Armistice Sunday service at the First Baptist church last evening.

The speaker went on to outline three ways in which America could continue the peace which she has enjoyed the past 18 years.

Peace Program

"An adequate national defense, strict neutrality on the economic front as well as the military in case of other nations' quarrels and congressional legislation for the drafting of capital, industry and man power on the basis of equality with special privilege and profit for none in the event (which God forbid) of our participation in another armed conflict," he said, "should be the major points in our peace program."

Members of the Bakersfield posts of the American Legion and of the Veterans of Foreign Wars together with the two auxiliaries, attended the service in a body with their respective colors. At the close of the service Bugler George Nazir of Frank Reynolds Post 26, American Legion sounded taps.



Three impressive services will give the Bakersfield faithful opportunity for worship during Holy Week under auspices of Bakersfield Ministerial Union, it was announced today.



Malone, Jr., of the Anglo-California National Bank in Bakersfield, who will be the Armistice day speaker here in memorial services at 11 o'clock next Thursday morning in Fox theater. He will be introduced by the Rev. William E. Patrick, once chaplain in his regiment.

Man of Many Decorations to Speak Here November 11

FORMER commandant of the Ninth corps area and the Fourth field army, Major Paul B. Malone, Armistice day speaker here who is widely known as a public speaker, had a distinguished record of service in France during the World War, receiving many decorations for bravery.

The distinguished service cross was awarded him in 1921 for extraordinary heroism in the battle of Soissons in July, 1918. He also won the distinguished service medal in 1919 for exceptionally meritorious services in France; four silver stars citations for gallantry in action; the Croix de Guerre of France with two palms and one star; and has been named an officer of the Legion of Honor of France and a commander of the Crown of Italy. He holds the victory and other American campaign medals for service in battle.

Lieutenant-Colonel in 1917

Leaving for France as lieutenant-colonel in July, 1917, General Malone served with the operations section, GHQ; was promoted to colonel and became chief of the training section on the general staff; and in February, 1918, was assigned to command the Twenty-third U. S. infantry, second division, and commanded his regiment in the trenches south of Verdun, in the Aisne-Marne defensive, in the Chateau-Thierry operations, and in the Aisne-Marne offensive.

By coincidence, the Reverend William E. Patrick, who will introduce General Malone on Armistice day, was chaplain of the regiment which he commanded in France. The Reverend Patrick, past national chaplain of the American Legion, also won the distinguished service cross.

Brigade Commander

General Malone in August, 1918, was assigned to command the Tenth brigade of the Fifth division, leading it in the St. Mihiel offensive and Meuse-Argonne offensive, and in forcing the Meuse river and capturing the high ground to the east. In October he was made brigadier general temporarily, an appointment made permanent in 1922, and commanded the Tenth brigade after the Armistice in Luxembourg, and later the Third brigade on the Rhine.

The speaker is a member of the Rotary Club, San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, the Baltimore Association of Commerce, the Elks, Pacific Union Club of San Francisco, the Army and Navy Club of San Francisco and the American Legion. He is well known as a public speaker on many subjects, such as insurance, transportation, unemployment, community welfare, art, music and religions, according to Z. V. Hoskins, Legion chairman in charge of Armistice day preparations.

Name Patrick on Two Committees

The Reverend William E. Patrick, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, has been notified of his appointment by the Right Reverend Louis C. Sanford, D. D., bishop of San Joaquin to two committees of the diocesan executive council, namely promotional and finance, being appointed chairman of the promotional committee under the reorganization plan of the executive council as arranged at the last quarterly meeting held at Fresno.

Ball, Grid Game, Fireworks Slated as Closing Events

MARCHING feet and martial music echoed the stirring days of 1918 today as Bakersfield celebrated the twentieth anniversary of the signing of the armistice, marking 20 years of uninterrupted peace for the United States. Before thousands of patriotic citizens who lined the downtown streets, gaily decorated floats, brilliantly uniformed marching units and cars filled with distinguished guests, city and county officials participated in the annual parade.

Special significance of this year's Armistice day celebration lay not only in the fact that it was the twentieth anniversary of the signing of the armistice but that it also marked the first observance of the day as a national legal holiday.

Continuing the Armistice day observance, hundreds of citizens crowded the Fox theater to attend memorial exercises which featured Colonel C. H. Mason, chief of staff of the first reserve area, as principal feature. A pageant entitled "Twenty Years Ago" also was presented.

In the afternoon Bakersfield High School tangled with Pasadena in a football game at Griffith Field arranged under auspices of the American Legion.

Fireworks Display

One of the outstanding features of the celebration will be the gigantic fireworks display tonight at 7:30 o'clock at the fairgrounds, depicting episodes in the history of Kern county. It will be presented by Frank S. Reynolds Post of the American Legion.

Concluding event of the celebration will be the official Armistice day ball tonight at 9 o'clock at La Granada ballroom.

Heading the first division of the parade this morning were nine black and white cars of the California Highway Patrol, followed by 14 motorcycle officers of the patrol. They were followed by four cars carrying Gold Star mothers.

In the next car rode Colonel C. H. Mason, distinguished guest and speaker at the memorial exercises; Wesley Waldon, commander of Frank S. Reynolds Post of the American Legion; Phil C. Pifer, general chairman of the Legion's Armistice day celebration committee, and Verne Austin, parade chairman.

They were followed by a car carrying Mrs. C. H. Mason; Mrs. H. E. Powell, president of the American Legion Auxiliary; and the Reverend William Patrick and Paul Malone, aides to Colonel Mason.

Official Groups

Succeeding cars carried Superior Court judges, county officials, members of the board of supervisors, the city manager, and members of the city council. A car representing the 20-30 Club was also included in the first division.

Concluding the first unit were two city fire trucks and four county fire department trucks. Leader of the first division was Captain E. K. Baum, Lieutenant William A. Howell was liaison officer.

Although entirely unscheduled, the 40 and 8 Voiture's engine and box car provided a feature attraction when it capsized on Truxtun avenue, halting the line of march for several minutes, and bruising the occupants of the Voiture's somewhat erratic vehicle. Cannoneer Sam Pinnell was the most seriously injured, having landed on his trigger finger. A turn cut too sharply was blamed for the mishap, which achieved no damage.

COL. C. H. MASON SPEAKER AT HUGE ARMISTICE MEET

Nonaggression Policy Is Credited With Peace for United States

AMERICA'S 20 years of peace since 1918 have been achieved through the nation's steadfast dedication to a policy of nonaggression.

That was the Armistice day message, brought to citizens of Bakersfield today by Colonel C. H. Mason, chief-of-staff of the first reserve area, who delivered the principal address at exercises held at the Fox theater after the parade.

Need Alertness

Colonel Mason declared that America had never been the aggressor in act or in thought, but that she must be constantly on the alert to continue the 20 years of peace already experienced, the longest period in American history that has been free from wars of any type.

"Peace comes through the will of human beings; it is not a natural state," said the speaker. He called attention to the fact that "peace is created by soldiers; in America they are never the ones who start the wars."

Chairman

Colonel Mason was introduced by Wesley Waldon, commander of Frank S. Reynolds Post of the American Legion, under whose auspices the entire day's celebration was staged.

The Reverend William E. Patrick of Frank S. Reynolds Post served as chairman of the meeting and delivered the invocation. The meeting was called to order by Commander Waldon as though it were a regular meeting of the Legion Post. Participants in the day's activities who were introduced by the Reverend Patrick were the following:

Twenty Years Ago was the title of the skit presented before the principal address. It represented a Salvation Army canteen in 1918 and was put on by high school and junior college students, costumed as soldiers, Red Cross nurses and Salvation Army workers. Several songs of that period were sung.

Taps were sounded by George Nasser, Stanley Woodward and Owen Conway, all members of the Legion drum and bugle corps.

Special Offering Will Be Collected

RED CROSS WORK TOPIC OF PASTOR

Training for Emergency Is Outlined for Work in Kern County

"What to do as well as what not to do in cases of accident, injury or sudden illness, is the basis of the truly co-operative service of the First Aid committee of the American Red Cross, Bakersfield chapter," comments the Reverend William H. Patrick, member of the chapter board, in outlining work being done by the committee in Kern county.

Training against such emergencies is being given to many this year, he says, through work directed by a voluntary committee composed of R. J. Williamson, vice-chairman, C. H. Phillips, E. A. Goss, Captain L. R. Galyen and Dr. R. E. Scherb, medical adviser.

Training School

An institute for Red Cross instructors has been conducted by H. P. Terwilliger, of the first aid department of the Pacific area. Out of this institute, eight persons received new appointments and six became new instructors.

Four other instructors have acted as medical officers for CCC camps in this district. In all, 17 classes have been conducted by these 13 instructors, training 224 new first aid operators. Fifteen junior, 183 standard and 26 advanced certificates have been issued through the service of these volunteer instructors.

Sponsor Groups

Sponsoring groups include the Boy Scouts, CCC companies of Isabella and Inyokern, Kern County Union High School, Kern County Camp Fire Girls, McFarland High School and night school, P. T. A. of Standard School, fire department of Shafter, Shafter women, state highway maintenance department, Wasco branch committee of Red Cross, WPA of Bakersfield, Delano and Wasco.

In addition, the committee supervises two highway first aid stations, by which much suffering may be alleviated before medical aid and hospital care could be secured for injured persons. Kits at these stations have been frequently refilled, and "Emergency First Aid" signs have identified the stations for all.

Services had been resumed early this month, but further inspection of the break in the masonry of the chancel arch has revealed the possibility of a collapse of this central feature of the building. Therefore, upon the advice of Roy H. Hubbard, Bakersfield building inspector, the officers of the parish voted to proceed immediately with the repairs and close the building in the interest of public safety rather than expose the members of the choir, Sunday School and congregation to possible injury. The committee in charge consists of Glen E. Stanfield, Dr. Fred J. Crease and C. E. Wakefield, Jr.

Rev. Barnes Addresses Club on Religion Theme at Meet

ONE'S religion should give intellectual integrity, psychological soundness and social courage, said the Reverend Canon C. Rankin Barnes, pastor of the largest Episcopal Church in San Diego, when he spoke Monday night at Hotel El Tejon at a dinner meeting of the Business and Professional Women's Club.

His subject was "Religion in the Life of the Average Business Woman of Today." He defined his terms and showed the peculiar need of the person who is making a daily adjustment of hearth and market place, for "loyalties to value objects of paramount importance in life."

Impediments

The speaker said impediments to religion include: being repelled by pettiness in the lives of certain people who claim devotion to religion; sheer ignorance; and pseudo-scientific attitudes. The confusion of fear with wonder in the source of religion was commented upon as was the "low market value of religion, which gives nothing to exhibit." The speaker distinguished between science with its facts and religion with its values higher than religion and cited convincing illustration to show no conflict between the two.

Moderns Groping

That the world is groping for something to afford a renewal of resources is evidenced in the popularity of such books as Link's "Return to Religion," he showed. He quoted the Sherwood play "Pettrified Forest" in which the chief actor carries the book "Modern Man in Search of a Soul," and read excerpts from Westcott's "The Modern Family."

Music Enjoyed

The evening's musical program was one of particularly satisfying content. Miss Aileen Hartzog, pianist, Mrs. Jack Tyler, violinist, Mrs. Walter Jaynes, vocal soloist, and Mrs. A. R. Hoisington and Miss Hartzog, accompanists, combined to create an interlude of much delight.

Two other features gave charm to

the evening. One was a simple portrayal of the club's emblem arranged by Mrs. John Crawford and her committee through an electrical device, and a "charge" to new members, delivered by Miss Dorothy Donahoe, central district president.






Bishop Urges Joint Effort To Defeat Paganism

Sanford Is Speaker At Opening Sessions Of Episcopal Convention

The twenty eighth annual convocation of the Episcopal Diocese of San Joaquin opened today at St. James' Cathedral with a plea by Bishop Louis C. Sanford for the laity and clergy to plan their common efforts intelligently "to meet the pressure of the new paganism which is triumphantly knocking at our doors."

"We of the clergy are often unaware," said Bishop Sanford, "of the weakness of our faith or the imperfections of our technique. Sometimes we regard our job as a static one, so many services to be held, so many sermons to preach, so many calls to make. A static clergyman in a static job soon will produce a static congregation and static congregations inevitably diminish."

Mistake Congregations

"Often times we regard the congregation as a flock of sheep or an army, figures often improperly used to picture a helpless, mindless aggregation steered into whatever pastures the herder chooses, or a body of goose steppers whose only function is to obey the captain in command for the day."

"The autocratic pastor who herds his people like sheep or issues orders destroys initiative and interest. Planning together with them, we can challenge the interest of the wisest and strongest in our communities."

First reports of the committee on revision of the diocesan canon law, inaugurated in 1934, were heard during the sessions. Proposed changes include removal of distinction between parishes and missions, application of rotation in office to the diocesan executive council and decision of certain elections by plurality vote.

The bishop was celebrant at ordination ceremonies for C. Aaron King of Fresno, for some time lay reader and supply pastor in the diocese.

Bishop Shirley H. Nichols of Kyoto, Japan, was a visitor at the convocation late today and will speak tonight at the annual convocation dinner in the Hotel Fresno. Bishop Sanford will be the toastmaster.

Church Service League meetings will open tomorrow and continue through Thursday. A scheduled feature is an address, set for tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock by Miss Abbie Nicholson, assistant supervisor of migrant work, western area of the Council of Women for Home Missions.

Final report on the canon law revisions and election of officers will conclude the convocation sessions tomorrow.

Kyoto Bishop Defends Japan's Policy In China

Bishop Shirley H. Nichols, Episcopal bishop at Kyoto, Japan, said in Fresno yesterday the attitude of Americans towards China was a case of "sympathy run wild."

He said he considered himself pro Chinese until he found out "what Americans do not know, or will not know, about the Oriental situation."

"The nine power treaty guaranteeing the territorial integrity of China, which Japan has been accused of breaking," Bishop Nichols said, "has only cloaked the exploitation of China by the great powers, who speak on disinterested principle as far as it is convenient and act according to their interests."

Bishop Nichols was present at the twenty eighth annual convention of the Episcopal diocese of San Joaquin, which held closing sessions at St. James' Cathedral yesterday, and a speaker at a diocesan dinner meeting in the Hotel Fresno. Bishop Nichols has been in Japan since 1911 and is returning from the recent Episcopal general convention in Cincinnati.

Forced To Act

"Japan," Bishop Nichols said, "cut off by tariff walls from supporting its population industrially, and cut off by exclusion acts from sending their people abroad, has been forced by other powers to turn to China as the only source of raw materials and the only market for its goods."

He said Japan unquestionably aims at setting up a Chinese government in China favorable to Japan.

A revote was called on the election of delegates to the provincial synod in Las Vegas, Nev., May 4th.

Among Dean Robbins' other books are "Cathedral Sermons," "Collected Poems," "Charles Lewis Slattery" and "Paul Revere Frothingham."

In 1926, while serving as national chaplain of the American Legion, the Reverend William E. Patrick, at the invitation of Dean Robbins, had the honor of preaching the Memorial day sermon at the Cathedral in New York.

Young "Sleeping Sickness" Victim Is Gaining Steadily

KERN county's only known victim of encephalitis, commonly referred to as "sleeping sickness," is declared by Dr. Joe Smith, superintendent of county hospitals, to be showing remarkable improvement. Burton F. Covell Jr., 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Burton Covell, 432 Bell, Riverside, became infected with the mysterious disease following an attack of measles.

Young Covell is a freshman at Kern County Union High School and will, in spite of the loss of time from his present illness, progress to sophomore work because of his excellent grades during the past year, according to Superintendent H. A. Spindt.

Epidemic encephalitis is a highly communicable disease which is very rare in the United States and of which comparatively little is known. Encephalitis as a result of a lesser disease occurs in less than one-half of one per cent of such diseases, which makes its incidence quite

low, according to health authorities. Young Covell acquired the disease following an attack of measles. Prompt recognition of the rare malady; early treatment, including a blood transfusion; combined with the fact that the boy has a strong heart and well-cared-for body, are responsible for his quick rally from the drowsy stupor common to the disease, according to Doctor Smith.

"All acute infectious diseases such as measles, smallpox, mumps, influenza and other very common diseases are sometimes complicated by nervous disorders which indicate an involvement of the brain, spinal cord or meninges," said Doctor Smith; "The utmost care should be taken of persons afflicted with even the most trivial illness in order that such complications may be avoided. Vaccination will prevent smallpox, typhoid, diphtheria and other communicable diseases," Doctor Smith said.



Patrick, vice-president of the diocesan service league of San Joaquin, spoke of the adoption of a resolution by the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Protestant Episcopal Church expressing sympathy with the Jewish people of central Europe. Whereupon the Bakersfield church federation board adopted the following resolution:

"We, the executive board of the church federation, representing the women of the various churches of Bakersfield, desire to express our grief and dismay at the persecution of the Jewish people in central Europe.

"At this Christmas season when we remember a Jewish family for whom there was no room in the inn at Bethlehem, we are sorrowfully aware of the countless numbers of their race who are today seeking shelter for themselves and their children.

"We call upon the women throughout the church to celebrate the birth of Our Lord Jesus Christ by showing in simple, friendly ways their sympathy with their Jewish neighbors and by making welcome refugees who have come to this country. We also urge them to promote international government action for the relief of refugees and to work for a larger measure of justice and consideration for all Jews and other minority groups in our national life."







Propaganda Danger Described by Judge as Paramount Peril

DEVELOPMENT and maintenance of a "stern conviction of permanent peace for America and a steadfast will to keep out of war regardless of what future contingencies may arise," was the theme of guest speaker, Judge Leonard Wilson's speech at today's Armistice Day program in the Fox theater. The judge asked his comrades of 21 years ago and all Americans to do all in their power to prevent this country from entering into another World War.

The program began at 11 a. m. as the last bugle call floated into the morning sunshine and Armistice Day parade contingents disbanded and streamed into the Fox with hundreds of parade followers and participants in time for the singing of "America," and the invocation by the Reverend A. S. Donat. With the Reverend William E. Patrick, past national chaplain of the American Legion, presiding, many patriotic events filled the program.

Delusion
In his speech, Judge Wilson declared that for many years Americans have been deluding themselves that World War No. 1 was to end all wars and to make the world safe for democracy. "As a matter of fact," he said, "17 major wars have taken place since the first Armistice."

The speaker remarked that this Armistice Day "finds us approaching the celebration in an entirely different attitude and with an entirely different problem confronting us." He pointed out that the principal problem today for Americans is that of building up a strong shield against the growing force of propaganda, which was used so effectively to drag us into the last war and "which is rolling up its big guns again today."

Judge Wilson stated that the majority of United States citizens say, "I do not see how we can keep out of this war" and when asked why we cannot, they have no convincing answer. He asked his audience to work actively for the retention of America's peaceful relations with other countries of the world.

Chorus Sings
Following the invocation by the Reverend Mr. Donat, "Prayer of Thanksgiving" was sung by the combined chorus of the American Legion Auxiliary glee club and the mother's chorus of the P-T-A, led by Charles E. Wakefield, Jr., with Miss Florence Bayless at the organ.

Presiding Officer Reverend Mr. Patrick presented Commander Z. V. Hoskins, who gave a brief talk on Armistice Day and Americanism. Commander Hoskins was followed by the introduction of commanders and presidents of service organizations. The combined chorus then rendered "God Bless America," after which Judge Wilson was presented to make the principal speech.

After the judge's speech, on "Permanent Peace for America," "Taps" was sounded by George Naser, American Legion bugler, and the audience remained until Bakersfield's Gold Star Mothers withdrew.

MOTIVEL

THERE are many things in our world and in our country for which we cannot be grateful," said the Reverend Benjamin B. Baird, pastor of First Christian Church, in delivering a sermon glistening with common sense, this morning. The occasion was the annual Thanksgiving gathering of hundreds of Bakersfield's faithful at First Baptist Church. He continued, "Our annual crime bill is \$5,000,000 more than the cost of all our educational institutions, all our churches and all our charities put together. Who can be grateful for that? Our American poverty, who can be thankful for that?"

"We have 34,000,000 young people between the ages of 5 and 18 years in this country and barely half of them are receiving any formal religious instruction, Catholic, Protestant or Jewish. Unemployment, war, legalized gambling, selfish makers of armaments, purveyors of liquor, promoters of selfish business and contemptible policies—all these and more stir within us something altogether other than gratitude!"

Some Grateful Reasons

After this challenging introduction, which followed a text from Ezekiel, "The foundations thereof shall be uncovered," the pastor summarized substantial reasons Americans have for being grateful.

He contended that they have grown impatient with the spirit of gratitude that is little more than refined selfishness—gratitude for abundant crops, good business, health and other things on a material plane and that there is a growing gratitude for the spirit that makes for righteousness. He illustrated his point with quotations from thousands of young folk in conference and from Albert Einstein, who paid high tribute to the church as a force against Hitler's campaign for suppression of truth. The speaker concluded: "There is a spirit abroad that is breaking down men's faith in physical force. Let us be grateful that trust in hate and brute force is losing its power and better foundations for life are being uncovered."



Harvard College Announces Opportunities for Local High School Students

Bakersfield students have a chance at eight Harvard College scholarships offered this year, it was announced today by the Reverend William Patrick, alumnus of the college, who received the information concerning the scholarships from Henry Chauncey, assistant dean of Harvard. Twenty-one scholarships, each with maximum stipends of \$1000 each, are offered to entering freshmen from schools in 17 states in the middle west, south and far west.

Stipends are adjusted individually, from a prize of \$100 to \$1000 for those whose families cannot pay anything for their college education. Awards are made on the basis of school records, scholarship examinations and character references.

Applications must be filed at Harvard by March 15 and the winners will be announced in June.

REV. PATRICK TRACES ST. PAUL'S GROWTH

"The first services according to the Prayer Book of the Protestant Episcopal Church to be held in Kern county were conducted by the Right Reverend William Ingraham Kip, D. D., first bishop of California, in October, 1855," the Reverend William E. Patrick, rector of St. Paul's Church, told his congregation at the morning service yesterday. Bishop Kip held services and baptized several children at the Fort Tejon army post before moving along by slow wagon train up the valley to Fort Miller and Stockton, a weeks-long journey from San Pedro. The address, in part, was as follows:

"In addition to Roman Catholic services, itinerant Episcopal clergymen held services at the old county seat of Havilah. Their names have long been forgotten. After the removal of the county seat to the new town of Bakersfield occasional services of the Book of Common Prayer were conducted by the Reverend Messrs. W. H. Hill, A. Todhunter and D. O. Kelley.

Organized in 1879

"To Archdeacon Kelley, indefatigable founder of missions throughout the San Joaquin valley, goes the credit of definite organization of St. Paul's mission in November, 1879. The Reverend Thomas A. Griffiths was the first resident clergyman, resigning on account of ill health in 1883.

"When the third pastor, the Reverend H. Horace Clapham (1884-1892), was conducting services in what is now the Emerson School, Alfred Harrell, publisher of The Bakersfield Californian and former vestryman of St. Paul's Church, was city superintendent of schools. One of his teachers, Mrs. H. P. Bender, still an active communicant, used to drive into Bakersfield from Greenfield as a young girl to sing in the choir with the late Mrs. W. A. Chittenden as organist.

Open First Church

"On the third visit of Bishop Kip to Bakersfield in 1886, the first St. Paul's Church was opened on the Seventeenth street site. In 1891 when Bishop William Ford Nichols consecrated the church, the mission assumed independent parochial status.

"The Reverend Messrs. L. Y. Jessup, F. D. Miller, David Holmes, Hobart Chetwood ministered in the old church. In 1898 the Guild hall still in serviceable use was built. Active in the guild, which was instrumental in sponsoring the erection of a Guild hall, were Mrs. Alfred Harrell and Mrs. A. C. Maude, regular communicants today.

"In 1901 under the leadership of the Reverend Edward Morgan the new church was constructed.

"The old church was moved to East Bakersfield where for many years it was known as St. Barnabas' Chapel.

New Church Built

"On January 1, 1902, Bishop Nichols of California opened the new church, at the same time blessing the beautiful marble altar, the gift of the late Mrs. William S. Tevis, known as the Romualdo Pacheco Memorial, in memory of her father, former governor of California. Under the Reverend Charles Hitchcock nearly all the indebtedness on the church was erased making it possible for the Right Reverend Louis C. Sanford, D. D., who had been elected first missionary bishop of San Joaquin, when the great valley and mountain counties adjoining were set off as a separate jurisdiction, to consecrate the church May 18, 1915, the Reverend Benjamin Diggs being rector.

The instrument of donation was read by Thomas A. Metcalf, senior warden.

Convocation in Kern

"Consecration of the church was held at the same time the first convocation of San Joaquin visited Bakersfield. Alfred Harrell was toastmaster of the convocation dinner held at the Southern hotel. In addition to Bishop Sanford, the speakers included Colonel A. S. Crites, Colonel Ira Hochheimer and Judge T. N. Harvey.

"Under the Reverend David M. Crabtree, rector from 1907 to 1912, the pipe organ now in use in St. Paul's Church was installed. Preceding Mr. Crabtree for two years was the Reverend Walter B. Clark and following him were the Reverend Messrs. Charles Hitchcock, Benjamin E. Diggs, George E. Renison and the Reverend William A. Cash, who moved to Merced in 1924.

"Convocation met in St. Paul's Church for the second time after 13 years in January, 1928. Bishop Sanford was then on a tour of the missionary work in the orient, at the request of the National Council. The Reverend William E. Patrick presided at the convocation dinner.

Baptize 288 Persons

"The rector in the last quarter of the 60 years' history of the parish has baptized 288 children and adults, presented 213 persons for confirmation and officiated at 311 burial services, in addition to carrying on the regular Sunday and week-day services of the church.

"In the church school we should give a certificate of merit to Miss Margaret D. Gardett, superintendent, who has given 28 years to Sunday School work and to Mrs. W. B. Lyons, who is finishing her twentieth consecutive year as superintendent of the primary department."

January 1940

At the present time the Reverend Mr. Patrick is president of the Council of Advice, vice-president of the Executive Council, dean of the Camp Sierra Summer School, chairman of the Diocesan Promotional Department and a member of the Council of the Province of the Pacific. Other church offices held include those of rural dean of the Southern Deanery, chairman of departments of finance, field, religious education and social service at different times, chairman of the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of the San Joaquin District and of Bishop Sanford's consecration held in Fresno in 1935; deputy to the Denver General Convention in 1931 and delegate to the Provincial Synod.

A director of the original Community Welfare Fund, past president of the Ministerial Association, the Bakersfield Lions Club, the local pastor is a director of the Red Cross Chapter, the Camp Fire Council and the Anti-Tuberculosis League, and a member of the California Advisory Committee of the National Youth Administration. He is a past national chaplain of the American Legion, of the Second Division Association, and of the Army and Navy Legion of Valor as holder of the Distinguished Service Cross.

Mrs. Patrick is educational chairman of the Diocesan Service League and has been several times a delegate to the National and Provincial Auxiliary. In the community she has been president of the Emerson P. T. A. and of the Legion Auxiliary.

SIXTY YEARS OF ST. PAUL'S PARISH

Services of the Protestant Episcopal Church were first held in Kern County by the Right Reverend William I. Kip, D. D., first Bishop of California, who visited Fort Tejon in October, 1855, and then passed the site of Bakersfield on his famous wagon pilgrimage from San Pedro to Stockton.

Occasional services had been held in Havilah by itinerant clergymen and in Bakersfield by the Reverend Messrs. W. H. Hill, A. Todhunter and D. O. Kelley. To D. O. Kelley, indefatigable founder of missions in San Joaquin, goes the honor of organizing St. Paul's Mission in November, 1879, with D. G. McLean as warden. The Reverend T. A. Griffiths was the first resident clergyman.

When the third pastor, the Reverend H. Horace Clapham (1884-1892), was using what is now the Emerson School for services, Mr. Alfred Harrell, now the publisher of The Bakersfield Californian these forty years past and sometime vestryman of St. Paul's Church, was city school superintendent. Mrs. H. P. Bender, one of the school teachers, as a young girl, drove into Bakersfield from Greenfield to sing in the choir under the late Mrs. W. A. Chittenden, organist.

On the third visit of Bishop Kip to Kern County in 1886 the first St. Paul's Church was opened on the Seventeenth Street site. In 1891 when Bishop Nichols consecrated the Church, parish status was assumed with Captain Charles E. Jewett and Dr. John Snook as wardens; C. Bickerdike, treasurer and Joseph V. Morley as clerk.

The Reverend Messrs. F. D. Miller, David Holmes, Hobart Chetwood and Edward Morgan "ministered" in

the old Church. Active in the Guild, which was largely responsible for the erection of the Guild Hall in 1898, were Mrs. Alfred Harrell and Mrs. A. C. Maude, regular communicants today.

Successors to Father Morgan were the Reverend Messrs. Walter B. Clark, David M. Crabtree, Charles Hitchcock, Benjamin A. Diggs, George E. Renison and William A. Cash. Changed conditions with quicker methods of transportation caused the giving up of the missions in Rosedale, Greenfield and East Bakersfield. Bishop A. R. Graves, retired bishop of the Platte, had charge for the summer of 1912. The present rector, the Reverend William E. Patrick, will complete his fifteenth year as rector in March, 1940.

The present Church was opened by Bishop W. F. Nichols of California on January 1, 1902, when he blessed the beautiful marble altar, the gift of the late Mrs. William S. Tevis, in memory of her father, Romualdo Pacheco, Governor of California. In 1915, the first time San Joaquin District held Convocation in Bakersfield, the Right Reverend L. C. Sanford, D. D., who had been elected first Bishop of San Joaquin when the district was set off from the parent diocese, consecrated the Church.

Bishop Sanford was absent on the second occasion in 1928 when Convocation assembled in this parish, having been sent on a missionary tour around the world by the National Council. Now 12 years later St. Paul's Parish welcomes Convocation a third time and is especially pleased to congratulate the head of the episcopal jurisdiction, who for half the organized history of the parish has been our bishop. We extend our sincerest greetings to him and Mrs. Sanford and to the visitors from the other parishes of San Joaquin.

The 1940 vestry consists of Dr. Fred J. Crease, senior warden (senior member of the vestry and forty years a member of the parish); G. E. Stanfield, junior warden; W. A. Alexander, clerk; C. E. Wakefield, Jr., treasurer; Handel W. Kelly, J. S. Kirkendall, W. E. Peterson and F. S. Wheeler.

Presidents, vice-presidents, secretaries and treasurers of the parochial societies as named are as follows: Altar Guild, Mrs. C. E. Wakefield, Jr., Miss Laura Covell; St. Paul's Guild, Mesdames B. F. Covell, Sr., Ed Rose, Fred W. Keller, Percy T. Neate (U. T. O. custodian); St. Margaret's Guild, Mesdames Heber B. Kelly, Ed Miller, Miss Nora Trafton and Miss Elizabeth Hammond. Young People's Fellowship, B. F. Covell, Jr., Ruth Patrick, Audrey Forest and Constance Macdonald.

Superintendent of the Church School is Miss Margaret D. Gardett, who has been active in the work for 28 years. Head of the Primary Department for 20 continuous years is Mrs. W. B. Lyons. Miss Helen Moore, secretary; Miss Mary Lynn Tuttle, organist and Miss Katharine Wakefield, pianist for the Primary, complete the list of officers with 16 teachers.

C. E. Wakefield, Jr., is choir director and Mrs. Laura E. Nichols, organist.



The Reverend William E. Patrick, rector of the parish for the last quarter of its 60 years of history, is a native of Cambridge, Massachusetts, a graduate of Harvard University and the Episcopal Theological School. Ordained by Bishop William Lawrence he served first as curate of Grace Church, New Bedford, and then, after two years service overseas with the A. E. F., he was rector of St. Paul's Church, North Andover, moving from Massachusetts to California in 1922 to take charge of St. Paul's Church, Santa Paula, in the diocese of Los Angeles.



He Directs Episcopal Conclave

THE Right Reverend Louis Childs Sanford, D. D., LL. D., missionary bishop of San Joaquin, who is in Bakersfield with Mrs. Sanford to attend the thirtieth annual convocation of the missionary district of San Joaquin, is one of the "elder statesmen" of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

A native of Bristol, R. I., Bishop Sanford graduated from Brown University and the Episcopal Theological School of Cambridge. Volunteering for western missionary duty he was assigned to St. Luke's Church, Selma, and St. Michael's, Fowler, being ordained priest in California. In 1898 Bishop Sanford was transferred to Salinas, resigning in two years to take the parish of St. John the Evangelist in San Francisco. His church and rectory were destroyed in the 1906 fire.

In 1910 Bishop Sanford was elected missionary bishop of San Joaquin when the district was given separate jurisdiction.

Bishop Sanford has held many positions of responsibility in the national affairs of the Protestant Episcopal Church, having served 12 years on the national council and for 14 years as president of the Province of the Pacific. With the Reverend William E. Patrick of Bakersfield, he is again serving on the executive council of the provincial synod.

In the years 1927-1928 Bishop Sanford, in company with Dr. John W. Wood, national council foreign secretary, toured the world investigating foreign missionary work.

In 1936 Bishop Sanford was honored in Fresno on the twenty-fifth anniversary of his consecration as bishop, in conjunction with the anniversary of the San Joaquin district.

At the first convocation in Bakersfield in 1915, Bishop Sanford consecrated the present St. Paul's Church, erected in 1901 by the Reverend Edward Morgan. Bishop Sanford is the presiding officer of convocation and will also act as toastmaster at the annual convocation banquet at 7 p. m. tomorrow at Hotel El Tejon.

Program Complete for Big Episcopal Church Meeting

A BISHOP SPEAKS

Church Stresses Family Sanctity as Divorce Foe

BISHOP LOUIS C. SANFORD, bishop of the San Joaquin Episcopal diocese, in a dynamic message to the thirtieth annual convocation of the church at St. Paul's Church today on "The Letter and Spirit of the Marriage Canon"

said emphasis of the church has been shifted from the individuals in the marriage relationship to the sanctity of the family. Speaking of the revision of the marriage canon in 1931 and the change in the church's attitude, the bishop said that before the change the only exception to church discipline on the breaking of union by divorce was permission for the innocent party in a divorce for adultery to remarry. The bishop said in part:

Mutual Responsibility

"The emphasis has shifted from the relationship of the individual man and woman to each other to the preservation of the integrity of the family and guarantee of the spiritual nurture of children. It is recognized that marriage is a relationship in which the private concern of the individuals immediately involved must be subordinated to the welfare of society. Making adultery the sole justification of divorce singled out a physical act as the only violation of a spiritual union which, common sense testified, may be destroyed by any one of a number of factors.

"The church is more emphatic now than ever in its insistence upon the permanence of the marriage relation as in accord with the mind of Christ, but it has become more realistic in the administration of discipline. It has substituted the positive effort to train people for Christian marriage for the negative attempt to discourage divorce by condemnation; it has centered attention on sanctity of the family."



A CALL to Christians to unite in a national day of prayer for peace to the world will be answered by Bakersfield and Kern church folk on Sunday when they will join with millions of other devout American citizens in the National Day of Prayer proclaimed by President F. D. Roosevelt.

In a proclamation the President set aside Sunday, September 8, as America's Day of Prayer when members of all denominations were asked to pray "for this land and for the troubled world, a righteous, enduring peace."

Bakersfield and Kern pastors, cooperating fully with the President, have arranged services in practically all churches to the end of praying for "peace." They have selected sermon topics that will emphasize the duties of Christians as patriotic citizens during times of national stress.

"Every loyal and patriotic churchman should be in his pew to engage in public prayer next Sunday," the Reverend W. E. Patrick, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, said today. The Reverend Mr. Patrick served chaplain during the World War and held this office nationally for the American Legion.

Patriotic groups are invited to attend services in groups at the various churches.

In England a few months ago, every church was crowded to capacity on a similar occasion.

The spiritual basis of democracy will be the theme of the American National Day of Prayer for local pastors and their congregations.
