Fire in Chaparral Ecosystems Presentation slated

On Tuesday, April 21, the Environmental Science and Resource Management Program and Interdisciplinary Lecture Series at CSUCI will host the presentation "Fire & Chaparral: The Myths, the Reality, and the Balancing Act" in Aliso Hall, Room 150 from 7-9 p.m.

Dr. Robert Muller, Director of Research at the Santa Barbara Botanic Garden. Dr. Muller will present a current understanding of fire in chaparral ecosystems. The presentation is free and open to the campus community and public. Parking on campus is \$6.

Day of Silence Demonstration, Reflection planned

The Day of Silence is part of a national movement bringing attention to the silencing of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer (LGBTQ) individuals and their allies.

Check in will be from 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. in the Broome Library Plaza. Participants will receive speaking cards explaining the reason for the silence, resources on how to inform others of their activism, and an armband to be worn throughout the day.

A Break the Silence Ceremony will take place at 5 p.m. at the Broome Library Plaza reflection pool, at which time campus community members, faculty and students will speak, followed by an open mic where all participants are encouraged to reflect and share about the impact and significance of the event by speaking, singing, reciting poetry or any other form of self-expression.

The Day of Silence demonstration reflects the silence caused by anti-LGBTQ harassment, prejudice, and discrimination. The Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network (GLSEN) 2007 National School Climate Survey found that 9 out of 10 LGBT students report verbal, sexual or physical harassment at school and more than 30% report missing at least a day of school in the past month out of fear for their personal safety. The Day of Silence helps bring us closer to making anti-LGBT bullying, harassment and name-calling unacceptable in America's schools. This year, we reflect on the 70 under 30 who have been killed because of perceptions of sexual orientation and gender expression between 1995 and 2008.
