First residents moved into LV fifteen years ago this month

Are we ready for a birthday party? This month may well be a good time to start because exactly 15 years ago, October 1973, saw the very first homes being occupied in what is now a 375-acre development with 2,136 homes.

Our first resident was Nora Gardner of Village 11 who just months ago celebrated her birthday of 100 years.

Says Nora, "We moved in the morning of October 6, 1973 just as soon as the last nail was driven. The second resident was sister Grace Troxel, who moved next door, three hours later."

Couple #11 moving into the village were Nick and Piff De Simone. Those early days hold many memories for this active couple.

Piff comments, "There were lima bean, pepper and tomato fields nearby, sheep across the street

and horses in the other direction."

Adds Nick, "I'll never forget the first movie Education and Recreation put on in the AR. Six people attended it. Soon after Leisure Technology provided a bus for folks to go to Camarillo to see the annual Christmas Parade. Piff and I were the only two on the bus."

Piff became the first President of the Women's Club in May of '74 and Nick remembers hitting the first shot when the golf course opened that spring. He doesn't remember if he "shanked" the shot or not, but does recall the PGA pro Jerry Barber was here for the ceremony.

The first 100 residents of Leisure Village are

LV Needs A "Yes" On Proposition A

As your Councilman, I have from time to time, reported to the Village on items of City and County business, problems and needs of special interest. Such an item is Measure "A" on our November 8 ballot.

Measure "A" is a request by the Ventura County Fire Protection District to allow them to spend more money over the next four years than provided by the Gann Initiative.

To refresh your memory, back in 1979 the people of California overwhelmingly voted to restrict the amount of money that government agencies could spend. Each succeeding year was adjusted using Federal and State (not local) economic factors. If it could be demonstrated by the affected agency that there was a genuine need to spend more to maintain current service levels and to provide additional service because of growth in the local area, the facts could be given to the people and a vote on the issue taken. Such is the situation the V.C.F.P.D. finds itself in.

We all must be aware of the tremendous growth in the Camarillo area. The District will exceed its appropriation limit for fiscal year 1988-89 by 2.9 million and is projected to exceed the limit by \$7 million of the revenue it collects by 1992.

What does this mean to Leisure Village?

1. It means that the District will have to close four fire stations and reduce personnel accordingly.

2. This will mean longer response time. To us it could mean the loss of a life that otherwise could have been saved.

What exactly does the District want from us?

They are asking us to vote to allow the Fire District's appropriating limit be increased in the amount of \$4 million for fiscal year 1988-89, and \$1 million over the previous year for each of the fiscal years 1989-90, 1990-91 and 1991-92.

What do we get for this?

Most important, no station will be closed. Two new much needed fire stations will be built and staffed. This, in turn, means that our #52 Station will be more readily available to us, as facilities there would be less likely to be on another call when we needed them.

What will this cost us?

Nothing but our "Yes" vote. This ballot measure does not call for or allow the voters to increase taxes.

If this measure does not pass, the money which the District has or will have by 1992 will simply be transferred to some other County service that has not reached its Gann limit. The money will not be returned to the taxpayer.

I urge you to vote Yes on Measure "A".

ILV Commends LV Board

ILV wishes to commend the present Board of Directors for two recent actions:

1. For achieving a compromise ruling on the smoking issue which is probably as equitable a solution as could ever be reached considering the emotion of both factions.

2. For making a report to the residents on the disposition of the Karen Marks lawsuit for harassment. How much better it is to have an open report than the kinds of rumors that are often rampant in the Village. We hope that soon the Board will be as open in telling us about other suits including the costs of special lawyers' fees.

The fact that it is completely independent is the only reason for ILV's existence in the first place. Before its inception, there was no place where villagers could voice their censored opinions. There was a definite need for a sounding board. ILV is capable and willing to fulfill that need, sometimes by soliciting opinions of knowledgeable residents and sometimes by letters to the editors *initiated by any villager who wishes to write*. The editors have pledged from the beginning to print any and all letters that are not libelous, except for a few times when there were many that were almost duplicates and space was short, we have printed one or two and explained, saying "These people also wrote supporting this view" and have given the names of the supporting contributors.

This paper was created and exists for everyone in the Village.

Villager Marion Gordon, retired nurse, active in health programs both in the Village and the Ventura County, is running for a post on the Camarillo Health Care District Board in the November 8 election.

Mrs. Gordon is a specialist in convalescent homes and as head of the County Ombudsman Program which investigates complaints pertaining to convalescent hospitals. She is well versed in problems of the elderly. She is a member of the Ventura County Council on Aging, and has worked with Y.N.C.G. in the Village

Mrs. Gordon was Director of a convalescent hospital in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, her home state.

The Camarillo Health Care District Board is composed of five elected members who serve two years without pay. The

District is a political subdivision of the State of California, funded by tax money. Camarillo and Somis residents are served by an adult Day Care Center, Care-A-Van transport, CPR classes, a nail clipping service, and Life Line. Life Line is a personal emergency system that allows elderly people to live comfortably at home by wearing a "Help Button" on their person which is connected to a central operator. When the person needs assistance, he needs only to activate his button and help is sent at once.

The Health Care District is dedicated to providing seniors with programs and services that promote physical and mental well-being.

Mrs. Marion Gordon is an ideal candidate for the Camarillo Health Care District.

Absentee Ballot Will Expedite Voting

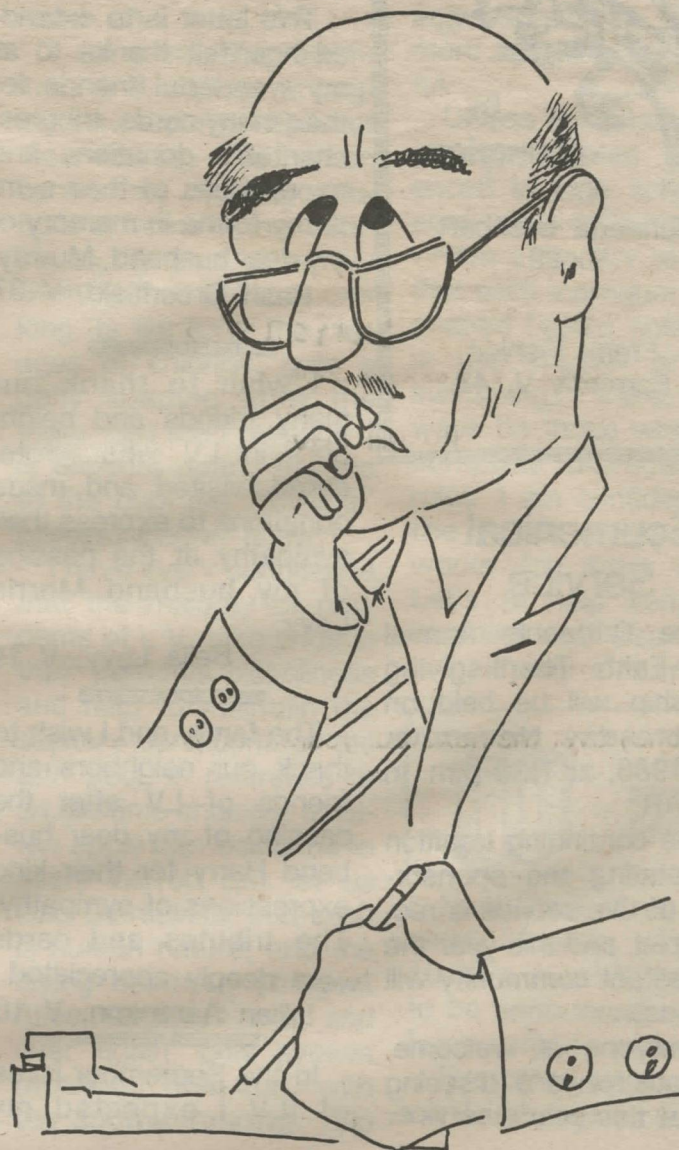

Memorial services were held recently at Pierce Brothers Griffin Mortuary,

Camarillo, to pay final respect to noted film director Henry Koster, a Leisure Village resident for the past seven years.

Officiating were Rev. William Curtiss of the Church of Religious Science and Dr. Fletcher A. Harding, a family friend.

One of the floral pieces on display was sent by president and Mrs. Reagan, along with a personal telegram. The Reagans and Koster were next-door neighbors in Pacific Palisades some years ago.

Koster, who directed some 100 movies both here and in Europe, will long be remembered for such favorites as "Harvey," "The Robe," "A Man Called Peter," "The Singing Nun," "My Cousin Rachel," "The Inspector General," and "Music For Millions."

Some of the stars he directed included Cary Grant, Bette Davis, Richard Burton, Loretta Young, Danny Kaye and David Niven.

Henry is survived by his actress wife Peggy Moran and sons Robert and Peter.

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Renovation for swimming pool

After fifteen years of steady useage, filter equipment, pumps and motors for the swimming pool have reached the end of the line, and are going to be replaced. Richard Mathes, Recreation Director, is studying bids received for the job, and the work is projected to be done before the end of the year.

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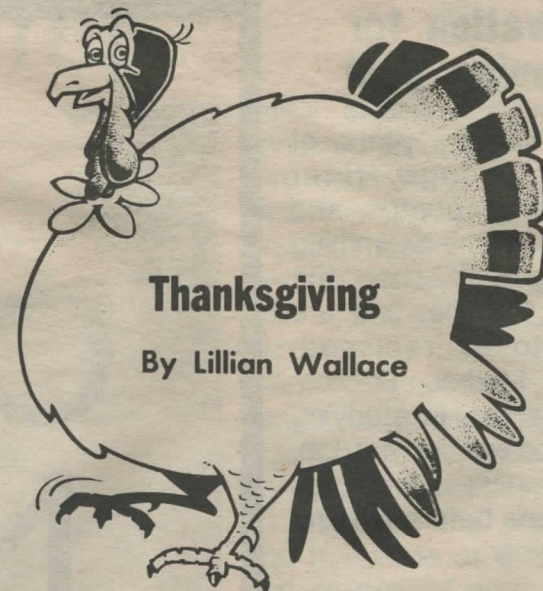
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Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving Dinner

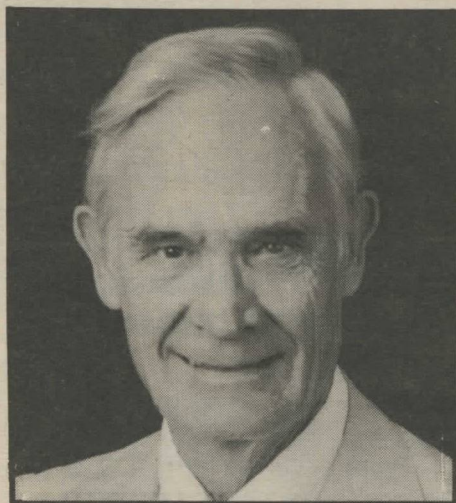
Thanksgiving Dinner will be served in AR, beginning at 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, November 24.

While learning new routines, and practicing our old routines, we are ever busy with the business and the joy of tap dancing.

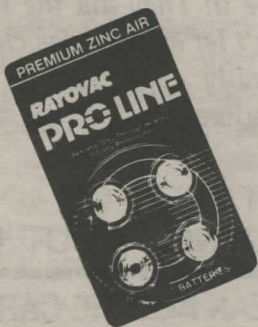
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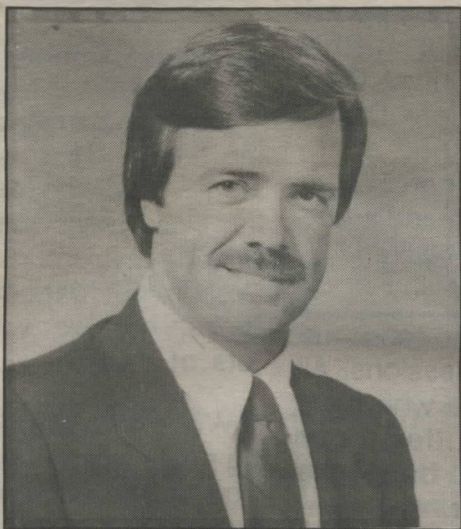

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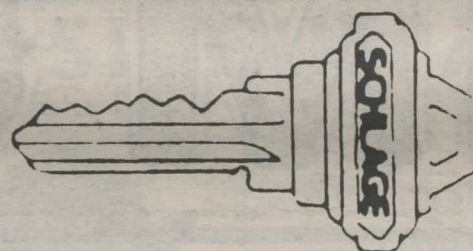


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Lets Be Thankful

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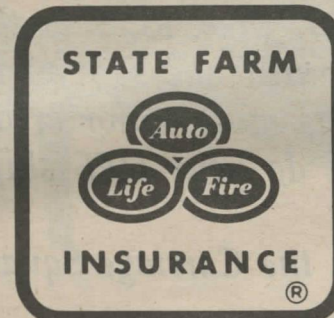
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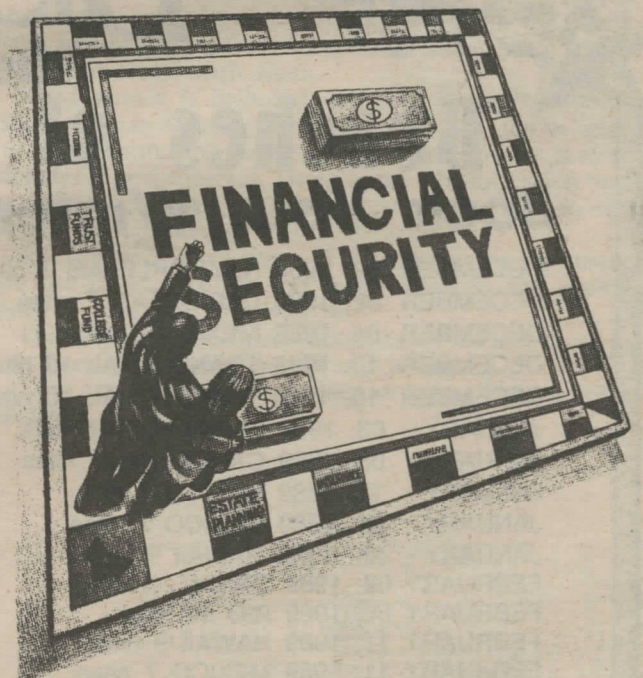
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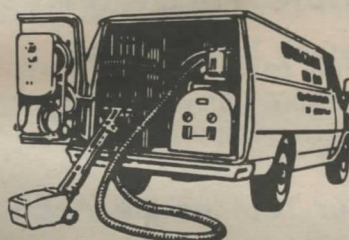
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High 12 Club

The October meeting of the Sawdusters Club was a delightful variation from woodworking as such. We were treated to a presentation of woodcarving by Doris Howard, a professional woodcarver, who teaches wood carving at the Simi Valley Senior Center under the auspices of the Simi Valley Adult School program. She titled her talk "Woodcarving-the development of a hobby".

Three banquet tables were covered with carvings which represented Mrs. Howard's earliest endeavors up to and through the present. All of these appeared to be highly professional. She also demonstrated the use of hand and power carving tools. She showed how she starts with a piece of wood, a wood block or a tree stump, and ends up with a beautiful stylized or realistic wood sculpture. There was one of the best turnouts since the inception of the club. The audience was so impressed that a number expressed a desire to take woodcarving instruction in her classes.

Our next regular meeting will be held on Thurs. Nov. 3rd at 2:00 p.m. in the MPR. A multitasking member of our club, David Dominguez, will present a two part program. 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Evolution of the workshop

Among the niceties that Leisure Technology planned for Leisure Village residents was a Wood Shop which technically would be open to all Villagers. The tools originally furnished included a table saw, radial saw, drill press, scroll saw, and a lathe. The shop has a floor space of about 350 square feet, or slightly more than a single garage.

Leisure Tech hired a woodshop teacher from one of the local schools to come each Saturday to teach Villagers how to use the equipment, and he maintained the tools. A person had to be checked out on the use of equipment before being issued a key to use the machinery.

When Leisure Tech left us on our own, the classes stopped, and the Woodshop Committee, under the Education and Recreation Committee, assumed jurisdiction of the Woodshop.

The Woodshop committee was not authorized to give instruction, so Villagers organized a club, now named the Sawdusters, to plan educational programs and demonstrations which can increase the ability of Villagers to use and enjoy the facility.

In appreciation of work done for them, the Women's Club donated a new miter saw to the woodshop, L.V. purchased another table saw, and two routers were donated by Ernie Mueller and Earl Nordquist. Maintenance of the equipment was, for a while, hit or miss. If a tool broke down, anyone who thought he could solve the problem, tried.

Then in 1984, Clary Morgan, a bonafide machinist who took an interest in the woodshop, came to the Village. He diagnosed the problems

and repaired the tools, saving the Village many hundreds of dollars in labor expenses, and keeping the shop open. Morgan is now president of the Sawdusters. Ron Neiss, an appliance repairman by trade, has been able to keep the vacuums associated with the dust collectors in running order. Most recently, Jack Reeve overhauled the drill press, scroll saw, and sander, returning these tools to service. Joe Seldon, Chairman of the Woodshop Committee, has set up a procedure for maintenance which will protect the equipment from unqualified mechanics.

The new equipment, acquired over the years, while increasing potential uses of the shop, has reduced the working space to a degree that only two people can work safely at a time. On the whole, the safety record of the shop has been remarkably good—not perfect, but Villagers seem to recognize the possible hazards and use care.

The health factor is different. There was no exhaust system planned for the shop. A dust collector on the sanding machine and a vacuum attachment on the radial saw remove much of the residue, but a peripheral condition remains that when the sander is being used, the air is thick with flying particles. The window screen gets clogged with accumulated dust, further limiting circulation. The air frankly, is unhealthy.

A former Cal-OSHA (Office of Safety and Health) inspector who lives in L.V. went through the woodshop and said he would close it immediately if he were so empowered. Dr. Bernie Goldman, first president of the Sawdusters said as a physician, that the shop is environmentally unsafe.

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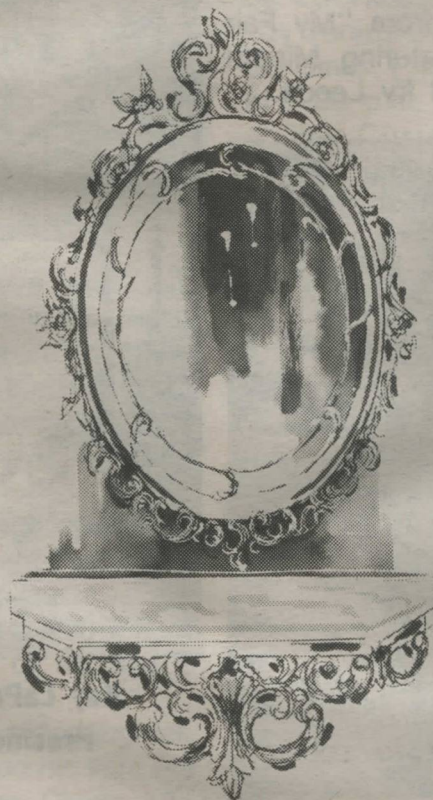
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The Man In The Glass

The Ombudsman Panel

In the late fall of 1985, the LVA board appointed a blue ribbon committee to research the advisability of instituting a proposal to establish an Ombudsman program. After several months of study this committee presented their findings to the board, who in turn established the Ombudsman Panel in spring of 1986.

Since that time the panel has been functioning in accordance with the established guidelines.

The purpose of the Ombudsman Panel is as follows:

1. Provide counsel and advice to residents of Leisure Village.
2. Mediate residents' complaints about any employee, any committee, and/or any resident.

The panel will not accept any disputes or complaints that have not been first submitted to one of the standing committees, if applicable.

During this panel's existence over the past two and a half years it has listened to and provided counsel to many, many grievance of Leisure Village residents, and to the best of my knowledge, were unsuccessful in mediating just three cases.

The present panel members are Gerri Kikendall, Karl Cannon, Bill Huffman, Robbie Karlin and Edna McCormick.

We just want to keep all residents advised of the existence of the Ombudsman Panel and that we are here to help and assist any resident who has grievance. Just call any of the above named members if you have any problem that you believe requires or needs discussion with the Ombudsman Panel.

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More on no smoking from the Clean Air Committee

As a result of the no smoking petition, the Board passed Article 9. This new rule in no way meets the objective of the people. In fact, it permits more smoking in the building now, than before Article 9 was passed. It is an insult to the 2800 people who signed the petition. For instance, the ballroom dances are run by two committees, taking turns every other Saturday night. One group permits smoking, the other does not. Now, under Article 9, smoking is permitted at both dances, every Saturday night. During discussions before the bill was passed, it was suggested that the Club room become a designated smoking area. This was to compensate for no smoking in the lobby and hallway. The Club room is now a designated smoking area, and so is the lobby and hallway. The Thursday afternoon duplicate bridge game has been played in the Club room for eleven years. By a vote of the players, it is a no smoking game. Now, under Article 9, anyone may enter that room and smoke, even during the duplicate bridge game.

During the discussions, we heard much of smokers rights. Leading authorities maintain that when it became known that smoke was hazardous, smokers lost their rights to smoke in enclosed public areas. That is why so many states and local governments have passed no smoking laws. We are not subject to the smoking law in Camarillo, because they consider us private property. But if we ourselves should adopt the Camarillo law for Leisure Village, there would be no smoking in the Recreation building. At our ages, we are more susceptible to

the dangers of smoke. We should be the first, not the last, to take proper precaution. There is so much cancer around here, it is almost like an epidemic.

When a person is elected to public office, no one expects that he is knowledgeable in all matters. In those matters in which he has no experience, an elected official usually seeks advice from experts. Here we have a medical problem. No one on the Board is qualified in this area. We are not aware that they sought advice. Apparently, on their own, they passed Article 9. This is in opposition to all expert medical opinion, including the recommendations of the United States Surgeon General, and the Heart, Lung and Cancer Societies. It is a crime to subject

2800 people to unhealthy conditions, against their wishes.

The Board has witnessed the tremendous crowds at the meetings when smoking is on the agenda. It has heard the loud moan of the people when a speaker dared say that there was no connection between smoke and cancer. The Board must know what the people who elected them want.

Article 9 must be repealed or substantially revised.

FIRST.....From Pg 1 known as the Pioneers and while an actual count has not been made to determine exactly how many are still living here, Piff believes that the number would be about 50.

Another LV resident who recalls the early days is Ben Drasin. He was the Leisure Tech purchasing director at the very start and continued in that position until all homes were built. Even to this day Ben receives calls concerning

a wide variety of questions pertaining to the village.

Were there many problems in the early days of construction?

"Yes," Ben replies, "we had years of ups and downs. For example in one year we may have built and sold 400 homes and the next year 16. And then there was the problem of guarantees on all appliances, you might say just about everything in the house."

"Would you believe," he continued, "the warranty was not for one, two or three years, but just about forever. Why, we had people who exchanged toilets, for example, several times. And those who wanted, once construction started, the bathtub where the shower is and vice versa."

"Some folks might like to know that while the original concept here was the construction of rather small units, we kept pace

with what the public wanted and in 1978 introduced 5 new models in Villages 19 and 17. And, of course, a few years later the lifetime guarantees were replaced with a more reasonable warranty."

What does he view as his single best effort toward making this what has to be a truly ideal retirement community?

"Two things come to mind," he replied. "In the early days Evelyn and I

visited dozens of resort communities from here to the Mexican border, looking at their recreational facilities. We then made proposals that result, for the most part, in what we have here today. Additionally, we are especially proud of our involvement in the Saturday Night Ballroom Dance which has been going on since 1976 and has brought great pleasure to thousands of Villagers."

Wishing to close this Anniversary story on a "high" note, we consulted with Tom O'Brien, who with wife Bea, purchased their home in March '74 and because of a construction strike, were not able to move in until July.

Tom became President of the Board of Directors in '79, the year Leisure Tech turned the village over to the homeowners. He recently served again as President of the Board and through the years has served admirably in many volunteer positions.

What are Tom's thoughts on this 15th Anniversary?

He replied: "Bea and I looked far and wide for a desirable facility. Leisure World and Sun City were much too large and they were still growing. And did you know that Leisure World security guards are not trained for emergency services? If you need instant care, such as an ambulance, you must call them. Yes indeed, you are on your own down there."

"We feel this LV complex is just about the right size. And not one more square foot can be added. And when we talk about the weather here, it is truly the "Mediterranean of the West."

"In conclusion," said Tom, "our greatest asset is the human resources of our people. Right here we have untold numbers of sharing, caring people, who, collectively, make this the greatest place of all to spend our retirement years."

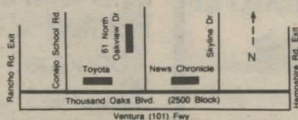
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A Favorite One Day Trip

Less than a half hour drive from the Village is the Seabee Museum at Port Hueneme at the Naval Construction Battalion Center.

Simply take #101 north, go off at Wagon Wheel Drive, then left on

to Ventura Road, going south under the freeway and continue straight for 5-7 miles and upon passing Channel Islands Boulevard, stay in the right lane. The US Navy golf course is on your right and suddenly there's a large sign, announcing the

Seabee Museum, with the public invited. A Navy guard will welcome you at the gate and direct you to the parking lot, several hundred yards straight ahead, to your left. Across the street is the Museum, featuring at the entrance a large totem

pole with a fighting Seabee atop it.

The US Navy Seabees were the construction crews that moved with our armed forces as military men leap-frogged across Pacific Islands during World War II. Inside are some 20,000 artifacts,

nicely arranged in glass enclosed groups that feature such items as carvings from Alaska and the South Pacific, Samurai swords, the head of a Kodiak bear, rare musical instruments, dolls from many foreign lands, thousands of action photos, war-time newspapers, ration stamps, wartime uniforms up to the present and hundreds of plaques and photos of great historical importance.

Actor John Wayne has an honored spot in the museum for his movie "The Fighting Seabees." You may spend as little as an hour or, as Mary and I have done, return again and again with friends.

It is also possible for groups of people to obtain a one-hour guided tour of the Naval Base which ends with your being dropped-off at the museum. Call Kassie Gayle phone 982-4493 or 5309 for further information.

On your return, since you can't exactly re-trace your steps and enter #101, may we suggest you reach Channel Islands Blvd., turn right (east) and continue on it, over the bridge at Highway 1, then when it dead-ends shortly at Rice Road, turn left, then right on 5th Street which will take you to Pleasant Valley Road and on home via Santa Rosa. This route will allow you to see lots of vegetable and fruit groves on both sides of the road.

ESO Completes Disaster Exercise

Results of the Disaster Preparedness Exercise, held Oct. 27, are being reviewed by the Emergency Services Organization. Preliminary data indicate many Villagers participated by displaying their "I'm OK" flags. Other items being evaluated include rate of responses by the functioning units, suitability of assigned areas and effectiveness of communications activities.

Under the chairmanship of Paul Kelwin, this Disaster Preparedness Exercise, which was held in cooperation with the City of Camarillo and the County of Ventura, was performed to assess the readiness of various units within ESO to respond in the event of an emergency such as earthquake, toxic material spill or other life-threatening situation.

Participating in the Exercise were the Medical Unit headed by Sy Schroeder, the Nurses unit directed by Maxine King, the Communications Unit guided by Ellis King, the Public Safety Unit led by Phil LaPorte and the RV Support Group with Nick Dahl. Additional support for the event was provided by the Your Neighbors Care Group headed by Sandy Okum.

Because of the schedules involved and facility requirements for the Exercise it was necessary to interrupt the normal schedules and locations of some groups at the Recreation Center. In particular, the Health-er-cize group and the Happy Hoofers yielded the AR, and the Oxnard College Classes, meeting in the Garden Room, moved to the MPR. ESO appreciates the cooperation of these groups in enabling a successful Exercise to be accomplished.

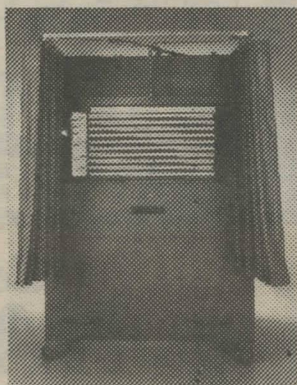

All are nicely displayed on peg boards in his garage. His assortment includes such ancient types as the long forgotten Spaulding Tournament,

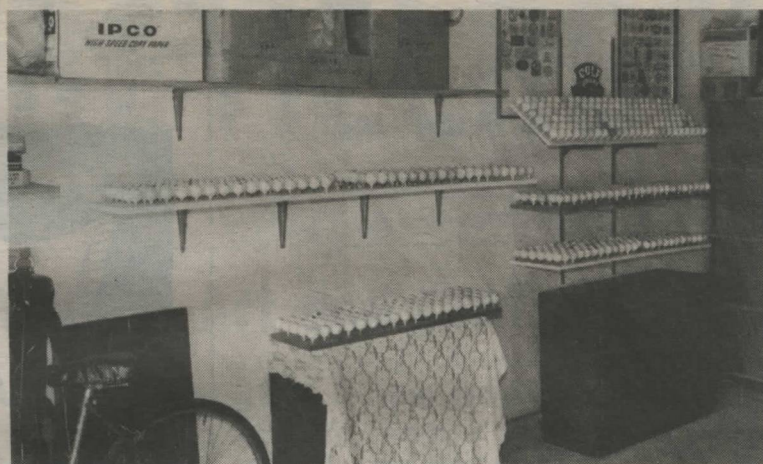

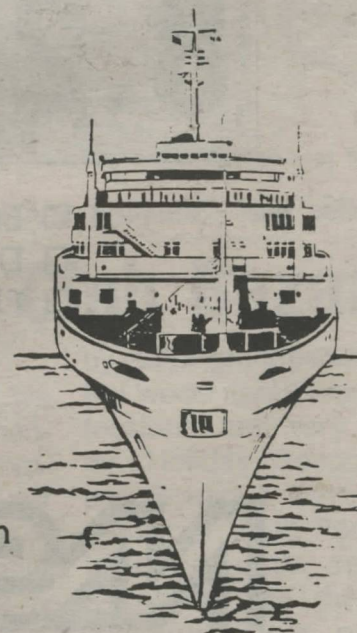

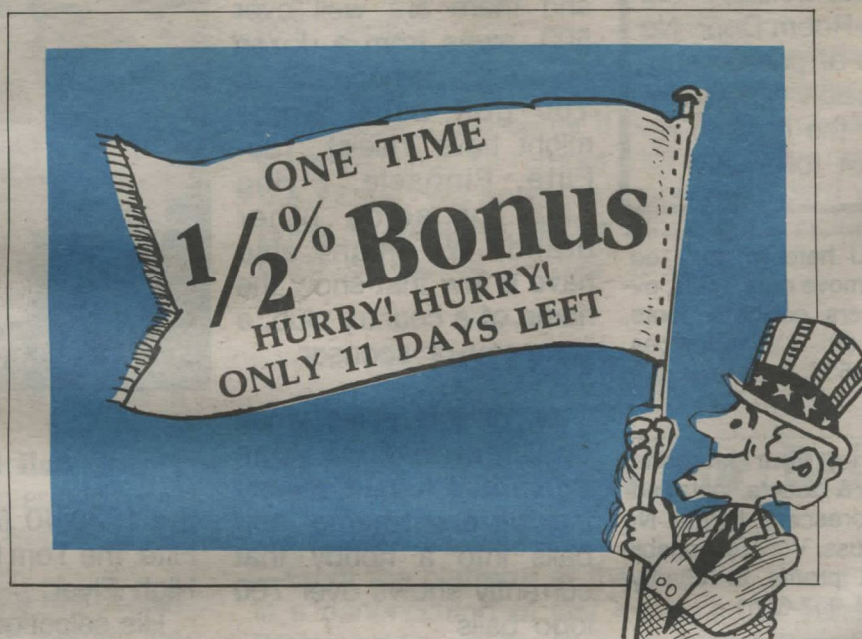
