Fire Station Funds Granted

The much-sought-after fire station for the eastern part of Camarillo may be a reality by the latter part of 1980, fire Chief Stan Masson said Thursday.

In adopting the fire district's \$16 million budget, county supervisors set aside \$382,000 to build a fire station near Leisure Village.

The fire district will have to close its station in Upper Ojai to make up the \$382,000 deficit in its budget.

It will probably take another 60 days to get the plans for the new Camarillo Station off the ground, Masson said. If all goes well, firefighters could be using the station by late 1980, he

Fire officials are looking at the corner of Oak Canyon and Santa Rosa Roads as the site for the three-man station.

That site is 3.7 miles away from the Ventura Boulevard station, which means the planned station would provide good secondary service to the downtown part of Camarillo and thus benefit the whole city, Masson said.

The decision to locate a station near Leisure Village is based on the area's increasing population, according to the fire chief, who projected the population of the station's service area will be about 15,000 in the near future.

After many attempts to resolve the apparent inequity in telephone charges to neighboring communities. John Lauten, Public Service Committee, prepared a letter (reproduced on page 27) which the LVA Board approved and forwarded to the Public Utilities Commission (PUC).

In another matter, while attending a meeting concerning the widening of Highway 101 through Pleasant Valley, Tom O'Brian and John Lauten were shocked to learn that no provisions were made to modify the two bridges which increases the probability of flooding Leisure Village. After researching the project, John wrote a letter (reproduced on page 27) which the Board also approved and sent to Cal Trans.

There was further discussion at the Committee meeting.

Chairman Tony Manzella introduced Claude Hughes, service center superintendent for the General Telephone Company. He says that beause of the shortage of equipment, only 200 new phones per month can be installed in September and October. By mid-November there should be no problem at all. If you can get a letter from your doctor, stating health reasons, you can get installation in three or four days. Send this letter to Mr. Hughes, 761 South "C" Street, Oxnard, CA 93030. Other problems: our local system cannot properly handle all of the calls going

into central Los Angeles area, which is why you may have to dial several times to get through. The Camarillo branch will go completely electronic in 1982. A public telephone booth can be installed near the new villages to aid people waiting for phones. Fred Preston will

follow up on this.

The Public Service Committee received a letter from our tax assessor. If you have not added an improvement to your home, you will not receive an assessment notice, and your tax bill will automatically increase by 2 percent. Note the important fact that if you have made a technical change in the ownership of your property since 1975/76 (i.e., added a member of your family, etc., to your deed) your property was reassessed to a much higher amount. A new law that went into effect July 9, 1979, will rollback your assessment to the 1975/76 figure. You will help the assessor if you personally notify him by phone or mail that this has happened to you. Your rollback will take place much sooner if you do this.

Jesse Levy reported that our City Council is not supporting the proposed train service to L.A. A survey will be made in Leisure Vilage for the Council, to see how many will use a bus service offered six days a week into and around Camarillo. Federal funds are available to help support this service. The fare may be as low as 25 cents. Expect someone to call on you.

Economic Impact of L.V. Stressed by Press

Few L .V. residents are unaware of the benefits we bring to the local community. It is indeed pleasant when an outsider, Julius Gius editor of the Ventura Star-Free Press, extolls our virtues as he did in his July 23 editorial.

Gius' editorial discussed the Tierra Rejada Valley development, saying, "You can't quarrel with the concept of the project which would be a twin of Leisure Village.

'The community of Leisure Village, in East Camarillo, is steadily increasing its economic impact on Ventura County - a highly favorable impact, I would add. There are 1,500 homes there now, with the number to be 2,150 when this selfcontained adult community reaches its growth limit in 1980. The population, largely retired professional and executive/business types, is socially involved, philosophically concerned and politically alert. With purchasing power conservatively figured at \$7,500 per dwelling, they contribute about \$111/2 million to the county's economy and their combined property tax bill, estimated at \$1,250,000 even in this Proposition 13 era, is second only to the county's largest property taxpayer, the Edison Company. Unlike most of us, however, the Leisure Village people ask and receive very little for their taxes: they send no children to school, maintain their own streets, hire their own security force, have their own golf course and recreational programs, and even operate their own street lighting system.

"In all of Ventura County, I'd guess, there is no other community that claims such small return for what it pays in tribute. So here's a tip o' the hat to all those good people, and a special welcome to newcommers."

ILV is pleased to bring this accolade to the attention of the Villagers and to thank Julius Gius for his kind words.

Our Ailing Bus By Elby Ess

Bussing at Leisure Village is not controversial - but the bus is. When the bright new bus was delivered to replace the old rattletrap, the residents were delighted. Unfortunately the new bus began to break down frequently and the enthusiasm soon wore off.

Although the vehicle is under warranty and still Leisure Tech's responsibility, the LVA Board is concerned for two important reasons. First, the bus serves as an important lifeline to the out-side world for some residents, as well as a pleasant way to travel to church and shopping for others. Secondly, the Board does not want to inherit excessive costs and down-time when it accepts ownership.

The LVA Board is therefore engaged in negotiations with Leisure Tech Pres. Gene Gianulli to resolve the problem. Investigation has revealed that the bus breakdowns result from an engineering error which has been rectified in later models.

Your Board has offered to allow Leisure Tech to take the bus out of service long enough to have it's deficiency analyzed at their choice of any competent Southern California automotive firm. The Board

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Board of Directors Meeting

The Board of Directors of Leisure Village Homeowners Association met on Aug. 6, 1979 in the Assembly Room. All members were present.

Blanche Follen, Education & Rec. Committe Chairman reported that Disco dancing with Marguerite Abdelnour will continue. The Committee is looking into the matter of the poor condition of the coffee pots in the kitchen.

Finance Committee Chairman, Art Wilson, stated that sub-committees had been appointed - one as an audit committee, the other to review L.V. insurance.

Bldg. & Grds. Chairman, Al Norvig, announced that an organization meeting for walkthroughs in the village once a month to report on conditions, eye-sores, etc.

Louise Young, Chairman of Information to New Residents stated that there have been 44 new occupants since July 1 and volunteers are meeting with newcomes as quickly as possible. Architectural Chairman, Bill Rassmussen, reported that in July alone there had been 29 requests for improvements and 9 had been okayed for construction. Those not approved had been either incomplete or owner had not been at home when contacted so requests could be processed.

Donaldine Weed reported on the request for bus service on Fridays to Thousand Oaks for relgious services for those of Jewish faith. The matter has been given much thought, but because of the poor condition of the so-called "new" bus donated by Leisure Tech which breaks down periodically, and because the old bus cannot get up the Conejo grade, the Board regrets that the request cannot be granted at this time and hopes that those concerned will understand.

To tighten security there will be a new system for registering owner-resident vehicles annually, because of the problem of persons moving from the village or giving their cars to their children and not removing decals. The procedure is now being implemented and when completed no resident will be admitted without the new decal, unless he objects to the reflecting decal; then he may get a 6 mo. pass.

Leisure Tech has been served notice that the Association will not take over new areas until after thorough inspection, of village personnel, Leisure Tech. and landscape Contractor, and full Board approval that all problems have been resolved. This includes all concrete, fencing, drainage, landscaping and streets. This acton is a result of prior problems not taken care of.

Henry Malkin discussed the misuse of equipment in the lapidary room and the need for stringent rules for its use. He stated that there is \$10,000 worth of equipment available, and it would take \$1,000 to replace some of it. Therefore, in order to protect equipment and users, participants will be required to take a basic class in

lapidary and applicants must pass an examination to receive keys. Similar problems have existed in wood shop and ceramics. For instance, persons have bought green ware and brought it to the ceramics room and fired up the kiln for as few as one item. It costs \$15.00 to fire a kiln and it should be full before using.

Ron Barlow discussed the problems the Public Service Committee has been working on - widening Highway 101 between Thousand Oaks and Oxnard. (See front page.)

O'Brien introduced George Hines who made a presentation to the Village of an American flag.

The board appointed George Mustaparta to a 3-year term with the Architectural Committee.

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Leisure Valley Waits County OK

This development is proposed by Jerry Lawrence, the designer of Leisure Village and until June, 1978, the President of Leisure Technology of California.

Jerry, as he is known to many longtime residents of Leisure Village, recently revealed plans of his new development to a group of Village residents. Called Leisure Valley at Tierra Rejada, this development will be located at the West end of Tierra Rejada, the valley which lies between Moorpark on the North and Thousand Oaks on the South.

Leisure Valley at Tierra Rejada will be built on 398 acres, two more than Leisure Village. There will be 1800 homes built around an 18 hole, 3 par golf course and a recreation center. A surrounding wall and controlled gates will provide security.

"I want to go back to the original planning of Leisure Village and provide homes with 800 to 1400 square feet of living space", he said. He hopes to have a price range from \$60,000 to \$90,000. There will be a standard pattern of two homes to a building.

The site at Tierra Rejada has a drainage problem which Lawrence will have to correct. And sewage facilities will have to be constructed. This area is served by Camrosa Sanitation, but there are no existing sewers.

As usual, the developer must pay these costs. "Only a project of the magnitude of Leisure Valley at Tierra Rejada can justify these heavy startup expenses", said Lawrence.

His appeal from the County Planning Commission denial on July 21 will be heard before the County Supervisors on Sept. 11. He is requesting a change in zoning on these 398 acres from Rural" to "Rural Planned Development".

If the County Supervisors deny his request, Jerry Lawrence must wait a year before he can ask for a rehearing.

Or he can drop Leisure Valley at Tierra Rejada.



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
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City of Hope

On the first Sunday in August a group of 58 people, most of them from Leisure Vilage, went to Duarte. We had been invited by Jules Gordon, who had recently given a talk - slide show about the City of Hope here in the village.

It was started in 1913 by European immigrants who wanted to help victims of tuberculosis. Originally there were two tents on a delightful rose garden. This garden, a handsome sculpture, and a fountain welcome the visitor as he enters this world-famous place, which now houses 40 buildings on 93 handsomely landscaped acres. These 40 buildings are various kinds of hopsitals and research laboratories.

Treatment and research are concentrated on cancer, leukemia, heart, blood and respiratory diseases as well as diabetes and other hereditary illnesses.

The buildings are modern and cheerful, and the various new equipment startling in its capacity to diagnose and heal. Anybody can be treated here regardless of nationality, race, color or religion. Nobody has to pay for any treatment or service given.

The children's hospital is sight to behold. As we entered the admission room, the atmosphere of light and warm colors had an immediate comforting effect on us. Everything is thought out in detail with great sensitivity toward the needs of the child.

A brightly upholstered bench doubles as a bed. This is meant for a parent, who can sleep there in case of need. A big clock and a television set hand on the wall opposite the bed. Plastic drawers in various colors brighten the room, and some of the drawers even have locks to ensure a feeling of privacy. There is great concern that the child leads as normal and happy a life as possible. If he is able to walk he will go to school right here on the grounds. If he has to be in bed, the teacher will come to him. "We try to heal the body," we were told, "but we care about the spirit and the soul. We also involve the parents of the child." Therefore they have built cottages where the parents may live during their child's stay at the hospital. They are taught how to cope with the illness and how best to help the child physically and psychologically.

To heal, to relieve pain and to prolong life, these are their major goals. Their scientists have made untold discoveries and have benefited the whole world. Their knowledge and procedures are available to any doctor or hospital at no cost whatsoever. Because of their willingness to share, the City of Hope is sometimes called "The Hospital Without Walls." They are in constant contact with all of the United States and many other countries, always helping and teaching.

The annual budget of this medial center is between \$34,000,000 and 140,000,000. It is kept open by the generosity of the public. A new chapter of the City of Hope in Camarillo will be started on the 20th of September, 1979.




magical gadget can I trust to make it stop before a geyser of the precious stuff spews over my car and me and the pavement at twice fifty-odd cents a gallon?

required fencing on the side and rear of each home. Pardee installed the sides but not the rear which prohibited privacy between these homes and the Colony Homes. Investigation of Planning Commission records revealed that fences were in the plans. Pardee was so notified but had not complied. However, an August 3rd letter from Pardee stated that the fencing will be completed with wood fencing in the rear on the Colony side.

Negotiations have been taking place with the City of Camarillo for bus service, possibly using the buses that go to the high school. It is still in the talking stage, but if provided it will consist of 4 trips a day during the school year. It will cost the city \$30,000 a year. Buses may have to enter the village to pick up passengers.

The Board adopted a solution recommended by the Public Service Committee to the Public **Utilities Commission regarding** extended telephone service for this area. (See front page.)

To distribute the work-load of the Board, each director will 'assume details as follows: Committee Development, Barlow; Maintenance, Beckel; Recreation, Malcolm; Security, Weed; Administration, O'Brien.

Meeting was opened to receive homeowners' remarks.

Resident from Village 32 was less than complimentary to Leisure Tech regarding the drainage pipe through his property and sidewalk and reports that the gutter has developed a sickly green moss.

Villager from 26 requested that letter of congratulations be furnished to the Public Service committee for the work done which resulted in refunds from Electric Company.

An owner in Village 3 who is renting his house requests that his tenant be allowed to have a decal for his car and to be listed in the telephone directory inasmuch as he is leasing.

Stan Berman announced that the present union contract will expire in October. Negotiations are now in

progress and will be during the rest of August and September, which should prove teresting.

The next meeting of the Board of Directors will be on September 10, a delay of one week because of Labor Day.

Problems

Sandy Okum was appointed by Joe Gaynes to be on the Citizens' Advisory Committee of the Council on Aging in Camarillo. The old library will be used exclusively as the Senior Citizen Drop-in Center. The Ventura County Council on

Aging will soon be a separate entity; that is, it will no longer be connected to the Tri-County. All federal funds for this purpose will come directly to Ventura County. We now have 50,000 senior citizens in the county. Joe Gaynes stressed our involvement in the Boys' Club, the Emergency Medical Service Committee, the State Mental Hospital, Hot Meals Programs, and our local City Council. L.V. and senior citizens have a big voice in politics and the politicians erecognize this. We should start surveying the candidtes for the Supervisorial post in our district.

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
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Popular Forum Attracts Villagers By Lori Kaye

SUBJECT: Widening of Ventura Freeway - Thousand Oaks to Oxnard

News articles indicate that construction on the Ventura Freeway widening project between Thousand Oaks and Oxnard will begin within the next two years. This letter is in regard to the bridges over Conejo Creek in Camarillo, and we ask that it be incorporated in the record of the public hearing in Camarillo scheduled for August 23, 1979.

Leisure Village, located just upstream of the bridges, is an adult community of approximately 2200 homes (when completed) which will be occupied by approximately 3900 people, most of whom are retired. The Village has been constructed so that during a 100 year flood, water will not enter the homes. However, during such a flood, water will fill the streets to a depth of several feet and will cover almost all landscaped areas.

Plate 18 of the Special Flood Hazard Study of Calleguas Creek and Conejo Creek by the U. S. Army Corns of Engineers, January 1977, indicates that the existing Highway 101 bridge (northbound) causes the water level to rise upstream during a 100 year flood up to 2-1/2 feet higher than if the bridge did not obstruct the flow of water in Conejo Creek. Other earlier studies by the Corps indicate that during a "project flood" (the largest flood that can be anticipated), water levels would be 2-3 feet higher than during a 100 year flood, flooding the freeway and causing water to rise into homes in the Village. Plates in those studies indicate that the obstruction caused by the freeway adds to the water level in the Village during a "project flood".

- Will you please advise us if the new highway bridges will be built to a level where the freeway will not obstruct the flow of flood water in Conejo Creek during a 100 year flood, and also a project flood? If the answer is negative in either case, would you please give us the reasons for your answer.
- Will you please furnish us with a copy of the staff report which analyzes the Conejo Creek flood problem and recommends the design of the bridges to cope with the problem?

Thank you for providing the requested information.

Dear Mr. Batinovitch:

The Leisure Village Association represents the interests of the owners of 1600 homes in Leisure Village in Pleasant Valley, Camarillo. Residents are primarily retired persons, most of whom previously lived in the San Fernando Valley and West Los Angeles. Since moving here, there have been numerous complaints about the high cost of telephoning nearby areas such as Thousand Oaks, with its huge new regional shopping center, and the many friends and relatives in the San Fernando Valley and West Los Angeles areas.

A study of the telephone service furnished to entire Ventura County, Los Angeles County and Orange County urban complex of which Camarillo is a part, indicates that almost without exception, telephone users have the privilege of calling, without toll, points within their exchange area, and also at least one additional area in each direction. In Camarillo, we can call all points within the Oxnard Exchange and also the Saticoy Exchange without toll, but we cannot call to the east to the next exchange (Thousand Oaks) without a toll charge (\$.56 - 5 minutes).

Telephone users in Thousand Oaks, Malibu, Moorpark, Valencia and San Clemente and all areas in between have ORTS service available. We can see no reasonable basis for denying such service to Camarillo while making it available to the other areas.

We understand that OCMS Service is available in some areas where ORTS Service is not available and that Pacific Telephone plans to materially expand this service, but it is not available to Camarillo.

There has not been any revision of telephone service area boundaries to reflect recent rapid developments in this area, tripling in size between 1965 and 1979 (10,350 - 33,304), and for the reasons outlined above, we request that the Commission advise us what needs to be done to:

- 1. Obtain an order that the Oxnard Exchange be divided into two areas: The Oxnard District area and the Camarillo District area, and that telephone users in each of such areas be able to call points within the adjacent areas without toll, e.g., Camarillo District area to be able to call Oxnard District area, Saticoy and Thousand Oaks without toll, with each of these areas to be able to call Camarillo District area without toll.
- To obtain an order that ORTS Service be made available to Camarillo on the same basis that it is available to other exchanges in the Ventura, Los Angeles and Orange County areas.
- If for any substantially valid reason ORTS Service cannot be made available, to obtain an order that OCMS Service be made available in the Camarillo area.


