

There are four candidates for three open seats.

We hear the usual preelection chatter about the strengths or weaknesses of this or that candidate's "personality." As far as we are concerned, election to the board is not a personality contest. These days, all around us, we have enough examples of the dangers of judging candidates on personalities only.


Granted, there is a political element in all elections, but ours is not an election of politicians. No candidate for our Board can or should represent a special interest, real or imagined.


From what we have observed, the single most important quality a candidate must have is the willingness to take on a heavy burden that will eat into their personal lives — each must be ready to give many hours to the task. Aside from whatever satisfaction one takes from meeting such a challenge

and whatever honor one finds in serving others, there is no material benefit to taking on the task.

Once elected, Board members' duties are clearly spelled out in our CC&Rs (Article III) and By-Laws (Article VII). These documents make no mention of special interests or personality qualifications.

In our opinion, the only qualification each voter should consider is which candidates will do the best job of carrying out their clearly stated duties for the good of the entire community — not just for today, but for tomorrow and tomorrow as well.

The primary goal of our Association and the Building & Grounds, as well as the Architectural Committee, is the safety and appearance of the Village.

Any changes made to the outside of our homes requires a permit. Any structural change requires a City of Camarillo building permit.

Per Rule 6.15, all wood fence that abuts Leisure Village or Mountain View Drive upon sale of the residence must be replaced with either slumpstone or vinyl. A sufficient amount to replace the fence must be held in escrow for no more than 90 days after the close of escrow, at which time the buyer must complete the installation of the new replaced fence.

Indoor/outdoor carpet is no longer allowed at front entrances, only in enclosed patios with a proper Architectural permit.

All improvements on the property are checked to be sure that permits are on file. If missing, the owner or agent must obtain one.



Afraid of a nasty fall? Here are tips to avoid one

Over the years, I have personally witnessed a few people fall. The sound of a human body striking the ground makes a perturbing sound. Visualize a large duffle bag full of clothes dropping form a height of 10 feet to the ground. When a person hits the ground, the weight of the body causes bones to break.

Statistics regarding falling are ominous: More than 40 percent of people hospitalized from hip fractures never return home because they are no longer capable of living independently; 25 percent of those who have serious falls pass away each year.

Falling is the bane of those of over 65.

The good news is that with adequate knowledge, most falls can be prevented. We need to raise our awareness level whenever we move about.

Falls occur when people don't look where they are walking. I recently took my wife to the Camarillo Train Station and saw a woman pull her suitcase up over a curb onto the platform. Her husband followed behind her, failed to see the curb, and fell flat on his face. He wasn't looking where

he was going. Fortunately, he was just shaken up and escaped serious injury.

There are some practical remedies we can take to insure safety in our home:

Don't turn a room into an obstacle course. Have clear paths for walking in your home.

Use a non-stick backing to secure throw rugs; keep floors clear of clutter, and run electrical and phone cords along walls.

Keep vour kitchen user-friendly by placing frequently used items on shelves within easy reach.

In the bathroom, nonslip bathmats and area

rugs are a must.

Don't use towel bars for support, they are not made to bear extra weight.

Use a night light in the bathroom.

If you have difficulty bending or stooping, don't bend down to pick up objects off the floor. Wait until someone can assist

Outdoor falls usually occur when people are distracted by looking everywhere except where they are going. Hazards are numerous: cracks in the sidewalks, curbs, protruding tree roots, uneven sidewalks, changes in elevation, garden hoses and,

of course, steps. When walking outdoors, wear good, comfortable walking shoes with non-skid soles.

The four essential elements of exercise are strength, flexibility, endurance and balance.
