Senator reacts to memo

The public has a right to know what is going on in the state college system and it will know if Senator Eugene McAteer (Dem-S.F.), has his way.

McAteer said this yesterday in a reaction to a memo from San Jose State College Vice President William J. Dusel who charged that short-circuiting by politicians endangered any gains made by the State College Board of Trustees.

"In general I would agree with the memo," McAteer said when it was read to him. "But I am concerned when 50 per cent of the faculty of a college complain about the policies of the Board of Trustees.

"I think the public is entitled to find out if the complaints are valid or this is just a large group of dissident professors. I am not sure the latter is true."

McAteer's action calling for a legislative investigation is counter to action taken Wednesday by the Board of Trustees which voted to refer charges of centralization, incompetent leadership and meddling with faculty affairs to a 10-man ad hoc committee set up by the Trustees to study the SF State faculty complaint.

The ad hoc committee is composed of two Trustees, two members of the Chancellor's staff, two members of the State College Presidents' Council and four members of the Statewide and local aca-

demie senates.

McAteer said the move to initiate a legislative investiga-

tion was now in the "confines" of the Senate (the rules committee) and that an in-

vestigation would probably take place before the end of the college year.

"It is time that the faculty and students realized that the state colleges are not private property," McAteer said. The state colleges belong to the people of California and they have a right to know what is going on."

"If over 50 per cent of a faculty voice a complaint, it is a lot different than two or three," McAteer said. "You have to assume that these people (the SF Faculty petitioners) are mature and that there is some credence in what they are saying."

No dissent: SJS letter

(Editor's Note: The following statement was issued to San Jose State faculty members by William J. Dusel, vice president at San Jose, on March 26, 1964, requesting faculty members to refrain from participating in SF State's faculty drive for an investigation of the California State College system.)

In the absence of President Wahlquist from the campus, I feel a personal responsibility to request all San Jose faculty members to refrain from taking part in the recent San Francisco State-led efforts to discredit publicly the leadership of the California State Colleges. I urge this restraint in signing petitions for several reasons:

- Destruction of public confidence in the California State College system (a probable consequence of infectious revolt) could result in the imposing of alternative forms of management on all of us, infinitely less promising for the future development of San Jose State and the other State colleges than the present almost autonomous Board of Trustees.

- The organizational structure of the California State Colleges, provided under the Master plan for Higher Education in California, has not had a fair chance to prove itself, to work out its many problems from within, and to make full use of the judgement and talents of its excellent teaching and administrative faculties.

- The California State College System has organizational provisions within it for orderly review and change of demonstrably unwise policies and procedures. Throwing San Francisco problems directly to the press and to politicians has short-circuited this machinery and has endangered the solid gains that have been made under a separate Board of Trustees.

- The Statewide Academic Senate has proposed a different approach to the problems at San Francisco State, and at all other colleges. Within a few days it will be announced and explained by our local senators and our Academic Council chairman. Please reserve your commitments until you hear from them.

Board of Trustees talk PE changes

The California State College Board of Trustees cut short a discussion on proposed physical education curriculum yesterday when Trustee Louis Heilbron pointed out the Board was jumping the chain of command by passing faculty recommendations.

Trustee Thomas Carr had been discussing a change in the age requirements for physical education from 25 to 21 years of age for students with six units and over.

After comments by board chairman Charles Luckman and State School Superintendent Max Rafferty that such a change would save money, Heilbron said that the PE requirement should be considered by the Statewide and local academic senates before being considered by the Trustees. At this point the discussion stopped.

In other action the Board changed the name of Orange State College to California State College at Fullerton. The Board said the change was a local request and that there was no attempt to force the college to change its name.

Louis Heilbron, chairman of the ad hoc committee to study the SF State faculty petition said that the committee had scheduled its first meeting for May 5, but would meet earlier if necessary.

Burnett reply

Speaker defends AS leg position

(Editor's Note: The following article is a statement by AS Legislature Speaker Bill Burnett in defense of his position as leader of that body which was recently attacked in former AS President Jay Folberg's "A Nasty Look at Student Politics." Since the charges were originally aired in the columns of this paper, the Gater believes that it is only fair to allow a rebuttal.)

I did not intend at first to reply to the remarks of ex-AS President Jay Folberg concerning my candidacy for AS President, but as the Golden Gater had apparently entered student government politics and seems to be taking an editorial stand supporting Folberg's position and misrepresenting my own, it has become mandatory that I use this means of presenting my position clearly.

News briefs

Student government, as I conceive it, exists for two purposes. The first, to provide a large and varied program of social and cultural activities for the student outside of his curricular studies. The second, to represent the student's interest in the formation of college policies, in co-operation with representatives of the faculty and administration.

President Folberg, playing it by ear in his year as campus politico, injected into student government a new element which was to eventually lead to a disintegration of much of the progress which he advanced.

Student government, reasoned he, should not merely limit itself to the 96-acre campus, but should in addition take stands on issues which affect the "student's welfare." This could occur through AS Legislature resolutions.

The legislature had been assigned by the student body the tasks of administering student body funds, running student government elections, and occasionally ratifying a faculty-administration policy affecting the Associated Students.

Pandora's box was opened, however, and the legislature began to drift progressively farther from the purposes for which it was conceived. The University of Mississippi was instructed to accept Meredith without incident, President Kennedy was advised how to

HEAVENLY BODIES

The Russian Cosmonauts boasted that they did not find God or Heaven up in the sky. Some say that this is only because they did not go high enough. But Christians know that God will never be found by searching the cosmos in a space ship; for God is Spirit, and His truth transcends the physical realm of existence.  resolve the Cuba crisis, and finally, a resolution was introduced warning Mao Tse Tung not to cross the Indian border.

When I became Speaker I suggested that no further resolutions of a political nature be presented. I maintain that this is the most realistic position for a body whose primary responsibility is still the allocation of student body monies, and whose members should be elected for this purpose rather than their outside political beliefs.

When we formed the Liberal Student League last spring it was my specific position that off-campus politics should not enter a body whose stated purpose was on-campus progress in student government.

When I resigned in the fall it was because this position had subtly changed. The word "liberal" however scared away persons unsure what it meant and attracted others not interested in student government but in political and social movements.

To combat this, Marty Mel-

lera, the assistant speaker, and myself suggested a change in name and a reorganization of the body to shake off its political encrustations.

The crisis hit when President Ramsay, Vice President Hill, and four of the five members of the LSL steering committee donned "Jordan for Mayor" buttons and sponsored his speech here on behalf of the LSL.

Meanwhile, back in the on-

campus world the famed controversy over the AS Loans Bill caused the two branches of government to drift rapidly apart.

There is not as Folberg has proposed and the Gater has echoed, a personality conflict between the branches of government. Goals in common—the formation of a Creative Arts Board for example—have passed easily in both branches. But there exists an ir-

reconcilable conflict between the legislature's idea that student government should concern itself with the on-campus world, and the executive, that it should join in actively supporting various student movements about the land.

FWC baseball play begins; Gators meet UN Wolfpack

SF State begins defense of its Far Western Conference baseball championship tomorrow with a doubleheader against the University of Nevada Wolfpack.

Starting time for the first on-campus game is noon.

The Gators have been league champions for two years in a row and will bring a well-juggled team into the first league game.

Terry Christman and Mike Campas will probably be SF State's starting pitchers for the game.

A left-hander, Christman

takes a 4-0 record into league play. Right-hander Campas is 3-1. Each pitched in the second game of the Nevada Southern twin-bill last Saturday and should be ready.

They will be backed up by John Walker and Wes Greenwood, two pitchers who have been improving fast.

After getting off to a slow start, the Gators have won six of their last seven games. They will take a 9-6 won-loss record into league play.

The Gators started slow because they had trouble following the bouncing ball or, when

they could follow it, making the proper throw with it.

They averaged four errors a game and reached a new low with eight against the University of San Francisco. But like a floundering swimmer, whatever goes down must come up.

Coach Bob Rodrigo made numerous line-up changes until he came up with a combination that could hold onto the ball.

Nevada was fourth in the league last year with a 2-6 won-loss record. SF State won the title with an 8-2 mark.
