Have you heard the good news? The brand new piano for the AR is here and in use! It is a 7'5" Kawai piano and actual presentation was made at the LVA Board meeting of March 5.

Pres. June Niles received the key from Jules Nayfack, Keyboard Club president. The Club has spearheaded a two-year drive to raise money for the pruchase.

The Keyboard Club acknowledges recent donations to the new piano fund of \$25 from the Bocce Club, and individual contributions from Eleanor Quartuccio, and from Roie Beck, given in memory of George Jensen.

The committee who se-

lected the Kawai grand piano included Dorothy Weiss, Kurt Godfrey, and Bill Marvel, who spent several months at the demanding job.

Undaunted by the great fund raising efforts to reach this goal, ambitious Keyboard Club members would like to continue the effort, until the tired pianos in the MPR and the Lanai Rm. are also replaced.

Any keyboard artist who has played either of these Village pianos can testify that a better replacement instrument is greatly needed, just as it was hard work to play the former baby grand piano in the auditorium.

Several years back the Keyboard Club replaced the AR organ with the current Yamaha theater organ, used for many Village events. Piff DeSimone was president the two years the enthusiastic group raised more than \$10,000 for that successful project.

Several expenses connected to the acquisition of the new piano are a new, larger cover and a new, larger cradle to facilitate moving the instrument. These extra expenses will run another \$500.

Can it be over eleven years ago that villager Sanford Okum strode into the Women's Club Room where a small Writers Group was meeting, and asked for a hearing? This Village needed its own newspaper, Sandy exclaimed, and this group was the logical place to start it. Sandy was very insistent, and Lew Simon from Village 8 was just the one to accept the challenge. He arranged for an open meeting, inviting all interested villagers to attend. The discussion was lively — who would write, what would one write about, who would print it, who would pay for it. There were no easy answers.


It seemed almost miraculous, then, that a stranger stood up and offered some help. It was Hank Crockett, now publisher of the Camarillo Daily News, and with him was Harold Kinsch, his assistant. If the villagers would be responsible for the material, he would print it without charge. The catch? The hope was that all villagers would subscribe to the Camarillo Daily News. Of course, this has never become a reality but the News continues to furnish enough copies of ILV for every home in the Village.

That first issue spelled out the nature of the paper, its purpose and its editorial policy and who would prepare it. It was aptly named Inside Leisure Village by Pat Jackler, V 18. It would be filled with contributions from villagers about the Village. It was not until several months later that Harold DeBow and Lew Simon designed the little man logo in use today.

Our editorial policy was set forth, and because of the nature of our paper our editing has been kept at a minimum, because we wish to keep the flavor of each contribution without embarrassment to anyone. Articles usually are cut only if space is at a premium.

In the beginning we had difficulty getting Club news. Now the club contributions overflow from the center pages and get scattered where ever there is space, although we do attempt to cluster them near the center.

We have had complete cooperation from the Camarillo Daily News. Our contents have never been questioned by Mr. Crockett and we rarely see him except for an occasional wave across the newspaper office. The Production Manager Novella Killian, broke us in (which took some considerable doing, since we were amateurs), and her competent assistant, Marcie Parsons, is always ready to give us a helping hand and puts up with us in good humor. Bob Aguilar, Advertising Diector, keeps his staff busy so that we have ample space each month. (We are allowed 40% of the space sold). If your subscription newspaper doesn't arrive on time, Circulation Manager Betty Lucas sees to it that you get a copy pronto.

CANDIDATE

In the January ILV was a letter, "Candidate vs. Director", which in turn was rebutted in February by another letter, "Pro and Con."

The first letter completely missed the point of what John Lauten said, both times. The second letter has a point well made, but both letters miss what John actually did say.

If quoted correctly, on May 26, 1989 John said in essence, that there should be meetings so the Board could "modify proposals after hearing homeowners."

Then on Jan 10, 1990, John said that "if they had to leave it to the vote of the homeowners x x x you can have the job."

This is not-- I repeat-not, a 180 degree turn from his May 1989 statement.

"Hearing from homeowners" is distinctly not the same as "leaving it to a vote of the homeowners".

Leisure Village Association, as with the state and federal governments, is not a democracy, where people vote on the issues and make the decisions. It is a Republic, where the people elect representatives to make the decisions for them.

Boards in the past have put proposals to votes of the residents at considerable expense, I may add, which were admittedly non-binding even when put to the vote.

I can't recall the details but I do remember one or two such "elections" where the Board went contrary to the popular vote.

In re the Toxic Spill exercise, I learned a few things about my house that I must correct, and I pass them on as suggestions for your house.

I selected the Master bedroom as the secure room, for the reasons suggested by the ESC. First thing, I found that the TV outlet does not work.

Then I became aware, mon household ingredi- although I knew it all along, that the connecting bathroom has a ceiling vent fan which will have to be sealed off, in addition to the windows.

The final blow was to find a cold draft coming out of a light switch on the wall. Our friends at B & B Too have a foamy stuff you can squirt in to correct that, and the ceiling fan can be covered with a piece of plastic grocery bag, stuck on with masking tape.

In addition to all those troubles, and although it has nothing to do with the secure room, I have been aware that the range hood vent makes a draft of cold air coming down onto the stove.

In a Toxic Spill this would allow a lot of noxious stuff to get into the house. A sheet of plastic would make an emergency fix, but I don't like to have plastic over the cooking area. There must be some kind of shut-off damper for the exhaust

These are small points, but could be important in an emergency. I suggest that you look for them in your house -- and if you find others, tell the rest of the Villagers about them.

Residents are reminded that there are four emergency telephones in the Recreation Center complex. These telephones are connected directly to the Main Gate where Security personnel are always on duty. These telephones are located as follows:

LEAVE VENT CLEAR

There is potential for a fire in the lower ovens of our cookstoves if the vents to these ovens are inadvertently closed. The cooktops have four heating elements. The larger (rear) element on the right side also serves as the vent for the lower oven.

It has been the practice of some cooks to place a low the heating element to protect the reflecting pan against staining from spillage or boilover...

Residents are warned, however, that if aluminum foil is placed below the heating element in the right rear position the vent from the lower oven will be blocked. This practice can cause the lower oven to overheat when used, with the corresponding possibility of fire in this oven.

Continuing Education Classes To Expand

Oxnard College classes
began inFebruary with
three courses offered
here at Leisure Village: 1)
Art Appreciation, 2) Current Issues inDomestic
and Foreigh Politics, and
3) Vocal Ensemble.

Almost 100 Leisure Village residents participate in these classes, clearly reflecting our interest in this kind of available continuing education.

Last year a survey was taken to determine residents' preferences for class subjects, location and time schedule. Preliminary results of this survey indicated special interest in courses dealing with the following topics: Art Appreciation, Western Civilization, History of Ideas and Culture, Survey of Great Philosophers, International Relations and Conversational Spanish.

Most people preferred attending classes here at Leisure Village, though several indicated they would be willing to travel to a satelite center located in Camarillo.

Most people preferred classes held in the morning, but many were willing to attend in the afternoons as well. A few people replied that they would be willing to attend classes at any time and any location.

In the fall semester of 1990, it is hoped that the number of classes offered here may be expanded based on these expressed interests. However, this will also depend upon available space resources here, and on available teaching faculty from Oxnard College.

We would also be interested in hearing from Leisure Village residents who are qualified and willing to teach classes themselves or to be guest speakers at classes on particular subjects.

We believe there is a great deal of talent and experience right here in our own population which could be used for teaching as well as learning in our cintinuing education program.

1990 Census Blasts Off

On or about March 25, you were one of 106 million recipients who found the 1990 Census questionaire in your mailbox. MOST of you received the short form; SOME Village households got the long form (59 questions). ALL villagers should complete and return the questionaire by Census Day, April 1, 1990.

An estimated 250 million people will be counted; the success of the 1990 Census depends on all of us. The questions are basic and need complete answers. An incomplete questionnaire requires that a Census employee contact the individual for information. All data is confidential.

If you have difficulty completing your census questionnaire, there are several Village volunteers ready to help you. Or, you can contact Charlie Kent, V#25, 484-9355, who is an official Census '90 worker.

The 1990 Census will set the population of Camarillo and all of Ventura County. This count directly affects how Federal and State funds are apportioned to city and county. Census counts also determine representation in the U.S. House of Representatives, the state legislature in Sacramento and county and municipal governments.

In addition the 1990 Census will tell us:

* How the nation is changing.

* The condition of housing.

* Education, employment, and income information about this area.

* The social and economic pulse of the nation.
