4 candidates vie for 2 seats on board

With the deadlines having passed for applications submitted through the Nominating Committee, and/or receipt of appropriate petitions as provided for in the governing documents, the process associated with the annual election for candidates interested in serving on the five-member Leisure Village Association Board of Directors for the next two years is well under way.

Public records show that two applications were received and subsequently approved by the Nominating Committee, consisting of incumbent John Mayer (Lin Grant's seat is also open, but she is ineligible to run because she

has reached the term limit of four years) and Ted Lansing, a previous member of the board. Individual petitions for the election containing the required 43 signatures (2 percent of eligible voters) were also received from Joyce Baker

and Robert Kulick, bringing the total number of candidates for the two open seats to four.

Showtyme bringing The Coasters to LV on July 15

Showtyme presents Billy Richards' Coasters and comedian Carlos Oscar on Sunday, July 15, at 2 p.m. in the AR.

Billy Richards is a multi-talented entertainer, having sung, recorded and toured his entire adult life. He got his start in high school. At the early age of 17, he sang with his uncle's famed rock-n-roll group, The Robins. In 1962 he joined forces with the original bass singer of The Coasters, Bobby Nunn. The group took the name The Coasters in 1955 because it had developed on the West Coast.

For the balance of the 1950s, The Coasters remained among the most important influences on popular music. Two of the most notable recordings that continued this trend were the 1958 No. 1-ranked hit,

"Yakety Yak," and the 1959 success, "Charlie Brown."

Carlos Oscar is known for his charming, witty and energetic stage persona. He fully acts out his jokes by telling stories and morphing in various characters and voices. Bill Cosby said, "Carlos Oscar is a comedy treasure that's finally been discovered." The only four-letter words you'll hear from Carlos are "wife," "kids," "debt" and "help." Carlos jokes mostly about the humorous side of his family, society and everyday mishaps.

Tickets will be on sale in the Lanai Room on Tuesday, June 26, from 9 to 11 a.m.; Wednesday, June 27, from 1 to 3 p.m.; and Thursday, June 28, from 1 to 3 p.m.

Ticket prices are still the same, \$10 for members and \$13 for non-members.



Realtors Corner: Make sure your insurance is up to date

Most of us know that there was a significant fire loss in Village 6 recently, making it very important to have appropriate insurance. Policies and coverages can be confusing! Our Leisure Village Association has a master insurance policy which covers the perimeter and structural walls only on each home. It is sometimes referred to as a "bare bones policy." If a homeowner has a fire in their unit and has to make a claim, there could be a \$5,000 deductible assessed to the homeowner.

Not covered in the master policy are cabinets, countertops, sinks, toilets, vanities, stove, dishwasher, refrigerator, washer, dryer, garbage disposal, water heater, flooring, lighting, bathroom fixtures, shower, tub, etc. Personal property contents on one's home is not covered at all on the master policy, but would be included on your HO6 policy. There are sub-limits for jewelry and other target items, so you may want to add a floater (endorsement) to insure those specific items. Be sure to include Contents Replacement Cost to your policy so your insurance will pay you "new for old" on your contents should you have a loss.

When talking with your insurance agent, you may want to ask about earthquake and flood insurance if relevant for your home.

Please be sure to have the correct coverage. Once a loss occurs, it's too late!

Some berry good summer treats bring some refreshing changes

Nothing says summer like California fresh strawberries. They are fabulous and plentiful now. Also, those yummy seedless watermelons are getting inexpensive, too. Berries and melon are summer buddies! You can use them in so many ways.

For example, hull fresh red strawberries and slice them. Then dice seeded watermelon. Place the sliced berries and the diced melon on top of mixed greens, tossing lightly with your favorite dressing. (Balsamic vinaigrette goes great with berries). Garnish with crumbled feta or goat cheese for a lovely, light entree. Or get out your blender and make a berry delicious (and low-calorie) smoothie. Don't forget to invite a neighbor to share a cool afternoon Leisure Village treat!

Strawberry Watermelon Smoothie

- 1 pound diced seedless watermelon, without rind, about 3 to 4 cups
- 8 ounces strawberries, stems removed, about a pint
- 1 Tbsp lemon or lime juice
- 1 Tbsp sugar or sugar substitute 1/4 to 1/2 cup cold water*

Put all ingredients into a blender and blend until smooth. If you want, you can strain the purée through a mesh sieve to strain out any pulpy pieces that didn't get broken up in the blender. I don't mind the little pieces. When I make this, sometimes I add a banana because I love them.

*Adjust the ingredients, adding less water and more sugar or sugar substitute to taste. Makes 4 cups.

Pickin' and grinnin' in LV

If the tree is planted in a common area, there's no forbidden fruit — it's all yours to harvest and enjoy

Lemons, lemons everywhere — so whom do they belong to?

It depends on where the tree is planted.

Golfers and strollers who walk the common areas of Leisure Village are familiar with the citrus trees growing in the greenbelt. Mostly lemon trees, they can be considered the residents' bounty.

"The lemons belong to you," explained LV General Manager Bob Scheaffer. "We maintain the trees, but we don't touch the fruit except when it falls in the path of the lawnmower and is ground up."

Years ago, Villagers complained when the landscaping crews picked up the fallen fruit in the common areas, so the grounds crews stopped doing it. Making lemonade out of LV greenbelt lemons is the sole province of any resident who wants to pick them

The majority of fruit trees in Leisure Village are planted and owned by homeowners. Mostly lemon — with some lime, orange, tangerine, and fig — trees dot patios and planter beds around our houses. Maintenance is very clear: It's the homeowner's responsibility.

"They must remove the fallen fruit and prune the trees away from the roofline," says Karen Snethen, LV landscape assistant.

Fruit left on the ground attracts critters, mostly squirrels and rats.

LV Rules and Regulations, Article 7.03 (page 108 in the phone book) spells out the requirements for fruit trees on private property clearly. Karen reminds us that LV landscapers can help with homeowners' trees. Cost is \$25 for pruning and \$35 to remove a tree.

Will you find it in the Bible, Or in the books you read? They will really help you, but that's not the place indeed.


The place you'll find religion, From when our lives begun Is not in books or places, But in the hearts of everyone.




governing campaign procedures and the election process were also included in the mailing to all homeowners.

Candidates Night, an open forum where the candidates had an opportunity to address homeowners and answer questions, was held at 7 p.m. Thursday, May 24, in the AR. One candidate did not attend. This event was broadcast live on LVTV and will be replayed via recorded tape during the next several weeks.

Absentee ballots were mailed to all homeowners on May 25, with the annual meeting scheduled for Thursday, June 28, at 10 a.m., after which the results will be announced. Officers for the coming year will then be elected at a working board meeting to be held immediately following the annual meeting.

The governing documents require that a minimum of 1,069 votes be cast for the election to be valid, and although a process exists to override this potential problem, it is time-consuming and costly, and ILV staff therefore requests that all homeowners become familiar with the candidates and "get out" the vote.




rightfully surmised he would soon tire of eating nothing but chicken wings.


