LOCATION:

Campus occupies a 354-acre site in the hills east of Mission Blvd., offering a striking view of the San Francisco Bay Area. By freeway, downtown Oakland is 20 miles to the north and San Francisco is 34 miles via the Bay Bridge.

The University places emphasis upon its liberal arts curricula and offers strong interdisciplinary programs in ethnic studies.

PHYSICAL FACILITIES

Now in use: Library-Administration Building, 361,400 sq. ft., Cost \$10.6 (1971)

Speech-Drama Complex, comprising the Karl Robinson Hall classroom building and University Theatre, 60,700 sq. ft., Cost \$2.5 (1971). The University Theatre, a 500-seat proscenium theatre, houses \$200,000 worth of professional quality computerized lighting and sound equipment. The Theatre also houses a Studio Theatre and related production facilities.

CURRICULUM

The *baccalaureate degree* is offered in 35 majors. The University now awards the master's degree in 21 fields: *MA degree* in Anthropology, Biological Science, Economics, English, French, Geography, History, Music, Political Science, Sociology, and Speech; the *MS degree* in Bus. Adm. (option in Quantitative Bus. Methods), Chemistry, Counseling, Education, (Supervision, Counseling, Reading), Kinesiology and Physical Education, Mathematics, Physics, and Statistics; *MPA degree* in Public Administration, and *MBA degree* in Business Administration.

Year-round operation was inaugurated when the University added a summer quarter in 1965 as a pilot project for the California State University and Colleges. Cal State also operates a six-week summer session, and a quarterly extension program.

ACCREDITATION

Cal State is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.

California Teaching Credentials are offered in the following fields: Multiple Subject, Single Subject, Community College, Standard Supervision, School Counseling, School Psychology, School Psychometry.

The B.S. in Chemistry is accredited by the American Chemical Society.

The B.A. and M.A. in music are accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music.

The B.S. in Business Administration is accredited by the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business.

FACULTY

The faculty roster for 1974-75 includes about 750 full and part-time professors of whom approximately 77% have doctorate degrees. (The national average per institution is around 50%). The teaching staff is organized in 36 instructional departments.

STUDENTS

The 1974 graduating class totaled more than 3,000. Approximately 12,000 students were registered for the 1974-75 academic year. The majority of students currently come from East Bay communities, although a number of out-of-state are enrolled. *Thirty-five countries* are also represented.

Annual nine-month residence hall fees are \$1,467 - \$1,512. Total three-quarter cost for single students *living away from home usually total \$2,500*. Sizable long-term student loans are available through the Financial Aids Office, *as are 30-day loans for sums up to \$50*. A few scholarships ranging from \$100 to \$500 are granted to outstanding students with financial need.

There are also fees for other services such as a one-time-only \$20 application fee, \$10 per quarter for parking permit, facilities fee \$2, and student body fee \$7, plus 50 cents photo I.D. fee per quarter.

LIBRARY

The latest count shows over 450,000 catalogued books, 2,900 periodical subscriptions, 150,000 government publications, microfilm, recordings and maps, and 55 newspapers.

HISTORICAL MILESTONES

- July 1957 Legislation creating the College receives Governor's signature
- September 1959 First classes are conducted in Hayward's Sunset High
- July 1960 Permanent campus site is chosen, with approval of the Legislature and Governor
- September 1963 Move is made from temporary quarters (Foothill High) to permanent campus.
- June 1965 Summer quarter — year round operation is initiated.
- June 1972 Cal State awarded "State University" status
