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Robert McAllister Gift Pushes Personal Total Over \$1 Million



Capt. Robert W. McAllister (D-42) – Ft. Myers, FL, has just made a gift of \$200,000 to Cal Maritime -- raising his overall contributions to the school over the \$1 million mark. McAllister is the largest individual donor to Cal Maritime in its 80-year history.

"We are extremely pleased that Capt. McAllister has continued to make these substantial and generous gifts to Cal Maritime," said **President William B. Eisenhardt**. "His initial gifts provided substantial scholarship support for our cadets. We will be consulting with him about how best to use these additional resources. They come to us at a time of great challenge and of great opportunity. Cal Maritime has experienced sub-

stantial growth in enrollment, programs and resources – like our new Simulation Center, residence hall and planned Physical Education/Survival Training Center. This latest gift, and the recent \$3 million award from ABS to expand and enhance our Department of Maritime Policy and Management, are clear signs of the steady growth of private support from business, individuals and foundations who recognize the value and quality of our programs."

With the intense demand for qualified deck and engineering officers to serve in the **U.S. Merchant Marine** during WWII, Capt. McAllister rose from 3rd Officer to Master just two years after he graduated from Cal Maritime, and he kept that license valid until his retirement, 45 years later, in 1987. Nearly half his career (22 years) was spent as a Panama Canal pilot, and in 1963 he had the proud honor of piloting the *Golden Bear* through the Canal.

Captain McAllister retired in 1987. Upon his wife's passing in 2001 and in her memory, he established the **Capt. Robert W. and Edith I. McAllister Fund** at the California Maritime Academy with an initial gift of \$600,000. Subsequent smaller additions, coupled with his latest gift, pushes his total contributions to his alma mater over the \$1 million mark.

Global Studies Cadets Win AIO Scholarship Two Years Running

Each year, the Northern California chapter of the Association of Intelligence Officers (AIO) funds two \$2,500 scholarships to students interested in a career in intelligence. The **Bernard "Buzz" Wellman Scholarship** is for sophomore through graduate students attending four-year accredited colleges and universities in Northern California. And while competition is intense, Cal Maritime cadets, for the second year in a row, won one of the coveted prizes. Last year's winner was **Jordan Fachko (GSMA '10)**. This year it was **Garrett Laudenback (also GSMA '10)**.

Cal Maritime **History Professor Dr. Timothy Lynch**, said the AIO competitive process requires an interview and detailed documentation including essays, letters of recommendation and proof of academic achievement and leadership potential. "For a small, highly specialized, and relatively new major like Global Studies to win consecutive awards against competition from **Stanford, UC Berkeley, UC Davis** and other more-established programs is a testament to the training our students receive and reflects well on the major and the institution," he said proudly.

Laudenback said, "I chose Global Studies because of the unique curriculum, and because I felt it would provide a good foundation for graduate school. I am also pursuing a minor in Business to give myself a wide body of knowledge." He spent part of summer, 2007 working with the **U.S. Coast Guard in LA/Long Beach** on incident investigations in advance of mariner licensing hearings, and then took part in his summer training cruise, which he loved. Today, he hopes to pursue a career in **Marine Corps Intelligence** – one of the reasons he decided to apply for the AIO grant. He has been accepted in the Corp's **Platoon Leaders Class** program and reports to Quantico, VA, for ten weeks of summer **Officer Candidate School** training leading to a commission as a 2nd Lieutenant. "Eventually, I would like to attend graduate school and study International Relations or Security Studies." Laudenback is **Administrative Officer** for his Div. 3 GSMA section, President of the campus **Toastmasters Club**, a member of the **Bible Club** and, when time permits, an avid mountain biker.

Jordan Fachko, comes from a family with deep Coast Guard ties. "My dad's a helicopter pilot with the service and we've lived throughout the Western U.S. and Puerto Rico. My grandfather was also a Coast Guard aviator. and I want to follow in their footsteps. I am interested in homeland security, law enforcement, and intelligence. and GSMA covers all of those areas." Fachko is the **Div. 2 GSMA Section Leader**. After training cruise last summer, he spent the fall semester in Washington, D.C. as a **Panetta Institute intern** and regularly represented the school at **Maritime Security Council Conferences** in Florida and Washington, D.C. Receiving the AIO scholarship is really an honor, he says.

"Garrett and I both faced stiff competition. Another winner was a UC Davis grad student who had already served overseas in Army intelligence. Being able to compete on that level as second and third-year undergrads speaks volumes about our Global Studies program.

Itinerary Set for 2009 Training Cruise—Preparation Underway

It may still be mid-winter, but **Capt. Harry Bolton** and his staff are already hard at work planning for the 2009 training cruise to the West Coast of South America – and with a special extra. Much of the advance work involves coordination with a host of campus offices and external agencies....everything from food service (food ordering and staffing the shipboard food operations) to academic department heads (classroom scheduling and arranging logistics for shore-side activities and educational visits) to Coast Guard checks of operational and safety systems.

This year, the four-month cruise itinerary will begin in a new way with a one-day training intensive of maneuvers and exercises on San Francisco Bay. The change will also afford an opportunity for campus faculty and staff to ride along that first day as observers. “We’re working closely with Bay maritime interests including area pilots, tug companies, and ports, Capt. Bolton explains. “Together, we’re arranging a day of exercises on the Bay that will include approaches to ports like Oakland and Richmond, maneuvering in confined channels, transferring of personnel between *Golden Bear* and workboats, and maneuvering in coordination with workboats such as our own *Black Bear*, which will accompany us throughout the first day in home waters. Collectively, these exercises will provide our cadets with excellent hands-on experiences in specialized vessel operations.”

Campus faculty and staff will be offered the chance to “ride along” that first day to watch colleagues and cadets in action. “We hope members of the campus family who have not had a chance to see the ship in full cruise operations mode, will get a better understanding of its role in all aspects of our educational and leadership programs. It’s also a chance for our deck and engine cadets to ‘hit the deck running’ from day one.”

Golden Bear will berth in San Francisco for an overnight stay, allowing visitors to disembark and return to Vallejo. The next morning, May 4, she will transit the Golden Gate headed for calls in Mexico, Panama, Ecuador and Chile. She’ll return to Los Angeles for changeover before repeating her Latin American itinerary a second time for Cruise 2 and return to Vallejo for the start of the fall semester on August 30th.

Cal Maritime's 2009 Career Fair drew large crowds of cadets, alumni and industry recruiters to campus on Tuesday, January 20th. According to **Interim Career Center Director James Dalske**, the numbers of companies taking part in this year's fair was enough to fill the gymnasium and overflow into the student center. The companies that took part were enthusiastic about the event and the opportunity to chat informally with job prospects, both at the Fair itself and in one-on-one interviews across campus. The day after the Career Fair, cadets had the opportunity to interview with eighteen companies, showing that although economic times are tough our cadets are still in high demand. The Career Center plays an important role in preparing students for the challenge of finding that first job after graduation. "We provide information about companies and organizations and what they are looking for in terms of available positions and job skills," Dalske explained. "We also help them prepare resumes, offer mock interviews to hone their skills in presenting themselves, and tips on how to dress for success."

Machinery like this will see heavy use as the date for the ship's 2009 Cruise departure approaches. Cadets will use forklifts to transfer vendor deliveries from trucks and trailers to the pier and from there to ship-board storage areas. Given the high volume of deliveries involved, the timing of their arrival has to be carefully calculated to assure they can be rapidly and efficiently transferred aboard and stowed away.

The new gas-fired system, located at the shoreside end of the main campus pier, will feed heated water through insulated piping for use by faculty, staff, students and others who live and work aboard during the academic year. Until now, ship's hot water was generated by large electric units on board. This process works fine when powered by shipboard electrical generators during cruise, but is very expensive and inefficient for shoreside usage. The new unit, one of a large number of energy efficiency upgrades being undertaken campus-wide, is expected to begin operating by the end of February.

Custodians Raise Visibility With First-Ever Calling Card Effort

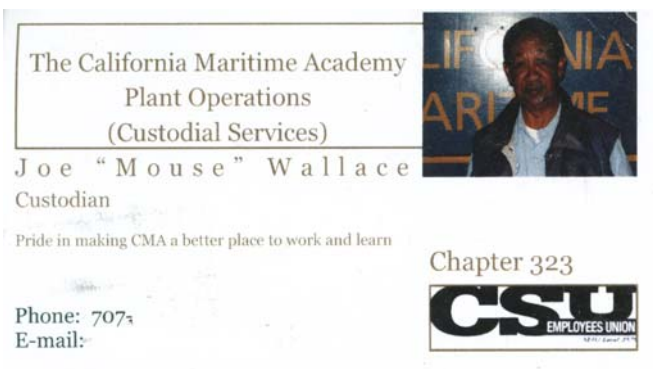
A university is a place with a lot of smart people, but here's a question a lot of us, we'd ruefully have to admit, can't answer. Who is your custodian? They're important members of the campus family, but for many of us they are largely invisible, because they do their work when we're not around.

To give their colleagues a better appreciation for what they do, Cal Maritime's custodial team launched a program unique to the California State University system. Calling cards, similar to those used in hotels, let colleagues know they have been by to do their tasks of cleaning offices and buildings. "We wanted the faculty and staff to know who they were," said **Chuck Constantine, chapter 323 President of the California State University Employees Union**, "and put a face with a name."

A 2007 campus survey found most freshmen living on campus, and many faculty and staff made no distinction between outsourced custodians who clean their living quarters, and the eight California State University custodians in charge of campus classrooms, labs, and offices. The recognition program was created by the custodian members with help from Constantine, a campus safety officer, and labor relations representative **Roni Jennings**. Its hallmark is the calling card, which includes the custodian's name, title, photo, and contact information. Members leave the cards behind about once a week in facilities they've cleaned. **State union spokesman John Watson** said Cal Maritime's custodians are the first in the 23-campus system to have implemented the idea. "It's helping introduce them to their colleagues on campus," Watson said, "and bringing them more recognition for their efforts."

Ringin' The Bell of Success



Many of the deck and engineering students who passed all seven exams on the first try gathered for a group photo on the quad after formation. All were given the opportunity to ring the ship's bell in front of the full Corps in recognition of their successful completion of this important milestone in their education.

Bells were ringing on campus in mid-January as happy Marine Transportation and Engineering students celebrated the completion of an important career milestone – passing all of the Coast Guard examinations needed to obtain their license as a Third Mate or 3rd Engineer and work as a deck or engineering officer. Those who passed every exam on their first try were invited to ring the ship's bell in front of the Corps formation on the quadrangle on January 14th.

The deck and engineering major tracks culminate with a series of seven exams which stretch over four days just before the start of the second semester. The Mate's exam covers Rules of the Road, Seamanship, Safety and Navigation. Engineers are tested on Diesel and Steam Engineering, Safety, General Engineering and Electrical. Students have up to three hours for each of the seven exams and passing grades requirements vary from 70-90% depending on the test subject. To get the desired license, examinees must pass all seven examinations. Failure to pass more than two requires that all seven must be taken again until all have been successfully completed. Thirty-six engineering and 60 marine transportation (deck) students took this year's exam.

In the past, the tradition of ringing the ship's bell had been undertaken by successful cadets as soon as they receive their test grades, and that practice continues today. Now however, a new tradition has now been put into place, with a repeat of the ceremony in front of the full Corps at formation. "This is a very important part of their learning experience and a major step on the path these cadets have set towards their careers in engineering and the maritime service," said Capt. Harry Bolton, skipper of Training Ship *Golden Bear* and head of the Academy Leadership program. "We want to give them an opportunity to share their success with the full Corps and receive proper recognition for what they have accomplished."

Cal Maritime is hosting a **US SAILING Basic Keelboat Instructor Course** for experienced sailors from **Feb 26-Mar 1st**. Membership in US SAILING is required to take the course and can be obtained online. Additional perquisites will also be found as indicated via the weblinks below. The course is a 3-day session allowing experienced keelboat instructors to test and evaluate their teaching and sailing skills.

Candidates should anticipate single-handing a keelboat while demonstrating competency in sailing off a dock, mooring or slip, tacking, jibing, stopping, backing the boat and returning to the dock, mooring or slip. Instructor candidates must also be able to present material in a classroom environment with ease. This certification includes the successful completion of written exams as well as other practical evaluations such as the swim check, Marlinespike Seamanship test and overall demonstrative and communication ability – important components of the Basic Keelboat Instructor course.

To become a US SAILING Instructor, a candidate must be both a confident and competent sailor and able to sail anywhere in the U.S. and handle the vast range of situations and different models of boats encountered in sailing courses.

"These are a sampling of our courses, and listings can change," Dean McNutt noted. "I would encourage interested individuals, businesses or organizations to download the current catalog and bookmark our website for latest updates."

"Cal Maritime can customize many of its courses to meet the needs of a specific group or organization and can, given sufficient demand, arrange for delivery at remote locations, or in some cases, via the Internet. 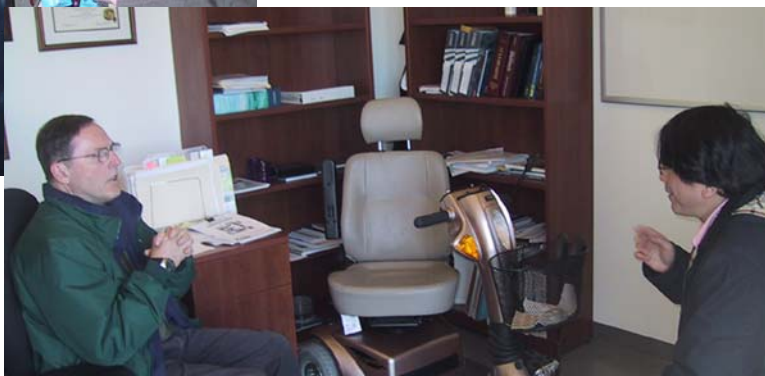
International Visitor
