California State University, Fullerton plays a major role in the intellectual, cultural and economic lives of Orange County. Given the charge of teaching as a member of the state's three-tiered system of higher education, Cal State Fullerton does an exceptional job of educating the residents – and future – of Orange County.

Now in its 44th year, the university points proudly to its product, more than 137,000 graduates who occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university – with its main campus in Fullerton, a branch campus in El Toro and satellites in Garden Grove, Irvine and Santa Ana – is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With more than 30,000 students currently enrolled and about 5,000 faculty and staff members, Cal State Fullerton generates \$828.5 million in economic activity annually and supports 11,679 full- and part-time jobs

With a mission of making learning preeminent, the university's 1,900 full- and part-time faculty members combine the best qualities of teaching and research universities to work in close collaboration with students and staff to expand knowledge. The instructional program is offered by seven colleges: The Arts; Business and Economics; Communications; Engineering and Computer Science; Human Development and Community Service; Humanities and Social Sciences; and Natural Sciences and Mathematics.

With full accreditation for its overall program, Cal State Fullerton has national recognition for its programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, communicative disorders, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, teacher education and theater. In all there are 100 degree programs - with 46 of them at the graduate level - plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

National Rankings

U.S. News & World Report lists Cal State Fullerton among its "Top Public Schools," ranking it among the top 10 of the nation's "Top Public Western Universities-Master's" institutions.

Black Issues in Higher Education ranks Cal State Fullerton sixth in the nation in terms of baccalaureate degrees awarded to minority students (June 2002). The data supplied by the U.S. Department of Education reflects degrees awarded during the 1999-2000 academic year.

Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education (May 2002) ranks Cal State Fullerton ninth in a listing of the top 100 colleges and universities conferring bachelor's degrees on Hispanics. Within the ranking, Cal State Fullerton is second in conferring bachelor's degrees in communications, fifth in public administration, seventh in criminal justice, eighth in foreign languages and 10th in business. The university is also ranked 10th in the nation for the number of Hispanic administrators and faculty members CSUF employs.

The Performing Arts Major's College Guide lists Cal State Fullerton among its "Most Highly Recommended Undergraduate Programs" for drama and musical theater, and among "Noteworthy Programs" for dance.

The Templeton Guide: Colleges That Encourage Character Development: A Resource for Parents, Students and Educators lists CSUF's Student Leadership Institute among the guide's "Exemplary Programs" in the student leadership category.

theory and research and integrate professional studies with preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships with their communities and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks sixth nationally in the overall number of bachelor's degrees awarded to minority students.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as more than 50 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing.

Community members also may visit the campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. While here, both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students, also is open to the public.

Volunteer opportunities are open through Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates. One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of successful aging.

In four decades, Cal State Fullerton has taken its place as a primary force in the growth and prosperity of Southern California.

NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills

Cal State Fullerton is a participating institution in the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program, which is aimed at enhancing the



quality of the studentathlete experience within the university setting. Throughout their career, Cal State Fullerton studentathletes are provided with resources that will assist their development in five primary

areas: academics, athletics, personal development, career development and community service.

Headed by Dr. June Kearney, the Athletic Academic Services department, tabbed as Titan Scholars, provides effective support services to help student-athletes reach their academic goals. The academic services staff takes a proactive role by coordinating study plans, study skills workshops, tutoring sessions, study halls, faculty and peer mentoring and campus services referrals. Staff members also monitor progress toward graduation, assist student-athletes in selecting and registering for classes and teach a Life Skills 100 class.

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "early warning" system in place, which utilizes periodic grade checks and clear communication with faculty members when student-athletes may require additional academic support.

The department also provides a re-entry program for former student-athletes who return to Cal State Fullerton to complete their degree.

ATHLETIC TRAINING

The athletic training program at Cal State Fullerton plays a major role in maintaining the health of Titan student-athletes. Team physicians, three full-time certified athletic trainers, two certified graduate assistants and more than 20 student assistants comprise a program that is generally regarded as one of the very best in the country.

Titan athletic training personnel specialize in preventive medicine, recognition of injuries and rehabilitation. Student athletic trainers who are admitted into the highly selective ATEP (Athletic Training Educational Program), which is administered through the Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion, must meet demanding requirements. In addition to taking 100 units of kinesiology and athletic training courses, they must serve five semesters and 1,500 clinical supervised hours. Before becoming certified, candidates must pass the National Athletic Trainers' Association Board of Certification examination. Since 1997, nearly 80 percent of Cal State Fullerton graduates have passed on their first attempt, compared to the national rate of about 30 percent. Since the inception of the program, dozens of alumni have moved into coveted positions across the country (see below).



Julie Max, MeD, ATC Head Athletic Trainer

Julie Max, Cal State Fullerton's Head Athletic Trainer, has been the driving force behind the development of an athletic training program that has received national acclaim. Max is in her 24th year at her alma mater since replacing her mentor, the late Jerry Lloyd. Recently, Max was elected to a second two-year term as president of the 25,000-member National Association of Athletic Trainers (NATA). Max, the first female president in the organization's history, previously served a six-year stint on the organization's board of directors and a one-year term as its vice president. In 1997, Max was honored with the NATA Service Award, which recognizes outstanding service to the athletic training profession at the state and district level.



ATHLETIC FACILITIES

Titan Gymnasium

Titan Gym currently is undergoing major renovations. In the past few years, chairback seats have replaced most of the bleachers, portable basket supports have replaced the fold down backboards, new paint and banners have been applied to the walls and the playing surface has been redone. Scheduled for completion by the end of the academic year is an expansion which will feature numerous classrooms, physical testing laboratories and a new practice facility upstairs. Budgeted and due for installation soon are the balance of the chairback seats, new lighting and a new "drop down" scoreboard over center court. The facility also features practice and match rooms for the wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs.

Goodwin Field

Goodwin Field was the host site for Cal State Fullerton's first NCAA Baseball Regional in the spring of 2000 and also played host to a Regional and Super Regional in 2001. A \$3 million expansion project, spearheaded by a \$1 million gift from Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin, has transformed the field into one of the premier collegiate facilities on the West Coast. The field now features the Wilson Clubhouse - which includes lockerrooms, a reception area and offices for the coaches – and the Doubek VIP Room.

Titan Softball Complex

Having received a complete makeover since the 2000 season, the Titan Softball Complex boasts one of the top facilities in the nation. Utilizing the adjacent Wilson Clubhouse and Doubek VIP Room, the two-diamond complex can now adequately serve as a host site for postseason competition in addition to the annual Kia Klassic, the top regular-season tournament in the nation.

Titan Stadium

Titan Stadium is considered among the finest soccer facilities in the nation and regularly hosts professional and international soccer matches in addition to the Titan men's and women's programs. The facility, completed in 1992, was home to the Titan football program for one year before the sport was dropped after the 1992 season. The stadium is also a hot-spot for the entertainment industry and is regularly featured in television commercials and programs.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Cal State Fullerton student-athletes have year-round access to the services offered by the Strength and Conditioning Program, under the direction of **Mike Nagler**. Aimed at developing speed, power, strength and endurance in Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes, the program plays a key role in the success of Titan teams.

Individual workouts are designed, implemented and regularly adjusted by Nagler to help each student-athlete develop the stamina needed to maintain the rigorous year-round workouts associated with Division I sports.

Located inside Titan Stadium is a 6,000 square-foot weight room facility featuring eight platforms, eight squat racks, plyometric devices and nearly 8,000 pounds in free weights. The facility will service more than 300 student-athletes over the course of the year.









Strength and conditioning coach Mike Nagler designs and implements individualized workouts to help student-athletes compete at the highest level.

Mike Nagler was named Cal State Fullerton's first full-time strength and conditioning coach on Jan. 4, 2000. Nagler had spent the previous 17 months as assistant strength coach at the University of Iowa. At Iowa, Nagler was in charge of developing and implementing weight lifting programs for women's basketball, volleyball, women's soccer, men's and women's track, gymnastics, softball and men's and women's golf. He also assisted with the men's basketball program.

He also previously worked as an assistant at Baylor University, the University of Washington, UNLV and Washington State and served as an intern with the NFL's Seattle Seahawks.

Nagler, 31, earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Washington State in 1993 and picked up a master's degree in kinesiology from UNLV in 1996.

Dr. Milton GordonUniversity President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon is a lifelong educator who, since becoming president in August 1990, has led California State University, Fullerton into prominence as one of the nation's largest and most inclusive senior institutions of higher learning. Currently, Dr. Gordon is overseeing a university planning process that has established missions and goals for the university into the 21st century.

Dr. Gordon holds a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, and M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit, and a B.S. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

His academic background includes serv-

ing as Vice President for Academic Affairs and Professor of Mathematics, Sonoma State University for four years; Dean, College of Arts and Sciences, Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years. He also served as an instructor of mathematics at the Illinois Institute of Technology, was a mathematician in the Laboratory of Applied Sciences at the University of Chicago, and served as an elementary and secondary teacher in the Chicago public schools.

President Gordon serves on the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and currently is a member of the NCAA presidential search committee to select a replacement for retiring NCAA President Cedric Dempsey. Dr. Gordon is a member of the Governing Board of Directors of the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities and is a member of the National ROTC Program Subcommittee: U.S. Army. President Gordon is active in civic affairs and currently serves on the boards of the Orange County Business Council, the Orange County Workforce Investment Board, and the Pacific Symphony Orchestra.

President Gordon is married to Dr. Margaret Faulwell Gordon, Dean of Extended Education at California State University, Dominguez Hills. They have three grown sons and two grandchildren.

Brian Quinn Athletics Director

Brian Quinn assumed the post of director of athletics at Cal State Fullerton on Jan. 14, 2002.

Quinn, 60, was assistant dean and AD at Loyola Marymount University from 1985 through 1998. During his tenure the Lions won nine West Coast Conference titles and advanced to the NCAA men's basketball tournament three times. Both the baseball team and the women's volleyball team made five trips to the NCAA Playoffs with the baseball team reaching the College World Series in 1986. Among his accomplishments away from competition were bringing the department into full Title IX compliance and earning a 10-year

NCAA accreditation without conditions in 1997

In June of 1998, Quinn was appointed executive director of athletic development and promotion. He was responsible for major gift solicitation to build new recreation and health facilities, new athletic offices and auxiliary services as well as improved playing facilities.

Quinn graduated from Loyola in 1963 with a degree in business. He was a starter for the Lions in both baseball and basketball and was captain and most valuable player of the latter for the 1962-63 season. He was inducted into the LMU Athletics Hall of Fame as both a player and administrator.

Quinn began a teaching and coaching career at St. Anthony H.S. in Long Beach in 1968 and earned a master's degree at Long Beach State in 1973. He moved on to St. Bernard H.S. in Playa Del Rey, where he coached the basketball team; University H.S. in Irvine and Irvine H.S., where he was the athletic director.

. He was a part-time physical education instructor at Saddleback College (North campus) and assistant principal at Woodbridge H.S. in Irvine from 1980-85.

Quinn and his wife, Collette, live in Manhattan Beach. They have four adult children: Andrew, who lives in Atlanta; Janet, who lives in Rye, New York; and two recent LMU graduates in daughters Suzanne and Maureen. The Quinns have three grandchildren — Brendan, Ryan and Dylan.



Dr. Maryalyce Jeremiah ASr. Associate A.D./SWA

Dr. Maryalyce Jeremiah is in her 11th year as Senior Associate Director of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrator for the Titans.

Dr. Jeremiah is primarily responsible for overseeing athletic department academics assisting with departmental planning and financial forecasting and supervising volleyball gymnastics, women's basketball and softball.

Dr. Jeremiah, the chairperson of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee, is also a member of the Big West Conference Athletics Council and serves on Cal State Fullerton's Academic Senate executive committee and university planning committee

In her seven years as the Titan's

women's basketball coach, Jeremiah compiled a 112-93 record and in 1990-91, she guided the team to a 25-9 season (most wins in school history) and the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Following the season, Jeremiah was recognized with both District 8 and Big West coach of-the-year honors.

She also was the recipient of the Carol Eckman Award, given by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association to the coach who best represents sportsmanship and ethics in the coaching profession. Jeremiah fin ished her 23-year coaching career with a 375-236 record.

She has a Ph.D. and a master's degree in physical education from The Ohio State University, as well as undergraduate degrees from Cedarville College and Central State University.

Cal State Fullerton is nestled in sun-drenched Orange County, with its mountains, amusement parks, professional sports, cultural showcases and seashores among the top attractions. Students can reach ski slopes in 45 minutes and the beach in less than a half hour. Los Angeles. with its never-ending cultural and entertainment opportunities, lies just 30 miles northwest of the campus and San Diego is 100 miles to the south. The city of Fullerton itself, which has a fascinating history dating back to the late 19th century, boasts a beautiful historic downtown area that features dozens of restaurants, museums and

The extensive development of the 42 miles of beaches in Orange County and attractions such as Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, the Laguna Festival of Arts and Pageant of the Masters, the Arrowhead Pond of Anaheim, Edison International Field and the Orange County Performing Arts Center continue to make tourism an increasingly important activity. So does the Mediterranean-type climate, with rainfall averaging 14 inches per year, and generally mild days (either freezing or 100-degree temperatures uncommon) with frequent morning fog during the summer.



Donny Daniels long had a dream to return to his alma mater as head basketball coach. On his third formal attempt to get hired at Cal State Fullerton, reality finally stepped forward.

On Apr. 20, 2000, Daniels got the job he had coveted since launching his coaching career with the Titans as a volunter assistant under Coach Bobby Dye in 1978. But there was a dark cloud hovering. The Titans were on NCAA probation and only now is the program finally free from sanctions.

"I look at this as really my first year," said Daniels this summer. "NCAA probation did what it's supposed to do -- punish a program."

Daniels was fully aware of the NCAA restrictions when he took the job, but even he couldn't fathom the combined effect of all the seemingly minor repercussions. Despite signing a handful of promising recruits and assembling a young and energetic staff of assistants to begin a major rebuilding process, there was no instant success.

"The NCAA probation and the lack of scholarships were something I anticipated," he said. "The new 5/8 rule was something I did not anticipate and it has made it more difficult to enhance our team. We had some guys decide to leave and you can't replace them, so that depleted us a little bit."

Injuries, eligibility problems and various misfortunes also reared their ugly heads and compounded a difficult situation. Daniels made no excuses and pushed whatever healthy and available bodies he could muster to play harder and continue to compete. The log will

show records of 5-23 and 5-22. The history books will not show -- at least for now -- his ability to stay upbeat and stick to his principles.

"Ît's not about winning and losing, it's about competing," he says with extra emphasis on the last word.

"Things happen in every program, they've just happened here in my first two years," said Daniels. "We just have to deal with it. You can't say, 'Woe is me.' You can't feel sorry for yourself. Through all the adversity, you can't give up. As I tell my team, if this is the worst thing that happens in your life, you'll have a good life."

The Titans have had their moments and even picked up several road victories, something rare in recent seasons. They beat conference co-champion Utah State last year and enter the 2002-03 season coming off a win, something only 11 other Division I schools can claim.


After two years as a Titan player and three stints as an assistant coach at Fullerton, Daniels qualifies as an expert on the CSF basketball program. He remains confident he can "get the job done" as head coach.

"I was turned down 10 years ago and again seven years ago. If I was turned

down a third time, I would have gone after it again. I just figured I would have to outlive them... there is nothing about this job that discourages me. I know the ins and outs of Fullerton and I know Southern California, and that's where I recruited a lot for Utah."

Daniels signed a four-year contract and hit the campus and the recruiting trail with his feet flying, his wheels turning and



his cell phone buzzing. After 11 seasons as an assistant to Rick Majerus at Utah, he had come home, but for not more than a few hours at a time. In a whirlwind few weeks he brought in seven new players despite the NCAA sanctions banning junior college transfers and limiting available scholarships. The slow process of restoring the Titan program to its levels of previous decades had begun.

Daniels, 48, played on Fullerton's first two Division I teams in 1974-75 and 1975-76 under Coach Dye. In his senior year he was selected the top defender on a team that won the school's only conference basketball championship by earning a share of the 1976

Pacific Coast Athletic Association title.

He graduated in 1977 with a degree in criminal justice and returned as a volunteer assistant for the 1978-79 season. He was a paid assistant in Dye's final season (1979-80) before becoming an assistant at his high school alma mater, Verbum Dei, in Los Angeles. Daniels returned again as a

part-time assistant coach under George McQuarn for the 1981-82 through 1983-84 seasons before becoming head coach at Los Angeles Harbor College in Wilmington (another alma mater) for two years (32-27 record). His third return to Fullerton came as a full-time assistant to first McQuarn and then successor John Sneed for the 1986-86 through 1988-89 seasons.

During Daniels' tenure in Utah, the Utes reached the NCAA Tournament eight times in 11 seasons and were national runnersup in 1998. The parents of recent Utah star guard Andre Miller made a special trip to attend Daniels' Titan hiring press conference and he also was the chief recruiter to Salt Lake City of Keith Van Horn. Ironically, both young NBA stars were traded this summer -- Miller from Cleveland to the Los Angeles Clippers and Van Horn from New Jersey to Philadelphia.

The Titans have not had a winning record since they went 15-12 in Coach Brad Holland's initial season in 1992-93. They have not qualified for the NCAA tournament since gaining the Elite Eight in 1978, but made NIT appearances in 1983 and 1987 during Daniels' tenures. His full-time coaching tenures at Fullerton coincide with the recruitment and/or development of former Titan greats Leon Wood, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen.



Daniels played and coached at Verbum Dei and then recruited Miller to Utah, where he graduated in four years.



Daniels is one of five head coaches on the current Cal State Fullerton staff who are former Titan student-athletes. He joins cross country and track and



"It's an honor to be a part of this coaching staff," added Daniels. "As a Titan graduate and former player and assistant coach, there can be no one more motivated than I to see this athletics department enjoy success.

"One thing I really want is for our players to graduate at Fullerton. I'll do everything I can to help them take advantage of the resources that are available."

Daniels was born on Aug. 3, 1954, in New Orleans, Louisiana. He has three children – Eric (18), Kalynn (16) and Sarah (12).






McQuarn and Daniels recruited Ceballos to Fullerton after his modest career at Dominguez High in Compton and two years of stardom at Ventura College. McQuarn resigned before Ceballos donned a Titan uniform, but Daniels remained as an assistant and helped Cedric develop into a second-round NBA draft selection in 1990. Cedric played 11 NBA seasons with five different teams. His best years were with the Lakers when he averaged better than 21 points in both the 1994-95 and 1995-96 seasons.





Coach Jason Levy 3rd year, Cal St. Northridge, 1993

Jason Levy brings a wealth and breadth of basketball experience to Donny Daniels' Titan coaching staff. The 34-year-old native of New York City has worked on the

West Coast, in the Midwest and on the East Coast in a variety of coaching positions. The past two summers he has represented adidas at clinics in Beijing, China, where he worked directly with the national and junior national teams. He also worked with professional coaches there on drills and coaching concepts.

Levy helps coordinate the recruiting efforts for the Titans, as well as work with on-the-court development, conditioning, scouting and planning. For his efforts, he recently was recognized by Rivals100Hoops.com with a selection to the Top 20 of "Top Assistants Not at a High-Major Program." He was one of only two selected from west of the Rockies.

Prior to coming to Fullerton, Levy spent three seasons as an assistant at the University of Portland of the West Coast Conference. He has three years of experience in the Big West Conference with two seasons (1994-95 and 1995-96) at Long Beach State under Seth Greenberg and one (1996-97) at UC Irvine under Rod Baker. The 49ers went to the NCAA Tournament in 1994.

At Portland, Levy coordinated recruiting efforts for the Pilots while assisting in practice and game preparation. On the floor he worked primarily with post players and he also assisted with the strength and conditioning program.

Levy played high school ball for La Salle Academy in Manhattan before venturing west and playing

two seasons at Cuesta College in San Luis Obispo. He transferred to Cal State Northridge, where he graduated in 1993. He served one season (1993-94) as an assistant to Rudy Washington at Drake in Des Moines, Iowa, before moving to Long Beach State. He began his coaching career at the Double Pump Camp at Cal State Dominguez Hills in 1992-93.

Levy was married on Oct. 6, 2002, to the former Anna Frost.

Rob Orellana brings a diverse basketball background to Donny Daniels' Titan coaching staff.

Orellana, 37, spent the two seasons prior to his Fullerton appoint-

ment as an assistant at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, New Jersey, where he helped the Knights to a second-place finish in the Northeast Conference. He also worked two seasons as an assistant at St. Francis College in Brooklyn, where he was brought in to help resurrect a struggling program. The Terriers had won only 28 games in the four seasons prior to his arrival and they won 28 more in just two seasons. Counting the next two years, St. Francis had its best-ever four-year record and won more NEC

games than any other school during that span.

Orellana also has been a head coach in Venezuela (Trotamundos Basketball Club in Valencia in 1995-96) and Spain (Gran Canaria Club in the Canary Islands in 1994-95) and in July was tabbed head coach of the Senegal national team which will compete next summer in Egypt for a berth in the Olympics.

Because of his head coaching experience, Orellana plays an integral role in the overall day-to-day operations of the Titan program including recruiting, scouting and game strategies.

He also can lean on three years of Big West Conference experence, serving from 1991-92 thru 1993-94 at UCI as an assistant to Coach Rod Baker.

Orellana's coaching career began with two years as an assistant at Pius X High School in Downey, his alma mater. He moved to Westchester High School for two seasons before launching his collegiate career as a student assistant at UNLV for three years including the 1990 NCAA championship season. He returned to Pius X as head coach for the 1990-91 season and the Warriors won the Camino Real League championship and advanced to the CIF semifinals. The team's 17-8 record earned him Southern California Coach of the Year honors.

Orellana is a 1998 graduate of Regents College in Albany, New York. He is the proud father of a 9-year-old son, Roberto, and his wife, Fatima, recently presented him with a daughter, Andrea.



Coach Mark Maki 3rd year, Wyoming, 1997

Mark Maki is a youthful but well-traveled and diversely trained young man who brings a lot of enthusiasm and dedication to the Titans' third assistant coaching

position under head Coach Donny Daniels.

Maki, 28, supervises numerous aspects of the Titan basketball program including the youth camps. He previously coached in Teaneck, New Jersey, at Fairleigh Dickinson University along with current staff-mate Rob Orellana. The team went 17-11 overall and was 13-5 to gain second place in the Northeast Conference. Maki also has coached at Notre Dame Prep School in Fitchburg, Massachusetts, and Penn State

New Kensington after serving as a student assistant for four years at his alma mater, the University of Wyoming.

At FDU, Maki conducted the off-season physical training program and assisted in the overall planning, organization and coaching of the team. He recruited, scouted, handled video coordination and aided in academic monitoring.

At Notre Dame Prep, he was an integral part of the staff of one of the elite prep programs in the country, one that placed 13 players at Division I schools during his one-year (1998-99) tenure. He was at Penn State New Kensington for the 1997-98 season and performed all general coaching responsibilities. Maki graduated from Wyoming in 1997. He is co-founder along with Evan Evans of the Hoop with ME Basketball Camp in Glenrock, Wyoming. Proceeds from the camp benefit the Kay Evans/Vicki Maki Foundation.

SEASON PREVIEW

The shackles of three years of NCAA probation have been removed from the Titan basketball program and now third-year

Head Coach Donny Daniels can completely put his mark on the Cal State Fullerton men's basketball program.

The last NCAA restriction -- no recruiting of junior college players -- was removed on Dec. 1, 2001, and Daniels responded quickly by signing five JC transfers. Their presence should provide an instant boost to a returning nucleus led by second-team All-Big West Conference forward Pape (Dakar, Sow Senegal). The Titans went only 5-22 last season, but Sow established himself as one of conference's stars as a sophomore. The agile 6-foot-10, 230pounder averaged 15.5 points and 8.6 rebounds and was rated by several observers as the best professional prospect in the Big West.

He has bulked up to 250 pounds and two websites have projected him as a first-round NBA draft choice.

Other returning starters are versatile wing player Brandon Campbell (St. Louis, MO), the team's No. 2 scorer last season at 11.5 points per game and a three-year letterman; 6-foot-11 center Babacar Camara (Dakar, Senegal) and point guard Derick Andrew (Rancho Cucamonga, CA). Reserve guard Denver Lopez (West Covina, CA) is the only other returning letterman, but 6-

foot-6 redshirt forward Amir Bar-Netzer (Woodland Hills, CA and Santa Monica CC) is eligible to play this season and Daniel Ryan (Montclair, CA), who played in only four games last year, also is back.

"I look at this as really my first year," said Daniels. "I'm excited about the opportunity to recruit junior college student-

athletes. They will give us a physical and much needed emotional boost."

The JC newcomers are 6-foot-7 swing man Anthony Bolton (Vista, CA) from Palomar JC, 6-foot-7 forward Jamal Forcheney (Brooklyn, NY) from West Hills CC, 6-foot-7 forward Bron Groomes (Brooklyn, NY) from San Bernardino Valley College, 6-foot-4 guard Ralphy Holmes (Philadelphia, PA) from Allan Hancock JC and 6-foot point guard Zakee Smith (Philadelphia, PA) from Panola JC in Texas. A late summer addition was guard Federic Holm-Hadulla (Heidelberg, Grmany) from University of Heidelberg in Germany.

"I have an open mind going into our first practices about our probable lineup," said Daniels. "When you win only five games, nothing is solid.

"Pape is the only individual that has a spot in the starting rotation. Everything else is up for grabs. Who plays will be based on effort and a person's competitive nature."

For the past two years, the Titans have been forced to play several people out of position. The influx of JC talent should remedy that problem.

"Goomes and Forcheney will give us added depth and experience on the front line. Smith, Holmes and Holmes

H a d u l l a should help us immediately in the back-court while Bolton can help us in both places," said Daniels.

"If Pape continues to progress in the manner we hope and with the maand turity game experence of Brardon Derick, we have a good foundation. Babacar must commit himself to re-



bounding, but I am excited about the possibilities.

"With the added depth and athletic ability, we should be a more effective pressing team. For us to move up in the Big West Conference standings, we must improve our defensive field goal percentage and rebounding margin. Those were two of our goals last year and we didn't achieve them."





Rules Changes for 2002-03

"If it ain't broke, don't fix it."

That was the mentality of the NCAA Men's Basketball Rules Committee when it held its annual meeting Apr. 29-May 2 in Palm Harbor, Florida.

"We discussed at length many items that were submitted to us, but, for the most part, we didn't change things much because we thought the rules were in good shape," said Art Hyland, chair of the men's committee and coordinator of officiating for the Big East Conference.

The most visible changes will involve the free-throw line. The two lane spaces closest to the shooter must be unoccupied. And when the bonus is in effect, no free throws will be awarded to the offended team for a foul committed by a member of the team in control of the ball. Instead, the offended team will be awarded possession.







This will be the fifth year in the basketball program for Brandon Campbell, but the first where he will be concentrating solely on the sport after a brilliant four-year track and field career... "Hopefully, he can avoid the nagging foot injuries he had last year," says Coach Daniels... "He hasn't really been totally healthy in my two years"... Brandon is one of the most gifted athletes to ever have worn a Titan uniform... He became only the second Titan male to earn All-America track and field honors at the Div. I level when he placed sixth in the high jump at the 2002 NCAA championships in Baton Rouge, Louisiana... He cleared 7-1 3/4... He also placed 16th in the long jump at 24-7 3/4... He had suffered a pulled hamstring three weeks earlier, which severely limited him at the Big West Conference



championshps, where a year earlier he was selected Male Athlete of the Year (2001) after winning the high jump and long jump and running on the Titans' championship 4x400 relay team...Brandon had made great strides in two seasons as a Titan basketball player and was poised on the threshold of stardom before suffering a knee injury in the 2000-01 season opener at Oregon State... Surgery was not required,

but his brief attempt to come back proved discouraging and he sat out the remainder of the year and successfully obtained a medical hardship to repeat his third year of basketball eligibility... The knee was healthy by track and field season... He finished up with six school track and field records: 25-10 in the long jump, 7-4 1/2 in the high jump, 46.98 in the 400 meters, 6,637 points in the decathlon and a spot on the 4x100 (40.15) and 4x400 (3:10.46) relay teams... On the basketball court he is a versatile swing man



CSF IN 2001-02: With a healthy knee, Brandon came back to start all 27 games and average better than 30 minutes per game... He ranked second on the team in scoring at 11.5 points per game and his rebound average of 4.2 was third best... He capped the season with a career game, scoring 28 points (next best total is 20) to lead the Titans to a season-ending win at Cal Poly on March 2... He hit 9 of 11 shots including 4 of 5 from 3-point range... He made 6 of 7 free throws and grabbed 3 rebounds in 34 highly productive minutes... For the season he had the best 3-point field goal percentage (.402) of any Titan who averaged more than one attempt per game... He had the second-best field goal percentage and scored in double figures 18 times including 7 games in a row early in the season.

CSF IN 2000-01: Brandon went down in a heap after tripping over a teammate midway through the first half of the season opener at Gill Coliseum in Corvallis, Oregon, on Nov. 17, 2000... Surgery was not required and his rehabilitation enabled him to attempt to return to action in late December... But after an ineffective 23 minutes vs. Northern Arizona, he was deemed lost for the season and sought a medical hardship to regain the year of eligibility... In track and field he was the Big West Male Athlete of the Year after winning conference titles in both the high jump and long jump and running with the Titans' victorious 4x400 meter relay team.

CSF IN 1999-2000: Started all 27 games... Averaged 10.7 points and 4.7 rebounds... Had team's best field-goal percentage at .538 and only Ike Harmon (183) made more field goals than Brandon's 112... Was third on the team in minutes played at 857 behind Mark Murphy and Harmon... Scored career-high 20 points in 72-66 win at San Diego State on Jan. 5, hitting 8 of 11 shots from the floor... Three times had 8 rebounds, one shy of his career high... In track and field, he was part of Fullerton's Big West Conference championship 4x400 meter relay team... Also placed third in the Big West long jump at 23-9 and was seventh in the high jump at 6-7.

CSF IN 1998-99: Appeared in all but one of team's 27 games including 3 starting calls... Playing time peaked down the stretch and he averaged about 16 minutes over the last 7 games... Played 34 minutes and scored season-high 14 points in home win over UC Irvine on





BROADCAST SPACE: One "table" is allocated to each team's designated commercial radio station. Each position handles three persons comfortably. Two complimentary lines are available in most cases.

TELEPHONES: There is one telephone at the press table -- (714) 278-5700-- which must be kept free for messages, out-of-town scores, etc. Additional telephones CANNOT be installed at the press table due to the physical limitations of the building. Please call if you have special telephone needs.

LOCKER ROOMS: Are located off the hallway on the north side of the playing floor. Donny Daniels will conduct his post-game interviews in the equipment manager's office just outside the Fullerton players' locker room, which is CLOSED to the media. Players will be brought to the office area upon request after a reasonable cooling-off period.

BIG WEST CONFERENCE

In Its 34th Season - 1969-2003

This season will be the thirty-fourth year in which the Big West Conference sponsors the sport of men's basketball. Also this season, the Big West will celebrate the 28th anniversary of its postseason tournament. For the third straight year, the conference tournament will be held at the Anaheim Convention Center Arena. It will be the eighth time overall that the city of Anaheim has been home to the event.

During the past thirty-three years, six of the 10 current members have claimed or shared a regular season title. Four current members have won the tournament title led by Utah State's four titles. UC Santa Barbara is the defending Big West Tournament champion, defeating Utah State by four points in last year's title game.

The Big West has been home to one NCAA National Championship (UNLV in 1990) and one NIT crown (Fresno State in 1983). The conference has also had a team represented in the NCAA Tournament every year of its 33-year existence. Nine times the conference has had multiple representatives. Last year, the Big West sent three teams to postseason play, including the representative to the NCAA Tournament, UC Santa Barbara. The Gauchos played a thrilling first round game against Arizona.

UC Irvine and Utah State represented the conference in the NIT a season ago.

While Big West programs have had team success on a national level, some marquee players have played in the conference. In 1998, the number one pick in the NBA Draft came out of the Big West in Michael Olowokandi (Clippers) from Pacific. Other NBA stars that hailed from the Big West are Larry Johnson, Bryon Russell, Brian Shaw, Lucious Harris, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen.

Leon Wood, a first round pick in 1984 for Philadelphia, has been working as an NBA referee for the past six seasons.

The 2002-03 season looks promising for Big West teams. Six of the top 10 scorers and seven of the top 10 shooters from last year are back. The conference also returns two first-team All-Big West members in UC Santa Barbara's Mark Hull and Utah State's Desmond Penigar and five second-team All-Big West members.

For the first time since the 1989-90 season, four Big West teams recorded at least 20 wins last year, pointing to a rising future for the conference.

2001-02 SEASON REVIEW

Nobody told Donny Daniels it was going to be easy rebuilding the Titan men's basketball program. Nor did anyone tell him about all the extra hazards that would be tossed his way.

A season that began with modest goals produced more frustration and heartache than improvement. The Titans won only five games for the second year in a row while losing one less, failing to qualify for the Big West Conference post-season tournament.

Already deprived of junior college transfers and down two scholarships because of NCAA probation for violations dating to 1992, the Titans couldn't weather the additional adversity they attracted. Starting guard David Castleton missed 10 games for a variety of reasons and three-year letterman forward Josh Fischer missed the second half of the season after an irregular heartbeat was detected. With 6-foot-9 forward Derrick Franklin quitting the program in October and Fisher out, the Titans had only two players over 6foot-5 on the active roster in letterman Babacar Camara and his newly arrived cousin, Pape Sow.


The latter proved to be the most pleasant development of the season. The 6foot-10 sophomore displayed his raw talent early

and, despite attracting the focus of everyone's defense, led the team in scoring at 15.5 points per game. He got his points inside and outside, on the glass and at the foul line, where he made 182 trips, second in the Big West to only Most Valuable Player Jerry Green of UC Irvine. Sow led the Titans with 8.6 rebounds per game and received second-team all-conference honors. He also put himself in the minds and notebooks of professional scouts.

The season got off to a bad start. With Camara and Sow sidelined for disciplinary reasons, the Titans opened up at NCAA Tournament-bound Pepperdine. Returning point guard Kevin Richardson started the game at center and picked up three quick fouls. The Waves erupted late in the first half and went on to a 17-point victory.

Two nights later the Titans opened at home against San Francisco and Coach Phil Mathews, a former Fullerton assistant

and close friend of Daniels. After only one day of practice with the big men back, the Titans weren't ready for the aggressive Dons' defense and the result was a lopsided 70-43 defeat.



Pape Sow was the brightest development of the Titans' 2001-02 season. He exploded for 36 points and 8 rebounds at Sacramento State in the sixth game of the year and went on to lead the team in scoring and rebounding. He earned second-team All-Big West Conference honors and attention from professional scouts.

Things picked up for the next few weeks. A home win over Loyola Marymount erased the memory of the tough start. A big loss at Baylor was relegated to the back of the mind when the Titans played very well in Laramie against a talented Wyoming team before running out of gas at the high altitude.

A pair of exciting games with Sacramento State were wrapped around a home win over outmanned Point Loma. Sow exploded for 36 points in Sacramento, but the Titans lost in overtime, 85-79. Nine days later the Titans won at home in overtime over the Hornets, 106-97, after blowing a 15-point lead in the final four mirutes. Derick Andrew hit 8 of 8 free throws in overtime and 10 of 10 for the game.

So the Titans barged into Big West play with a 3-5 record only to drop a pair of hearl-breakers at home. Cal Poly won a 1-point game and then UCSB got a 3-point basket as -- or maybe after -- time expired -- for a 2-point win.

The Titans went on to lose four more conference games before they pulled off one of the biggest upsets of the collegiate season. Utah State strode into Titan Gym with a 13-3 seasonal record and 14 wins in

its last 15 meetings with Fullerton. But the Titans dominated the final 7:42 of the game, outscoring the visitors 19-4 down the stretc 1 for a much-needed 65-51 win.

Positive momentum from that victory never materialized. Fischer's absence grew more significant with each game and the Titans absorbed some of the most lopsided defeats in school history. Somehow, they managed to dig down deep for two remarkable efforts in the final week. They lost at the buzzer in Santa Barbara to a Gaucho team that would win the Big West tourney a week later and then they handed Cal Poly only its second home loss of the season as Brandon Campbell had a career game -- 28 points on 9 of 11 shooting including 4 of 5 from 3-point range. The win enabled the Titans to join a select group of only 12 Div. I schools who are coming off a win as they open the 2002-03 season.

The Titans opened the season at Pepperdine minus two of their big men with Babacar Camara and Pape Sow sitting it out due to disciplinary reasons and they had Brandon Campbell only because he had recovered in half the time from a sprained ankle that was supposed to sideline him for a month.

Fullerton shut out Johnson in the second half and hung with the Waves until the end, trailing 65-54 with 2:47 to play. But that was as close as they would get and Pepperdine stretched out the lead in the final minute.

The home opener attracted some familiar faces. Former Cal State Fullerton assistant coach Phil Mathews brought his USF team in to play close friend Donny Daniels and their mentor, George McQuarn, and numerous ex-Titan players including Cedric Ceballos were in Titan Gym to watch. More important for the Titans were the faces of Babacar Camara and Pape Sow, who were both in uniform.

Playing their third West Coast Conference foe of the season, the Titans came up with a third face to this squad. They played inspired ball at both ends of the floor for 40 minutes, crashed the offensive boards and hit more shots than they missed in routing Loyola Marymount.

The Lions probably didn't know what hit them after watching film of the first two games — the outmanned effort at Pepperdine and the stagnant offensive showing vs. San Francisco. But the transition didn't happen immediately.

The Lions got 10 first-half points from Marcus Smith and they led most of the period, by as many as 5 points on four occasions. A 3-pointer by Kevin Richardson and a Josh Fischer putback tied the score at 27-27 at 2:40 and David Castleton's 3-pointer put the Titans ahead to stay at 30-27.

Baylor was off to an unbeaten start for the third year in a row and for the second time the Bears included the Titans in their season opening win streak. The Bears improved to 5-0 with a withering assault from behind the 3-point line led by freshman John Lucas, who hit all five of his attempts. Defending Mountain West Conference champion Wyoming was the preseason pick to repeat as titlists so the Titans were a heavy underdog strolling into the Arena-Auditorium in Laramie, where Coach Steve McClain had amassed a 37-5 home record in his three-plus seasons. But the afternoon crowd of 8,565 had to sit through an uncomfortable first 15 minutes as the upstart visitors dominated the game.

Two programs trying to rebuild and desperate for an early-season victory fought down to the wire and then some in Hornet Gym. A game that ebbed and flowed for 40 minutes with neither team leading by more than 7 points was decided in overtime when Jimmy White exploded for 12 of his 17 points.

Aggressive guard play by Sacramento State offset the Titans' inside strength and the performance of Pape Sow, who came within a basket of Richard Morton's Div. I school record of 38 points. The Hornets forced most of Fullerton's 29 turnovers.

The Titans met their only non-Division I foe of the season in the Crusaders from Point Loma Nazarene and the step down in competition was just what the doctor ordered to restore some confidence in the players after their difficult 3-game road swing.

Not that the NAIA visitors went quietly. With Matt Enloe and Brad Heinrichs leading the way, the Crusaders held a 12-11 lead at the second media timeout at 11:39 of the first half.

But Fullerton's size eventually took its toll, both in rebounding and the ability to get high percentage shots from in the paint. Babacar Camara put the Titans ahead to stay with a basket for a 13-12 lead and it triggered a 35-18 Fullerton run to close out the first half.

Point Loma Coach John Block, who had seen four defections from his roster during a 1-9 start to the season, went basically with six players and they were worn down by the second half. Fullerton scored the first 15 points after intermission to build a 61-30 lead at 15:23.

The Titans opened the Big West Conference schedule prior to the Christmas holidays due to a quirk in the calendar in 2001 and they faced a Cal Poly team which has become a nemesis. The Mustangs had won the last four meetings in Titan Gym and seven of the last eight overall. And even with new Coach Kevin Bromley and several new faces, the Mustangs maintained their hold on the Titans by the slightest margin.

All the frustration the Titans felt vs. Cal Poly paled in comparison to the heartbreak two nights later. After apparently pulling out a win in the final seconds, the Titans saw the Gauchos beat them at the buzzer. Nick Jones was in perfect position to get the deflection of a length of the court pass and knock in a 3-point field goal at the horn.

Kevin Richardson had the hero's robe ripped off him. He had made a 3-point play with 1.2 seconds to go to complete a Titan rally from 41-33 down with 14:48 to play.

Mark Hull, who batted the ball to Jones, was the offensive show for UCSB. He exploded for 29 second-half points, scoring 28 consecutive points for the Gauchos from the 17:11 mark to the final minute. Hull missed a free throw with 12.2 seconds left to give Richardson the opportunity to take the lead when the Titan drove the length of the floor and made a leaning bank shot as he was fouled.

Two programs with diametrically opposed fortunes in close games over the past season and a half met in the Bren Center and there were few surprises. UC Irvine made the necessary plays to win down the stretch and rallied for a victory over a Fullerton team that was poised for an upset only to hit a stone cold wall down the stretch.

With Kevin Richardson playing a solid game despite foul trouble to lead the way, the Titans overcame a modest halftime deficit and built a 52-45 lead with 8:37 to play on a Josh Fischer layup. But Fischer missed the free throw on a 3-point play try and the Titans wouldn't score again until Fischer made a layup at 2:12.

In the meantime, the Anteaters very slowly nibbled away at the lead, which was still 52-51 with 3:44 to play. But then Adam Parada hit a perimeter jump shot and Mike Hood hit two more including a trey on back-to-back possessions around the Fischer layup to leave UCI ahead, 58-54, with 1:49 to play.

The Anteaters hit 8 of 10 free throws in the final minute to pull away to the 10-point victory, their second in a row over the Titans in the Bren Center but only their second in the last six meetings on their home floor.

Fullerton hit only 12 of 23 free throws including 6 of 14 in the second half. On top of mediocre shooting from the 3-point line and a 15-rebound deficit in the second half, the Titans couldn't win despite forcing 20 turnovers.

The Titans hoped to end their losing streak in Long Beach, where the disappointing 49ers were trying to regroup from a home loss to UC Riverside, which had overcome a large late lead. Whatever ailed Long Beach healed in two days as the 49ers hit their free throws and didn't turn over the ball in protecting a medium-sized lead down the stretch.

For the second time in a week, long scoreless spells plagued the Titans. Fullerton fell behind immediately, failing to score for three minutes while Long Beach jumped out to a 6-0 lead. But Babacar Camara got free inside for a couple of easy hoops and the Titans took a short-lived lead at 14-13 with 8:34 remaining in the half.

However, an even longer scoreless streak was too much to overcome. The Titans didn't score again until Kevin Richardson made two free throws at 3:01. They ended a 12-0 Long Beach run over five and a half minutes that had built a 49ers' lead of 25-14. By halftime the Titans trailed, 32-20.

A pair of 3-point field goals by Ryan Dillon got the Titans within five points at 44-39 with 10:27 to play but that was as close as they would get. The 49ers ended up making more than 80 percent of their free throws and Fullerton was a dismal 3 of 23 from 3-point range, blunting any late rallies.

The biggest crowd of the season to date showed up at UC Riverside to see if the Highlanders could climb above the .500 mark in their inaugural Big West Conference season at the expense of the seemingly hexed Titans.

What the crowd saw was primarily a free-throw shooting contest as the two teams banged away at each other with minimal success from the floor before the Highlanders rode superior foul shooting to their sixth win in eight games.

Two teams who always seem to play close games went at it again in Titan Gym and the competitiveness was the same. Idaho overcame a very slow start to overtake the Titans midway through the second half and then held on for the win against a frantic Fullerton rally.

The Titans were playing their first game without Josh Fischer, who would miss the balance of the season due to a recurrence of an irregular heart beat that sidelined him for a few weeks in November. Without his size coming off the bench, the Titans had no front line depth and their apparent height advantage over the Vandals disappeared.

Idaho made only six baskets in the first half and shot only 22 percent from the floor. But the Titans made only one more bucket and shot only 29 percent and settled for a 20-19 halftime lead after back-to-back 3-point field goals by Ryan Dillon had given them a 20-13 lead with 4:15 to go before intermission.

What may have been one of the biggest upsets of the college basketball season developed in Titan Gym. Playing a school they had beaten only once in the last 15 tries and again without any size on the bench, the Titans seemed to have little chance against the Aggies, who came in with a 13-4 record after a lopsided win at UC Riverside.

Form prevailed early as Aggie stars Desmond Penigar and Tony Brown scored all but two of their first 13 points and it was eventually 21-15 Utah State with 8:16 to go in the half. The Aggies never could stretch the lead beyond seven and they settled for a 5-point lead at the half.

Fullerton came out hot after intermission and caught Utah State at 36-36. Brown countered with a brace of treys and Penigar hit two free throws and the Aggies were in the lead at 47-46 with 7:42 to play.

But in the balance of the game they would get only a Brennan Ray tip-in at 3:57 and two meaningless foul shots by Penigar in the final minute. Fullerton outscored them 19-4 down the stretch including a 12-0 run triggered by a Pape Sow 3-pointer to register its first conference victory of the season.

Fullerton and Northridge renewed their dormant conference rivalry that began in the days of the California Collegiate Athletic Association, when both schools were competing at the "college" level. Five non-conference matchups had occurred in the 1990s, but none since the 1995-96 season.

Only five men can take the floor at a time, but the fact that Northridge played all 15 players in uniform and the Titans put all eight of theirs into the contest offers a clue as to this game's outcome. The Matadors' all-out assault style with full-court pressure from end line to end line and up tempo offense using multiple substitutions is designed to wear down opponents, especially those with a height advantage. The Titans had that edge only in the starting lineup and when Babacar Camara got in early foul trouble and managed to play only 13 minutes before fouling out, the Titans were in trouble.

Fullerton stayed in the game thanks to a hot hand off the bench from Ryan Dillon and the relentless play of Pape Sow, who overcame a slow start to score 9 points in the first half and explode for 19 more after intermission.

The final minute of the first half was probably decisive. A narrow 29-27 CSUN lead stretched to 8 points in only 54 seconds. The Titan kept it close, trailing only 51-45 with 11:13 remaining, but then the rout began.

A return to Titan Gym and another Fox Sports Net television presence wasn't enough to inspire the Titans to the point of overcoming poor freethrow shooting and a monster performance by Travis Reed, although Pape Sow did more than his share.

Sow and Reed almost made it look like a one-on-one game in the first half. Reed hit 9 of 11 shots as he scored 18 points, just shy of half of the 49ers' total. Sow made 6 of 9 shots plus 5 of 8 free throws to total 17 points, or more than half the Titans' producton as Fullerton trailed by six at the half.

Sow was near perfect after intermission, making all three of his field goal tries and four of five at the line. But Reed didn't slow down, either, and he got more help and Long Beach pulled away to win handily.

A Sow dunk made it a 2-point game at 42-40 with 13:56 to play. But a Reed put back, a Michael Darrett hoop in transition, a Ron Johnson trey and a Kevin Roberts putback produced a 9-0 run and a 53-42 lead.

A pair of Sow free throws got Fullerton as close as 6 points at 60-54 with 6:50 remaining but the Titans managed only 6 more points the rest of the way.

No one knew it at the time, but the win would mark the final Fullerton appearance for 49ers' Coach Wayne Morgan, who stepped down a few weeks later. He ended up 7-5 against the Titans, 3-3 in Titan Gym.

Fullerton Mayor Don Bankhead was among the most interested spectators as the Titans hosted Orange County rival UC Irvine. He had made a "friendly" wager with Irvine Mayor Larry Agran a few weeks earlier about the outcome of the Titans-Anteaters contest, which was culminating Titan Basketball Day in Fullerton. The loser of the bet had to buy dinner in the winner's city and wear the opponent's hat at his next council meeting.

Irvine blue and gold was on display at Fullerton City Hall after the Anteaters scored the most lopsided victory in the 73-game series. UCI gained a 2-to-1 advantage on the backboards and broke open what had been a close game in the first half. Fullerton still was in the hunt at 48-38 with 7:46 to play after a Brandon Campbell 3-point baket. But UCI scored the next 12 points and finished the game with a 24-8 run to rack up the lopsided victory, their fifth in a row over the Titans after losing the previous seven meetings.

The Titans actually led in the early going, holding a 9-6 advantage after a Derick Andrew basket at 15:42. But after that, UCI would finish the game with a 66-37 edge. The finishing touches came when 7-foot center Dave Korfman knocked down a 3-point field goal in the final minute.

A home game against the 8th-place UC Riverside Highlanders seemed to offer the Titans a good opportunity to snap a 4-game losing streak and capture their second Big West Confernce victory. But when UCR jumped out to a 17-3 lead and Pape Sow picked up his third foul for the Titans with 13:14 to go in the first half, it looked like the Titans were in for a very long night.

Instead, with Ryan Dillon coming off the bench to score 8 points, the Titans fought back into the contest. They used a 19-6 run to offset the quick start by the Highlanders and when Derick Andrew hit two buckets in the final minute, the Titans were down by only two points at intermission.

It was still a 2-point game at 44-42 after a Dillon trey at 10:42 in the second half when Ted Bell took over. On his way to a career-high 23 points, he made a 4-point play and later a 3-point field goal to bracket a John Galbreath bucket and the 9-0 spurt gave UCR a 53-42 lead that would shrink by only 2 points the balance of the game.

Babacar Camara picked up the slack for Sow, who played only 19 minutes. Camara grabbed 10 rebounds and blocked 8 shots to tie the Big West single-game record set by Fullerton's Steve Shaw on March 4, 1978, vs. Long Beach State.

There was a story going around Logan that all the security at Salt Lake City International Airport was not for the Winter Olympic Games, but to make sure the Cal State Fullerton Titans' basketball team couldn't get back on a plane after landing in Utah for a rematch with Utah State, whom they had surprisingly beaten three weeks earlier in Fullerton. The Aggies wanted revenge and with a Dee Glen Smith Spectrum record of 19-2 against the Titans, it certainly seemed inevitable that Fullerton would lose for the 18th time in a row in the Cache Valley.

The loss did come, but it wasn't as bad as some of the previous lickings the Titans had received in Logan. With an effective defensive game plan designed to check the Aggies' potent one-two scoring punch of Tony Brown and Desmond Penigar, the Titans hung with the first-place Aggies for most of the first half. But the Aggies went on a 14-4 run and went to the locker room ahead by 11.

The Titans would never get within a single-digit deficit and it took a Ryan Dillon 3-point field goal on their last possession to avoid matching the season low for points in a game.

Returning to the scene of their first road win of the previous season, the Titans had high hopes going against Idaho, a smaller team with the worst field goal percentage in the Big West Conference. Plus, the Vandals were coming off an uninspired losing effort vs. UC Riverside which left its home record (4-9) worse than its road record.

But it was Senior Night, the final home game for the Vandals, and that seemed to inject new life into the hosts. They unleashed their best 3-point field goal shooting of the season and controlled the backboards in a dominant first half to hand Fullerton a loss which eliminated the Titans from the postseason tournament.

With reserve Bethuel Fletcher leading the way, Idaho made 9 of 18 treys in building a 44-27 halftime lead, equalling Fullerton's largest halftime deficit of the season. A trey by Moe Jenkins and two by Fletcher keyed an early Idaho run that turned a 6-6 tie into a 19-9 Vandals' lead and the Titans would never get closer than 9 points.

The Pacific Tigers maintained their recent mastery of the Titans to open the final week of the home season in Titan Gym. Senior Night for the Titans arrived and the pre-game ceremony was a microcosm of Cal State Fullerton's season. Of the four seniors saluted --Danny Kohn, Josh Fischer, Kevin Ricahrdson and David Castleton -- only Castleton would play in the game against Northridge. Tendinitis in his right shoulder sidelined Richardson along with Kohn, who missed the entire season due to knee surgery, and Fischer, who missed most of the second half with a recurrence of his irregular heartbeat.

The game developed as many had during the year. Fullerton sparred with the Matadors in the first half, falling behind by 7 points but coming back to lead by 3 at 28-25 with 6:42 to go. Ryan Dillon hit 4 of 8 3-point field goal tries and eventually drew a box-and-one defensive alignment from CSUN. That tactic helped the Matadors to a 10-0 run over 3 minutes and they would never trail again.

Riding the momentum of the near miss at UCSB, the Titans got "over the hump" at Cal Poly and got a muchdeserved victory to end the season. The win snapped a 10-game losing streak and a 17-game road losing streak that dated to the Jan. 17, 2001, win in San Luis Obispo. Brandon Campbell had a career game but it took a total team effort to beat the Mustangs, who went into their final regular season game and senior night with a 10-1 record in boisterous Mott Gym.

The Titans led by 11 at 62-51 with 3 minutes to play and almost let it get away. Two turnovers against the press contributed to a quick 7-0 Cal Poly spurt that made it a 4-point game at 62-58 with 2 minutes still to play.

Campbell made a pair of free throws but also missed the front end of a oneand-one and David Henry hit a 3-pointer to make it a one possession game with a minute left. Another turnover with 30 seconds left gave Cal Poly a chance but Pape Sow blocked a Varnie Dennis inside shot at 0:12. Derick Andrew missed another one-and-one giving the Mustangs one more chance. They couldn't get off a shot and managed only a Steve Geary free throw with half a second left.

Cal Poly scored the game's first 7 points and led again by 7 at 25-18 before CSF went on a 14-4 run to close out the first half. The Titans opened the second period with a 14-7 spurt and led by as many as 12 at 60-48 at 5:24.

DIV. I TITANS' **HOME-COURT** RECORD



TITANS IN THE NBA

Cal State Fullerton has been well represented at the professional level despite the relative youth of the intercollegiate basketball program. Seven Titans have been drafted in the past two decades and several more players have signed as free agents with the National Basketball Association.

The most currently prominent former Titan is late bloomer



Cedric Ceballos starred for the L.A. Lakers


Bowen. Bruce whose professional career has been a model for perseverance and determination. Signed originally as a free agent by Cleveland in 1995. he spent a couple of years in Europe, (Evreux, France, where he averaged 29 points per game) played in the CBA and has been waived and resigned numerous times by several teams while crossing paths with numerous legendary coaches. He first captured the atten-

tion of Pat Riley with the Miami Heat in 1996-97, where he played in only one game before moving on to Boston. There he


appeared in 91 games during the 1997-98 and 1998-99 seasons for Rick Pitino, serving primarily as a defensive specialist and playing less than 10 minutes per game. He was well travelel during the 1999-2000 season -- signed by Philadelphia, traded to Chicago, waived two days later and signed by Miami again where he was reunited with Riley. He became a starter during the 2000-01 season and averaged 7.2 points in 82 games before signing a free-agent contract for 2001-02 with the San Antonio Spurs. Last year he started every game (59) except for the seven weeks he missed with a broken finger on his right hand. Not coincidentally, the Spurs went only 11-12 in his absence.

"You really don't know how good Bruce is until he isn't around," says captain David Robinson.

The Spurs regrouped and made the playoffs, only to run into the Los Angeles

Lakers and Kobe Bryant, whom Bowen guards with relative success. He held him to 20 points and helped force 7 turnovers in


> a 108-90 San Antonio win last March 20, when Bowen asked reporters to refrain from calling him a "Kobe stopper."

"Not smart," said Bruce. "All that does is fuel his fire."

Prior to Bowen's emergence, the most recognizable former Titan was Cedric Ceballos, who became one of the league's top scorers for the Los Angeles Lakers and made the NBA All-Star team in 1994-95, but was unable to play due to an injury. He began his career in Phoenix, returned to the Suns and then also played for the Mavericks, the Pistons and the Heat before beginning last season in camp with Denver.

During his first four years with the Suns, he was known primarily for two things: winning the NBA slam-dunk contest in 1992 with his blind-folded "hocus pocus" act and scoring a phenomenal number of points when Charles Barkley was injured. Ceballos' absence due to another injury may have swung

the tide toward Chicago in the 1994 playoffs.

Bowen and C e b a l l o s played together as Titans during the 1989-90 season, when Cedric was a senior and Bruce was a freshman.

Success has seemed come in pairs for Fullerton players in the pros. The Titans hit it big in 1984 when two players made NBA rosters -guard Leon Wood with Philadelphia and center Ozell Jones with San Antonio. Wood completed a 6year NBA career with Sacramento on Christmas Eve, 1990. He

played last in the CBA and in France and toured with Magic Johnson's All-Stars. He has spent the last six seasons as an NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that transition. Wood began his post-Titan career as the point guard on the United States' gold-medal 1984 Olympic team under Coach Bob Knight.

Other former Titans in and out of the NBA and CBA during recent years were 1988 graduates Richard Morton and Henry Turner. Morton started the 1988-89 season with Indiana and later played with Golden State. Turner, who was a teammate of Morton's in the CBA, spent much of the 1989-90 season with Sacramento. Morton was one of the top scorers in the CBA in recent seasons and has made the loop's all-star team.

Guard Aaron Sunderland, a 1993 product, has done well in the CBA and 1994-95 products Winston Peterson and David Frigout have played in Europe. J. D. Green (1990-92) has become a star in Australia and former center Dirk Rassloff was summoned two

summers ago to join a team in Milan, Italy.


Other Titans to play in the NBA include guard Kevin Henderson, who played with Golden State and Cleveland; forward Mike Niles with Phoenix; and forward Greg Bunch with the New York Knicks. Foreign leagues have featured center Herman (Demone) Webster, forward Kerry Boagni and sharpshooter Kevin Heenan to name a few. Other players drafted in the 1980s were Ricky Mixon (Lakers), Tony Neal (Lakers) and Boagni (Utah Jazz).

Sean Williams gained fame first as an actor ("Blue Chips") and later as a mem-



Ike Harmon, left, passed Bruce Bowen and all but two other Titans in career scoring.


ber of the Harlem Globetrotters, for whom he entered the Guinness Book of World Records by dunking on a basket 11 feet, 8 inches tall.




Former NBA player and current NBA referee Leon Wood addresses a Titan youth basketball camp in Titan Gym last summer.


