Minutes of the Executive and Annual Business Meetings of the Society for Armenian Studies

Chicago, Illinois
December 3, 1998

The meeting was called to order by president Dennis Papazian.

Minutes of the 1997 meetings were approved.

The membership report was submitted by Dr. Papazian. Three additional members were reported for 1998 for a total of 224.

Assignments were made to have members contact those who have not paid their dues.

The financial report was submitted by Dr. Papazian. There was \$9,098.22 cash on hand on 11/20/97, and \$13,873.32 cash on hand as of 12/02/98. Bills for the *Newsletter* and the forthcoming *Journal* must be paid.

Volume 9 of the JSAS is being laid out and should be at the printer by March 1999.

There is sufficient material for vol. 10 (September 1999) and a great deal of material for vol. 11 (January 2000).

Dr. Papazian asked the Society to look for a new editor to take over prior to the publication of vol. 10, so that there would be no interruption in producing vols. 11 & 12. It was also decided to advertise for a new editor in the *Newsletter*.

Peter Cowe and Dickran Kouymjian were elected to the Executive Council. The election was very close. It was agreed that the Society would make every effort to send the ballots earlier next time.

Barlow Der Mugrdechian was congratulated on his excellent job as the editor of the *Newsletter*. His report on the *Newsletter* was submitted to the president (copy available). It was decided that Dr. Papazian would write to Dr. Kouymjian requesting that he continue the financial assistance of the Armenian Studies Program at CSU Fresno, in the production of the *Newsletter* for another year.

It was decided that Dr. Bournoutian would contact Rita Balian to arrange a cocktail and fund-raising party for the SAS at the 1999 meeting in Washington, D.C. Dr. Papazian would contact the ANC and the Armenian church in D.C. regarding panel discussions and other activities.

The following were elected to the nominations committee: Joseph Kechichian, Aram Arkun, and Barlow Der Mugrdechian. They will contact individual members to seek

those who are willing to be nominated and serve.

Mazda Press requested the SAS to permit them to use the SAS for donations earmarked for the Armenian Studies series. Thus the donations would be tax-deductible. The membership approved and asked that Mazda send an official letter to the SAS president detailing the conditions.

Bournoutian suggested that a committee from the SAS approach the Lincy Foundation for funds for the publication of the JSAS. Plans were made to contact individuals connected with the foundation who would make this task feasible.

It has become apparent that MESA has treated the SAS as a junior member when it comes to panels and the time of presentations. Dr. Papazian will bring this to the attention of the MESA board.

The membership decided that panels that include other disciplines be combined with Armenian panels to attract a larger audience as well as having a better chance of approval from MESA.

The following topics were suggested for 1999 panels: Foreign Policy of Armenia, Teaching Armenian Language Panel on Transcaucasia, and Panel on Literature.

Members were encouraged to contact their colleagues by e-mail regarding the above topics and to do it well before the deadline.

It was also suggested that SAS members (if invited) attend teaching conferences on Armenian history and literature.

The meetings began at 8 pm and ended at 11 pm.

A Letter from the President

As my two-year term as president of the SAS comes to a close, it seems proper to reflect on the state of the Society and its future potential.

As always, finances determine a lot of what we can do. Fundamentally, we depend on membership dues and the generosity of friends for our support. It is important, accordingly, for all members to be up-to-date with their dues and, perhaps, to give a little more for the support of the Society. Unfortunately, we must also depend on an annual fund raising in the community, an effort which distracts us from our purely scholarly activity.

From my vantage point, we are doing well, but perhaps we can do better to face the challenges before us. In the realm of publications, our members and others in the field are producing a great deal, more perhaps than at any other time since the Society was founded. Yet much is left to be done in all areas, including the study of the Armenian Genocide.

Much investigation remains to be done on the theoretical level and the documentation level. All theory must be consonant with the facts, and much basic work needs to be done to establish those facts. There is great danger in constructing theories without fundamental documentation to support those theories.

It is in this spirit, the need for documentation, that the Armenian Research Center is working on the publication of a series of official German documents. We hope to make them available soon.

The *Journal of the Society for Armenian Studies* continues to be published, and the next issue, volume 9, should be with the printer by March 1999. That will make it four issues that have been published since the untimely passing of Avedis Sanjian. The *Journal* now has wide distribution overseas and is sent to most major libraries in North America, Europe, and the Caucasus. We are also currently preparing volume 10, since it takes several months to collect and edit the articles and to put out books to the reviewed and to receive the reviews for inclusion in the *Journal*.

As I have said at the last two annual meetings, we will need to appoint an editor who will take up the torch beginning with volume 11. That individual should be appointed as soon as possible so that there is not a break in the publication schedule. We are currently accepting nominations for the next editor. The Armenian Research Center at the University of Michigan, Dearborn, continues to subvent the cost of the *Journal* and will do so through volume 10.

We must also be grateful to Prof. Dickran Kouymjian and the Advisory Board of the Armenian Studies Program at Fresno State University for their kindness in agreeing to subvent the publishing of our *Newsletter*.

Our *Newsletter*, published out of Fresno by Barlow Der Mugrdechian, has appeared on a regular basis, on the average of three times a year. It has become indispensable for keeping up with activities of our colleagues and being made aware of much that is going on in our profession. Mr. Der Mugrdechian is to be highly commended.

As you will see in our report elsewhere in this issue, our membership has held steady at around 225. We have eleven members in Canada and thirty-four overseas. Our mailing list of scholars and libraries, which goes beyond our membership, is well over 300 individuals and institutions.

Financially, we have never been in better shape since the days when Mr. Alex Manoogian was donating \$10,000 a year. Our balance sheet, published elsewhere in this issue, looks moderately good. It shows that we are solvent, having

enough funds to maintain our modest program and perhaps to expand it a bit. At the recent impromptu fund raising in Chicago, we received donations totaling a bit over \$4,000.

It is a pity that only three of our members attended the MESA membership meeting which, to tell the truth, was sparsely attended by anyone at all except the officers and various committee members.

Instructed by the SAS annual meeting, I brought up the issue of how few panels were allotted to Armenian studies relative to the total number of panels at MESA. I said that the members of our organization were forced by circumstances to hold conferences, meetings, and programs separate from MESA inasmuch as we had topics to discuss which might not appeal to the broad MESA membership but which were of great interest to us. Accordingly, our attendance at MESA seemed to be dropping each year.

I explained how we would much prefer to have our panels at MESA since some members of MESA might also find them of interest, and that by attracting more of our members to MESA, they could take advantage of attending the other panels which might be of interest to them. Philip Khoury replied that my argument made good sense. "I liked the way you put it," he said.

He went on to say that the idea was not a new one, but one hard to implement in the face of space considerations. He said he would bring it up at the next Board meeting and that the Board might consider having each member organization being assigned one panel under their full control. We must wait and see how this plays out.

Finally, we can see that many good things are happening in our professions. There are new cadres in the wings, and we can only hope that they earn the Ph.D. and are able to find positions in the universities. This is one issue that deserves our thoughtful attention. Furthermore, the independence of Armenia and the renewed international interest in the Armenian Genocide has, unfortunately for scholarship, brought the study of the Armenian Genocide into the political arena. We are all aware that in all eras of history there are scholars who serve the state rather than science. We must all be sensitive to this issue and do our best not to have the study of the Armenian Genocide politicized.

New Books

"Turkish Atrocities": Statements of American Missionaries on the Destruction of Christian Communities in Ottoman Turkey, 1915-1917.

An important new volume of Armenian Genocide documentation has been published by the Gomidas Institute. The volume, introduced and edited by Ara Sarafian, is titled *"Turkish Atrocities": Statements of American Missionaries on the Destruction of Christian Communities in Ottoman Turkey, 1915-1917.*

The twenty-one eyewitness accounts comprising this volume were collected in 1917-18 by the Reverend James L. Barton. Rev. Barton collected the documents for an American Presidential commission investigating various aspects of World War I, including the Armenian Genocide. The materials include graphic descriptions of what went on in different parts of the Ottoman Empire between 1915 and 1917. They cover Bitlis, Erzeroom, Marsovan, Kharpert, Diyarbekir, Mardin, Adana, Talas-Cesarea, and Konia.

The fact that the volume covers such a wide range of communities makes it particularly useful for gaining insights into the genocidal process of 1915.

In a brief introduction to each report, Rev. Barton provides biographical notes about the author of that report. Each report is also accompanied by archival citations relating to the authenticity of the report. The 224-page volume includes a map, index, and appendix.

Morgan Library Announces Publication of Symposium Papers *Treasures in Heaven: Armenian Art, Religion, and Society*

The Pierpont Morgan Library's new publication, *Treasures in Heaven: Armenian Art, Religion, and Society*, comprises the series of papers delivered at a two-day symposium held in conjunction with the Library's 1994 exhibition entitled "Treasures in Heaven: Armenian Illuminated Manuscripts" (May 4 - August 7, 1994). The enthusiasm with which the public embraced the exhibition and the symposium led the Library to publish these papers, which represent the work of a dozen internationally prominent specialists. The resulting volume is a fresh and original picture of Armenian culture that fills in many historical gaps and makes a number of unprecedented connections among various aspects of art, religion, and society.

Featuring twelve papers, divided among historical, art historical, and religious subjects, *Treasures in Heaven: Armenian Art, Religion, and Society* presents topics as diverse as the late flowering of Armenian culture in seventeenth-century Iran, the history of the Armenian rite of the Eucharist, the painting of the Cilician period and its relationship to Byzantine art in the eastern Mediterranean area, and the relationship of Armenian and Islamic art in the Mongol period. Beginning with a preface by Charles E. Pierce, Jr., Director of the Morgan Library, and an introduction by Thomas F. Mathews, guest curator of the project, and Roger S. Wieck, Curator of Medieval and Renaissance Manuscripts, the Morgan Library, the publication includes essays by Helen C. Evans; Nina G. Garsoian; Vazken Ghougassian; Robert H. Hewson; Father Krikor H. Maksoudian; Thomas F. Mathews; Ina Baghdiantz McCabe; James R. Russell;

Priscilla P. Soucek; Robert F. Taft, S.J.; Alice Taylor; and Annemarie Weyl Carr.

The twelve essays intersect on many points, returning to examine the same critical issues and key masterpieces from different perspectives, and constitute an important milestone in the study of Armenian civilization. In addition to being an indispensable contribution to the field, the volume will prove to be a revelation for students and scholars alike.

My name is Guranda Machaidze. I'm from the Republic of Georgia. The reason for writing to you is that my speciality is Armenology. I am working as an assistant at the department of Armenology (Faculty of Oriental Studies) of the Tbilisi State University. The department was established in 1945 by the famous armenologist Leon Melikset-Beg. At present the head of the department is Mr. Z. Aleksidze, at the same time the director of the Institute of Manuscripts.

The area of my activities is Georgian-Armenian language relationship. In particular, I am working on the dictionary of the famous Georgian lexicographer Sulkhan Saba Orbelian, who compiled the first Georgian-Georgian Dictionary in the 18th century. The dictionary is interesting in terms of Armenology as well, as it comprises Armenian translations of about 2,000 Georgian words. This research would be useful both for Georgian and Armenian lexicology. both for Georgian and Armenian lexicology.

The other members of the department work in other spheres of Georgian-Armenian relationship. I think that cooperation between our two centers will be useful both for you and us. In case of interest do not hesitate to contact me.

I have just received a message from Armenia, informing me of the death in Moscow on August 25 of Gagik K. Sarkisyan, the Vice President of the National Academy of Sciences of Armenia. Funeral services were held in Yerevan on August 29, 1998.

Academics Bring Together Fresh Ideas and Approaches at ANI

Washington, DC-The Academic Council of the Armenian National Institute (ANI) convened here on November 1, 1998 to discuss and plan the Institute's projects for 1999. The scholars comprising the six-member advisory body shared their expertise and knowledge on the subject of the Armenian Genocide with ANI staff to shape the proposed

projects and strengthen collaborative efforts for implementation.

Chairman Richard Hovannisian (UCLA), Peter Balakian (Colgate University), Robert Melson (Purdue University), Claire Mouradian (National Scientific Research Center, Paris), Christopher Simpson (American University), and William Parsons (U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum) of the Academic Council joined Robert Kaloosdian and Carolyn Mugar of the ANI Board of Governors and Institute staff members Rouben Adalian and Linda Bedeian in the discussion of project priorities within the mission of the organization. With a focus on both short-term and long-term goals, decisions were taken on what ANI's primary objectives should be in the coming year: 1. To continue the collection of archival documentation on a country by country basis. 2. To increase awareness of the Armenian Genocide worldwide. 3. To produce publications with universal applications. 4. To pursue the possibilities of international legal remedies.

Rouben Adalian provided the Academic Council and Board members with an overview of ANI accomplishments during 1998. With archival documentation projects underway in four countries, mainstream media articles and reviews attained, the ANI Web site (<http://www.armenian-genocide.org>) being used as a major educational and research tool, quick responses taken on international calls to action, and an Armenian Genocide map, Adalian explained by example how such products and services are yielding measurable benefits and reaching out to multiple audiences around the world.

Morgan Library Acquires Manuscript Leaf

1999 Armenian Language Summer Institute in Yerevan

Intensive Introductory Courses in Classical, Eastern, and Western Armenian

Such annotated translations should provide wider access of texts to scholars of Armenian, Iranian, Russian, Georgian, and Turkish studies. Original monographs focusing on Armenian history and literature in the modern period will also constitute part of the series.

The first in the series, *The Chronicle of Abraham of Crete*, dedicated to the memory of Hagop Papazian, was recently published
