Highlights of LV Board Meeting

Changes, modifications, proposals, rules, improvements, maintenance, services, all were subjects discussed in the LVA Board Meeting on June 4th, 1979. Chairman Karl Joehnck presided as the first order of business was the reports by Committee Chairmen.

Martin Beckel, Education and Recreation Committee, reported that the Sub-Committee had been monitoring the classes of Oxnard College, that all phases had been satisfactory, and recommended that classes continue in the Fall. There will be meetings with Oxnard College and John Dodds this week to determine the curriculum to be offered.

Beckel recommended that we try John Dodds' suggestion for a one time only "Bring Your Own Bottle" social event, to test the desirability of maintaining the Village liquor license.

The Finance Committee, represented by Eric Lindmann, recommended the establishment of a reserve fund for future use in replacing and/or maintaining common property, equipment, roofs, etc. He suggested setting aside for this purpose 5% of the amount contributed each year. The fund will be considered in the budget next year. (This is about the average payment being made today, according to Tom O'Brien.)

Esther Malkin of the Building and Grounds Committee reported that an increased watering schedule is helping to make our common areas green again.

A rather routine Meet-Your-Candidate-Night broke into a lively question and answer session after the fourth speaker Marty Beckel asked a series of questions!

The meeting was opened by chairman Karl Joehnck at 7 p.m. Thursday, June 14. There were approximately 250 people to whom Karl explained the duties of the Board of Directors.

1. To function like a City Council, to enact rules and regulations.

2. To manage a non-profit organization.

3. To negotiate problems with the developer.

The order of the candidates was chosen by lot, Karl introduced the first speaker Donaldine Weed.

Donaldine sees L.V. as a community of active - not old - residents. In her judgment the ideas that will serve the majority of the residents should be enacted, regardless of how the minority may feel. No favors. Therefore, "NO" must be said many times. Her main object is to keep the Village the happy, lively place it has been up until now.

Ron Barlow, number two candidate, stated "We chose this way of life. The Board needs your help as a volunteer." Ron is a result-oriented person and said, "Let's resolve all problems with Leisure Technology - now - before they move on. Let's build a contingency fund and do the things that will help the greatest majority."

Next candidate, Hank Malkin, stated, "Since I have spent 50 years in a very competitive business I believe

As we grew up, we were all repeatedly cautioned to read and understand everything we were asked to sign. And we so vowed. Yet probably very few of us read the LVA regulations (CC and Rs) before signing up and moving in.

We knew that rules were necessary for the operation of a large community, and it seemed likely that the proffered rules would

be reasonable. But an exception slipped through.

"Article II 2.7 Commercial Use" is an odd-ball which slipped through. It prohibits any "industry, trade, occupation or profession of any kind, whether commercial or otherwise, designed for profit or otherwise." Banning virtually every human activity except eating, drinking and sleeping, it makes a farce of a needed regulation which should be clear, reasonable and practical.

Since it covers activities which are of continuing interest to many residents, and disputes over what is permitted founder on the present rule, it seems worthwhile to rewrite it.

Believing a solution to be readily available, we checked the Camarillo R-1 (Single Family Residential) Zoning. Making a few minor changes, it appears to be a good model for our use:

"Permitted Uses. Any occupation can be conducted by a resident incidental to the residential use, with no sign used; no display; no commodity sold or stored on the premises; no person employed other than a member of the resident family; no pedestrian or vehicular traffic generated beyond that incidental to residential use; no perceptible noises or fumes produced."

The foregoing is tossed out as a suggestion for a rewrite of the meaningless mish-mash written by Leisure Technology.

Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I should like to comment on your recent "Opinion" on "Fees for RVers." As you noted, under the provisions of the Homeowners Association I am entitled to a "space... to park an RV." I do not own an RV, but because I have not exercised that entitlement does not mean that I have abandoned it.

However, since residents, like myself, do not use their RV space, these spaces are available and it is not unreasonable to make them available to those who want two or three spaces, as a few do. However, I also feel it is not unreasonable to charge a token rent for those spaces, say one dollar a month per extra space. This could be terminated by either party and not establish would possessory interest." Again there should be no fee charged for the original one space to which each resident is entitled.

As the RV Storage Area becomes filled, then those who

occupy three spaces should be the first to have to give up one space, then those who occupy two spaces should have to give up their extra space. Those who have held extra spaces the longest should be the first to have to give them up. This should be the most equitable distribution of time that could be made in a random, unpredictable situation such as this.

Report of Service Committee

The Public Service Committee, chaired by Anthony Manzella, had the following report.

ELECTRIC RATES - if any one has not received his corrected Life Line allocation, contact Owen Vaughn.

TELEPHONE SERVICE - John Lauten is waiting for an answer from the Public Utilities Commission regarding extended telephone service. A telephone engineer in L.A. promised to check into the 40 mile limit from downtown L.A. regarding the Optional Residential Service; other areas exceed this 40 miles, so maybe we can.

He also spoke with Mr. Hester of G.T.E. who promised to study Optional Calling Measure. This would cost \$11.50 per month for each additional exchange you wish to call, with limited calling privileges between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. and unlimited calls after 8 p.m.

Our local Chamber of Commerce would support our efforts to improve local telephone service.

FLOOD CONTROL AND DRAINAGE - Leisure Technology is bonded to maintain the Flood Control Channel until it is completely improved. Silt is still coming into the V5 and V7 drain from the Pardee property. Our Board of Directors has notified Pardee and the City of Camarillo by

letter that they will be held responsible in the event of any further drain clogging.

If we have what is known as a 50 year storm, water might back up to our homes, if greater than a 100 year storm, water could get into some homes. The freeway bridge over Conejo Creek is the constricting point for flooding. If water goes over the bridge, we would be flooded. When the freeway is improved we should insist that the bridge level be raised.

Our Board has approved the employment of engineers to check our drainage system.

ACCESS ROAD - Roland Rohde stated that the Adolfo Road extension consists of two stages. Lewis Rd. to Flynn, built first, then from Flynn Rd. to Mission Oaks Blvd. There is enough money for a grade level crossing of the R.R. tracks but to bridge Calleguas Creek would need Federal aid and might take 2 to 5 years to negotiate. It was suggested by Sandy Okum that our Board of Directors write a letter to Camarillo City Council opposing the dangerous on-grade R.R. crossing.

Ventura County Supervisor MacDonald's administrative assistant Ann Schlange visited during our entire meeting and was very impressed with our work. She promised to help in any way she could.

LV Emergency Procedures

Leisure Village is a peaceful, happy place to live most of the time. Then someone is ill or injured, or there is a fire in a home. Then, we go to work. "We" are Security.

"routine" Let's take a emergency. John Villager, 12345 V.12, comes home after well, drinking eating moderately, and dancing a great deal. Suddenly he feels a constriction in his chest - pain radiates from his body into his arms - breathing becomes difficult. He gasps something to his wife who turns to the phone, noting the emergency number on the phone sticker provided by LVA.

In the Main Gate House the duty officer picks up the receiver as the phone rings. He notes the light is on the right hand side of the console -**EMERGENCY!** Routine chores are forgotten. "Security, this is Mrs. Villager. My husband seems ill!" "May I have your address, please. Someone will be right there!" The officer

reaches for his radio. "Unit 3, illness, possible heart attack. 12345, repeat, 12345, emergency!" As the radio message is finished, the officer presses a red button on the automatic phone dialer, which will dispatch Fire Department rescue and an ambulance in a matter of seconds.

Meanwhile, Patrol Officer Mike Gilyle has flicked on his red light and is calmly breaking every speed rule in the book. He leaves his vehicle in front of the residence, taking the ever present radio and a medium size green case inside. About 150 seconds after the phone call, the apparently unconscious Mr. V is receiving oxygen and the rhythmic pressures of CPR. Five or six minutes later a man from the Ventura County Fire Department is beside them, and shortly later ambulance attendants are there to load him, now breathing on his own, into the waiting ambulance for transport to PV Hospital.

This story is fictitious, but the

comprehensive

details are true. It has happened in this village many times. Your Security Department made the difference by arriving seven or eight minutes before the Fire Department, or Mr. V might have died.

A great deal of credit goes to Officer Mike Lyle, a resident of the Village, who has spent many hours training and retraining Security personnel in CPR techniques. Mike has, with the assistance of Your Neighbors Care Group and other village organizations, acquired the latest teaching materials, and also conducts classes for villagers.

We hope that none of our readers will ever have to have this kind of service from Security, but just in case, here is a short check list of things to have and to do:

1. Be sure your phone has the LVA emergency sticker attached. If you don't have one, the LVA office will give them toyou.


Classics will be played by the Ventura County Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Conductor Frank Salazar.



Skylab Falling

recent newspaper headline caught my attention: "Skylab will soon be falling back to Earth." I just looked around the room at my framed Skylab Astronaut uniform patches and other memorabilia. Has it been six years already since we launched America's first space station^o As a member of the **NASA Quality Assurance Team** we were responsible for monitoring the fabrication and testing of our new flying laboratory. We at NASA had just completed our Apollo Moon Exploration Program in 1971 and now we embarked on a new and challenging adventure. From a standpoint of reducing cost we used leftover Apollo hardware - even the Skylab living quarters was a converted Apollo-Saturn 3rd stage booster.

It was interesting and exciting, checking out the flight crews. Subsequent to the launching in 1973 the big difference in the Space Station became apparent. Instead of the cramped interior of an Apollo capsule, they lived in an area as spacious as a two bedroom house. Menus were selected from a wide variety of frozen or dehydrated food even delicacies such as chicken casserole and lobster Newburg were aboard. The compact library included Shakespeare plays, and taped music of the Tijuana Brass Band went aloft with the astronauts.

Smoke alarms which today are standard items in our new homes were invented for Skylab, to alert the crew in event of a problem. Miniature electronic devices such as a

cardiac pacemaker or a pocketsized calculator are "spinoffs" from our requirement to minimize weight in space flights.

Aside from numerous experiments conducted by the three different crews, we were anxious to learn the effects of long periods of weightlessness on the human body - essential information in advance of any inter-planetary travel. The Solar Telescope gave us numerous photographs of activity on the sun's surface, the source of much of our energy, unhampered by Earth's atmospheric conditions. The camera, deployed through the Skylab windows, aided in surveying mineral resources, flood and erosion control, crop production, ocean technology, taking 20,000 photographs in all.

After the third crew returned safely to Earth, Skylab continued to speed around the globe, completing each orbit every 90 minutes, at an altitude of approximately 275 miles. It was planned that the new Space Shuttle Air Bus could replenish expendible items in Skylab to ready it for subsequent use, but technical problems have precluded any space shuttle flight to date.

Meanwhile, increased sunspot activity has raised upper atmospheric temperatures sufficiently to slow down Skylab and force it to plummet to Earth.

I still have my hard hat hanging out in the garage, but I am not worried about being hit by debris - I am confident that Skylab wouldn't hurt an old friend.



Profile - Gil Reimer

Most people call him "Chief," but he also has the title Brigadier General, U.S. Army, Retired. Gil Reimer's life sounds like a far-out adventure story, and, in fact, a biographer has prepared either a book or a movie script for early release. Author Frank Drdlck has not yet chosen a title.

Despite the fact that the Chief wears a uniform, and a badge, and always has his ominous little black radio beside him ready for whatever call-to-action should come, he is far from tense about being our Security Officer in Leisure Village. He talks easily about his own family, his greater family in Canada, the ancestral Reimers traced back to 1540 in Germany, and his church - he is a Deacon in St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Woodland Hills.

Gil Reimer was a farm boy on a 2,000 acre wheat farm in Manitoba, Canada. Farm and family life were great, but the independent and spirited boy could not cope with the strictness of the Mennonite Church. At age eleven he ran away, roaming as far as Florida before he was returned home. He ran away again at age 13, and joined the U.S. Army when he was barely 14. A year later he was in a Cavalry Troop in Manchuria, protecting U.S. missionaries from Chinese bandits. He participated in the last full cavalry charge (including drawn sabers) of the U.S. Army: March 1940, in Tsingtao, China. Then they discovered he was under-age, and he was promptly discharged. After hitchhiking to Shanghai, he eventually got a job as stoker on a cattle boat coming back to San Francisco.

The youngster bought a train ticket to Chicago, but got only as far as Denver before he met a Navy recruiter, and he was off to boot camp in San Diego (almost 16). He volunteered for the newly formed Underwater Demolition team and was transferred to the Marines for this duty. Ultimately in WW II, he was in 28 engagements in the Pacific, Atlantic, Normandy, and Sicily. He was captured three times, broke loose each occasion.

He remained in the active

army reserve after 1947, and was called up for the Korean War receiving a direct commission to Captain and then to Lt. Colonel. He was Colonel in the Vietnam War, for two years head of a Military Police unit in Saigon. He retired in 1967 after 28 years service, and in Oct. 1977 the U.S. Congress appointed him Brigadier General, U.S.A., Retired.

Education? Gil went to night school for a year after WW II, and received his high school diploma at age 25. It took 14 years to earn a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration (UCLA), but then he earned two Masters Degrees in Political Science (USC), and Military Administration and Logistics (U.S. Army War College), and he taught field grade officers at the War College in Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

Gil married his Dad's secretary in Chicago in 1945. Louise was also his childhood sweetheart from back home. They have two sons and a daughter, all doing well in their chosen fields.

In civilian life, Reimer was a business man in various financial institutions - vicepresident of Equitable Savings and Loan Association, mortgage banker and appraiser and he had a heart attack. He regained his health after open heart surgery, was too young to really retire, but needed less tension in his daily routine.

His wife Louise works at Westlake Hospital and knew Marsha Berman, our Administrator's wife, arranged for Stan to meet Gil. As a consequence, Reimer was hired for L.V. Security. He has created the emergency response force for L.V., and now heads 20 guards and officers.







Marty Beckel asked the audience to give Karl a round of applause for his outstanding work as a Board Member these past two years. Karl thanked the small crowd and urged them to attend Townhall Meeting and contact neighbors about voting.







Group hears about Solar Water Heating

Solar energy is providing him with hot water and significantly lower electric bills - so reported Leonard Micon of Village 6 in a talk to the Current Events Discussion Group on Tuesday, June 12th.

About 60 Villagers heard him describe the solar hot water heating system installed in his house in April 1976 - an experimental project financed by the Federal government. The system consists of two collectors, a 40-gallon water tank and a 52-gallon reserve tank, with a ¼ h.p. motor to provide circulation. Supplementing the standard electric meter, there is another one metering the amount of electricity required to heat water only, as well as a water meter.

For the year beginning October 1, 1977, and ending September 30, 1978, the Micon residence used 10,963 gallons of water. The amount of electricity used in heating water was 1656 KWH, for an annual cost of \$69.55. Micon

rightly felt that the sun did most of the work. He has invited Villagers to inspect his solar system at 6316 Village 6.

Preceding the discussion a film entitled "Sun on Tap," distributed by the California Energy Commission, visually described various solar water heating systems, which, incidentally, came to California as early as 1895. By 1897, 30 percent of the homes in Pasadena had solar water heaters.

Solar energy contractor Rick Suddes, owner of the Ojai firm, Sun Control, described a solar hot water system he installs for \$1775 and took many questions from an inquisitive and costconscious audience.

Literature furnished by the California Energy Commission was distributed, and Villagers present were particularly pleased to learn details of the 55% tax credit allowed on installation costs.

The Discussion Group, organized less than two months ago, is currently pursuing the energy problem, having begun

with a spirited critique of the gasoline shortages. Herb Swartz, secretary, announced that Mission Federal Savings & Loan agreed to provide the group with free bumper stickers bearing the slogan, "55 MPH SAVES LIVES AND ENERGY."

All residents in Leisure Village are invited to participate in the twice-monthly discussions, held the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays at 7:30 p.m. in the Men's Club Room. Topics are chosen by the members in "brainstorming" sessions.


Chairman Joehnck reported:
