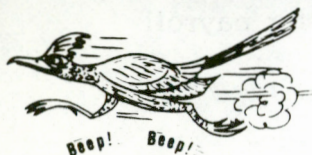

ANNOUNCEMENTS

CONSTRUCTION AREAS - You will notice that for the next year-and-a-half, there will be considerable construction on the campus. Our Residence Halls and Dining Facilities are now under construction immediately west of the Cafeteria. We will very shortly be starting our Initial Science Building to the southeast of our campus. Both of these construction projects will have construction barriers around the entire site. It is requested that nobody trespass on these grounds due to the hazardous conditions. If for any reason any member of the faculty, staff or students has some reason to visit the job site, please make arrangements through the Office of the Campus Planning Officer, Administration Building room 107, phone 2246. Because the general contractor and his insurance companies are responsible and liable for any accidents occurring on the construction site, the contractor has been given authorization by the Trustees to escort any non-authorized visitors off of the construction site. I. D. CARDS - Those who had pictures taken during registration, March 29 and 30, may pick up their I. D. Cards in the Library. If your picture was taken during the week of April 5 to 9, you will be notified at a later date when to pick up your I. D. Card.

PARKING - We have just received approval to inaugurate a payroll deduction plan for parking. By signing a payroll deduction form, authorizing a \$3.00 deduction for one vehicle or 34¢ additional for each additional vehicle from your pay check each month, you will be able to obtain a parking decal which will be good for the period July 1 to June 30 each fiscal year. We think this simplifies the problem of applying for and issuing decals, and encourage everyone to use this method of funding for parking in place of the quarterly cash purchase procedure. Faculty not teaching during the summer quarter will recover a full refund for the quarter. Forms authorizing payroll deductions may be obtained at the Bursar's window, Administration Building room 105, commencing immediately for payroll deductions to commence on or after July 1, 1971.
