CAL STATE FULLERTON CAMPUS



California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing. Having first offered classes in 1959, the university has grown to 23,000 students and achieved national distinction.

In 1984, the university will host team handball competition at the Summer Olympics. It also will begin its 25th anniversary observance with the theme "Honoring the Past—Creating the Future."

The university's students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes: many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The university enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, education, engineering, communications, music, nursing, speech and hearing, and theater. All told there are 82 degree programs—40 of them at the graduate level.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is the largest university level internship and cooperative education program on the West Coast. The program allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours on a year-round basis. Extended education offerings are open to the community without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Still another strong point is the university's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances and the Cabaret Repertory Theater Company, which performs regularly in Brea.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the 7,000-person network of community support organizations. The Titan Athletic Foundation is one of these support groups.

Further examples of community outreach are the Fullerton Arboretum and Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary. Opened in 1979, the Arboretum is a 25-acre on-campus preserve that was established jointly by the university and the City of Fullerton. Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary is a half-hour from campus in a canyon of the Santa Ana Mountains.

To reinforce the university's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on an ambitious campaign called "Commitment to Mindpower." Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980 to replace Dr. L. Donald Shields, who had resigned after a ten-year term to accept the presidency of Southern Methodist University.

Dr. Cobb had served as Dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of Professor of Biological Sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was Dean of Connecticut College and Professor of Zoology for seven years. Previously, she was Professor of Biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black woman to head a major public university on the west coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree in 1944 from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University in 1947 and 1950, respectively. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a student in the Cornell University Medical School.

HEAD COACH JUDI GARMAN



Judi Garman begins her fifth year as softball coach at Cal State Fullerton and has led the team to no less than a ninth-place national finish in each of her first four years.

Garman established the program in 1980 and finished third in the conference, second in the region and ninth-place nationally. Since then, Garman's teams have won every conference and regional championship while finishing second in the nation in 1981 and 1983 and third place in 1982.

Garman's instant success at Fullerton is only the latest in a remarkable string of accomplishments which stretch across the continent from Canada to the University of California at Santa Barbara to Golden West College in Huntington Beach to Cal State Fullerton.

At Golden West College in 1971 she inherited a team which was winless the previous year and took it to a 9-8 showing. Two years later she captured a conference crown and it took two more years for her first regional championship and her first of four national championships.

Starting with nothing at Fullerton, she has taken the Titans to the national championship tournament in her first four years, just missing the national title and settling for second twice. In 1981 the Titans lost the national championship game 4-3 to Utah State and last year it took Texas A&M 12 innings to beat the Titans in the final game 2-0.

In 1982 the Titans were undefeated through their first 27 games (one tie) and won 49 of their first 53 games (two ties) and won the WCAA Championship with a 17-0-1 record as Garman won Coach of the Year laurels.

Garman also started the Pony Invitational Softball Tournament five years ago which has now turned into the most prestigious softball tournament in the nation. Five of last year's participants participated in the NCAA playoffs. This year, five of the final six teams in the 1983 College World Series will be playing.

Garman comes from a softball family. Her mother, Ruth, was a physical education teacher and softball coach at Messiah College in Pennsylvania and her aunt also coached. She grew up in Kindersley, Saskatchewan and by the eighth grade was playing on a senior women's team. She then joined the Saskatoon Imperials. They were twice Canadian Champions and in 1970 Garman was a member of the national team at the World Softball Tournament in Osaka, Japan. In 1967 she was an all-star Canadian outfielder.

Garman began working on her master's degree at UC Santa Barbara in 1967 and started club softball and soon had a varsity team (1967-69). Upon completion of her studies she took the women's athletic directorship at Westmont College in Santa Barbara and coached volleyball, basketball and tennis in addition to softball.

Garman then moved to Golden West College where, along with softball, she coached basketball (1973-76) and cross country (1977-79). Twenty-one of her softball players received scholarships to four-year institutions, against whom she manufactured a 34-11-2 record over the years.

In great demand as a speaker and instructor at clinics, Garman has conducted her own sessions at Golden West College and Fullerton, attracting hundreds of coaches and young softball players. She has also taken a Titan team to Sweden for a series of clinics and exhibitions.

Fishing and snow skiing occupy Garman time away from the softball field. She has also been published in many physical education journals and was a pioneer in the equality in sports movement when she played Little League baseball.

ASSISTANT COACH KATHY VAN WYK

Kathy Van Wyk begins her second year as the Titans' assistant coach after a highly successful playing career at Cal State Fullerton and Texas Women's University.

Van Wyk, 23, had a sensational one year pitching career at Fullerton after transferring from Texas Women's University when its softball program was dropped. At Fullerton she compiled a 35-1 record with an earned run average of 0.18 and 270 strikeouts in 278 innings pitched. She was named both NCAA and AIAW All-American while receiving the Broderick Award for the nation's top softball player. Van Wyk also received an NCAA post-graduate scholarship.

At TWU she was a member of the 1979 AIAW National Championship team and was named Texas AIAW Player of the Year. In 1980 she was nominated for the Broderick Award after compiling a 40-6 record with three perfect games. In 1981 her record was 11-9 with a 0.63 ERA in 133 innings. She was also an ASA AII-American when she played for the Orlando Rebels in 1979.



Van Wyk was born in Holland Michigan on July 21, 1960 and attended Holland Christian High School. She was twice named to the all-conference team and she played on the 1979 state championship team. She also played two years of volleyball and three seasons of basketball. In basketball she was once all-city and twice all-conference.

After coming to Fullerton she ran her pitching record to 33-0 before losing her first game in the College World Series and was named County Athletic of the Year by the Orange County Sportswriters Association for sports other than football, basketball or baseball.

SEASON PREVIEW

Cal State Fullerton's softball team has finished as one of the top three teams in the nation for the last three years and has what may be its best chance to win the national champion-

ship in 1984.

The Titans return 12 members of the team that finished second in the nation in 1983 including two All-Americans and a top group of newcomers. In fact, the competition for playing time will be so stiff some returning players will be forced to switch positions to make room for all the talent.

"We have so many players that can play so many different positions that we will be moving people around," said fifth-year coach Judi Garman. "We'll experiment to find the

best combination.

Returning to the Titans are All-Americans Susan LeFebvre and Elise King. Both were also named to the All-WCAA, All-Region and College World Series All-Tournament Teams.

Le Febvre was the leading pitcher for the Titans with a 26-5 record and 0.23 earned run average. She had 201 strikeouts in 241.2 innings. When not pitching LeFebvre may be the designated hitter. In 1983 she was second on the team in batting at .285.

Elise King returns to the outfield but will move from left to centerfield to take advantage of her speed. She led the Titans in batting, stolen bases, runs, hits, total bases and tied in

triples. Her first and only error of the season came in the 63rd game of the year.

Also returning will be 1981 and 1982 All-American Sue Lewis who played only the first half of last season. Even still, she led the team in doubles, home runs and tied in triples. She led the team in almost all batting statistics her first two years and her power will give the team an extra punch. Although she played first base last season, she will move back to right field and Robin Goodin, who took over for Lewis at first, will remain at first.

Jan Pierini, who has been a staple of the infield at third, will remain there. Kim Kirk, last season's starting shortstop, may play some second base. JoAnn Ferrieri, when not pitching, also has the ability to play either third or second base. Leslie King may also see action at

second, sharing the catching position with Maridee Richards.

Also returning are pitchers Lori Neff and Lisa Baker and outfielder Stephanie Tanaka. Baker and Tanaka will be used also as pinch hitters while Tanaka may also be used to pinch

run.

Leading the newcomers is pitcher Debbie Mygind. Considered one of the top pitchers in the world, Mygind pitched her native New Zealand National Team to the 1982 World Championships where she was named to the All-World Team. Last season she played for Arizona Western Junior College and was named JC All-American and named to the JC national championship All-Tournament Team.

Rina Foster should be competitive for the second base position although she can also play outfield while Tammy McKinney, an All-State shortstop from Arizona, may see action on the left side of the infield. Donna McElrea, who was first team All-CIF for four years, can play both catcher and outfield. Lisa Noriega, a transfer from U.S. International, will see

action at shortstop.

'All the competition for the positions has pushed everyone to work harder," said Gar-

man. "This kind of depth will benefit us as we strive for the national title.

"LeFebvre and Mygind should be our top pitchers this year. They will probably alternate starts and should be the best one-two punch in the nation. Our depth shows when you see that we have all our pitchers returning, our entire infield, except second base, and an All-American outfield with King at center and Lewis at right."

UCLA looks to be the Titans' toughest conference competition. Last year the Bruins and Titans tied for the conference crown. UCLA finished third just below the Titans in last year's

College World Series and they also return their pitching staff.

The Titans schedule is, once again, one of the toughest in the nation. Coming to Fullerton this season are the teams that finished first, third, fourth, fifth and sixth in the nation last year along with other teams who participated in the NCAA playoffs. The WCAA schedule has been shortened this year with only one round of competition, which has allowed Fullerton to schedule more non-conference opponents.

Fullerton will play most of their home games at Lions' Field, again this year, while waiting for their new on-campus fields to be completed. The two lighted fields should be completed towards the beginning of April and will be the new home for the Titans' games. With their completion, Cal State Fullerton becomes the only university in the nation to have two

lighted softball fields on campus.

Garman is cautious when it comes to predicting a national title.

"There are a lot of good teams around the country," she said. "Last year's national championship was decided on who got the breaks in the game. It may come down to that again this year.

"I will say this much, though: we finished second in the nation last year, and we're a

much stronger team now."

1983 COLLEGE WORLD SERIES

In what was supposed to be a rebuilding year, with an entirely new pitching staff, Cal State Fullerton surprised everyone with their strength and entered the College World Series as the top seeded for the second consecutive year.

Going into the series, Susan LeFebvre had pitched four consecutive one-hitters followed by a no-hitter in the regional championship game over New Mexico. Kim Kirk hit seven rbi in the previous seven games to the series while Pam Newton hit .400 in the regionals and .363 in the previous six games.

GAME #1: Things didn't start out good for the Titans when they gave up two runs in the bottom of the first inning. In the third, JoAnn Ferrieri, dh, doubled up the center. Vera Bahr sacrificed her to second and she's hit in by Elise King. GAME #2: With a day off to rest, Fullerton met South Carolina in the second round. In the bottom of the first inning Elise King layed down a bunt and beat it out to first for a single. Leslie King sacrificed her to second. Pam Newton hit it back to the pitcher who elected to throw it to third. King beat the throw and everyone was safe. LeFebvre took the first pitch and Newton went for second. The throw was cut off by the second baseman who threw wildly to third allowing King to score. With two outs in the fourth, Bahr singled into center field and Elise King hit it to the second baseman and beat the throw for a single. The throw was wild, though, which allowed Bahr to score. South Carolina never threatened while LeFebvre pitched a one-hitter. FINAL SCORE: Fullerton 2, South Carolina 0.

GAME #3: The battle between the last two unbeaten teams saw Fullerton play conference rival UCLA. The Titans and the Bruins split on the year and everyone was expecting an exciting game. Debbie Doom pitched for the Bruins who had lost twice to Fullerton during the regular season but hadn't been scored upon in two years of CWS play. Fullerton came out slugging and led 3-1 after the first inning. The Bruins loaded the bases in the fifth but weren't able to score. LeFebvre, Tobi Perkins and Bahr had two rbi each and the Titans came away with an easy win. FINAL SCORE: Fullerton 6, UCLA 1.

GAME #4: As the last unbeaten team in the tournament, Fullerton was guaranteed a spot in the championship game whether or not they won this game. Texas A&M had battled back through the losers bracket and a loss for them would have meant elimination. The game didn't start until 10:00 p.m. because of a 17 inning contest between UCLA and South Carolina that delayed the start. Neither team threatened until the fourth. Aggie Cindy Cooper scored from second on a Iva Jackson single with the throw coming too late to the plate. Neither team got more than three hits but the Titans' two errors were their downfall. FINAL SCORE: Texas A&M 1. Fullerton 0.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME: For the second game in a row the Titans had to wait for the start of their game. This time Texas A&M and UCLA played 14 innings for the right to meet Fullerton in the championship game. In a year when pitchers dominated collegiate softball, this game was no different. The 12 inning contest saw Texas A&M pitcher Lori Stoll strike out 14 while Fullerton's Susan LeFebvre only gave up three hits. Pam Newton who was injured in the previous night's game was a question mark for this game but played with an injured knee. Neither team threatened until the top of the twelfth when A&M's Cooper singled to right and went to third when the ball got past Bahr. Cooper and Patti Holthaus came home when the ball was wildly thrown from second two batters later. The Titans fought back in the bottom of the inning when Pierini singled into right. The attempt at the rally was stopped short when the Aggie shortstop robbed LeFebvre of a single when she made a diving stop and crawled to second base for the force out. FINAL SCORE: Texas A&M 2, Fullerton 0.

INVITATIONAL TOURNAMENT

Cal State Fullerton's Pony Invitational Softball Tournament continues to be the country's most prestigious tournament as it attracts the nation's top teams to Southern California. Four of 1983's top five national finishers will be participating along with two others who qualified for the NCAA tournament.

Leading the double elimination field are defending national champion Texas A&M, national runner-up Cal State Fullerton, 4th place national finisher South Carolina and University of Pacific, who finished 5th in the 1983 College World Series.



Cal State Fullerton won the first three Pony Invitationals, but they finished third in 1983 behind eventual national champion Texas A&M and Cal Poly Pomona.

1983's top batter was Suzy Brazney of Cal Poly Pomona who hit .434. The tournament's top pitcher was Lori Stoll of Texas A&M who had 34 strike outs and gave up 2 earned runs and seven walks in 41 innings.
