

Goodwin Field

All Cal State Fullerton home baseball games are played at Goodwin Field on campus. The field is located at the north end of campus, just east of Titan Stadium. Parking is available by:

- Using Lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and Associated Road and paying \$4 upon entry for a daily permit (Monday-Thursday only). Parking is free on Friday nights and all day on Saturdays and Sundays.
- Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of a news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

Media Credentials

Requests should be made by phone (714-278-3081), fax (714-278-3141) or e-mail (mgreenlee@fullerton.edu) as far in advance as possible and no later than 24 hours before game time. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. Otherwise, credentials can be picked up at the press will call.

Photo Credentials

Credentials will be issued on a per-game basis and must be worn in plain sight at all times. All photographers must remain in the camera wells located to the outfield side of each dugout. NCAA regulations regarding photography will be adhered to at all times.

Press Box

The press box is located on the walkway behind the home plate seating area. Limited seating is available with beat writers receiving priority. Radio positions and additional media seating will be allocated in the press box or in the rows immediately in front of the press box, if necessary.

Telephones

The press box phone number (for media scoring updates only) is (714) 278-5327. Additional lines are available on a shared basis in the press box or softball press box (located adjacent to the baseball facility).

Radio Lines

Up to two telephone lines can be made available to the designated radio station of the visiting team. Please make arrangements through the athletic media relations office well in advance.

High-Speed Internet

The press box is equipped with several highspeed data jacks for on-line browsing and transmission. Media members should bring their own network cables.

Interviews

Coaches and players will be available for postgame interviews on the field after a brief cooling down session and team meeting. Midweek interviews can be conducted before practices, which generally start at 1:45 p.m., or by special arrangement. Coach Horton can also be reached in his office at (714) 278-3780 before noon. Special requests should be made through the athletic media relations office. Interviews with visiting coaches or players should be arranged through the visiting team's SID, when available.





Heading to Omaha

The Big West has enjoyed a tradition of representation at college baseball's premier event, the NCAA College World Series, a showcase of the nation's best teams battling for the national championship in Omaha. Neb. The Big West has featured a contender for the coveted crown on an almost annual basis. In fact, a Big West school has reached Omaha in 13 of the past 17 seasons. Cal State Fullerton brought home the Big West's first national title in 1995 and then brought home a second last year as the 2004 national champ. Here is a breakdown of Big West participants in the College World Series over the years (baseball was not sponsored in the Big West from 1977-84).

Big League Talent

The Big West boasts a sizable number of alumni who have moved on to baseball's highest level and are contributing to the successes of their respective major league clubs.

Some of the Big West's more prominent alumni wearing major league uniforms include 2000 American League Most Valuable Player Jason Giambi (Long Beach State), 2001 National League All-Star Phil Nevin (Cal State Fullerton) and 2004 American League Rookie of the Year Bobby Crosby (LBSU). Other notable major leaguers who honed their skills in the Big West are Lyle Overbay (Nevada), Mark Kotsay (CSF), Steve Trachsel (LBSU), Brady Anderson (UC Irvine), Michael Young (UC Santa Barbara) and Reed Johnson (CSF).

The list goes on and on, and the supply does not appear to be in danger of shortage. The Big West produces an annual bumper crop of players in the Major League Baseball amateur draft that ranks the conference among the highest represented in the nation. In the 2001 MLB amateur draft alone, an incredible 38 Big West players were selected, including firstrounder Crosby. Cal State Fullerton's Chad Cordero, the 20th overall pick of the 2003 MLB draft by the Montreal Expos, made a quick ascent to the parent club with his appearances in relief throughout the 2003 season. Most recently, Long Beach State right-hander Jered Weaver was selected 12th overall in the 2004 draft. Weaver is the highest 49er pick since Kyle Abbott went No. 9 in 1989.

Key Dates in Big West Conference History

July 1, 1969 - The desire to form a Division I football conference sparks the formation of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) with seven charter members: Fresno State, Long Beach State, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara, Pacific, Cal State Los Angeles and San Diego State. The conference sponsors 11 men's sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, gymnastics, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, water polo and wrestling. J. Kenneth Fagans is named commissioner on a part-time basis.

June 3, 1976 - The conference approves the split of the PCAA baseball league into two leagues separate from the PCAA. The Southern California Baseball Association (SCBA) and the Northern California Baseball Association (NCBA) consist mostly of members of the PCAA and the West Coast Athletic Conference. PCAA Commissioner Jesse Hill agrees to govern the SCBA.

June 8, 1979 - SCBA member Cal State Fullerton wins the NCAA Baseball Championship with a 2-1 victory over Arkansas.

May 17, 1984 - The conference council approves the reformation of PCAA baseball for the 1985 season, thus eliminating the SCBA and the

June 10, 1984 - SCBA champion Cal State Fullerton wins its second NCAA Baseball Championship. The Titans prevail over the University of Texas 3-1.

July 1, 1988 - The conference changes its name from "PCAA" to "Big West Conference."

May 14, 1995 - Cal State Fullerton defeats Long Beach State 8-4 to claim the title in the inaugural Big West Baseball Tournament in Long Beach, Calif.

June 10, 1995 - Cal State Fullerton

claims its third College World Series title with an 11-5 win over USC. The Titans become the first No. 1 seed in College World Series history to win the title. In addition, CSF becomes the 14th team in CWS history to advance through the regionals and series undefeated.

January 8, 1996 - Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge are invited to join the Big West as associate members in softball starting in 1997. Sacramento State's baseball team is invited to join the league as an associate member also in 1997.

February 9, 2000 - Cal State Northridge and UC Riverside are formally invited to join the Big West beginning with the 2001-2002 season.

May 26, 2003 - For the first time ever, two Big West schools are given regional host-bids by the NCAA. Long Beach State hosts its first regional, while Cal State Fullerton hosts its third. Each advances to the Super Regional.

June 8, 2003 - With a 7-1 victory over Arizona State, Cal State Fullerton advances to its 12th College World Series and ninth as a Big West member. The Titans come one win shy of reaching the best-of-3 championship series.

June 27, 2004 - A two-game sweep of Texas in the College World Series clinches Cal State Fullerton's fourth national championship, its second as a member of the Big West. After a 15-16 start to the season, the Titans win 32 of their next 38 games.


Goodwin Field, formerly known as Titan Field, became the home of Cal State Fullerton baseball on April 18, 1992, when the Titans swept a doubleheader from Loyola Marymount, 8-2 and 11-3. It is the third oncampus diamond to serve Cal State Fullerton, which has also played "home" games at city parks such as Amerige in Fullerton and Boysen in Anaheim as well as borrowing junior college fields at Fullerton, Santa Ana, and Orange Coast Colleges during the installation of lights in 1983.

Goodwin Field has become an undeniable home field advantage for the Titans. In the 12-plus seasons they've played at Goodwin Field, the Titans are 284-88 (.763 winning percentage) with their best season coming in 2003. That season the Titans won their first 22 games at home before finishing with a 31-3 mark. The Titans are 18-5 in NCAA postseason play at the facility and have won their last five postseason

The first Titan diamond was laid out to the west of Titan House, located to the southeast of the current stadium. Home plate was in the southeast corner of the field plowed out of the citrus groves. A new field was built around 1970 on today's site, but with home plate located where the current left field foul pole rises. The largest crowd to see a game at that field, with small portable bleachers and plenty of standing room, was estimated at 5,000 in 1979, when Fullerton hosted the University of Hawai'i and heralded pitcher Derek

The most recent facelift to the facility came in August of 2004 when the playing surface of Goodwin field was completely renovated. The grass was removed and about 12 inches of topsoil was reworked to provide a smoother, more durable baseball playing field. Irrigation and drainage were also updated.

Prior to that, a larger-scale \$3 million project was completed just before opening day 2001. The



stadium's seating capacity was expanded from 1,750 to nearly 3,500 and for the first time, the stadium included an on-site clubhouse-style building, which connects to the adjoining softball stadium. The clubhouse includes locker rooms, coach's offices, umpire quarters and a VIP viewing and entertainment area. The stadium's name was officially changed from Titan Field to Goodwin Field (in honor of benefactors Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin) in a ceremony prior to the Titans' game against Long Beach State on April

Thanks in part to the extensive renovations and a commitment by the university to transform the field into a state-of-the-art facility, the NCAA has named Goodwin Field as a regional site in four of the past five seasons. Fullerton also hosted Super Regionals in 2001, 2003 and 2004. The Titans had been on the road for the first 21 Regional appearances in their history and had qualified for more College World Series appearances (10) by winning on the road than any other school. When Fullerton hosted Mississippi State in its first home Super Regional in June of 2001, consecutive then-sellout crowds of 3,412 cheered the Titans on as they swept the Bulldogs to clinch a CWS berth in front of a home crowd for the first time.

Goodwin Field is also home to the prestigious Kia Baseball Bash, which will mark its sixth annual tournament in 2005. The three-day round-robin event is considered one of the best tournaments in the country. Of the 20 teams that have competed in the tournament over the last five years, 11 have reached the Super Regionals and six have advanced to the College World Series.

Goodwin Field has had several other renovations over the years. Its playing surface sported a brand new look for the 1996 season, thanks in part to the efforts of the Sports Turf Managers Association led by Steve Guise. The organization donated materials and labor in rebuilding the pitcher's mound and batters' box, along with planting new grass in the outfield. Turface was added to the warning track. Additional landscaping has been placed on the outside of Goodwin Field, including palm trees along the batting cages in left field.






Head Coach 9th Season 356-154-1 Cal State Fullerton (1978)

After five conference championships and four trips to the College World Series, two-time National Coach of the Year (2003 Baseball America and 2004 Collegiate Baseball and ACBA) George Horton added last year to his extensive resume the only credential lacking since becoming the Titan head coach ... a national title. At the helm of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program, Horton, 51, guided his Titans to their fourth NCAA National Championship, by defeating the Texas Longhorns and his mentor, former Titan Head Coach Augie Garrido, 3-2, at Rosenblatt Stadium in Omaha, Neb.

Since taking over for Garrido on Sept. 4, 1996, after six years as Garrido's associate head coach, Horton has led the Titans to a 356-154-1 overall record. They have been a constant in the national Top 25 polls, briefly ascending to the top spot in 1999, 2001 and 2003 before claiming a unanimous No. 1 spot following the title in 2004. Horton's .698 winning percentage is eighth-best among active Division I coaches (minimum five years). Of the 29 teams – many of which are nationally prominent – that Horton has faced five or more times, only two (Stanford and Wichita State) have managed winning records against Fullerton.

Horton himself couldn't even imagine the comeback the Titans would produce in 2004. The team started out a dismal (for Fullerton standards) 15-16 through the first 31 games, falling out of the Top 25 polls completely for 6 straight weeks (3/8-4/12).

In Horton's attempt to right the ship, he enlisted Sports Psychologist Dr. Ken Ravizza to come clear the heads of the slumping Titans. And, in storybook fashion, the Titans flushed away their problems and went on to finish an all-time best 19-2 in the Big West while winning 27 of their next 32 games to reach the College World Series for the 13th time in their history. In Omaha, Horton's Titans jumped out to

a 2-0 record before a powerful South Carolina team gave them their only loss at the CWS. Fullerton rebounded from the loss and took the next three games including a 2-game sweep of No.1 seed Texas in the championship series.

The three-time Big West Conference Coach of the Year has been at his best in series play. Heading into 2005, Fullerton owns a 91-23 (.798) overall record in three-game regular-season series and the Titans have won 57 of 68 (.838) Big West Conference series. Fullerton has been swept just five times while the Titans have recorded 49 series sweeps. Perhaps an even bigger credit to Coach Horton has been his success on the road: the Titans have won 30 of Horton's 34 conference series away from Goodwin Field.

Horton, who is one of nine men to have appeared in Omaha as a player (1975) and a head coach, has seen 52 Titans selected in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft during his tenure, including nine in 2001, 11 in 2003 and six in 2004. Aaron Rowand was a "sandwich" pick in 1998, Adam Johnson was the second overall selection in 2000, Chad Cordero was the 20th overall pick in the 2003 amateur draft and battery mates Kurt Suzuki and Jason Windsor were taken in the second and third rounds, respectively, on the first day of last year's draft. Already, nine former Titans who played under the Horton regime have ascended to the Major Leagues, including the latest, Cordero, who jumped to the bigs just two months after leading the Titans at the College World Series in 2003.

Horton scripted a brilliant season in 2003, guiding the Titans to one of their best starts in program history (15-1) and leading them to a program-best record of 31-3 at Goodwin Field. After sweeping through the Regional at Goodwin Field, the Titans beat Arizona State – the top offensive team in the country – in a Super Regional to advance to Omaha for the 12th time in their history. Fullerton quickly shot out to a 2-0 record in Omaha before Stanford knocked off the Titans twice en route to the championship series. Nonetheless, the Titans finished as the consensus No. 3 team in the nation for the second time in three years. For the Titans' efforts, Horton was named the National Coach of the Year by Baseball America, the highest reputed baseball publication. He was honored in December at the 2003 Baseball Winter Meetings in New Orleans.

Horton's Titans also carried the Fullerton flag to Omaha in 2001, when they secured a berth at home for the first time and carried the national No. 1 seed to Rosenblatt Stadium. After holding off local favorite Nebraska in the opener, the Titans lost a pair to Stanford with a win over Tulane sandwiched in between. The Titans finished No. 3 in all three national polls. Under Horton's eye, the 2001 squad posted several memorable moments during the regular season as well. They won 24 of 25 over one stretch and became the first team ever to sweep a three-game series

against eventual national champion Miami at Mark Light Stadium.

The 2000 Titans, the unanimous preseason pick to win the conference and the consensus No. 2 team in the country, had a two-game lead on Nevada with three games to go in the Big West race. But the Wolf Pack swept Pacific in the final series and Fullerton lost two of three to Long Beach State, so the Titans had to settle for a co-championship. However, the Titans did host a regional for the first time, which was won by USC.

In 1999, the Titans went 25-5 to win the BWC by four games. They swept three games at the Notre Dame Regional and then overcame an assortment of disadvantages to triumph in three games in the Super Regional at Ohio State to qualify for the school's tenth College World Series, where they went 1-2.

In 1998, the Titans used a remarkably balanced squad to start strong and then dominate the Big West Conference regular season with a 25-5 record. But they stumbled at home in the Big West Tournament and then ran into a powerful buzz saw in Baton Rouge in the NCAA Regionals, placing second at 3-2 with a pair of losses to the host LSU Tigers.

In Horton's debut season in 1997, the Titans struggled to a 23-19-1 start, but then rattled off 15 victories in their final 18 regular season games. They lost the opener of the Big West Conference post-season tournament at home to Pacific ace Dan Reichert, but then came back to win four games in a row at Blair Field. They swept a doubleheader on the final day against host Long Beach State to capture the automatic NCAA tournament bid. At Stanford, the Titans went 1-2 to place third, losing to Santa Clara and Fresno State.

Horton fulfilled a lifelong dream of being a Division I head coach when he was promoted to replace Garrido, who left to take over the program at the University of Texas. A 1978 CSF graduate, Horton had returned to the campus in 1991 when Garrido came back after a three-year stint at Illinois. In the next six years the Titans posted a 264-99 record and made three trips to the CWS, winning the 1995 crown with a phenomenal 57-9 season. Horton had input on virtually every aspect of the Fullerton program with his primary concern being the development of the pitching staff. His organizational skills, patience as a teacher and his attention to detail provided the backbone of the Titan coaching staff.

During the years Horton was responsible for the pitching staff, nine pitchers received All-America honors and James Popoff (1992), Matt Wagner (1994) and Ted Silva (1995) won Big West Conference Pitcher of the Year honors. Dan Naulty became the first Titan pitcher under Horton's guidance to reach the major leagues when he made the 1996 opening-day roster for the Minnesota Twins. He later earned a World Series ring in 1999 with the Yankees. Another Horton product, Brent Billingsley, made two appearances for the Florida Marlins early in the 1999 season. Eleven more of Horton's former pupils – both pitchers and position players – have ascended to the Major League ranks over the last few years.

Horton also worked with Phil Nevin (San Diego Padres), who in 1992 was the Golden Spikes Award winner, *Baseball America* player of the year, baseball's No. 1 draft pick (by Houston) and the College World Series MVP. Nevin has gone on to a successful pro career as have former Horton pupils Mark Kotsay (Oakland A's), Mike Lamb (Houston Astros), Aaron Rowand (Chicago White Sox) Brandon Duckworth (Houston), Matt Wise (Milwaukee) and Reed Johnson (Toronto Blue Jays).

Kotsay and Nevin along with Brian Loyd and Jason Moler – all tutored in part by Horton – were Olympians and Kotsay was chosen the college player of the decade by *Baseball America*.

Horton began his head coaching career at Cerritos College in Norwalk, where he guided the Falcons to three junior college state championships in six years. He compiled a 226-53 record and won the California titles in 1985, 1987 and 1989. Each of those years he was selected National Junior College Coach of the Year. His best season was 1987 when the Falcons went 46-5. He had a South Coast Conference record of 102-28 (.785) and was a four-time South Coast Conference Coach of the Year (1985, 1987, 1989 and 1990).

He had many players graduate to the major leagues including Brian Hunter, who played for the Atlanta Braves in the 1991 World Series. Other names include Mike Benjamin, Craig Worthington, Ever Magallanes, Al Osuna, Joel Adamson, Dan Patterson, Luis Medina, Jeff Hearron, Naulty and Olympian and major leaguer Bret Barberie.

Horton was a player on the Cerritos College teams in 1972 and 1973. As the Falcons' team captain in 1973, he won the Dallas Moon Award



and was a member of the state championship team. Horton played two seasons for Garrido at Cal State Fullerton in 1975 and 1976 and won All-PCAA honors as both a junior and a senior. He was on the first Fullerton team to go to the College World Series in 1975. He batted .308 as a junior and .290 as a senior while playing first base. He graduated in 1978 and went on to earn a master's degree in 1980 at Cal Lutheran.


Horton's coaching career began as an assistant at Cerritos in 1976-77 and he went to Los Angeles Valley College the following three seasons where he coached with former Long Beach State Coach Dave Snow. In 1980, he moved back to Cerritos as an assistant to Gordie Douglas before taking the head job in 1985. In addition, he coached during the summer for the Fairbanks Goldpanners (1981 and 1983) in Alaska and the Hutchinson Broncs (1982) in Kansas. A few famous names played for him on those summer teams such as Shane Mack, Oddibe McDowell, Joe Magrane, Dan Plesac, Phil Stevenson, Roger Clemens and Barry Bonds.

In 1994, Horton was inducted into the California Community College Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame. He was also inducted into the Downey High School Hall of Fame in May of 2003. Horton will be honored this year with the Orange County Manager of the Year award given by the Orange Coast Chapter of the Society for Advancement of Management.

Horton was born on Oct. 5, 1953. The Yorba Linda resident and his wife, Francie, have four daughters: Michele (25), Heather (21), Loyal (16) and Rebecca (14), and two granddaughters: Angelica (5) and Alyssa (3).

Rick Vanderhook is in his 19th season as an assistant coach for the Titans. He will again coach the outfielders and hitters and will also take on a new responsibility by running the offense from his standard post in the third base coaching box. He is also a key evaluator of talent in the recruiting process and is the director of Titan Baseball Camps.

"Hook" has coached four first-round draft picks (Mike Harkey in 1987, Phil Nevin in 1992, Dante Powell in 1994 and Mark Kotsay in 1996) and a supplemental pick (Aaron Rowand in 1998) as well as 15 All-Americans since 1991. He also played a key role in the development of 2003 and 2004 Big West Conference Players of the Year Shane Costa and Kurt Suzuki, each of whom was selected in the second round of the draft by Kansas City and Oakland, respectively.

As camp director, Vanderhook oversees all aspects of the Titan Baseball Academy, which helps young players (7 to 17-years-old) reach their top performance level. Among the graduates of Titan camps are former Titans Steve Chatham, Rowand, Darric Merrell, Kyle Boyer, Jason Corapci and current pitcher Dustin Miller.

Vanderhook, 41, first coached at Cal State Fullerton from 1985 to 1988. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third-base coaching box in 1987 and began working with the hitters and defense a year later. In 20 seasons with the Titans as a player and a coach, Vanderhook has been to the College World Series nine times and won it three times.

Vanderhook spent 1989 and 1990 with Coach Bill Kernen at Cal State Northridge. In 1990, the Matadors posted a 39-22 record and were the NCAA Division II runners-up. Vanderhook returned to Fullerton, along with Head Coach Augie Garrido, prior to the 1991 season.

Vanderhook has coached some of the most explosive Titan offenses in the program's history. The 1999 Titans, who made the school's 10th College World Series appearance, set school records for single-season batting average (.338) and runs per game (9.2). He also helped fine tune the 2003 squad, which was 10th in the nation in hitting (.329), 20th in scoring (7.9 runs per game) and among the top 30 in doubles and triples per game.

Vanderhook has also coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and helped the Goldpanners finish third in the nation in 1986.

A product of the prominent Cerritos College program where he played for George Horton, Vanderhook originally came to Cal State Fullerton in 1983 and redshirted his first season with the Titans before becoming a member of the Titans' 1984 national championship team.




He currently resides in Yorba Linda with his wife, April, daughters Noelle (9) and Autumn (7) and son R.J., who will turn 5 in April.

Jason Gill is a former All-Big West Conference infielder for the Titans and he returns for his second stint on the coaching staff, replacing former assistant coach/recruiting coordinator Dave Serrano. Gill, 32, will handle the first base coaching duties as well as work with the hitters and infielders.

Gill, who began his coaching career at Cal State Fullerton as a manager on the 1995 National Championship squad, spent the last three seasons as an assistant coach with the Big West Conference rival UC Irvine Anteaters, working with the infielders and being heavily involved with the program's recruiting efforts. UC Irvine's first recruiting class was ranked eighth by Baseball America and the following two classes were among the top 30 according to Collegiate Baseball.

Prior to UCI, Gill was an assistant coach at Loyola Marymount of the West Coast Conference. He helped guide the Lions to WCC titles in 1999 and 2000, earning postseason berths in both years. He also served two years as an assistant coach at Nevada (1997-98).

Gill played one season for the Titans in 1994 after spending the first two years of his collegiate career at Cuesta College and his junior season at Cal State Dominguez Hills. He hit .345 with 13 RBI while starting 43 games as a senior third baseman, helping the Titans to a 47-16 overall record and a berth in the College World Series.



Former Cal State Fullerton All-America right-hander Ted Silva, 30, starts his collegiate coaching career with the Titans as the Volunteer Assistant Coach helping skipper George Horton with the pitchers.

Silva has been an instructor for numerous clinics and summer league teams over the years and spent last season as an assistant coach in charge of pitching at Villa Park High School.

Silva, a 21st round draft selection in 1995, spent five years in the Texas Rangers organization following his brilliant collegiate career. He spent one season pitching overseas in Taiwan and parts of another pitching in the independent Atlantic League.


Silva played three seasons for the Titans from 1993-95, helping Fullerton to its third National Championship during his junior year. Silva led the nation in victories in 1995, posting an 18-1 overall record with a 2.83 ERA and 142 strikeouts in 152 2/3 innings. The 18 wins are also a school single-season record.

In the College World Series, he pitched the Titans to a pair of wins - over Stanford in the tournament opener and USC in the championship game - and earned a spot on the All-Tournament Team - one of four Titans to earn the honor.


He was named a first-team All-American by the American Baseball Coaches Association, Collegiate Baseball, Baseball America, and the Greater Houston Sports Association.

In 1994, Silva represented the Titans on Team USA and was a secondteam All-American according to Collegiate Baseball. He finished the year with a 4-4 record for the Titans with a 2.29 ERA and 13 saves - a total which ranks third on the school's single-season charts.

Silva was the 1995 Big West Pitcher of the Year and was a first-team all-conference selection during his sophomore and junior seasons. He finished his Titan career with a 26-7 overall record with a 2.92 ERA and 26 saves, which ranks third in Titan baseball history.







Long-time Orange County baseball supporter Todd Rogers is in his second year as the Director of Baseball Operations at Cal State Fullerton

In his role, he coordinates the Titans' travel plans and oversees special activities, such as the 2004 championship banquet and alumni weekend.

Rogers has coached youth sports for 25 years and spent several years with the Placentia Mustangs 14-and-under travel team. During his time with the Mustangs, the team won three national AAU championships. Rogers also served on the booster club for El Dorado High School's baseball team and ran the National Classic at Goodwin Field.

Rogers has also been involved in the restaurant business and previously owned Homer's, the popular Titan "hang-out" located just a mile from

Rogers, 40, lives in Placentia.

- ♦ TOURNEY TALK: The Titans have made 26 NCAA Regional appearances in their 30-year Division I history and have not missed the playoffs since 1991. Their 13-year run is the fifth-longest active streak in the nation. Only Miami (32), Florida State (27), Clemson (18) and LSU (16) have longer streaks. Fullerton has advanced to Omaha 13 times, with College World Series titles in 1979, 1984, 1995 and 2004.
- ◆ PREDICTIONS: Baseball America has looked into their crystal balls and predicted that Cal State Fullerton will repeat as Big West Conference champions again in 2005 in their annual conference preview. They have the Titans coming out on top with Long Beach State and Cal Poly in tow, and all three teams heading to postseason play. Junior lefty Ricky Romero's name was thrown around quite a bit as he was predicted to be Pitcher of the Year as well as one of the Big West's Top prospects in the 2005 MLB Draft. The publication also named Titan freshman Jared Clark and junior Trevor Mortenson as Top Newcomers to the conference with Clark as the Freshman of the Year. Juniors Justin Turner, Danny Dorn, and Romero along with senior Ronnie Prettyman were all predicted to make the all-conference team.
- ♦ REPEAT OF 2004?: In a preseason survey of 160 Div. I head coaches by Baseball America, 21 said that Cal State Fullerton would repeat their 2004 performance and win the 2005 College World Series. The Titans finished second in voting behind Texas who got 47 votes (almost 30 percent of the votes), including one from Titans skipper George Horton. Stanford's team came in third place with 20 votes.



With official practice beginning in January, what some consider "the off season," comes to a close. But there has been no "off season" for the Cal State Fullerton baseball coaching staff. With a whirlwind of awards ceremonies, public appearances and interviews, Head Coach George Horton has hardly had time to sit down and take in what winning his first National Championship has meant.

"I do know that having won the national championship means the target on our back has gotten a little bit bigger," Horton said, "but we welcome that challenge and we expect to be right back in the hunt."

The experts at both Collegiate Baseball and Baseball America seem to agree the Titans have another shot at getting back to the College World Series as both have ranked them

Horton filled the vacant posts with a couple more former Titan players in Jason Gill and Ted Silva. Gill will serve as recruiting coordinator, taking over for Serrano in that capacity, while coaching first base. Silva, the volunteer assistant coach, will work primarily with the

"We've redefined the roles within the coaching

staff," Horton said, "How well and how soon we (as a team) adapt to the change will be the key to our success."

Horton will go back to being in charge of the pitching and catching, a position he held as associate head coach under Augie Garrido. 18-year veteran Assistant Coach Rick Vanderhook will take over the reins of the offense and will remain in charge of the outfielders. Gill will in turn be working with the infielders, the spot formerly held by Horton. Both Vanderhook and Gill will

tackle the hitting duties together.

Horton added, "We have a good balance of baseball personality on the staff, and I expect that this transition will work out just fine. All of the coaches are very capable of handling their roles."

On the field, the Titans are virtually the same team that was in Omaha last June. They will be returning 25 players from last year's squad, losing only four to the draft. The problem is, those four players could be defined as the heart and soul of the 2004 team.

"In college athletics you are always going to have to replace your leadership, as they are typically your juniors and seniors, but the four guys we lost to the draft were special. On top

No. 3 in their preseason polls. And, if the 2005 squad can prove them right, it would be historic for Cal State Fullerton.

"Our long-term goals are definitely centered around getting back to Omaha and winning another championship." Horton said. "This year's squad has a chance to do some special things. If we are fortunate enough to get back there, it will be the first time our program has gone three years in a row."

And if the Titans can back up their 2004 performance with another national championship, it will not only be their first time winning back-to back titles in their history, but it will be the first time they will have made it back to Omaha after such a feat.



of being exceptional athletes, they are good human beings," Horton commented on the loss of standouts Kurt Suzuki, Jason Windsor, P.J. Pilittere and Mike Martinez.

"Though we are going to miss those guys immensely, I feel good about this year's group of young men. There is good talent and good leadership."

INFIELD

Third-year players Justin Turner and Ronnie Prettyman all but have their names written on the lineup card at second and third base, respectively. Both bring to the table the hard-nosed skill set that Cal State Fullerton players are known for. Both handle the bat extremely well and are able to put the ball in play. Both can also bunt and run the bases well. Turner and Prettyman are exceptional with their gloves and should they stay healthy, are both capable of providing a spark to this potentially potent lineup.

Again Blake Davis and Neil Walton will be fighting for time at shortstop. Walton finished up the year starting 17 of the last 19 games providing valuable defense down the stretch, but hit only .237 to Davis' .295.

"Both are very capable players, but if we had to choose right now, based on their performance in the Fall, Davis would be our guy," Horton said of the dogfight at short.

Brett Pill is the front-runner for the job at first base with the departure of Pilittere and Suzuki, who combined to handle most of the work there last season. Pill will definitely try to capitalize on having more consistent playing time with a regular spot in the lineup. However, don't count out All-Big West Honorable Mention honoree Felipe Garcia, who will be waiting in the wings.

Garcia, who earned a spot on the College World Series All-Tournament Team for his performance in Omaha, will get his at bats as the designated hitter, but with the depth of talent on this 2005 squad, he may need to do a little fighting of his own to stay in the lineup.

OUTFIELD

As with all the positions on the 2005 team, the depth chart in the outfield is two, sometimes three, players deep. Danny Dorn, Freshman All-American Clark Hardman, and Bobby Andrews look to be the frontrunners to start the season in left, center and right field, respectively, against Stanford come Feb. 4. But that leaves talented outfielders like Sergio Pedroza, an All-Big West Honorable Mention selection as a sophomore in 2004; Brandon Tripp, Joe Turgeon, J.D. McCauley, and Trevor Mortensen looking for an opening.

Mortensen, who was in the Titan program from 2002-03, spent last season at Santa Ana College to get some playing time. He could very possibly find his way into the lineup as he can fill a role the Titans have been looking for since David Bacani left ... that of a true leadoff hitter.

"We wanted him back because of his potential at the top of the order. He's a base-stealer with doubles and home run power," Horton said of Mortensen. "He is a definite candidate for the lead-off roll if he can make the starting lineup."



CATCHER

"Our only unproven commodity is the catcher's position," Horton said. "John Curtis is ready, and he will get the first crack at it."


The Titans have eight catchers on their roster (not counting Pedroza who got some time behind the dish in the fall, but has moved strictly to the outfield this season), but Fullerton will likely only look seriously two to three deep in 2005. Waiting in the wings behind Curtis are redshirt freshmen Jon Wilhite and Vance Otake.

PITCHING

Preseason All-American Ricky Romero will lead the staff after a brilliant sophomore campaign. Romero finished 2004 with a 14-4 record and a 3.37 ERA in 155 innings. Romero along with departed Windsor and Martinez took the brunt of the innings last year pitching and will look for some help in 2005.

Fullerton will look to balance out the staff just a bit with a number of arms vying for the other two weekend starting spots. The Saturday spot looks like it will be filled by junior lefthander Ryan Schreppel. The bullpen didn't take too kindly to Schreppel's ERA in 2004. After going 5-3, 2.45 ERA as a starter his freshman year, his ERA jumped to 6.03 last season splitting his time between starting and relieving. He will look to get back on track with a more consistent schedule as the Saturday starter.

The Sunday spot is still up for grabs. Freshman righty Jared Clark is in the mix for that job. Clark, who prepped at Valencia High School, "is a power pitcher with a fastball in the low 90's with a very good change up," Horton explained. Just on his heels are senior southpaw Scott

Sarver, sophomore Nolan Bruyninckx and freshmen Cory Arbiso, Adam Jorgenson, and Brian Stevens.

The Titan coaching staff will look to regain some confidence in a bullpen that didn't prove itself until it was forced to the brink of elimination in last season's regional.

Some fresh faces as well as some bullpen veterans will look to turn it around. Lauren Gagnier and Vinnie Pestano will be battling with Wes Roemer, Dave Pherrin, John Estes, Jeff Soulages and Clark Hardman for relief innings.

"Roemer has been our most consistent freshman to date. We are looking to groom him as our closer, which has been a pretty prominent role in our program. That is giving him a lot of praise at this point of the season," Horton said.

THE SCHEDULE

The Titans again have a challenging schedule laid out ahead of them. Only this year, a majority of the games will be played at Goodwin Field.

Fullerton will play a total of 56 regular season games with 31 of them on its home turf. Of those home games, 15 will be played against Top 25 programs and 20 of them against Top 40 schools.

"We've got as competitive of a schedule as we've ever had, only this year we have a lot of those games here at home," Horton said. "Stanford, Tulane, Arizona and Long Beach State all have a chance at being a legitimate Top 10 team in my opinion."

The Titans open defense of their title on Feb. 4 versus long-time nemesis Stanford before moving right into a weekend series with Fresno State.

Fullerton will then make its first road trip to Las Vegas to take on an improved UNLV squad before heading home for the annual Kia Bash, which features Nevada, local rival UCLA, and last year's tournament champion, Oklahoma. The Sooners are skippered by former Titan head coach Larry Cochell, who piloted the Fullerton to a pair of Omaha trips in three-years.

The following weekend, the Titans will take off for New Orleans to take on Tulane, which is ranked No. 1 on Baseball America's preseason poll.

TOP OF THE WORLD: The Titans, making one of the most dramatic turnarounds in program history, clinched their fourth NCAA National Championship after opening the season 15-16, sweeping the two-game championship series from Texas and former Head Coach Augie Garrido by the scores of 6-4 and 3-2.

UNLUCKY 13? NAH...: Cal State Fullerton clinched its 13th trip to Omaha in its 13th consecutive postseason appearance on June 13. The Titans had a pair of pitchers win at least 13 games, and the number of letters in "Omaha, Nebraska" and "Titan Baseball" add up to... yes, that's right, 13. At Rosenblatt Stadium, the Titans were assigned radio booth No. 13 for the entire tournament. Ricky Romero won his 13th game of the season to put an end to Miami's 13-game winning streak and got help from 13 Titan hits in a 6-3 win. The "Titan House," a place for Titan fans to gather and watch the games, was located across the street from Rosenblatt on 13th Street.

TITANS IN THE DRAFT: Former Titans Jason Windsor, Kurt Suzuki, P.J. Pilittere, and Mike Martinez join a long list of former Fullerton standouts to move on professional careers. Suzuki and Windsor will get the chance to continue as battery mates after the duo was selected by Oakland in the second and third rounds, respectively. Martinez was an eighth round selection of the Yankees and may be throwing to former teammate P.J. Pilittere, who was also taken by the Bronx Bombers in the 13th round.

ALL-AMERICAN BOYS: Jason Windsor and Kurt Suzuki may have to build larger mantels above their fireplaces after all the accolades hoisted upon them by various organizations. Windsor was named a second-team All-American by three publications (Baseball America, Collegiate Baseball, and the ABCA) and the first team of another (College Baseball Insider.com). Suzuki earned first-team honors from Baseball America, Collegiate Baseball, the ABCA, and College Baseball Insider. com, as well as second-team honors from the NCBWA and Sports Weekly. In addition, rookie Clark Hardman was named a Freshman All-American by both Collegiate Baseball and Baseball America.


TITANS BIG TIME ON BIG WEST LIST:

Cal State Fullerton pulled off the trifecta in 2004, winning the Big West Player (Kurt Suzuki), Co-Pitcher (Jason Windsor), and Coach of the Year Awards for the first time, coincidentally, since the 1995 National Championship season. 



WINS FOR WINDSOR: Jason Windsor closed out his final collegiate season with the College World Series Most Outstanding Player Award after tossing a pair of complete-game victories and earning a save. It was what fans had come to expect from the Titans' ace as Windsor finished out the year by winning his final 12 consecutive starts and posting a 5-0 record with a 0.61 ERA in the postseason.

SARVER COMES THROUGH: Not bad for a month's rest. Junior lefty Scott Sarver, who entered the postseason having not pitched in almost a month, tossed perhaps the two biggest games of his career to help the Titans to the national title. With Fullerton facing elimination in the regionals, Sarver tossed a complete-game six-hitter against Pepperdine in a 15-1 Titans' victory to force a second game for the regional title. Just when it couldn't get any better, Sarver stepped in on college baseball's grandest stage, throwing six-plus innings, scattering five hits and striking out seven as the Titans eliminated South Carolina with a 4-0 victory. The starts were the first two of the season for the junior and the 15 innings in the postseason accouted for almost half of his final season total (37.1).

PILL'S POSITIVE IN A PINCH: No offense to "Kurt Klutch," but fans may be looking for a catchy nickname for Brett Pill if this keeps up. In true clutch fashion, Pill came up with maybe two of the biggest hits of the year for the Titans against Long Beach State on May 21 and in the title-clinching game against Texas on June 27. With Fullerton down to its final strike against Jered Weaver, Pill delivered a double to left-center to set up the game-tying run in a contest the Titans would win 2-1 in 10 innings. Then, against the Longhorns, Pill's RBI triple down the left field line jumpstarted a three-run Titans' rally as Fullerton defeated Texas, 3-2, for the trophy.

RED, WHITE & BLUE: Titan southpaw Ricky Romero donned a different set of stripes for the summer, dashing straight from the various College World Series celebrations for USA National Team duties. In five starts, Romero went 3-1 with a 1.57 ERA, allowing just five earned runs on 13 hits in 28.2 innings. Opponents hit just .137 against him while striking out 30 times. He was a member of the gold medal-winning team at the FISU World University Baseball Championships, winning a pair of games against Taipei and allowing just six hits and striking out 12 in 13 innings.

BEST IN THE BUSINESS: Head Coach George Horton was recognized by his peers once again in 2004, voted as the National Coach of the Year by Collegiate Baseball after earning the same award from Baseball America a season earlier. Also honored as the Big West Coach fo the Year for the third time in his career, Horton's .698 winning percentage (356-154-1) is eighth-best among active Division I coaches (minimum five seasons).







History and Records

◆ In the Beginning 1964 thru 1974

Titan baseball began in the most modest of fashions as a club team in 1964. The founding father was University physical plant employee Beryl Kempton, who carved a diamond out of an orange grove, literally establishing the foundation for what has become arguably the most successful facet of a University now in its fifth decade and educating more than 30,000 students each semester.

Home plate of the first diamond was located near an old orchard residence, the John Hetebrink House built in 1886, which has served a variety of functions for the campus and now houses athletic department offices. The first-base line ran north and the third-base line went to the west paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive.

The first coach was Warren Beck, a physical education faculty member who gave way to Bill Fulton when the team assumed intercollegiate status in 1965. The Titans played at the College Division as members of the California Collegiate Athletic Association along with Cal Poly SLO, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona. The Titans had limited resources and were competitive at best until the arrival for the 1973 season of Coach Augie Garrido from Cal Poly SLO.

A new backstop and batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools. His first season's record was 19-33-1 and it would be the Titans' last losing season. The Titans won the CCAA championship with a 39-11-1 season in 1974 and the stage was set for Division I play.

New Bully in the Neighborhood 1975 thru 1984

Garrido's Titans made an instant splash in 1975 as a little fish in the biggest pond. They captured the Pacific Coast Athletic Association championship and then served notice by snapping USC's string of five consecutive national titles by winning their first NCAA regional tournament at Dedeaux Field. They earned their first trip to the College World Series where they were quickly eliminated by losses to Arizona State and Oklahoma. Pitcher Dan Boone, catcher Andy Pasillas and first baseman George Horton were key players that year and initiated a pipeline into the fertile California junior college ranks.

The Titans were dominant in the regular season for nine more years, running their string of conference championships to 11 in a row. They won the PCAA in 1976 and won every Southern California Baseball Association pennant through its 1977 to 1984 run. And in the post-season they proved their mettle against regional and national competition despite always playing on the road.

In 1976 they took Washington State to a final game in Pullman and in 1977 they lost to the Cougars again in Tempe. USC and Arizona were their nemesis in 1978 in Los Angeles but the Titans struck paydirt in 1979 in Fresno. After an opening loss to UCLA, they came back to beat Portland and Fresno State before sweeping a Sunday doubleheader with the Bruins to earn a return trip

to Omaha. There they repeated the championship formula, falling immediately into the losers' bracket with a loss to Mississippi State before rolling through Connecticut, Arizona, Arkansas, Pepperdine and Arkansas again to win the first NCAA Div. I men's championship in school history. First baseman Tim Wallach was the College Player of the Year, pitcher Tony Hudson was the MVP of the CWS and Dave Weatherman hurled a complete-game 2-1 victory in the championship game on no day's rest.

The Titans would return to Omaha twice more in the next five years and it would have been more



but for the strength of the western region in that era. In 1980 they went to the Tucson regional and Arizona went on to win the national title. In 1981 they went to Tempe and were ousted by the Sun Devils, the eventual national champs. Behind the play of Mike Rubel, Mark Pirruccello and freshman John Fishel, the Titans went through powerful Arizona State in Packard Stadium in 1982 to get

back to the World Series, which was now being televised nationwide on the new ESPN network. Unfortunately, the Titans left their game in Tempe and became the first CWS team to go scoreless in losses to Wichita State and Maine.

In 1983 the Titans were sent to Tempe for the third consecutive year and they were eliminated by Fresno State. But the Bulldogs had to sit and watch the next year as Fullerton won the 1984 regional over Mark McGwire's USC team and Chris Gwynn's San Diego State squad in well over 100-degree weather in Fresno. John Bryant's single in the 11th inning of the finale scored Bob Caffrey and the 8-7 win over the Aztecs sent Fullerton to Omaha for the fourth time in its 10 years of Div. I competition.

Bryant was a hero again in Omaha. After beating Michigan, Miami, Arizona State and Oklahoma State, the Titans used Bryant's triple for a 2-run rally that was the difference in a memorable 3-1 victory over Texas and gave the Titans their second NCAA championship. The Titans won 37 of their last 42 games. Fishel was the series MVP but 5-foot-7, 133-pound lefthander Eddie Delzer captured the

headlines in *Sports Illustrated* with his courageous 7-inning mound effort to get the win that was preserved by Scott Wright with his then NCAA record 22nd save. Caffrey would go on to become the first Titan Olympian and join Wallach as a first-round draft choice, also by Montreal.

A Couple of Blips on the Radar 1985 thru 1987

The Titans returned a solid nucleus for 1985 and ended up with a roster that featured seven players who would eventually play in the Major Leagues. But they failed to win the conference championship and the string of consecutive NCAA playoff appearances was snapped at 10 when they lost a PCAA playoff series at Fresno State and did not get an at-large berth with a 36-32-1 record.

The 1986 team wasn't much better, posting a 36-21 record that again left Fullerton out of the top spot in the standings and out of the NCAA Tourney. The 1987 team restored order with a 42-15 regular season record and an 18-3 PCAA championship mark. But the Titans stumbled in the post-season when sent out of the West for the first time. In New Orleans, they lost an improbable opening game to Southern and converted reliever Allan Ratliff in a 1-0 game in which the defensively-suspect Southern infielders had no chances. Mike Harkey and Larry Casian tossed shutouts to give Longo Garcia another start, vs. LSU. But the unlucky Garcia lost again, this time victimized by his fielder's mitt coming apart on what should have been a routine come-backer.

When Garrido left to accept a lucrative offer from University of Illinois Athletic Director Neale Stoner, who had hired him at Fullerton 15 years earlier, it appeared the Titans' national prominence was waning.

Cochell Does Even Better 1988 thru 1990

Well-traveled Larry Cochell replaced Garrido and a different style and approach still produced success similar to what Garrido had manufactured. The Titans won a pair of regional tournaments in unlikely spots - Mississippi State and Texas - to earn Fullerton its fifth and sixth trips to Omaha in Cochell's 3-year term.

The 1988 team looked like it might be a team of destiny. After a 5-6 start, Garrido's players adapted to the Cochell style. Despite a late-season slump after a 30-5 run, they ventured to Starkville for the NCAA playoffs. With reliever Paul Johnson turning in a clutch performance, the Titans twice beat the host Bull-

dogs and then posted a 5-run ninth inning capped by a two-out, three-run home run by Mike Ross to beat top-seeded Texas A&M. In Omaha, they took control of the revamped format with wins over Miami and Stanford behind Garcia and Mark Beck, But the Cardinal came back to beat both Titan aces on their way to the NCAA title.

Despite the presence of a pair of All-Americans in Brent Mayne and David Staton, the 1989 Titans struggled all year and finished at 30-27 for their worst Division I record ever. They finished in the second division of the standings at 10-11.

The 1990 team was picked to finish fifth in the renamed Big West Conference. When they began the year 9-9 there were stories printed that the Titan dynasty was over. It was still only a 18-16 team until back-to-back sweeps of Fresno State and UNLV sparked a 14-5 finish and a 13-5 record good enough to win the Big West and an NCAA berth. Behind two solid starts by righthander James Popoff, the Titans went 4-0 at the Austin regional, beating Texas twice. In Omaha, the Titans were stunned twice. They lost to Oklahoma State in a game that saw outfielder Rich Gonzales carried off the field after crashing into the steel wall in left field. And they lost in extra innings to The Citadel when a catcher took the mound and shut down a Titan rally.

♦ If You Build It, He Will Come...Back 1991 thru 1996

Cochell accepted a lucrative financial offer to go to Oklahoma and, with construction of a new field underway, Garrido returned from Illinois to launch the Titans' most successful decade yet. Baseball America would rank the program No. 3 for the decade behind only LSU and Miami.

It started in bitter disappointment. The 1991 team won 10 of its last 12 games to post a 34-22 record that the Titans thought was sufficient to earn an at-large NCAA berth considering the circumstances of Garrido's late return, the strength of schedule, playing at Amerige Park downtown and the strong finish. The team would have gotten the Big West's automatic bid as a Big West tri-champion, but Long Beach State lost its season finale to Pacific, leaving a 2-way tie with Fresno State that worked to the Bulldogs' advantage. An at-large berth was not forthcoming (the third-place 49ers got one) and Fullerton was left to focus its frustration on the 1992 opposition.

Led by juniors Phil Nevin and Jason Moler, the Titans christened their longawaited new stadium with a return to the national championship game. An overpowering performance at Baton Rouge - they outscored the opposition 35-3 - earned the Titans their seventh trip to Omaha. They beat Florida State twice and Miami two out of three times, the last time in a heavy rain shower, to get a shot at unbeaten and well-rested Pepperdine. Two schools located about 50 miles apart put on a classic show almost 2,000 miles away for a national CBS television audience with the Waves winning, 3-2, thanks to the pitching of Patrick Aheame, a home run by light-hitting shortstop Eric Ekdahl and a brilliant eighth-inning play by second baseman Steve Rodriguez. Nevin nevertheless earned MVP honors after being selected college Player of the Year. His also was the first name selected in the pro draft a week earlier. Both he and Moler were selected to the U.S. Olympic team and Nevin joined Wallach as a Golden Spikes Award winner.

The 1993 team couldn't overcome the losses to graduation and the pro draft. The Titans placed second in the Big West and twice lost to USC, whom they had beaten twice in the regular season, to be eliminated from the NCAA Regional in Austin and finish 35-19. It would turn out to be the only year Fullerton High School product D. C. Olsen would miss a trip to Omaha in four years in

In 1994, Fullerton staged an early season Anaheim Hilton & Towers Classic and it would be a preview of that season's College World Series. The Titans beat San Diego, Oklahoma and Georgia Tech in February and all but USD would be reunited in Omaha. Fullerton earned its eighth trip with a dramatic regional victory at Oklahoma State. The Titans had to beat Memphis in oppressive afternoon heat and humidity and then come back at night and beat a rested Cowboy team on its home field. A ninth-inning, 2-out pinch-hit single by Brian King tied the game and Robert Matos was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded to win it in the tenth.

Georgia Tech, with a quartet of future major leaguers – Brad Rigby, Nomar Garciaparra, Jason Varitek and Jay Payton – beat the weary Titans and Mike Parisi in the CWS opener, 2-0. Fullerton then pounded LSU for 11 runs in the first inning of a 20-6 victory and freshman Mark Kotsay drove in seven runs in a 10-3 win that eliminated Florida State and set up a rematch with the Yellowjackets. This one went extra innings with Garciaparra's home run the difference when the Titans couldn't score Dante Powell from third base with no outs in the bottom of the 12th and had to settle for third place.

A year later, the Titans were not denied as they compiled perhaps the best college season of all time. With Olympians Kotsay and Brian Loyd and future major leaguer Jeremy Giambi pacing the offense and Ted Silva and Kotsay anchoring the pitching staff, Fullerton went virtually wire to wire as the No. 1 team in the nation. They won everything in their reach - the Hilton Classic with Olsen the MVP; the Big West regular season; the Big West Tournament with Loyd the MVP; the regional at LSU with Jack Jones the MVP and the CWS behind MVP

Kotsay. They won their final 18 games to finish 57-9 and become the first No. 1 seed at Omaha to win the title. Kotsay won Fullerton's third Golden Spikes Award after batting a then school-record .422 with 21 homers and 90 RBI. To this day, Kotsay holds College World Series career records for batting average and slugging percentage.

The momentum continued into 1996. The Titans opened the year with a 38-4 record before hitting an inexplicable slump where they lost 12 of their final 19 games. Fullerton tumbled to fourth place in the Big West and was eliminated from the BWC tourney at home by UNLV, but still got an NCAA berth at Wichita State. Kotsay tied an NCAA record with nine RBI in a rout of Delaware and a victory over Rice set up a showdown with the host Shockers. Wichita State got a great pitching performance from tourney MVP Brandon Baird and Rice ended the Titans' season and Kotsay and Loyd's collegiate careers with a come-frombehind 13-10 decision. As part of its millenium edition, Baseball America selected Kotsay the college player of the decade.

♦ And the Beat Goes On 1997 thru 2002

Garrido left again for greener pastures, this time the historical program at Texas His former first baseman and associate head coach for six years, George Horton took over. Again, the program marched forward.

The 1997 team won 11 of its last 13 regular season games and then bounced back from an opening game loss to win the Big West Tournament, sweeping Long Beach State at Blair Field for an automatic NCAA bid. Good pitching and an aborted ninth-inning rally knocked the Titans out of the regional at Stanford. The 1998 squad reversed the pattern, winning the Big West regular season title but losing the tournament at home to Long Beach. They got sent to Baton Rouge for the third time in the decade and won two games before taking a big lead over the host Tigers behind pitching ace Benito Flores. But LSU flexed its muscles and came back to beat Fullerton twice.

The most productive Titan offense ever - .338 batting average and 9.2 runs per game - carried Cal State Fullerton back to Omaha in 1999. Again, the Titans advanced via the road, winning the Regional at Notre Dame and capturing the Super Regional at Ohio State. But the bats went quiet in Fullerton's 10th trip to Omaha, where they shared in the 50th Anniversary celebration. The Titans sandwiched a win over Texas A&M between losses to Stanford and Florida State en route to a fifth-place finish.

The Titans' 38 wins in 2000 marked their fewest since the 1993 campaign, but they still captured a share of the BWC championship. The season also marked the start of a \$3 million renovation to the Titans' facility, which saw its official name changed to Goodwin Field. With the complex's increased seating capacity, Fullerton finally was named to host an NCAA Regional after 22 on the road, but the second-seeded Titans couldn't get by red-hot USC. Adam Johnson was named BWC Pitcher of the Year after leading the nation in strikeouts and he was selected second overall in the MLB Draft.

After a sluggish start, the 2001 Titans traveled to Miami and became the first team ever to sweep the eventual national champion Hurricanes on their home turf at Mark Light Stadium. The sweep was the highlight in a stretch that saw the Titans go 24-1 and claim the No. 1 spot in the nation in one poll. Fullerton, seeded first in the nation for postseason play, won a Regional and Super Regional at Goodwin Field to clinch a CWS berth in front of a home crowd for the first time After beating sentimental favorite Nebraska in the CWS opener, Fullerton ran into Stanford, which beat the Titans twice, though Fullerton was able to sandwich in a win over Tulane. Senior Kirk Saarloos, who pitched the third no-hitter in Titan history, led a quartet of All-American pitchers.

The 2002 Titans thrived on pitching as usual, but Fullerton's offense was anemic more often than not. No Titan hit more than five home runs and the team total of 40 was the fewest since 1976. Despite fading down the stretch to finish tied for fourth in the conference, Fullerton earned its 11th consecutive NCAA berth. The Titans lost to Stanford and All-American Jeremy Guthrie – who earned it 13-inning complete-game win – in the Regional opener, came back to best San Jose State, but were ousted by Long Beach State, whom they met for the first time in NCAA postseason play. Wes Littleton was the only Titan to earn All-American honors, though Chad Cordero was again brilliant in the closer role, pacing the conference with 12 saves.

Fullerton won 15 of its first 16 games and went on to win 50 games for the second time under Coach Horton. The Titans, who went 31-3 at Goodwin Field, hovered in the top five in the country for nearly the entire season and

reached Omaha for the 12th time with a Super Regional win over Arizona State. The Titans shot out to a 2-0 record at the CWS before Stanford came out of the loser's bracket to beat the Titans twice and keep them out of the inaugural championship series. Fullerton had a record 12 players named all-conference and seven earned All-American honors. Shane Costa was named Big West Player of the Year and was selected in the second round of the draft. Chad Cordero was again an All-American and was pitching for the Montreal Expos just two months after the College World Series.

Completing one of the greatest turnarounds in the history of the program, the 2004 Titans closed out the season with a bang to clinch Cal State Fullerton's fourth NCAA baseball championship. Sitting at 15-16 on April 3, the Titans ran off 32 victories in their final 38 games, including a 2-0 Championship Series sweep of Texas and former skipper Augie Garrido. The Titans played catch-up in the Regionals, battling out of the losers' bracket to win the tournament, and then punched their ticket to Omaha for the 13th time after a two-game sweep of Tulane in the Super Regionals. After jumping out to a 2-0 start in Omaha, including a win over top-ranked Miami, the Titans were on the brink of elimination again after a loss to South Carolina. But a brilliant pitching performance by Scott

Sarver sent the Gamecocks packing and Cal State Fullerton nto the Championship Series against the Longhorns where Ricky Romero and Jason Windsor tossed gems to give the Titans the title. Fullerton had 11 players named to the All-Big West squads, including Player and Co-Pitcher of the Year honors for Kurt Suzuki and Jason Windsor, respectively. Windsor was named the College World Series' Most Outstanding Player and earned All-College World Series nods along with teammates Romero and Felipe Garcia. Romero spent the summer travelling with Team USA while Coach Horton was named Collegiate Baseball's National

Coach of the Year and Big West Coach of the Year honors. Suzuki (2nd Round) and Windsor (3rd Round) were both selections of the Oakland A's in the Major League Baseball Draft, joining teammates Mike Martinez (8th Round - Yankees), P.J. Pilittere (13th Round - Yankees), Ronnie Prettyman (28th Round - Brewers), and Felipe Garcia (48th Round - Red Sox).

History at a Glance

- ◆ Cal State Fullerton has won national championships in 1979, 1984, 1995 and again last year in 2004. The Titans started off a dismal 15-16 before rolling off 32 wins in their last 38 contests including a two-game sweep of Texas in the CWS Championship Series. The 2004 national championship was the first for Head Coach George Horton in his eight seasons as skipper of the Titans.
- ♦ Cal State Fullerton is one of only three schools (Arizona State and Florida State are the others) to have three Golden Spikes Award winners. The award is given annually by USA Baseball to the top amateur player in the nation. The Titans who won the award were Tim Wallach (1979), Phil Nevin (1992) and Mark Kotsay (1995).
- ◆ Cal State Fullerton is among the top five collegiate suppliers to Team USA. Ricky Romero represented Cal State Fullerton in 2004 and was a sparkling 3-1 with a 1.57 ERA in five starts for the red, white and blue. Wes Littleton, Shane Costa and Chad Cordero were all members of Team USA in 2002. Mark Kotsay and Brian Loyd represented Fullerton and the United States at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. In winning the bronze medal as part of Team USA, Kotsay and Loyd joined three other Titans who have been members of Olympic teams (Bob Caffrey in 1984 and Phil Nevin and Jason Moler in 1992).
- ♦ Thirty-nine Titans have gone on to play Major League Baseball. Three former Titans made their debuts in 2003, including Reed Johnson, who had a stellar rookie season with Toronto, and Chad Cordero, who was pitching for Montreal just two months after pitching in the College World Series.
- ♦ Cal State Fullerton is 108-55 (.663) in NCAA postseason play and is ranked in the top five all-time in winning percentage for teams that have played more than 100 postseason games.
- ♦ No school has made more trips to Omaha, Nebraska, and the College World Series by winning on the road. Cal State Fullerton has won 10 Regional titles and one Super Regional title on the road. The Titans' last three CWS berths (2001, 2003, 2004), however, have been clinched at Goodwin Field.
- ♦ In 30 years at the Division I level, the Titans have made it to the NCAA Tournament 26 times. Their current streak of 13 consecutive NCAA appearances is the fifth longest active streak in the nation. Only Miami (32), Florida St. (27), Clemson (18), and LSU (16) currently have more consecutive trips in the tournament.
- ◆ Chad Cordero became the ninth Titan to be selected in the first round of the Major League Baseball draft when Montreal selected him in June, 2003. Other Titans selected in the first round: Mark Kotsay (Florida, 1996), Tim Wallach (Montreal, 1979), Bob Caffrey (Montreal, 1984), Mike Harkey (Chicago Cubs, 1987), Brent Mayne (Kansas City, 1988), Phil Nevin (Houston, 1992), Dante Powell (San Francisco, 1994) and Adam Johnson (Minnesota, 2000).
- ♦ Cal State Fullerton has had 58 All-Americans and 134 first-team all-conference selections in its 30-year Division I history. CSF first joined the Pacific Coast Athletic Association in 1975 when it made the jump to Division I. The baseball conference was not in existence from 1977 to 1984 (CSF played in the SCBA), but returned in 1985. On July 1, 1988, the PCAA officially changed its name to the current Big West Conference.
- ◆ The Titans have never had a losing season in the 30-year history of the program at the Division I level and have never gone winless in 26 NCAA postseason tournament appearances.



2000

Thanks to a \$3 million renovation to the Titans' stadium,the NCAA names Cal State Fullerton as a regional host for the first time.

2001

The Titans win four championships: the Kia Baseball Bash, the Big West Conference title and Regional and Super Regional titles. They are also seeded No. 1 in the NCAA Tournament and for the first time, the Titans clinch a College World Series berth in front of a home crowd.

2003

The Titans win their first 22 games at home and finish the campaign with a 31-3 record at Goodwin Field.



2004

After starting the season at 15-16, the 2004 Titans make an

improbable turn for the better that sees them win 32 of their last 38 to bring home the school's fourth national title and first for Head Coach George Horton.





Notes on Titans in the Pros

- ◆ Chad Cordero was the last Expo to pitch in Montreal's Olympic Stadium before the team was moved by Major League Baseball to Washington D.C He pitched the top of the ninth inning against the Florida Marlins on Sept. 29, 2004, striking out 2 of the four batters he faced. The Expos lost 9-1.
- ♦ Dann Howitt got the last hit allowed by Nolan Ryan a grand slam home run.
- ◆ Andre David hit a home run in his first major league at bat.
- ◆ Greg Mathews started game one of the 1987 World Series (10/21/87) for the St. Louis Cardinals. He went 3.2 innings against the Twins before giving way to reliever Bob Forsch who eventually got the win.
- ◆ Dan Boone is a distant relative of the fabled frontiersman.
- ♦ Tim Wallach made the National League All-Star team five times in his 17-year career.
- Andy and Jose Mota are sons of former Major League outfielder and Los Angeles Dodgers Coach Manny Mota.
- ♦ Harkey, Schooler, Turner, Fishel, Reimer, Casian and J. Mota were all on the 1985 Titan team which failed to win the PCAA championship and snapped Fullerton's string of 10 consecutive trips to the NCAA playoffs.
- ◆ Catcher Brent Mayne became the first Major League position player in 32 years to post a pitching win when he worked a scoreless 12th inning in Colorado's 7-6 win over Atlanta on Aug. 22, 2000.
- Frank Charles played for nine years in the minor leagues before finally making his Major League debut for Houston on Sept. 5, 2000.
- ♦ Phil Nevin was one of just five players in the National League in 2001 to hit .300 or better with at least 40 homers and 100 RBI. The others were Barry Bonds, Sammy Sosa, Todd Helton and Luis Gonzalez.
- ◆ Adam Johnson, the second pick in the 2000 draft, was also the second player from that draft class to appear in the Majors. He struck out Mark McGwire in his debut against St. Louis on July 16, 2001.
- ♦ Kirk Saarloos, the 2002 SportsTicker Minor League Pitcher of the Year, was named the National League Rookie of the Month in July, 2002, when he went 3-0 with a 1.77 ERA for Houston.

Dan Boone...No. 12...LHP...1975-76...A member of Fullerton's first Division I team, Boone became the first Titan to pitch in the majors when he debuted for San Diego on April 11, 1981...Earned a pair of first-team all-conference bids while going a combined 22-6 with a 2.29 ERA over his two seasons... His career ERA is still the third lowest in Titan history and his single-season marks of 2.26 (1976) and 2.32 (1975) are among the nine best...Drafted by California in the second round of the secondary phase in 1976.

Bob Caffrey...No. 14...C...1982-84...A pure physical talent behind the plate, Caffrey was a key cog on the Titans' 1984 College World Series championship team...Set the school single-season record for home runs (28) – which he still holds – and drove in 90 runs, but was overlooked on the All-American teams...Picked to the CWS All-Tournament team...Was the first Titan to play in the Olympics when he wore the Red, White and Blue in Los Angeles in 1984...Became the second Titan to be drafted in the first round when Montreal selected him in 1984.

Augie Garrido...No. 16...Head Coach...1973-87; 1991-96...Took the Titans from the most limited of resources to seven College World Series appearances, one runner-up finish (1992) and three titles (1979, 1984, 1995)...One of just two coaches to have won national titles in three different decades...Named National Coach of the Year in 1975, 1979, 1984 and 1995...Posted an 875-341-5 record (.719 winning percentage) in his 19 seasons with Fullerton at the Division I level...Won conference championships his first 11 seasons and 16 of 19 overall...Was the driving force behind the construction of Titan Stadium (now Goodwin Field)...Now the head coach at Texas.

Mark Kotsay...No. 7...OF/P...1994-96...Arguably, the best and most decorated player to ever wear a Titan uniform...Three-time All-American and only Titan ever to earn consensus first-team All-American honors twice... Among the top five career leaders in virtually every Titan offensive category, including first in batting average (.404), second in home runs (45) and second in RBI (216)...Named collegiate player of the decade (1990s) by Baseball America...Earned Golden Spikes Award and Smith Award in 1995 as college baseball's top player...Also named Player of the Year by Collegiate Baseball... Named College World Series MVP in 1995 after batting .563 and slugging 1.250...Is still the career CWS leader in batting (.517) and slugging (1.103)... Phil Nevin...No. 21...3B...1990-92...Exploded onto the national scene in 1992, when he hit .402 with 22 homers and 86 RBI...Claimed the Golden Spikes Award as the nation's top amateur and was named Baseball America's Player of the Year...Also earned first-team All-American honors from the ABCA but was relegated to the second-team by Collegiate Baseball...Led the Titans to a runner-up finish at the College World Series and became just the first player since 1973 to earn CWS MVP honors despite not winning the title...Played on the 1992 US Olympic team in Seoul...Was selected by Houston with the first overall pick of the 1992 draft.

Dante Powell...No. 11...OF...1992-94...Perhaps the most highly regarded recruit to ever come to Fullerton...Was the 42nd overall selection in the 1991 draft out of high school, but honored his commitment to the Titans... A speedster who still holds school career records for stolen bases (109) and triples (18)...Earned All-American honors all three years, including a pair of first-team citations in 1993, when he batted .335 with 12 home runs, 57 RBI and 41 stolen bases...Played for the US National Team in 1993...Drafted in the first round by San Francisco in 1994.

Ted Silva...No. 12...RHP...1993-95...Had one of the best pitching seasons in NCAA history in the Titans' 1995 national championship season, going 18-1 with a 2.83 ERA and 142 strikeouts...A consensus first-team All-American and the Big West Conference Pitcher of the Year...Was the winning pitcher in the Titans' 11-5 win over USC in the CWS championship game and earned a bid on the all-tournament team...Almost overlooked is his 1994 campaign in which he saved 13 games and had a 2.29 ERA on his way to *Collegiate Baseball* second-team All-American honors...Pitched for the US National Team in the summer of 1994...Drafted in the 21st round by Texas in 1995.

Tim Wallach...No. 29...1B...1978-79...The first national high-profile player at Fullerton, Wallach won the 1979 Golden Spikes Award, was named *The Sporting News* Player of the Year and was a consensus first-team All-American after leading the Titans to their first CWS title....Batted .391 with 23 home runs and a still-standing school-record 102 RBI...Earned CWS All-Tournament honors...Batted .394 with 16 home runs and 80 RBI in 1978... Selected in the first round of the 1979 draft by Montreal.





Now in its 46th year, the university points proudly to its product, more than 142,000 graduates who occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university – with its main campus in Fullerton, a branch campus in El Toro and satellites in Garden Grove, Irvine and Santa Ana – is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Black Issues in Higher Education ranks Cal State Fullerton sixth in the nation in terms of baccalaureate degrees awarded to minority students (June 2002). The data supplied by the U.S. Department of Education reflects degrees awarded during the 1999-2000 academic year.

Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education (May 2002) ranks Cal State Fullerton ninth in a listing of the top 100 colleges and universities conferring bachelor's degrees on Hispanics. preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships with their communities and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks sixth nationally in the overall number of bachelor's degrees awarded to minority students.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as more than 50 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing

Community members also may visit the campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. 

Titans have achieved successes that are the envy of many older and larger institutions across the country.

"Titan Pride" has been the rallying cry for 12 national team championships in seven different sports, hundreds of individual All-Americans, dozens of eventual professional athletes, numerous national coach of the year award winners, Olympic basketball players, a Miss America candidate and the subject matter of a Walt Disney film.

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only his second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller-Rycraw in 1991.

The Titans earned gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to a 6-year National Basketball Association career and is now a veteran NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that career switch.

Future NBA performers Richard Morton, Henry Turner, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen (a member of the 2003 NBA champion Spurs) were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballos gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women can point with pride to Autumn Hollyfield, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Koko Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Rycraw still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks before returning to Fullerton as an assistant coach.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCAA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in Fullerton's first Div. I season in 1975. The Titans have gone on to win four national championships and establish a remarkable winning tradition over four decades. The Titans captured their first NCAA title in 1979 behind Tim Wallach, who would go on to play 17 major league seasons. They won again in 1984 behind College World Series MVP John Fishel, in 1995 behind national player of the year Mark Kotsay and again in 2004 behind All-American pitcher Jason Windsor, who won two games and saved a third in Omaha to cap a two-year, 8-0 post-season record. Coach George Horton has won national coach of the year honors in each of the past two seasons.

Women also have sparkled on Fullerton diamonds. Hall of Fame Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and won more games (913) than any previous coach The Titans have made eight trips to the College World Series and 22 regional appearances. They brought home an NCAA Championship in 1986 and boast three national players of the year in pitchers Kathy Van Wyk, Susan LeFebvre and Connie Clark.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Div. II beginnings in 1970. Coach Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runner-up finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have had remarkable success in the Canadian Football League. Allen Pitts was the CFL's all-time leading receiver and Damon Allen, who was still active this season, is the all-time leading passer. Mike Pringle is the No. 2 all-time rusher and could become No. 1 if he stays healthy.

HISTORY & TRADITION

With the loss of football, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program filled the void in Titan Stadium. A women's squad was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans climb as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. They were led by All-American forward Eddie Soto and competed at the NCAA Final Four, placing third. There have been three subsequent trips to the playoffs and a No. 2 national ranking in 1996. On the international level, former Titan Brian Dunseth captained the U.S. Olympic team in the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

There have been national titles in men's cross country (1971) and women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts such as golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994, won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships and was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year Award. Brandon Campbell was the Big West track and field male athlete of the year in 2001 after starring in the high jump, long jump and quarter mile. He also was a starter on the basketball team.

Several current and recent Titans have garnered international attention including appearances in the 2004 Olympics in Athens. Catcher Jenny Topping played for the gold medal-winning U.S. Softball team while outfielder Lindsey Bashor was on the Greek team. Competing for Mexico were pole vaulter Giovanni Lanaro and soccer player Marlene Sandoval.

What about the nickname?

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that arise when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, there are some recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done but then along came the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions of the caricature have been made to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was appropriate on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange.

NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills

Cal State Fullerton is a participating institution in the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program, which is aimed at enhancing the



quality of the studentathlete experience within the university setting. Throughout their career, Cal State Fullerton studentathletes are provided with resources that will assist their development in five primary areas: academics,

athletics, personal development, career development and community service.

The Athletic Academic Services department, tabbed more simply as Titan Scholars, provides effective support services to help student-athletes reach their academic goals. The academic services staff takes a proactive role by coordinating study plans, study skills workshops, tutoring sessions, study halls, faculty and peer mentoring and campus services referrals. Staff members also monitor progress toward graduation, assist student-athletes in selecting and registering for classes and teach a Life Skills 100 class.

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "early warning" system in place, which utilizes periodic grade checks and clear communication with faculty members when studentathletes may require additional academic support.

The department also provides a re-entry program for former student-athletes who return to Cal State Fullerton to complete their degree.

ATHLETIC TRAINING

The athletic training program at Cal State Fullerton plays a major role in maintaining the health of Titan student-athletes. Team physicians, three full-time certified athletic trainers, two certified graduate assistants and more than 20 student assistants comprise a program that is generally regarded as one of the very best in the country.

Titan athletic training personnel specialize in preventive medicine, recognition of injuries and rehabilitation. Student athletic trainers who are admitted into the highly selective ATEP (Athletic Training Educational Program), which is administered through the Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion, must meet demanding requirements. In addition to taking 100 units of kinesiology and athletic training courses, they must serve five semesters and 1,500 clinical supervised hours. Before becoming certified, candidates must pass the National Athletic Trainers' Association Board of Certification examination. Since 1997, nearly 80 percent of Cal State Fullerton graduates have passed on their first attempt, compared to the national rate of about 30 percent. Since the inception of the program, dozens of alumni have moved into coveted positions across the country (see below).



Julie Max, MeD, ATC Head Athletic Trainer

Julie Max, Cal State Fullerton's Head Athletic Trainer, has been the driving force behind the development of an athletic training program that has received national acclaim. Max is in her 25th year at her alma mater since replacing her mentor, the late Jerry Lloyd. Recently, Max completed a second two-year term as president of the 25,000-member National Association of Athletic Trainers (NATA). Max, the first female president in the organization's history, previously served a sixyear stint on the organization's board of directors and a one-year term as its vice president. In 1997, Max was honored with the NATA Service Award, which recognizes out-standing service to the athletic training profession at the state and district level.



ATHLETIC FACILITIES

Titan Gymnasium

Titan Gym continues to undergo major renovations. In the past few years, chairback seats have replaced most of the bleachers, portable basket supports have replaced the fold down backboards, new paint and banners have been applied to the walls and the playing surface has been redone. Recently completed was an expansion that features numerous classrooms, physical testing laboratories, a new upstairs practice facility, as well as additional seating. A new "drop down" scoreboard over center court was installed in the spring of 2003. The facility also features practice and match rooms for the wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs.

Goodwin Field

Goodwin Field has played host to four NCAA Regionals and three Super Regionals in the past five years. A \$3 million expansion project, spearheaded by a \$1 million gift from Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin, has transformed the field into one of the premier collegiate facilities on the West Coast. The field now features the Wilson Clubhouse – which includes lockerrooms, a reception area and offices for the coaches – and the Doubek VIP Room.

Titan Softball Complex

Having received a complete makeover since the 2000 season, the Titan Softball Complex boasts one of the top facilities in the nation. Utilizing the adjacent Wilson Clubhouse and Doubek VIP Room, the two-diamond complex can now adequately serve as a host site for postseason competition (it was the site of an eight-team NCAA Regional in 2003) in addition to the annual Kia Klassic, the top regular-season tournament in the nation.

Titan Stadium

Titan Stadium is considered among the finest soccer facilities in the nation and regularly hosts professional and international soccer matches in addition to the Titan men's and women's programs. The facility, completed in 1992, was home to the Titan football program for one year before the sport was dropped after the 1992 season. The stadium is also a hot-spot for the entertainment industry and is regularly featured in television commercials and programs. UCLA also utilized the facility in 2003 for its fall football camp.

Cal State Fullerton student-athletes have year-round access to the services offered by the Strength and Conditioning Program, under the direction of **Andy Williams**. Aimed at developing speed, power, strength and endurance in Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes, the program plays a key role in the success of Titan teams.

Individual workouts are designed, implemented and regularly adjusted by Williams to help each student-athlete develop the stamina needed to maintain the rigorous year-round workouts associated with Division I sports.

Located inside Titan Stadium is a 6,000 square-foot weight room facility featuring eight platforms, eight squat racks, plyometric devices and nearly 8,000 pounds in free weights. The facility will service more than 300 student-athletes over the course of the year.

Andy Williams was named Cal State Fullerton's second full-time strength and conditioning coach on Oct. 11, 2004. Williams came to Cal State Fullerton after spending the previous 20 months as the director of human performance at Somerset Sports and Rehabilitation in New Jersey.

Armed with a wide range of experience, Williams spent two years as the head strength and conditioning coach at Tennessee State, working with football and women's basketball, and a year each at Middle Tennessee State (assistant strength and conditioning coach) and the University of Connecticut (graduate assistant).

In 1999, Williams was the head strength and conditioning coach for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe during their World Bowl Championship season and also served as the assistant special teams coach. He also served a two-year internship with the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs from 1996-98 and was an intern with Major League Baseball's Kansas City Royals during spring training in 1997.

Williams earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Missouri Western State College in 1997, where he also played three seasons at outside linebacker, and completed his coursework for a master's degree in education at Middle Tennessee State in 2002.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana

Brian Quinn Athletics Director

Brian Quinn assumed the post of Director of Athletics at Cal State Fullerton on January 14, 2002.

Under Quinn's leadership, the Titans are successfully weathering a state and systemwide fiscal crisis with minimal impact on student-athletes. Academic performances have improved dramatically and Titan Gym has undergone a dramatic makeover. In each of the last two years, the Titans have outperformed the rest of the Big West Conference in the NACDA Cup Standings, capped by consecutive appearances by the baseball team at the College World Series, where the Titans placed third for the fourth time in 2003 and then won their fourth national title in 2004.

Quinn, 63, was the athletic director at Loyola Marymount University from 1985 through 1998. He then dedicated his time towards completing the Burns Recreation Center and Aquatics Center at LMU. He also directed the athletic fundraising efforts as executive director of athletic development.

During his years as director of athletics at LMU the Lions won nine West

Conference titles and advanced to the NCAA men's basketball tournament three times and once to the NIT. The basketball team advanced to the Final Eight and led the nation in scoring. The baseball team advanced to the College World Series where it defeated the No. 1seed, LSU. Women's volleyball won numerous conference championships as well and the women's crew team won the national championship.

Quinn graduated from Loyola (1963) with a degree in business administration and received his masters degree from Long Beach State. He was a long-time coach and athletic administrator at the high school level in the Irvine Unified School District and taught volleyball classes for Irvine Valley College for six years.

He was the chair of the athletic directors for many years in the West Coast Conference and was the chair of the NCAA men's volleyball committee, as well as serving on the board of directors for USA volleyball.

Quinn was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame both at his high school (Serra High School) and university (LMU). He was the captain of the basketball team and MVP and three-year starter on the baseball team. The basketball team was the WCC champion and defeated USC in the NCAA tournament. Quinn also was a member of the Balboa Bay Club national champion volleyball team. He continues to be an avid beach volleyball player and is definitely a "beach" guy.

Quinn and his wife of 41 years, Collette, live in Manhattan Beach. They have four adult children: Andrew, a teacher in Atlanta; Janet, who lives in Rye, NY; Suzanne, a teacher in Inglewood; and Maureen, who recently married. The Quinn's have five grandsons, Brendan, Ryan, Owen Kiernan, Dylan and Colin Brian. Quinn is a member of the Ancient Order of Hibernians

Cal State Fullerton is nestled in sun-drenched Orange County, with its mountains, amusement parks, professional sports, cultural showcases and seashores among the top attractions. Students can reach ski slopes in 45 minutes and the beach in less than a half hour. Los Angeles, with its never-ending cultural and entertainment opportunities, lies just 30 miles northwest of the campus and San Diego is 100 miles to the south. The city of Fullerton itself, which has a fascinating history dating back to the late 19th century, boasts a beautiful historic downtown area that features dozens of restaurants, museums and shops.

The extensive development of the 42 miles of beaches in Orange County and attractions such as Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, the Laguna Festival of Arts and Pageant of the Masters, the Arrowhead Pond of Anaheim, Angel Stadium and the Orange County Performing Arts Center continue to make tourism an increasingly important activity. So does the Mediterranean-type climate, with rainfall averaging 14 inches per year, and generally mild days (either freezing or 100-degree temperatures uncommon) with frequent morning fog during the summer.
