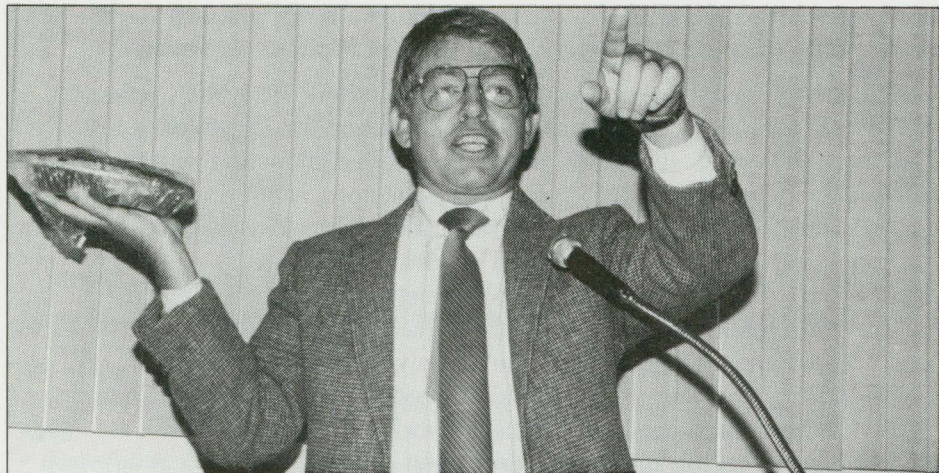

### Janos Kornai, expert on Eastern Europe, to speak January 16

Dr. Janos Kornai, widely recognized as the leading international authority on socialist economies, will speak Wednesday, January 16 at 2:35 p.m. in the Library's Biella Room. Dr. Kornai has witnessed events in Eastern Europe ranging from Soviet tanks crushing the 1956 democratic reform movement in Hungary to the removal of barbed wire separating Hungary from Austria, an act which led to the fall of the Berlin wall.

Currently, an economics professor at Harvard University and the head of the Institute of Economics at the Hungarian Academy of Sciences in Budapest, Dr. Kornai will discuss the possible spread of more liberal economies across Europe.

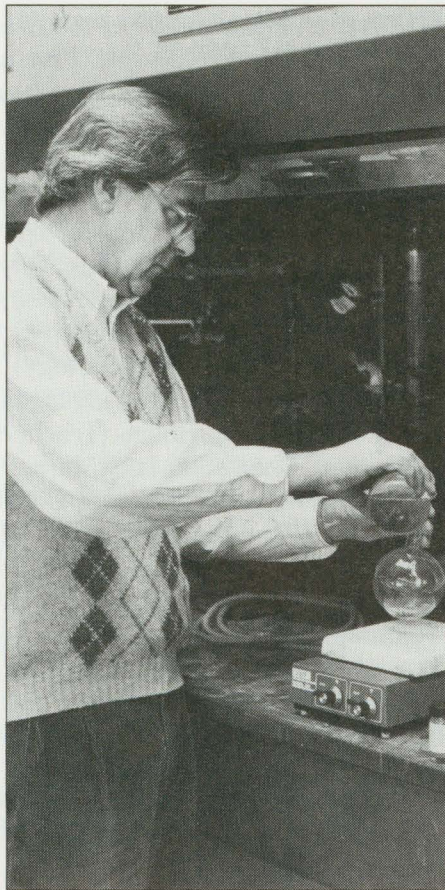


## Richard Bozak develops safety training for nuclear facility

In a newly developed Department of Energy (DOE) program, Cal State Hayward professor Richard Bozak is teaching DOE employees the fundamentals of nuclear, physical and organic chemistry to enhance their ability to protect people and the environment from nuclear hazards. Bozak was contracted by the DOE to work with employees at Colorado's EG&G Rocky Flats plant, a national defense facility, which develops new technology for the manufacture and assembly of nuclear weapons.

Bozak helped devise the new "Facilities Representatives Advanced Nuclear Course," which he calls "a very rare collection of training" for facilities representatives who perform the on-site monitoring of all hazards. He says the DOE initiated this unique program to give the representatives some training in all areas of nuclear power safety. "After attending the Advanced Nuclear Course, the reps will be better able to communicate with all the scientists at the facility, not just those in one special area," explains Bozak.

The training began in November and will conclude with three-day ses-

sions in January and March.

Though Dr. Bozak has taught chemistry for over 30 years, it was his avocation more than his vocation that brought him to the attention of the DOE. "I have been a student of the history of the A-bomb and the H-bomb since 1954. It has been a side interest for me. I find nuclear chemistry and physics fascinating. It's like magic," says Bozak.

He is aware of the controversy surrounding nuclear energy. "Chemistry helps to make the world turn, but chemistry can be used improperly. We have to be vigilant," says Bozak, whose study of the development of nuclear power resulted in an academic course which chronicles the atomic age. He has taught the course many times at Cal State Hayward and it is well attended. "It's an emotional subject. But it is a fascinating history of science and that is how I try to teach it."

In addition to teaching and chronicling the nuclear age, Bozak is currently researching a somewhat obscure iron-containing molecule, which may some day have practical application in the field of medicine. He has found a comfortable niche in this research. He also feels that research makes a professor of chemistry more authoritative. "I love working in the lab," says Bozak. "My students and I have contributed original experiments to chemistry texts from lab research at Cal State Hayward. Sometimes we have a breakthrough. Many times we don't. I keep up my research. I owe it to my teachers and the chemists who have gone before me."

John Sandoval's efforts on behalf of the University began when he wrote the history of Hayward for the campus' dedication ceremonies. In 1985, he and his wife Ruth endowed a scholarship for upper division students in journalism or history.
