Dear Mr. Byne: Your first shipment (the \$5,000.00 one) is safely through customs and I had the pleasure today of examining the contents. All proved interesting and most usable -- the ceiling especially - the Castilian ironwork - the large old wooden grille and the fine polychromed doorway and the little marble fountain. There was only one difficulty - viz. the packing. The boxes of this and previous shipments are not substantial enough to stand the many handlings. Also repacking is necessary on account of the California laws not allowing foreign straw to go into the ranch districts and we are located on a great cattle range. All this because of the great losses due to the "hoof and mouth" disease epidemics recently. I am curious as to how the wooden grille looked -- so as not to unpack yet. Could you find a more elegant one? carved and colored perhaps? In Calvert's "Spain" - two volumes - published by Helburn, 1924, there are illustrated many bits of cloisters in old and little known localities. Mr. Hearst suggests perhaps some of them might be obtainable. Our capacity of absorption is apparently limitless. How about stone Spanish sarcophagus fronts? My conclusion from your shipments is that you have our general idea as to nature of purchases, but if you can get finer and more important things they would be welcome. Just to give you an idea -- In one room 86'x36' plus we have a 17'x17' mantel from a French chateau, 16th century -- an enormous wooden ceiling plain dark wood deeply paneled and carved, from a 16th century Italian palace -- four 15'x24' Scipio tapestries from the Royal Collection, Madrid -- two 14'x18' tapestries ditto, and

I have to-day received the following telegram from you;

IF CAN BUY ITEMS SEPARATELY SEND BACK ALMENAS COLLECTION PHOTOGRAPHS AND TAKE OPTION ON TERUEL CEILING AND BIG EQUESTRIAN GOTHIC MANTEL TRY FOR VERY IMPORTANT SPANISH GOTHIC MANTEL - JULIA MORGAN

I regret to say that the Almenas collection cannot be sold as separate items. However since I corresponded with you on the subject several concessions have been made. To begin with I have made out a complete inventory of every object in the collection which had never before been done. Next, the owner has consented to sell each room and its contents separately (there are three rooms). And further I have persuaded him to reduce his price considerably.

I am enclosing herewith the complete inventory and the corresponding price of each object ennumerated. If the rooms are sold separately the price quoted in the inventory holds good. If however the three rooms are purchased the price will be reduced to 1,750,000 pesetas (at present the exchange is seven pesetas to the dollar and seems inclined to stay stationary). One more concession has been granted; if the prospective buyer wishes to omit a reasonable number of objects they will remain with the owner at the price quoted in the list. To the sum above mentioned must be added my commission of five percent. Generally, as you know, I never work under a basis of ten percent, but as in this case all the objects are held under one roof I am willing to cut my remuneration in half.

In case of purchase 1,000,000 pesetas (or its equivalent in dollars) is to be deposited in a designated New York bank in advance. The remaining 750,000 pesetas are to be sent to Spain on the receipt of goods.


I can't praise this collection too highly. When I say this I know that you know that I speak disinterestedly. It is not conceiveable that another such group of late Gothic and early Renaissance objects could be brought together in Spain or Slsewhere. I am certain that Mr. Hearst

Please find enclosed herewith the consular invoice for the six marble columns and capitals and the little painted ceiling which have just been shipped.

Also I wish to acknowledge the receipt of the cheque for \$2500 and for which please accept my thanks. This was deposited at an exchange of 7.02 making an equivalent in pesetas of 17,550. The columns cost 15,000, which sum plus my commission comes to 16,500. You have therefore a credit of 1,050 pesetas. The boxing of the shipment, along with the transportation charges, to be paid in America.

In my last letter I spoke of sending you a sketch of the ceiling made before it was demolished. Unfortunately one of our pieces of luggage (that containing a number of sketches made in Egypt along with the one of the ceiling) disappeared en route to Madrid. For this reason I am compelled to enclose a little memory sketch of the ceiling; however it is all so very simple that I know that you will have no trouble with it.

I am enclosing also a photograph of a chimney-piece (so-called) that I mentioned in my last letter. You may remember I said it was built up of Romanesque fragments of the 13th century. Where I suspect the stones are modern I have marked them. The dimensions I have indicated on the back. It is not cheap but chimney-pieces, even when recomposed of cloister fragments, are difficult to find. In case this piece should interest you we might give it the code word "Romanesque".

I recently acquired two typical Spanish escutcheons in stone of the sort employed on facades in the 17th century. The shield in the center supported by plumes and amorini. They are very decorative and stand about 3'-6" high. If you can use them you may have them for \$250 net.

I am still looking for the other objects you spoke of. With kindest regards in which my wife joins, believe me, Sincerely,
