

'Waking Up in the Nuclear Age' Is Topic of Two-Day Event

The University will present a two-day event on "Waking Up in the Nuclear Age: Becoming a Global Citizen," featuring a distinguished international group of concerned citizens who will show how elected officials and citizens can work together at local and global levels to achieve a nuclear-free world. Speaking Monday, March 13, from 6 – 9 p.m. in the Science Building will be the Honorable Tony de Brum, former foreign minister of the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and Adam Horowitz, creator of the documentary, *Home on the Range*, which focuses on the U.S. hydrogen bomb and missile testing on the Marshall Islands. Speaking Tuesday, March 14, from 7:30 – 9:30 p.m. in the Science Building will be Shigeko Sasamori Cousins, a survivor of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima, Japan; Dr. Gabino Aguirre, former mayor of Santa Paula and now principal of

The University joins Pepperdine University and California Lutheran University in hosting lectures in the month of March on "The Many Faces of Africa – The Series," sponsored the Ventura County World Affairs Council. CSUCI's lecture, the second in the series of four, is titled "16,000 Years of African History: What it Means to World History and How it Relates Today." It will be presented by Dr. Chris Ehret, UCLA professor of history, at 2 p.m., Thursday, March 16, in the Bell Tower Collaboratorium. This will be followed by "East Africa: The Politics and Religions and Climbing the Peaks of Mt. Kilamanjaro" Thursday, March 23, featuring Richard Regnier and Georgianna Regnier, environmental lawyers and travelers, at Pepperdine University, and "South Africa: AIDS, Disease, Crime and the Effects on the Global Economy" Thursday, March 30, featuring Angela Hawkens, Ph.D., Pepperdine University professor of public policy, at Pepperdine University.
