UCLA's Prof. Cowe Will Speak on Origins Of Armenian Alphabet at CSUF, Oct. 21

FRESNO - Dr. Peter Cowe of UCLA will speak on "The Origins of the Armenian Alphabet and Its Cultural Impact" Oct. 21, at 7:30 p.m., in the Alice Peters Auditorium, Rm. 191 of the University Business Center on the Fresno State campus.

The presentation is part of the Armenian Studies Program Fall 2005 Lecture Series and is co-sponsored by the Armenian Students Organization.

Joining Dr. Cowe will be Prof. Barlow Der Mugrdechian of the ASP who will speak on "The Political Situation in Armenia on the Eve of the Invention of the Armenian Alphabet."

This year marks the 1600th anniversary of the invention of the Armenian Alphabet. Der Mugrdechian's presentation will explore the political situation of the time, while Dr. Cowe will focus on the Armenian sources for the invention and also discuss the impact on the Armenian culture, especially in art.

Dr. Cowe is Naregatsi Professor of Armenian Language and

James Reid Named Henry S. Khanzadian Kazan Visiting Professor at Fresno State

FRESNO - Dr. James Reid has been appointed the fifth Henry S. Khanzadian Kazan Visiting Professor in Armenian Studies at Fresno State for the Spring 2006 semester.

Dr. Reid will be teaching a three-unit course, Armenian Studies 120T, "The Armenian Genocide in History and through Eyewitness Accounts," which will be offered on Wednesday afternoons from 2:00-4:50 PM. The Spring 2006 semester and Dr. Reid's course begin on Wednesday, January 18.

Armenian Studies 120T examines the historical context that led to the Armenian genocide. The course looks at the Armenians and other Christian groups living in the Ottoman Empire. Emphasis will be placed on understanding events that occurred from the mid-1870s to 1920 through eyewitness narratives. A part of the course will study Ottoman perpetrators and why they engaged in genocide and massacre.

The appointment of Dr. Reid as Kazan Visiting Professor, follows that of Dr. Richard Hovannisian, AEF Professor of Modern Armenian history, UCLA, (Fall 2000), Dr. Robert Hewsen, Rowan University (Fall 2001), Dr. Barbara Merguerian (Fall 2002), and Dr. Ara Sanjian (Fall 2003).

Dr. Reid holds a B.A. from the University of California at Berkeley and a Ph.D. from UCLA and is the author of several books, including *Crisis of the Ottoman Empire: Prelude to Collapse, 1839-1878*; *Studies in Safavid Mind Society and Culture*, Costa Mesa, Ca.: Mazda Publishers, 2000; *Tribalism and Society in Islamic Iran, 1500-1629*, Malibu, Ca.: Undena Publications, 1983; and *Archilocus' Shield: A Psychohistorical Study of War and Massacre, 1878-1914* [Macedonian Conflict, Greco-Turkish War of 1897, Armenian Massacres of 1894-96, Balkan Wars of 1911-1913] [in progress, researching and writing].

Dr. Reid is currently Tsakopoulos Hellenic Fellow at CSU Sacramento; from 2001-2003 he was the director of the Vryonis Center, and from 1991-2001 he was a senior research fellow at the Center. He has written extensively on the Ottoman Empire and modern Greece.

CSUF's Armenian Studies Program Hosts 2006 Semester Program at Yerevan State

FRESNO - The Armenian Studies Program at California State University, Fresno has organized a one-semester program designed to introduce students to Armenian language, history, art, and contemporary events. The semester schedule is composed of five courses: Armenian language (4 units); Armenian art and architecture (3 units); Armenia today (3 units); Armenian studies (3 units); and Independent study (2 units).

Courses, based on curriculum used by the Armenian Studies Program at California State University, Fresno, will be taught by faculty from Yerevan State University. Orientation will be held Aug. 27-31 in Armenia. Semester begins Sept. 3, 2006.

The academic committee in charge of curriculum is composed of Dr. Dickran Kouymjian, Haig and Isabel Berberian Professor of Armenian Studies and Director of the Armenian Studies Program at Fresno State, Dr. Tom Samuelian of Arlex International, and Barlow Der Mugrdechian of the Armenian Studies Program at Fresno State.
