The Criminology Department provides educational opportunities in the areas of corrections and law enforcement. The corrections program is designed for students interested in careers in probation, parole, penal and correctional institutions, and other affiliated forms of work. The law enforcement program is designed for students interested in careers in law enforcement and related areas at the federal, state, and local levels of government, or in allied occupations in government, business, and industry.

The department offers the bachelor of science and master of science degrees.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE DEGREE WITH A MAJOR IN CRIMINOLOGY

The bachelor of science degree with a major in criminology with options in corrections or law enforcement is granted upon completion of a four-year curriculum consisting of 128 semester units. The general degree requirements must be completed, see *Degrees and Credentials*. Each student desiring to major in criminology must select and complete one of the options listed below.
