Don't forget to vote Thursday!

Excitement is building in the Village as voters review all six candidates' resumes, deciding which three will triumph. It promises to be a close election, as we have some experienced folks pitted against newcomers, some of whom boast impressive backgrounds. Remember, only one vote

per candidate.

Villagers must keep in mind the following voting procedures: You may vote absentee up to the day before, Wednesday, June 25, prior to 5 p.m. There are absentee ballot boxes both in the AR and in the lobby of our Headquarters, but they will be closed as reported above.

If you have not voted prior to Wednesday at 5 p.m., you may vote between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. in the Multi-Purpose Room on Election Day, Thursday, June 26, at which time our Annual Meeting starts and the Election Committee starts counting the ballots.

The Annual Reports by

Committee Chairs will probably take 90 minutes or so and if election results are not available by noon, the Board will take a recess, returning at 1:30 p.m. to report election results. Channel 8 will be telecasting live beginning at 10 a.m. and will be back live at 1:30 p.m. for the results. Then, when Channel 8 goes back to the "run," they will

show the results after perhaps every 20 or so messages.

Three of our candidates were approved by the Nominating Committee. They are Bob Ellis, Dick Griswold and Marge Lorraine. Candidates running by petition are Donna Duke, Mike Shapiro and Don White.

Longtime friends and

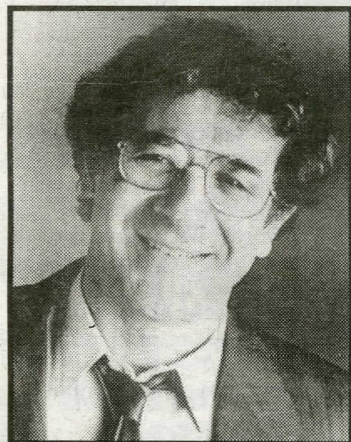

Paul, as most golfers know, had a massive heart

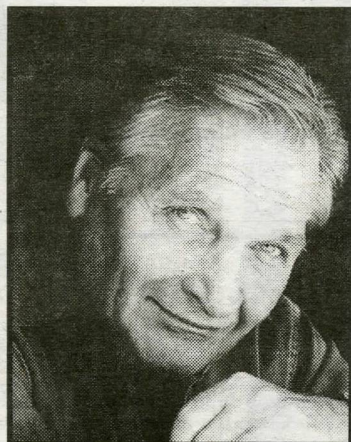

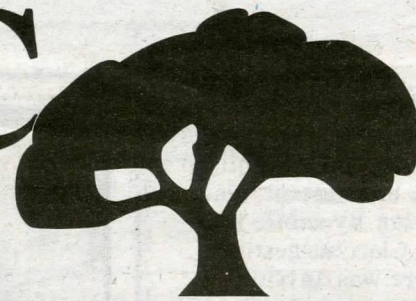

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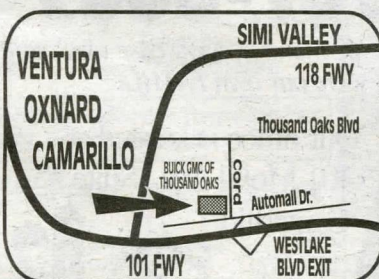

our General Manager, Randy Watkins, in conjunction with our accountant, Marc Poindexter. By subtle innuendo, is Clair suggesting that there was anything incorrect in either their collecting or counting these ballots, which showed that voting in favor of the change outnumbered the negative by approximately a 4 to 1 ratio?

Another statement that I question is this one: "This Board has failed to deal with ... the issue of the Nominating Committee."

It is my understanding that prior boards have selected a chairman, and then the remaining four board members each select a person to make up the Nominating Committee. Naturally, each of the board members picks a single individual whom he or she thinks has the qualification to be a member of the committee. If the chairman were given the power to do all the selecting, would that not give that individual the power of selecting members who would pursue his or her agenda when selecting board candidates?

Another area where I must object and feel it's like the pot calling the kettle black is Clair's statement: "Now what has happened this year, of course, is that

our Nominating Committee has nominated three candidates and then they have converted themselves into a campaign committee and are actively trying to have their nominees elected. I think that is improper and should be prohibited. We have other candidates who have lots of experience, lots of training and can do a wonderful job on this board, and I'm in favor of their election."

To me, this is a serious breach of ethics. One of our governing rules for all board members is not to do any electioneering in any public facility and certainly not at an open board meeting. No board member is permitted to do any electioneering in

any public facilities. This is a definite no-no. On the other hand, any electioneering they wish to do in their own homes or via their telephone is certainly their prerogative.

And finally, Clair said, "Who are the people who

review the questions at Candidates Night?" Clair, for your edification, I, as Candidates Night Chairman, based on the rules currently established for Candidates Night procedures, selected all the people for that evening, which included three screeners, two deputies and one timer. If you'd like to see the rules and procedures for Candidates Night, I'd be happy to make you a copy.

Since living in Leisure Village, I have noticed a vast improvement in the physical assets of the Village. In addition, during the four years I have lived in Leisure Village, just about every person I have met has been pleasant and friendly. However, there is one item that bothers me and that I consider very dangerous: people who insist upon riding their

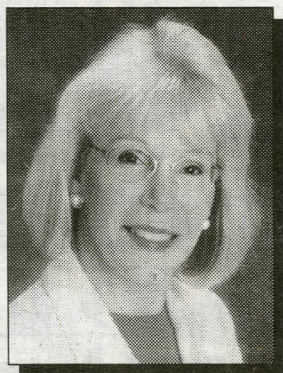
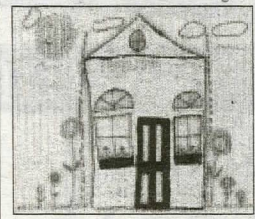
bikes on the sidewalks inside the Village.

As someone who has been injured by a bike rider, I know how dangerous this "benign means of transportation" can be. Back in 1993 when I was living in New York City, a person riding a bike and going the wrong way on a one-way street hit me and I sustained a broken wrist. Ever since that unfortunate accident, I have realized that bike riders are capable of causing severe injury to pedestrians on the sidewalks or crossing streets.

Here in Leisure Village, some persons insist upon riding their bikes while they are on the sidewalks instead of walking their bikes while on the sidewalks. By definition, sidewalks are for walking, not bike riding. Whenever I see someone riding his/her bike on the

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sidewalk, I bark at them, "You should be walking your bike, not riding it; this is a senior community, and if you hit someone they are going to be hurt and probably injured really bad. Take that bike out to the bike lanes, that's what the bike lanes are there for."

The response I usually get from these persons (who usually have bike helmets on so they won't be injured) is: "It is permitted here in Leisure Village." If, in fact, bike riding on the Village sidewalks is permitted by the Village Regulations, they should be changed; it is only a matter of time before one of these bike riders — usually going much too fast — hits someone in the community and seriously injures them. Persons our age don't take much to knock them down and hurt them.

All six candidates were present on our Leisure Village stage and had a chance to present their views and field some questions on Candidates Night. The program lasted from 7 p.m. to about 9:15 or so. It was educational for the audience as well as for the candidates.

Prior to the candidate program, I had received phone calls from homeowners asking for whom to vote. I was reluctant to endorse anyone until I had seen and heard all the candidates. Now that Candidates Night is over, here is what I think.

Donna Duke will be my first choice, Mike Shapiro will be my second choice and Don White will be my third choice. We are only entitled to cast one vote for three candidates per our regulations.

Donna and I have had our differences, but that is in the past. Donna is a leader who understands what it means to be responsible for her actions. She is practical, experienced, energetic and capable. I can't think of another homeowner with all her useful life experiences.

"She's been there, done that."

Mike Shapiro has had a most useful background which serves the Village well. Like Donna, Mike is interested in efficiency and stays awake nights thinking of ways to improve. Mike's philosophy is to do it better for less. I can't believe he never went into his own business.

Don White has always been a guy to roll up his sleeves and get things done. He will never pontificate or be dogmatic. He is a common-sense guy with a proper attitude. He is the kind of guy Henry Ford would have hired in a minute. He understands seniors and senior living needs. His parents lived here before him, and Don, still young in my eyes, knows the score.

A few homeowners are bound to ask why I didn't choose Dick Griswold as one of the three. I have many personal reasons that could be considered political, but I try not to be influenced by those. Dick was one of the players in the flawed "encroachment theo-

ry," which cost the Village a bundle of money and caused many unnecessary divisions and hardships as well as the root cause of the recall committee involvement. He has never admitted guilt or apologized for the role he played in that fiasco. To me, he does not measure up to my idea of what it takes to be a good Board member.

About Marge Lorraine and Bob Ellis: Their attitude in answering questions at Candidates Night was "spend" instead of trying to economize. Association fees will go up if they are elected. The people on fixed incomes will suffer.

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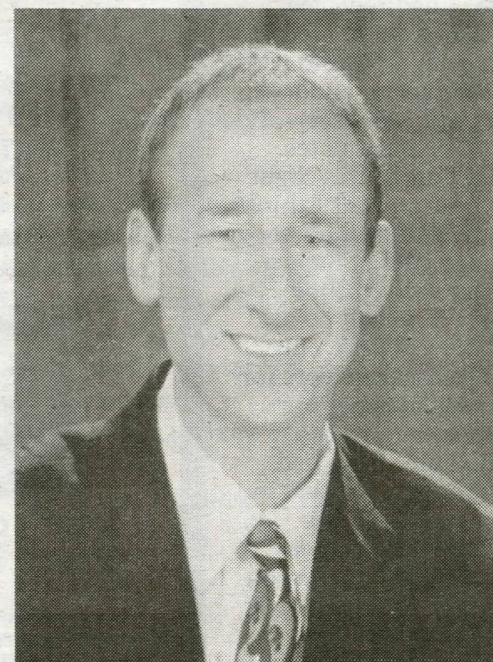

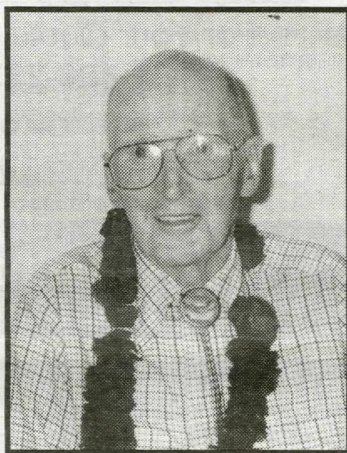

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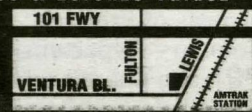

"I Call My New Lung Tina" is a book that captures the experience of transplant survivor and Leisure Village resident Shirley Jewett.

"When a somber-faced doctor looks across the desk and tells you that you need a lung transplant, a complex set of emotions and events are set in motion for the patient and their family," explains Jewett.

"Underlying the entire process is an unbelievable amount of fear."

This book combats that fear by delivering practical information on navigating the medical system and coping with the uncertainty and the life-altering experience of becoming a transplant patient.

At the time of Jewett's diagnosis of Primary Pulmonary Hypertension (PPH), she did not qualify

for a transplant, the only cure for the disease. Her journey from near death to radiant health and an open-ended prognosis is fascinating and heartwarming. Most importantly, Jewett's personal triumph is encouraging for anyone facing a transplant.

"This book is a chronicle of her journey to a new life, says Gordon Yung, M.D. "It is an inspiration to all of us — patients and doctors alike — who battle potentially fatal diseases every day. I want to thank Shirley for sharing her experience with all of us and for giving us a unique perspective from a patient's point of view."

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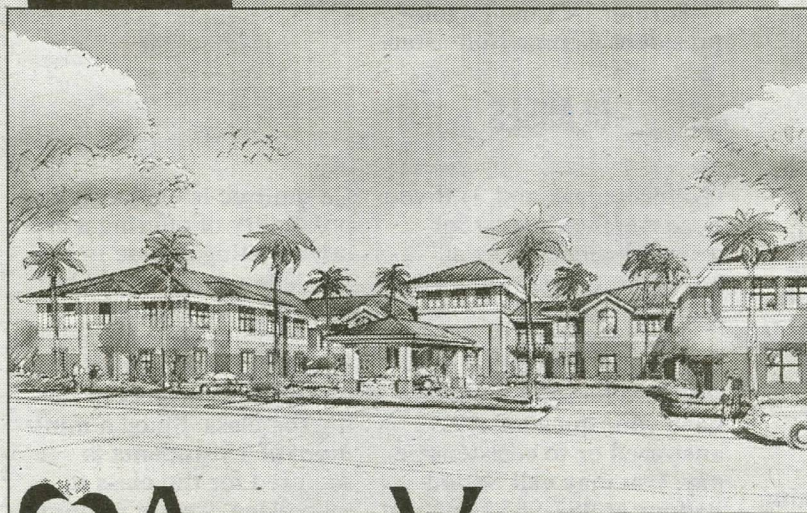

We were both ill recently

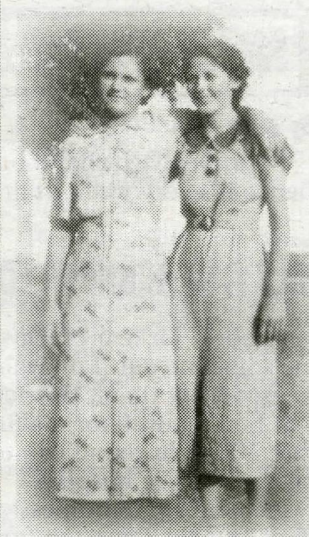
and you were there for us — cards, telephone calls and good thoughts. All this helps a person to recuperate faster.

The world will work! Despite those strains.

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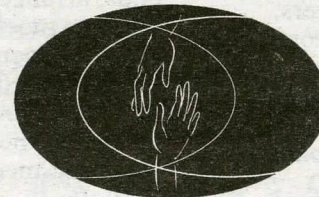

Your Neighbors Care Group has a stock of hospital supplies available to LV residents for emergency short-term use free of charge.

This supply includes wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, canes, commodes, toilet risers, shower benches, traction equipment, vaporizers, etc.

These can be loaned for

one month's use through our Recreation Department office, Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and from 1 to 4 p.m.

In a real emergency, after these hours or on weekends, arrangements can be made to meet a security guard to open our storage room, located under the projection room in the AR, by calling the Main Gate. You must meet the guard

there and sign the log as to the time you removed the item you are borrowing.

Remember: No deliveries by our Security Department, and call only in an emergency.

YNCG also takes blood pressure the first Monday of the month from 7 to 8 p.m. in the AR, free of charge.

Flu shots are given in October, and there is a Health Fair in early spring.

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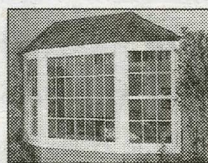
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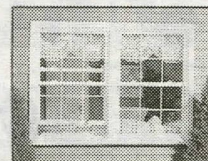
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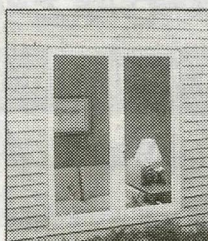
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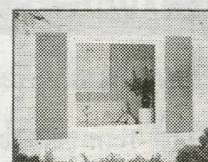
Bay Window



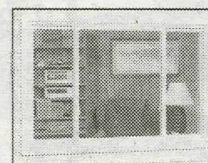
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Casement Window

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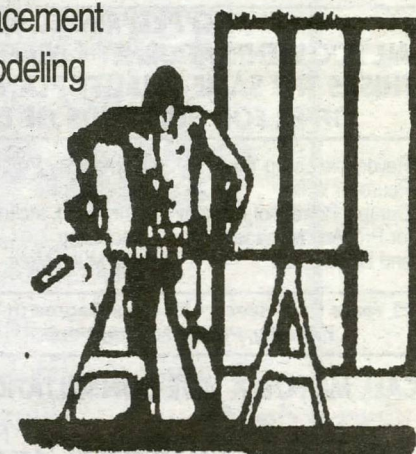
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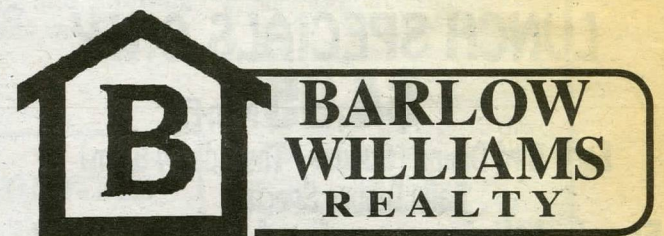
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
