### **Leisure Village Gets New Dish**

A new 10 foot diameter television receiving antenna (dish) has been installed at the west end of the LV Recreation Center. As reported previously (ILV April 1992), this antenna was required because some of the channels which were being transmitted from an older satellite (Galaxy III) have been shifted to a new satellite transmitter (Galaxy V). This change

necessitated installation of the new antenna.

The larger antenna (20 foot) will continue to receive Channels 15 (HBO), 16 (Cinemax), 18 (CNBC), and 24 (Discovery). Channels 8 (ESPN), 14 (TNT), 19 (HNN), 21 (CNN) and 22 (WTBS) are being received on the new (10 foot) antenna. Regular TV channels (2-13) and CSPAN-1 and CSPAN-2 are not affected by these changes.

### **Reporting And Rapport**

The editors of ILV wish to congratulate the staff of the Village Voice for improving the reporting of the minutes of the monthly Board meetings. The June issue was explicit in reporting briefly what was said rather than "So and So' spoke on 'such and such' a matter," which those minutes had deteriorated into saying.

When ILV was first published in March 1979, there were many wrongs that needed to be corrected. The Village was barely five years old, still largely run by Leisure Technology, which was an eastern firm directed by men from the East with a philosophy much stricter about control than is usually tolerated in California. Thus we, the homeowners, were told what was what and were expected to abide by that with no questions asked! The monthly report to the residents was just that. It was a re-enactment of a meeting already accomplished. There was no discussion possible beforehand; questions were discouraged, and a three-minute time limit was often cut short when a homeowner dared speak in opposition. All measures came to homeowners as having been unanimously approved. The meeting was a travesty--a report/no report affair.

To compound the matter, renters, who are required to abide by the rules, were excluded from staying to listen, but were told to leave in the opening sentences. (Renters also could not have their numbers listed in the Village telephone directory until after ILV began printing them each month.)

The previous month's Board meeting minutes were often not placed in the library reading room until just before 4 o'clock on the last Friday before the new month's meeting, when the new month's agenda was also placed there. Communication was almost nil. Channel 12 was not yet activated. No wonder most members of the Board (which included a Leisure Tech representative) did not want an independent newspaper! They had it all their way.

In its third edition on May 24, 1979, ILV began a column which was called "Board Highlights". For the first time people who for one reason or another could not attend Board meetings had a fairly clear idea of the proceedings, but this information came late in the month. In 1981 the Board's official newssheet began printing in-depth reports, so ILV discontinued Highlights in December of that year.

Especially with the aging of the Village has Channel 12 been important in the more timely communications. More recently, Boards have been more cognizant of the need for better communications. They recognize the importance of their own reporting and the use of input from committees made up of the many talented experts residing in the Village. However, the Board should not be allowed to forget that its official paper should be responsible for printing a fairly comprehensive report. The last edition of Voice did exactly that. It looks as if they're back on target.





### **Insurance Committee Keeps On Working And Working And Working**

George Parker's Insurance Committee report was an important item on the July 6 LVA Board Meeting agenda. His report summarized the Committee's thorough study of the State mandatory earthquake insurance policy and the decision to not participate in the State program. The Insurance Committee is a prime example of village volunteerism and its benefits to all villagers. The committee report follows:

The Insurance Committee, in a special meeting on June 23, 1992, unanimously recommended that the Board not insure the Village under the recently enacted State mandatory earthquake insurance policy.

On Monday, June 29 the Board adopted the State insurance policy by recommendation and John Lauten.

based thereon the Village will not be insured under

the State mandatory insurance policy.

the Board was based on the following;

1) An extensive study of the provisions of the State policy.

2) The financial inability of the State to pay claims for which it is obligated after a quake.

3) the structure and capacity of the State's claims department, and

4) the legal ability of the state to enforce the mandatory policy by levying a penalty if the policy was refused and not purchased.

The study of these issues was based on contacts with a law firm of specialists, the legal department of the State Insurance Department, commercial insurance experts with our insurance carrier, plus a detailed study of the law and the

Based on this study the conclusions were:

1. The state policy either duplicates the cover-The recommendation to age in our Village earthquake policy or excludes items covered by the Village policy.

2. The state policy applies only to owner-occupied units and has a maximum coverage of \$15,000 per unit with a \$1,000 deductible and does not cover any damage to the Common Area.

3. In the event of a serious earthquake, the State's financial ability to pay claims is virtually impossible as is its ability to organize a claims department with the needed capacity to handle the many claims resulting from an earthquake.

4. The Insurance Department and the Governor are attempting to convince the legislature to repeal the law effective no later than January 1, 1993 because of the known inability of the department to handle it.







### Worrisome **Bus Situation**

I would like to share with you what I know about our bus situation.

Camarillo City owns two eleven year old buses and contracts with Laidlaw Transit, Inc. to keep the buses moving. All too frequently, the Camarillo buses break down and Laidlaw-owned buses are pressed into service. Recently the two Camarillo buses, as well as the Interconnect bus which takes passengers to Thousand Oaks, broke down on the same day. The big white buses, which our riders call the big white whales, were formerly school buses, have narrow seats, and are hard to get in and out

Camarillo has extended the contract with Laidlaw for one year with the option to cancel with one month's notice, as can Leisure Village. When, and if, the city gets new buses, the city will put out to bid the operation of the buses, but with so many unanswered questions concerning the buses, the city had no other option except to renew the contract with Laidlaw at this time

They bluff themselves into thinking they don't have a hearing loss as if it were some crippling disease or something to be frowned upon by their peers. This attitude is so much nonsense. The easiest way to be left out of a social group is to have a hearing problem and not do anything about it. People who admit their hearing impair-

ment and then take necessary steps to correct their hearing disability as much as possible, will help reduce their hearing problems by an immeasureable amount.

One good way to acby attending our meetings and learning the latest facts on sound amplification for telephone, television, record player, in the theatre, concert hall, radio, etc. If it is no disgrace to wear a pair of eye glasses to improve vision, neither is it to wear an inconspicuous hearing aid to improve hearing.

#### MAKING YOUR HOUSE ACCESSIBLE

Having your house on the market involves a certain invasion of privacy. If you're lucky, agents will be previewing it and showing it to buyers with some regularity. On one hand, you'll want to make it reasonably accessible to real estate professionals and their prospects. On the other hand, you don't want to step out of your shower as a local broker is bringing in a group of buyers.

In many areas agents use a hand little tool of the trade called "lock box". On an occupied property, agents call first and let the owner know when they'll be by. If no one is home, an agent with a special key can open the box, retrieve the key and let themselves in. The other extreme of accessibility is requiring a day's notice, and insisting that your listing agent accompany at each showing. This will eliminate a lot of the inconvenience to you, but it will also eliminate most the showings of your house. Whatever arrangements you work out, keep in mind that the easier you make it for us to see and show your home, the easier you make it for us to sell i more quickly.


