On the health care side of the VA, we have a new undersecretary for health that, that some of you may have, had an opportunity to meet out here in California because he's from California, from UC Davis originally.

They put about \$32 million into the construction, in for the construction. The hospital there is already about 25 million there. So there's that. We need to have it's fine to have great health care, but if it's not where everybody needs the health care, then it's not doing anybody any good. So what we're very hopeful is that in the very near future, that Congress will allow us to develop new access points. And what this is, is it's a little bit different than having a, a hospital somewhere. It's having a storefront, if you will. We think that this is our future at the VA. It's very important that we be able to take our resources and put them where the veterans need them.
