Special Targets of the Legislative Program Campaign from Governor Brown's Legislative Program

AB 570 & 571 by Assemblyman Ronald Cameron, Covina. Establishes fair and reasonable standards for the cost and coverage of Health Insurance, preventing the selling of health insurance policies giving inadequate coverage at high prices.

AB 266 by Assemblyman Ed Z'berg, Sacramento. Requires all hazardous substances to be plainly labeled as to any damage which may occur from their use, allowing us to shop knowing that we are protected from purchasing hidden hazards to our families.

SB 332 by Senator Arnold, Susanville. Overhauls our outmoded laws dealing with juvenile offenders, guaranteeing juveniles the same civil rights and safeguards that adults have, while continuing to protect them from unwarranted publicity.

SB 57 by Senator Hugo Fisher, San Diego. Changes the basic education standards for the certification of California teachers, by reducing the overwhelming number of teaching credentials, and requiring a subject major - resulting in better-equipped teachers to provide our children with the best education possible.

GOVERNOR BROWN'S EIGHT POINT NARCOTIC CONTROL PROGRAM

1. A substantial increase in prison terms and penalties as now provided in AB 9, by Assemblyman Clayton Dills, and in SB 83 by Senator Edwin Reagan, retaining the power of the court, however, in proper cases to grant probation to any first offender.
2. The creation of a new offense, possession for the purpose of sale. This offense should be more severely penalized than simple possession.
3. Legislation which would protect informants by allowing peace officers to obtain search warrants without disclosing their informants' identity except to the magistrate himself . . . except in case of "entrapment".
4. Legislation authorizing the service of search warrants both day and night.
5. Legislation requiring persons convicted of narcotic offenses to register for a period of five years following their release from custody.
6. Revocation of vehicle operator's licenses of those convicted of narcotic offenses.
7. An increase of \$183, 000 in the Attorney General's appropriation over a two - year period of further intensification of the fight against narcotics.
8. Legislation providing for the acquisition of a state narcotic detention and treatment facility, under the Director of Corrections and the adoption of a complete procedure for addict commitment and control as recommended by the Narcotics Commission.
