

In a fairly closely contested Board of Directors election race, Bob Ellis, with 851 votes, led the six contestants, while Dick Griswold, with 826 votes, finished second, and Mike Shapiro, with 742 votes, took the third and final Board seat.

Marge Lorraine was fourth with 699 votes, Donna Duke next with 640 votes, and Don White trailed the field with 348 tallies.

With Don Ellis on a


European trip, it was not until the morning of the July Board Meeting, July 7, that members selected office titles.



Thope the new Board Ladopts a Code of Conduct to curtail false and misleading statements as those made by Carol Sweeney in the June Village Voice. She vilified Director Huffman for publicly stating he was supporting the candidates running by petition but said it's OK for Nominating Committee Chair Coleman to have house parties for candidates he supports because they are private affairs.

A brochure distributed on Candidates Night contained bios of Ellis, Lorraine and Griswold, plus the following words across the top: "Vote for qualified and trustworthy candidates." It was endorsed by Directors Sweeney, Coleman and Prosen. Candidates Night is a public affair.

For clarification, Mike Shapiro and Donna Duke are previous Board members with proven track records. To infer they are not qualified or trustworthy is false and misleading — bordering on defamation.

Ms. Sweeney previously announced she consulted an attorney before publishing her message, but she didn't say whether Homeowners are stuck with that attorney bill. Remember her when

she berated Sandy Okum for printing negative letters in ILV? Yet, she fills pages of the Village Voice with negative and unfounded statements.

Regarding Director Prosen: He was a leader of the Recall Committee to change the status quo, until he got on the Board. In his ILV letter, he pontificates, "it is a serious breach of ethics for board members to do electioneering in any public facility." Since his name was on the brochure publicly displayed at Candidates Night, he breached his own code of ethics.

During the Open Board Meeting of June 5 and again in the June Village Voice President's Message, past President Carol Sweeney stated if some elderly residents were financially strapped to pay their assessment fees they could always get a reverse mortgage.

A reverse mortgage is no simple act. It is a complicated financial and legal transaction. HUD and FHA are involved. Your house is assessed and the transactions are like buying and selling your home, with a termite inspection, etc. Basically, though, it is a loan against the equity you have in your home. Sometimes the loan can be granted for your lifetime. It must be paid back, with accrued interest, at the time of sale or transfer by you or your heirs.

If at some point you would like to go into assisted living and need the money from the sale of your house, the loan must be repaid with interest first. There could be virtually nothing left. Or, if your heirs should inherit the house, and after the loan and interest charges are repaid, they may be inheriting nothing but a headache. This is an option that must be carefully considered on each individual basis.

I would suggest that the next time Ms. Sweeney tosses out a recommendation so cavalierly that she does some research beforehand. — Felice Perkins, V. 7

Itake offense with Ms. Sweeney's remarks in the June Village Voice that if assessments are reduced for several years, they must automatically be increased substantially the following years. She cited no examples for her fallacy because a fallacy cannot be proven. However, I can give specific examples, which are based in truth.

The Boards of Directors I served on used good management techniques. Our goal was to find ways to keep assessments down without jeopardizing any benefits or advantages, and we did just that.

Examples:

1) Negotiating a tight but efficient union contract by eliminating rain days that other union contracts disallowed, providing better medical coverage through the union for all employees, keeping down raises as they were over scale, and not hiring additional employees, saving us \$257,000.

2) Establishing the P.R.C. and going out to bid, saving over \$200,000 in three

3) Saving \$698,000 on the January 1994 earthquake by using an in-house claims adjuster.

4) Finding a way to claim a rebate on our diesel gasoline usage, recouping some \$7,000 over three years.

5) Contracting out our phone book for profit at 12.5 percent or \$10,000, whichever was greater, netting us \$30,000 over three years.

6) Obtaining a rebate from the Fuel Spill Super Fund of \$120,000.

7) Receiving a \$25,000 roof repair credit.

8) Obtaining a change in our flood map for 941 structures, resulting in a savings of \$188,000.

9) Signing a letter of agreement with the ambulance company, saving residents \$65,000 a year.

10) Discontinuing the street slurry for a savings of \$132,000 a year.

11) Purchasing a pool heater and fertilizer contract that saved \$8,800 a year.

The Boards of Directors I was honored to work with did a veoman's job in finding ways to keep assessments down. No other Board of Directors that I know of has been able to come up with such moneysaving ideas. Why give back money to our Homeowners? The Finance Committee advised us to do just that.

In addition, we performed our fiduciary duty by maintaining and enhancing the Village by instituting the following: tree removal and tree trimming; water management program; installation of water pressure valves; walkway V15 to Main Gate; met with Realtors on changing paint colors; studied needs for

computer and exercise rooms; completed the walkway from V11 to Main Gate; painted and carpeted the Recreation Center; replaced lobby furniture; painted Rec. Center; purchased new computers and a new telephone system; upholstered the library furniture; painted and carpeted the board room; resurfaced tennis and paddle tennis courts; repaired ail earthquake damages to Rec Center, Administration Building and Shuffleboard Building, plus fogging the stucco on the entire Rec Center and Shuffleboard Building; purchased two perimeter systems for the Security Department; planted the front of the RV Lot; installed gate to the Santa Rosa Plaza; added three drinking fountains (V16, 28, 41); installed a new gas barbecue grill in pienie area; added 19 walkways, eight

benches and numerous bus stops for our handicapped residents; designed a new paint schedule by increasing the number of houses from 291 to 571 for a fiveyear program; removal of 50 trees first year.

The above were all good management techniques, well thought out, and planned with the concept of providing the Villagers more for less money. The past several boards have provided less for more money.

nother year, another Achallenge. This year I'm hopeful that we may see some budget savings. Two of our major budget expenditures are insurance premiums and water usage.

We now have an Insurance Committee that is fully functioning and readying proposals for next year's insurance needs. Because of our recent CC&R change and our increased deductible, claims against our association's insurance have been practically eliminated. At renewal time, even thought most

insurance carriers want to see a five-year claim record and these changes will have only been in effect for a little over one vear, it could certainly enhance the possibility of our maintaining current insurance costs, in spite of a tight marketplace, as well as being beneficial for possible future insurance premium reductions.

Another bright area is our golf course water usage. Since almost all the engineering is in place, I am hopeful that within the next 30 to 60 days, the front nine holes on our golf course will start using reclaimed water, which will greatly reduced our water costs. The back nine holes need additional engineering to become operational, and this will be one of our priority projects. Once our entire golf course starts using reclaimed water, we can expect a substantial savings in our water costs.

Hopefully, if savings come to pass, next year's budget may see assessments favorably affected and possibly long-term ongoing projects, such as street maintenance. can be accelerated, thereby creating additional possible future cost savings. Just keep your fingers crossed.

And, the Village was reaping the profits of lower water bills, assisting us in holding future assessments to a minimum. I would also like to look back and say I contributed to a well-run, harmonious board that had the Village's best interest at heart.

Dick Griswold: "Last year the Board was very productive and, for the most part, I believe the main reason was because we wanted to work together. It was truly a gratifying experience I'll long

remember.

I appreciate being elected again to the Board of Directors and sincerely thank all Members who voted for me.

This coming year I believe savings are possible in two traditionally highcost areas of our budget: water management and insurance.

With the weather station operational to tell us how much water to lay down daily, the computer online to accurately determine water use, and the six new Camrosa-donated water pressure regulators, we have everything we need to reduce water use. Carl is now fine-tuning the system.

The CC&R change, along with new rules 19.18 and 20.11, will be helpful to the

Insurance Committee when going out to bid for the November 1 renewal of the Master Policy. Please pray for their success.

If anyone has a good idea for reducing expenses without impairing our quality of life here in Leisure Village, please get in touch with me.




I, as well as many Villagers who knew Ed Williams, will always remember him as a giver, the highest compliment that I believe can be paid a person.

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

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

We have grown and now feel that the talent we have exposed here was the best we could afford, and the shows have been more than well received. Most retirement communities have

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
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


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
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

New landscaping will soon grace Rec Center

The new landscaping that will be installed along the north side of the Recreation Center is something we haven't seen before at Leisure Village. There will be a new look to the building, one that represents not only a beautiful variety of unfamiliar plants, but an approach to landscaping that will reduce the use of water, fertilizers and garden chemicals.

The project is an outgrowth of months of research and garden visits by the Landscape Committee as they sought ways to demonstrate a state-of-the-art approach to landscape maintenance one that might be expanded to other parts of the Village. The current trend in landscaping is to create "sus-

tainable" plantings — ones that do not rely on excessive use of resources such as water, chemical fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides, and that require little hands-on maintenance. When you think about it, no one turns on the sprinklers in the Santa Monica Mountains, or trims the shrubs, spreads fertilizers, or rakes up the leaves. The plants are adapted to the natural environment and get along just fine with no care. By selecting plants from parts of the world that have climates similar to ours, we can choose from hundreds of varieties of lowwater using plants that look great throughout the year and don't require a lot of help

Great, you say. But how will it look? We think it will look fabulous. The design

for the Recreation Center was created by Santa Barbara landscape architect Billy Goodnick, who is also the city landscape architect for Santa Barbara and son of Leisure Village residents Linda and Irv Goodnick. Mr. Goodnick's work for the Goleta Water District's Low Water Using Demonstration Garden was what really convinced the committee to seek out his services.

Mr. Goodnick's approach to landscape design emphasizes year-round interest through the use of not only showy flowering plants, but by combining striking combinations of foliage, texture and form to create a composition that looks good every day of the year.

The grass will be removed, but all the mature trees remain. Some of the new plants will include the exotic Kangaroo Paws, numerous tall ornamental grasses, daylily, and grand New Zealand Flax with its stunning yellow and green striped leaves. And there will be lots of color on the ground, with plants like the magenta flowering Arctotis, and the delicate mauveflowered groundcover Carpet Geranium. There will be combinations of

foliage colors, using a variety of greens, silver and purple, that will set off the seasonal floral displays, while keeping the Jacaranda, Crepe Myrtle and Silk Trees that currently grace the frontage of the Recreation Center.



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

sons? No problem. There will be a few high-visibility flower beds that will spread color all year, but a bit less to reduce the cost of replanting.

A word of caution: For a landscape to truly be low maintenance, young plants are arranged to allow room for mature growth. Just as our grandkids can't spend their lives in a crib (even thought that's a cute thought), the plants we install need room to grow and achieve their mature form. Some of the new plants will achieve spreads of over eight feet and will be planted that far from their neighbors. Any closer and they'd run into each other and pile up, causing far too

much maintenance and ruining their graceful natural appearance.

So at first, the landscape might looks pretty sparse. Folks might think, in the words of Peggy Lee, "Is that all there is?" Well, just for now. In the next few growing seasons, the plants will thrive and fill in to create a stunning tapestry of plant forms and colors, while allowing the grounds crew to keep their hedge trimmers on the truck and their pruning shears in their holsters. All that and lower water use tool

All in all, we think you'll appreciate the work the Landscape Committee has done to improve the appearance of our most used building and to lower the cost of some of the grounds maintenance. Stay tuned.


