LV Chorale Presents Holiday Concert In AR



Pool Renovation To Be Delayed Until Spring

The LV Board of Directors is announcing that pool repairs originally scheduled for November will be deferred until April of next year. The planned re-plastering of the pool will be combined with replacing the decking at the same time. The spa deck will also be replaced.

This strategy will benefit the Village by reducing the overall cost of renovating the pool and by requiring only one shutdown period of approximately six weeks, resulting in less inconvenience to residents.

This rescheduling will result in a savings of about \$24,000.

addition replastering the pool and replacing the decking, the renovation project will also include replacing the

pumps, valves and filters. A new pool sweep will be installed. The existing heater will be retained since it is fairly new.

The Leisure Village pool was constructed 25 years ago and now needs a major renovation. Funding for this project will be included in the 1999-2000 budget with an estimated cost of \$124,000. The money originally planned for the work to be done this year (approximately \$50,000) will be shifted to complete conversion of the Shuffleboard Annex to the Recreation Center Annex.

The committee working on this is headed by Susan Rockwell, Recreation Facilities Manager; Ron Ceurvorst of the PRC; and Shelly Runge, assistant to the recreation manager.





Know Your Community Resources: Camarillo Health Care District

This is the first in a series of articles about resources in this community that offer special services for seniors. This is not intended to make any recommendations or preferences but to provide information which may be helpful.

The first resource selected for presentation is the Camarillo Health Care District (CHCD) because it is the largest one in terms of variety of programs offered and number of clients served. The CHCD was established in 1969 by the State of California as a special public not-for-profit local government agency. Its mission is to serve the health needs of the greater Camarillo area: City of Camarillo, Somis, Las Posas and Santa Rosa Valleys through a range of direct and indirect programs which include education, prevention, treatment and support.

According to Jane Rozanski, the Chief Executive Officer, since its founding, it has expanded from approximately 12 programs to almost 1000, and from a few hundred people served to almost 17,000 last year. In fact, the agency has just had to enlarge its facilities to accommodate these expanded services.

CHCD is staffed by eight full time and 26 part-time professionals, administrators and clerical personnel, plus more than 200 volunteers. The agency is financed from three sources: property taxes, participant fees, donations and grants.

Fees for services vary with the different programs, and scholarships are available as needed.

Wellness and preventive programs include innoculation clinics and health screenings for osteoporosis, depression, blood pressure and blood sugar.

Special assistance for seniors is offered through services such as Lifeline for emergency response, the nail care clinic, home companions, and transportation with Care-A- Van. There

people of all ages and in- are also adult day support vocacy Management for caregiver relief for special clients.

> Individual, couple and in able to help in understanding and coping with health problems. There are also a number of support groups for bereavement, care-givers, arthritis, women's issues, hearing loss, stepfamilies and others.

In addition to these direct services, CHCD also provides indirect services through contracts with certain non-profit groups such as Grey Law for legal assistance to seniors. HICAP for information about health insurance, and Patient Adhelp in negotiating with HM0's.

An official study by the Ventura County Grand Jury 1997 commended CHCD for being "attuned to the growing health care needs of the community, especially its seniors", and for providing services in "a well-managed and caring

It covers a lot more than earthquakes, however, including its noting in the latest issue, that as an order to evacuate may come at any time, ...it's important to include plans for evacuation as part of family, business, and

ness efforts." Obviously, the Disaster Preparedness exercise last month was timely!

Because it's so basic, a repetition of the importance of the "Buddy system" is in order! Any of you needing special assistance, but still remaining unclear as to the identity of your Buddy and their continuing ability to assist please, please call your Village Coordinator.

There's a further usefulness of the Buddy System for all Villagers, -- if you share rides with a neighbor during an ordered evacuation, the effect will be to cut in half the number of vehicles on our roadways!

Think about this and make the arrangement, as time saved will equal lives saved! Further, make sure you stow your evacuation diagram and Shelter in Place sheet in an easily remembered place, like the ESO pages of your Village phone book, or your car's glove compartment



Report On Electrical Deregulation

In May 1998, the Purchase Research Committee reported that an alternate electrical service provider instead of Southern California Edison had contracted with four Leisure Village residents to provide electrical power on the promise of electrical power cost reduction. As of this date, the alternate service provider has not been able to fulfill this promise.

The company representative was called and he reported that no cost savings could be realized for residential electrical service until the year 2002, at which time the Competitive Transition Charges ("CTC") now on electric bills as authorized by the California Public Utility Commission, will cease to be assessed.

Another service provider also contracted with a L.V. resident and has provided electric power for several months with no apparent cost savings.

This confirms the information previously received from Southern California Edison: CTC charges as authorized by the California Public Utility Commission would not offset any savings offered by alternate service providers until early

Until now this has been an exercise in frustration. In spite of advertised discount cost promotions by alternate providers, there is no further cost benefit available for residential electric power users beyond the original January 1998 SCE 10% rate cost reduction.

The Committee is now in a holding pattern and will continue to monitor the situ-

What Can Be Put Into **Recycle Bags**

An article appeared in the January 30, 1998, issue of ILV with a similar headline. There are many new residents in L.V. as well as many who have lived in L.V. for some time who might benefit from a repeat of the

The following is a report of what the January article included.

Harrison Industries, who handle the trash and recvcling pick-ups in L.V., have published a pamphlet listing the following things which are acceptable unless otherwise indicated:

Newspapers and all that comes in them. Please put in a bag, type unspecified.

Magazines, including catalogues, are all O.K.

Papers and junk mail. All types and colors of mixed paper. Put into see-through bags.

Cardboard boxes, flattened, also paper bags, egg cartons, cereal type boxes with plastic or wax paper inserts removed.

Glass—all food and beverage containers, empty and clean, labels and lids on are O.K.

Plastic bottles, clear and colored, with a "1" or "2" in the triangle on the bottom or side. This includes large milk, water, or juice bottles.

Metal containers—all food and beverage cans, empty and clean, labels and lids on are O.K.

No plastic grocery bags. At present Harrison has found no one to recycle these but many of the markets have a bin for recycling located in the front of the store.

No styrofoam, no flower pots, hoses, PVC pipes,

No food, landscape materials, bathroom wastes, oil, chemical, or liquid waste

Defibrillator Fund

Anyone who has experienced this traumatic event, and who is having a difficult time dealing with it, no matter how much time has elapsed since the loss, is encouraged to attend.



CLIP AND SAVE

Guidelines For Contributors To Inside Leisure Village

Reporters and publicity people submitting material to be used in Inside Leisure Village will help out the staff (and may enhance the reception of their material) if they will follow basic guidelines. These include:

1. Type all material, or we must take time to type it, a delay. If handwritten copy is absolutely necessary, submit it early.

2. Use full size 8" x 11" sheets of paper. Odd size sheets can get lost.
3. DO NOT TYPE IN

ALL CAPS: stories in all caps must be retyped.

4. Put writer's name and phone number in upper left corner.

5. Leave 2" of space at top of page for our nota-

6. Type group's name and writer's byline.

7. Double space each line and indent each paragraph.

8. Put the name of your group into the FIRST sentence of your story. This makes it easier to match with the right logo, if you have one.

9. Be sure your copy can be easily read. Do you need a new typewriter ribbon? Do the keys need cleaning? No red rib-bons, script type or Xerox copies, please. Clean prevents copy misunderstandings.

10. Submit your story on time. Deadline is Monday at 5:00 p.m., usually the first Monday of the month. Deadlines for the next paper are listed on page 2 of each issue. Please check the exact deadline and meet it. All material should be placed in the ILV mailbox in the east hall of the Rec Cen-

11. If your story must be late, call the coordinator and tell her when you can

get it in and why it must be late. Coordinator has the OPTION to accept or refuse the copy.

12. Call the coordinator to arrange in advance for a photographer to cover your event. Do not call | the photographer directly; he works on assignment from the coordinator only. Planning for each issue, including pictures, starts the first week of each month, so if you want pictures, we need notice.

13. A news story is not minutes of your meeting. Reading about events two months old is dull. What I is coming up for your group? Feature future

14. If ILV must cut your article because of space, the cutting generally starts at the end, so put your important information at the top, and then give the details.

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
