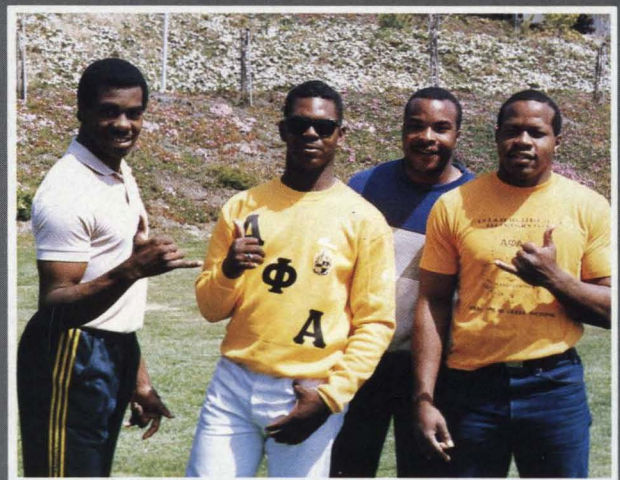

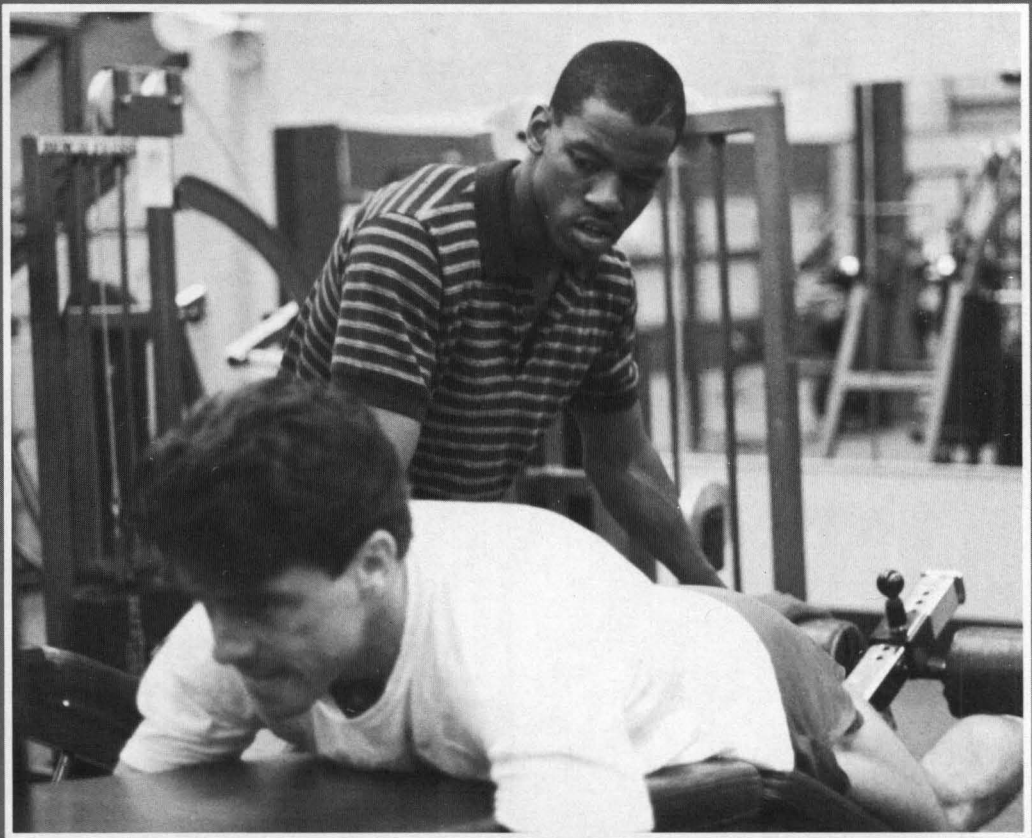

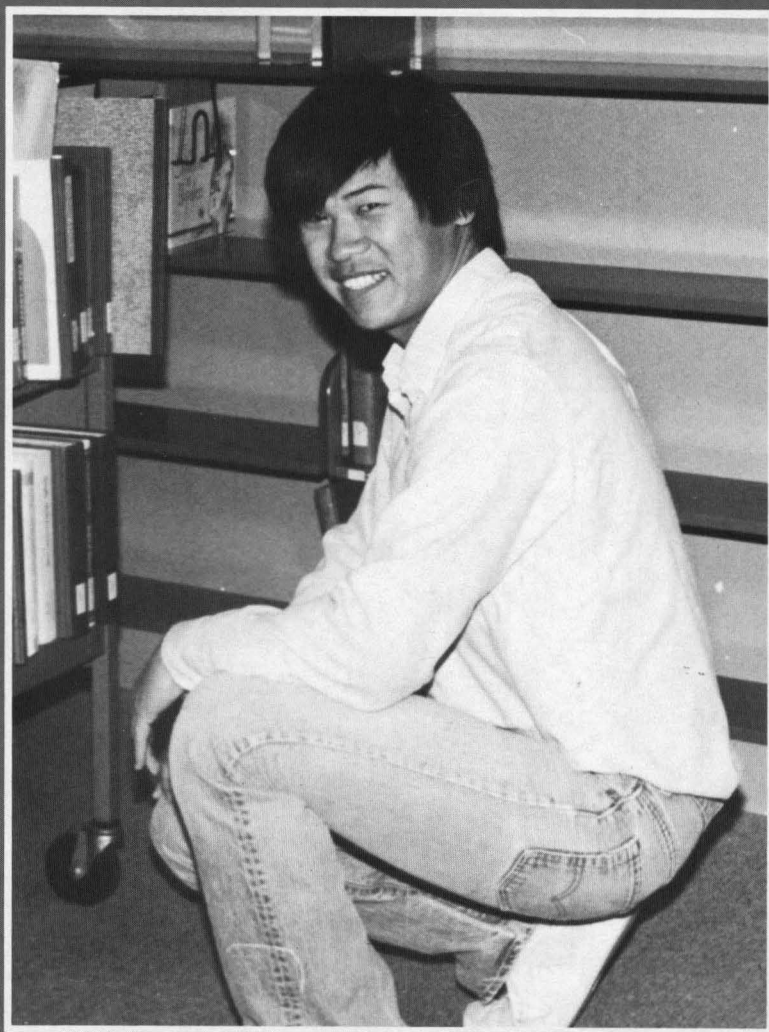

Boredom played no part in the lives of students who balanced study, social life and work. Seventy-four percent of Cal State students held part-time or full-time jobs, working at least 20 hours per week, according to the Office of Institutional Studies.

They worked at everything from traditional student occupations — slinging hash and ringing sales — to communicating with computers. Some didn't even have to leave campus. There were plenty of paid positions in the University Union, the bookstore and administrative offices. Money was not always the motivation. Unpaid internships provided many students with the experience from which great resumes are made.

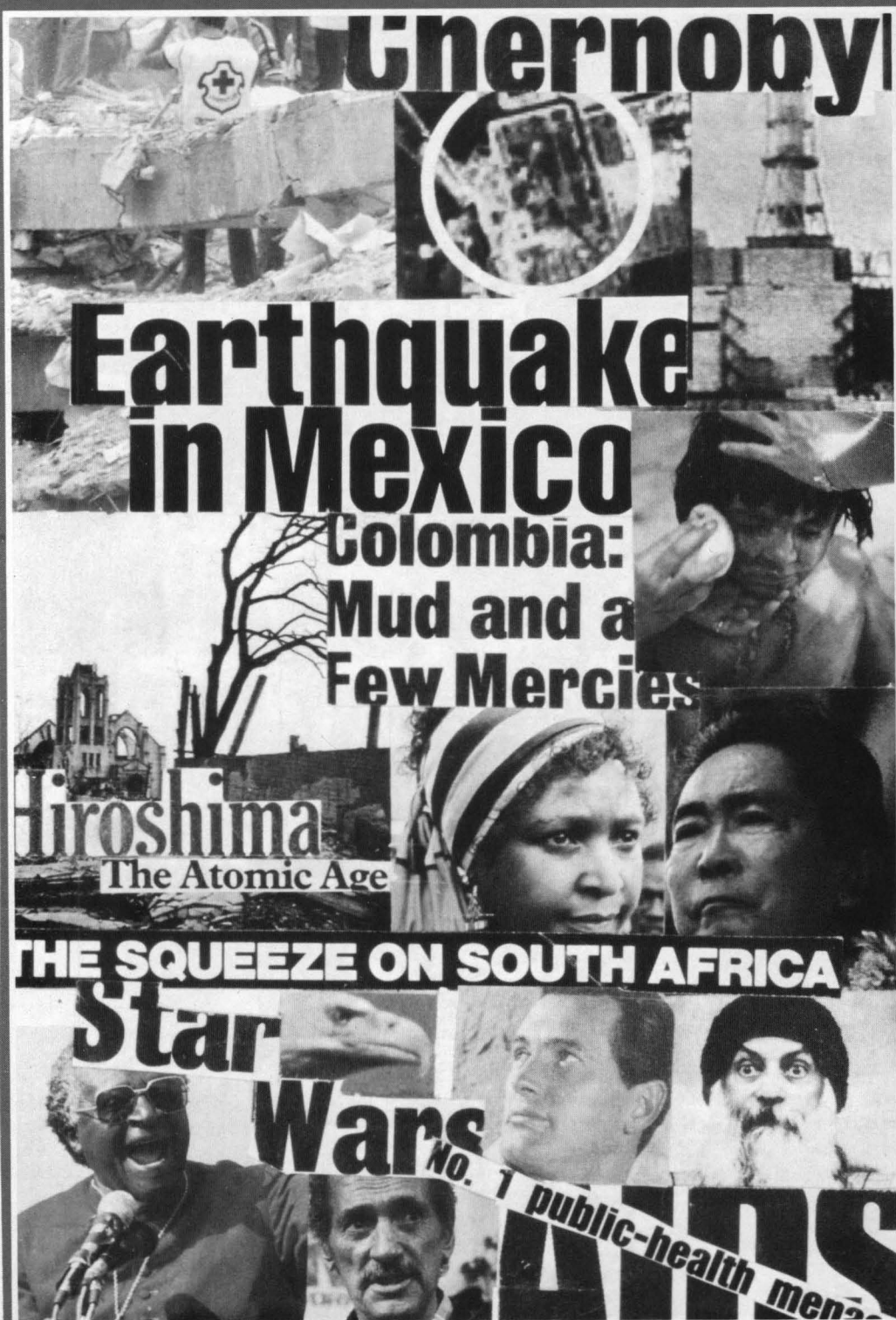

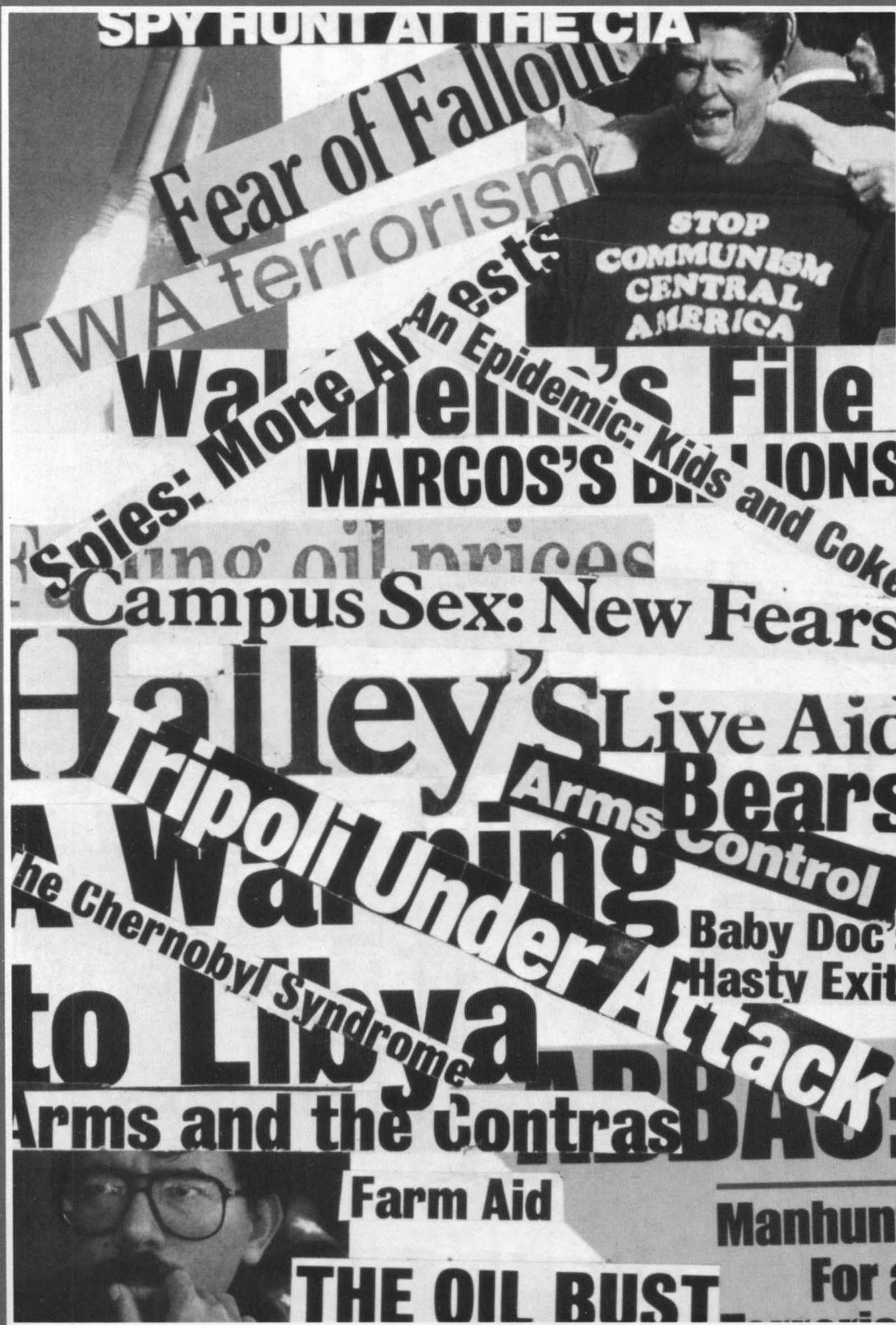

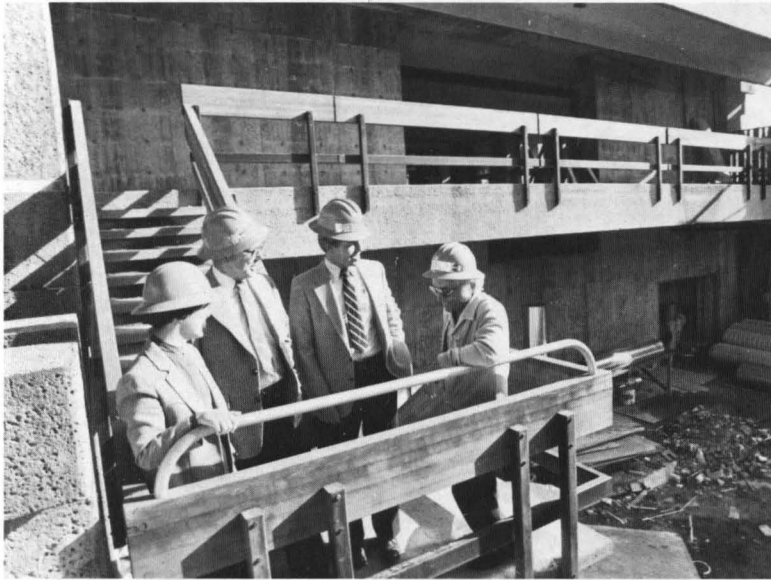

Birth of a Union



Amidst controversy over delays, budget over-runs, and other minor problems, the University Union opened on September 26, 1985 with an official ReUnion Day gala a month later.

Plans for the \$3.4 million project originated in 1976 and was approved in 1977 by the largest student election in Cal State's history. Seventy-one percent of the students who voted agreed to institute a University Union fee which now amounts to \$20 per year.

Setbacks pushed the opening, originally scheduled for the beginning of fall quarter 1984, to the September 26 date. Despite these early problems, the Union now enjoys popularity among students who use the facilities to relax between classes. If that was the intention of those who originally voted to begin construction, their vision of a central place for activities has been realized.

A Day in the Life of a Union



The much anticipated facilities of the University Union provided what many had hoped it would — a place for students to eat, socialize and gather for special activities between classes.

The puzzle, a place for students to buy beer and wine, quickly became a popular area on campus for students to gather. Equipped with multi-colored tables in various geometric shapes, a juke box, and a unique puzzle wall which divides the area from the regular eating section of the Union Square, an area providing an atmosphere for students to relax and enjoy themselves.

In the game room, pool tables, a ping-pong table, video games, and other board games, including Trivial Pursuit, are available for check-out use by the student body.

Students government offices were moved from the old, temporary student union building across from the bookstore to the top floor of the building along with other administration offices. Banquet facilities and meeting rooms are available for use by student organizations.

Throughout the building, students can listen to the campus radio station, KSUH, which broadcasts directly into the building.

Other special programs and activities were organized for the students, bringing what many see as an opportunity to change what has been called an apathetic atmosphere on campus.

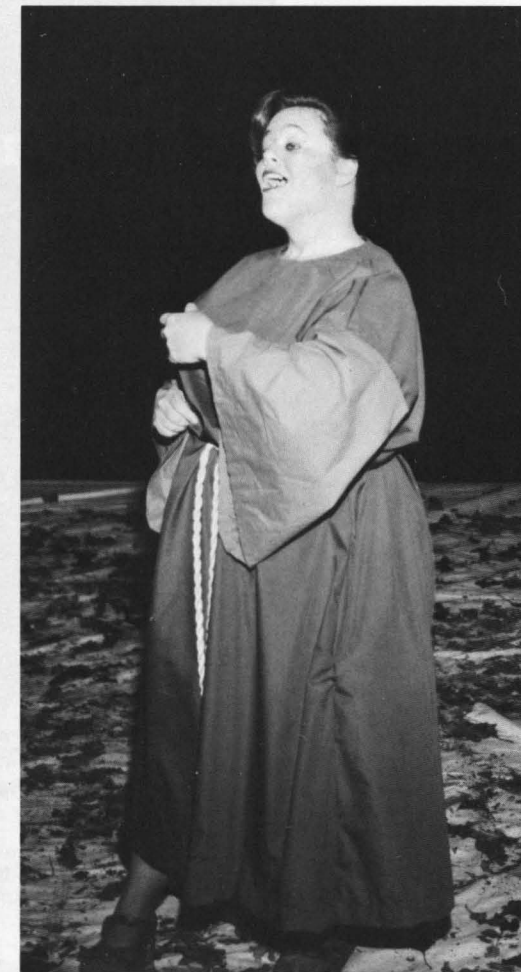

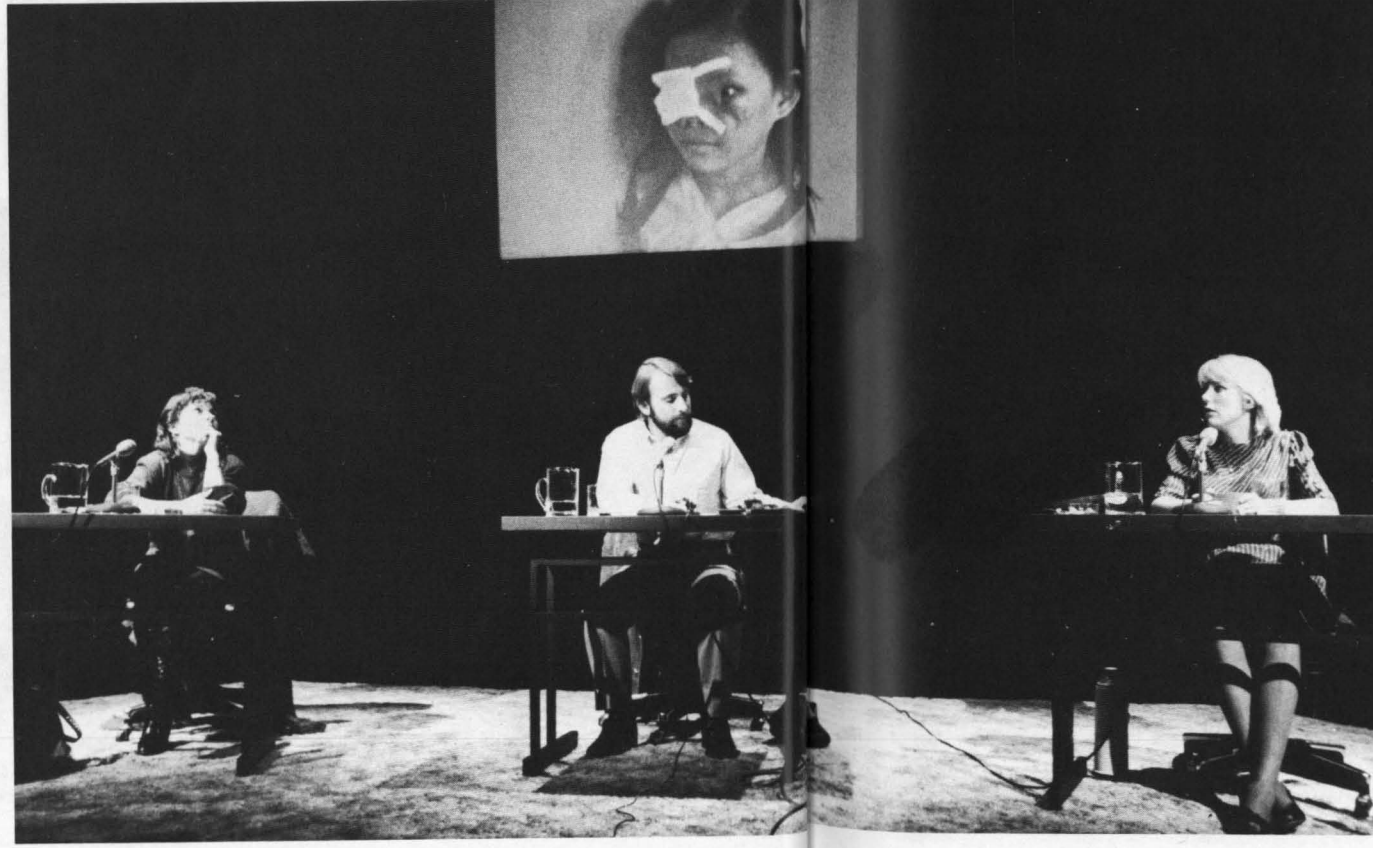

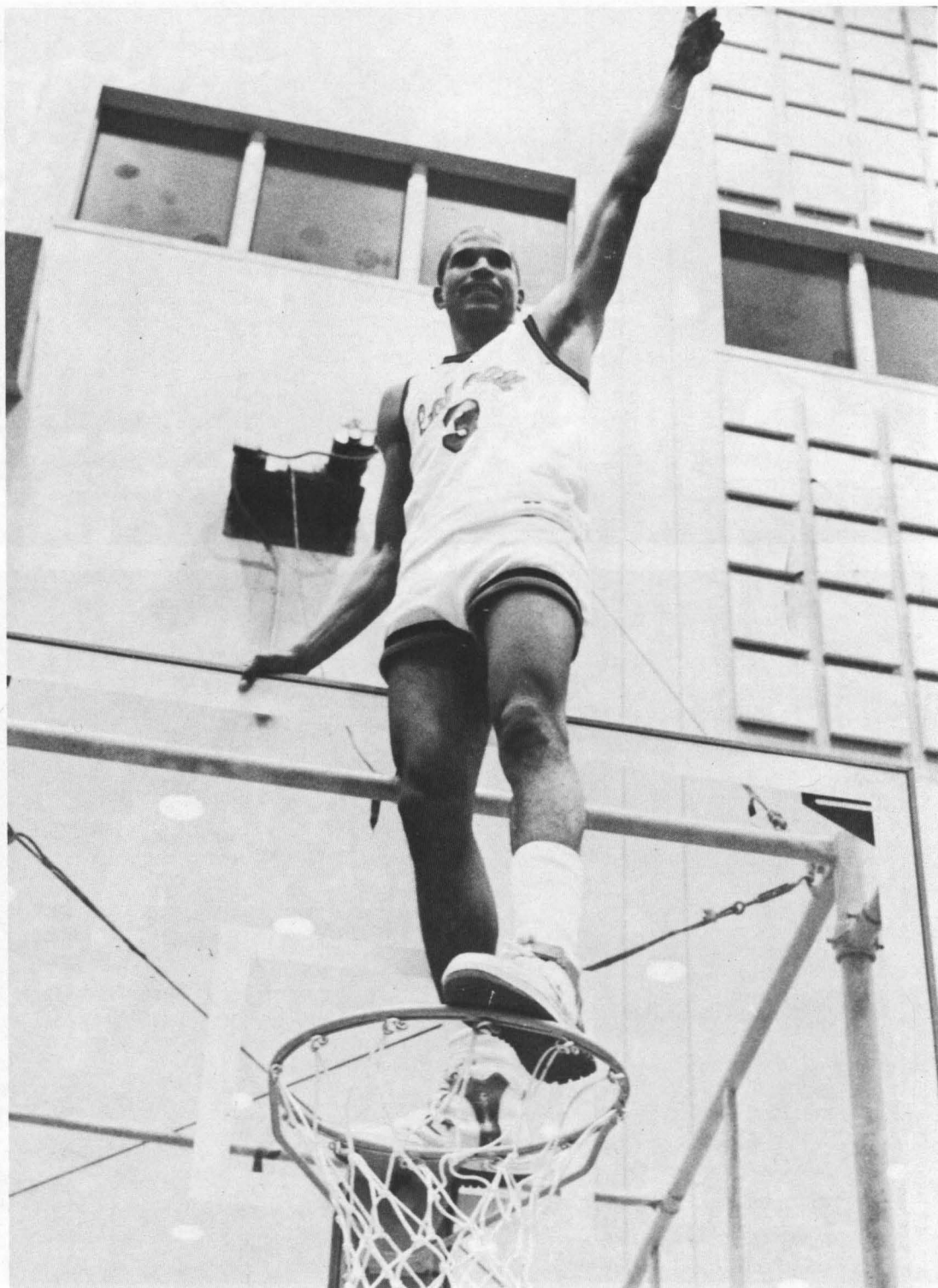

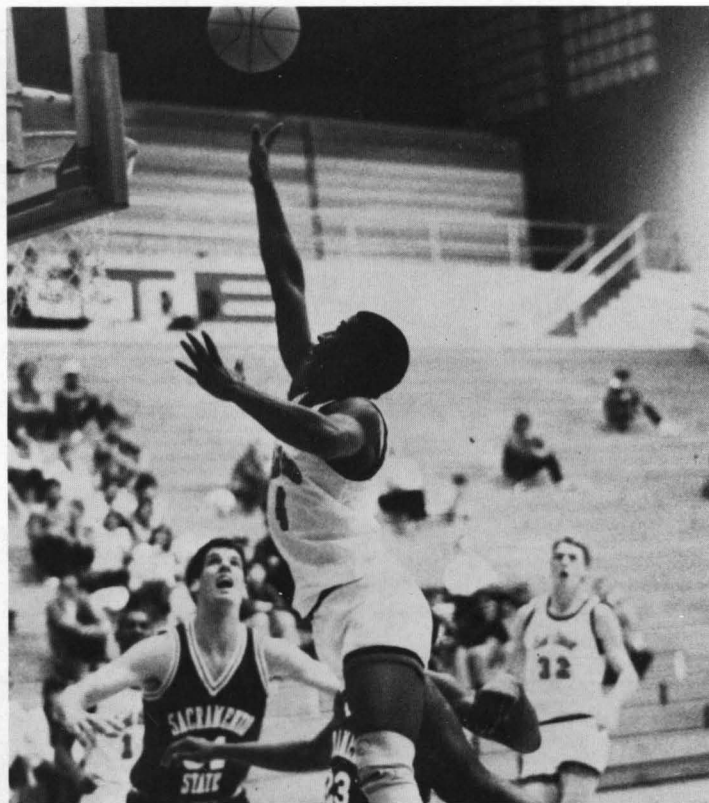




Men's Basketball

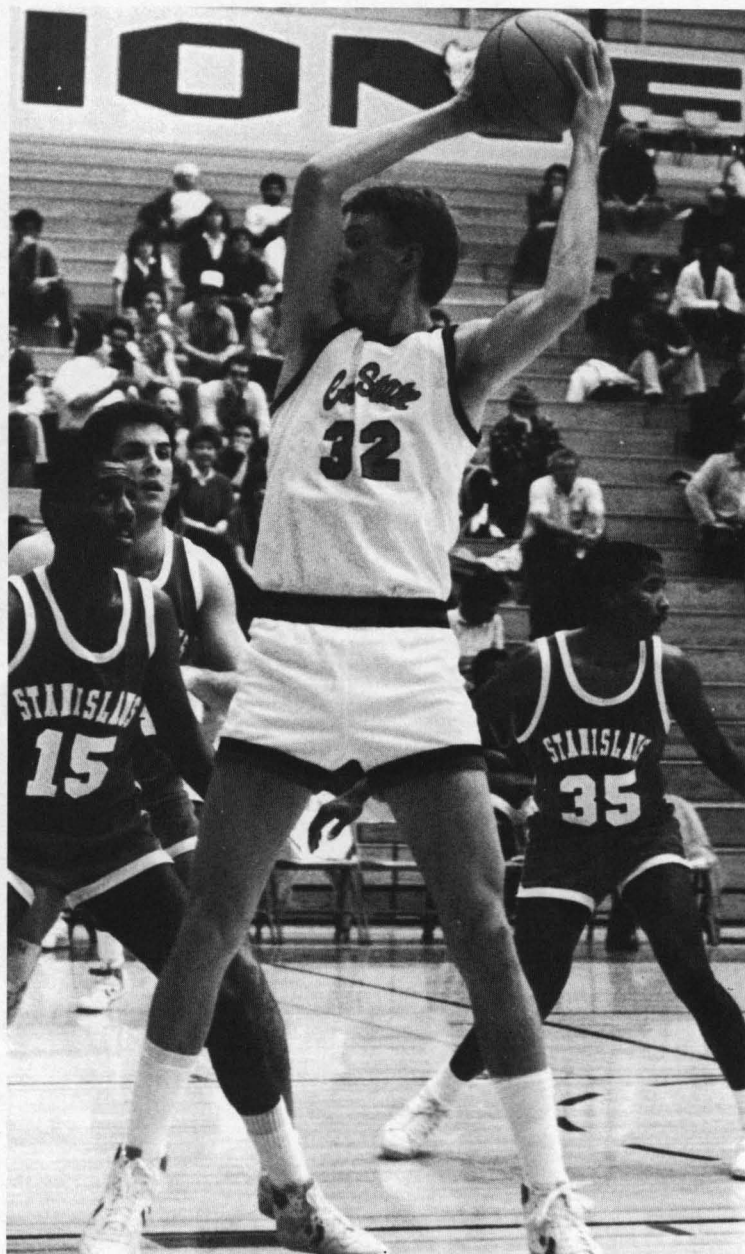
The Pioneers captured the NCAA Division II Western Regionals for the second straight year, as they defeated Cal Poly SLO 67-65 and University of Alaska-Anchorage 87-73. For the second straight year, the Pioneers lost in the quarter finals of the NCAA Division II playoffs. Cal State, Hayward was defeated by Southeast Missouri State University 86-69 at Cape Girardeau, Mo.

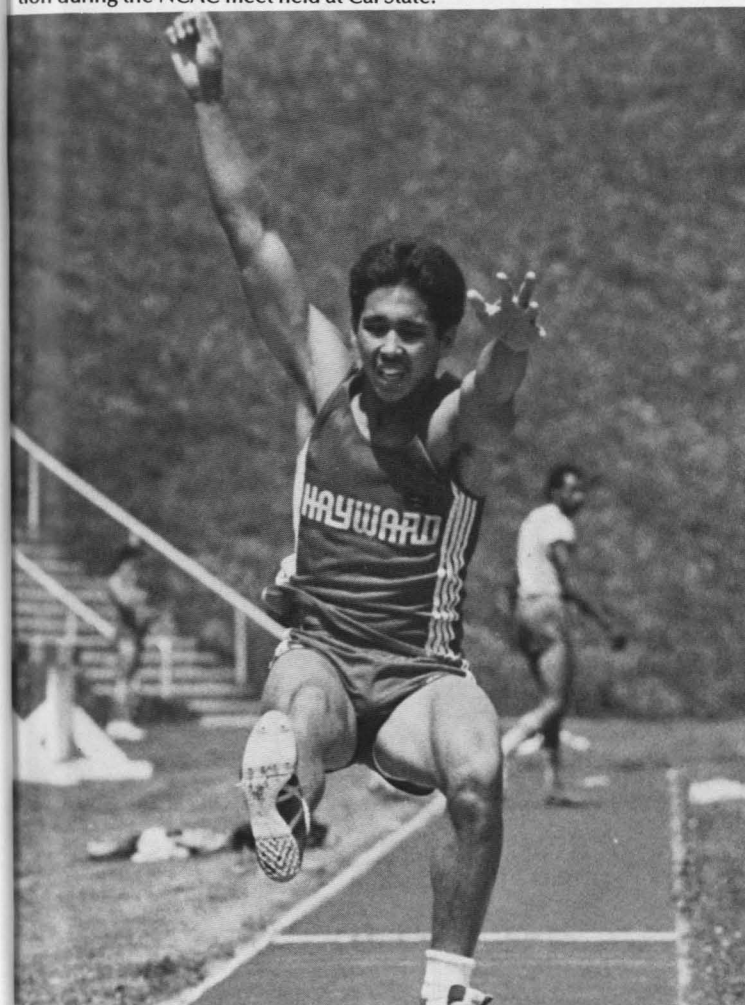

The Pioneer women's soccer team completed their most successful campaign ever, as it went a perfect 8-0 to win its second Northern California Athletic Conference championship. Overall, the Pioneers finished 18-1, the lone loss was a 4-3 decision to UC Santa Barbara in the opening round of the NCAA playoffs.

Fullback Denise Burley was selected as the NCAC Player of the Year. Burley, along with sophomore Michelle Nieto, freshmen Bev Reaume, Denise Regas, and All-American Kim Johnson were first-team selections. Pioneer Coach Colin Lindores was selected NCAC Coach of the Year. The future potential of this team is incredible.

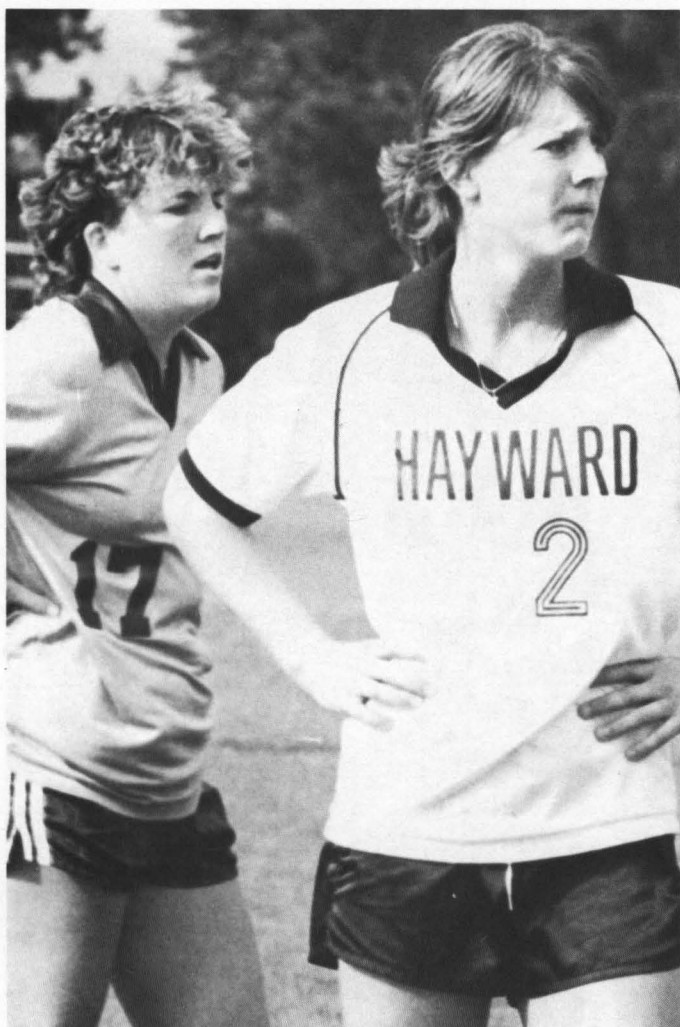

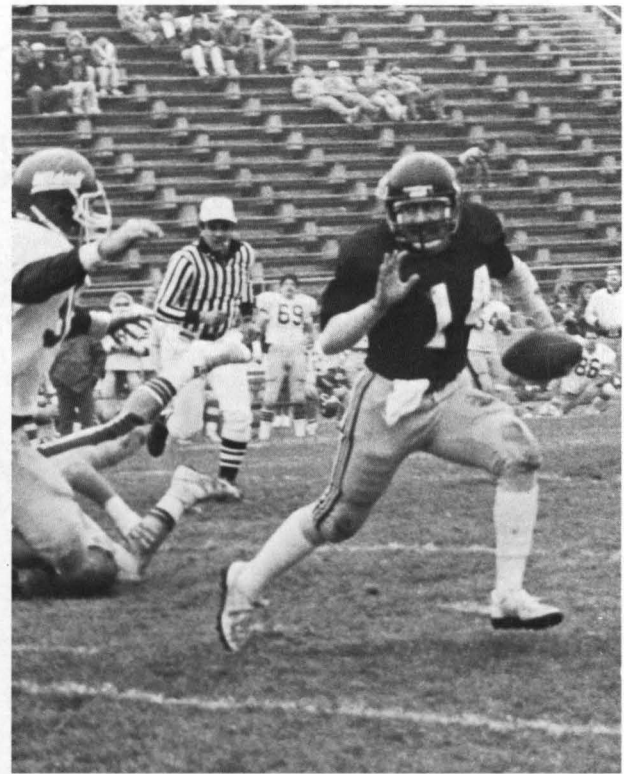


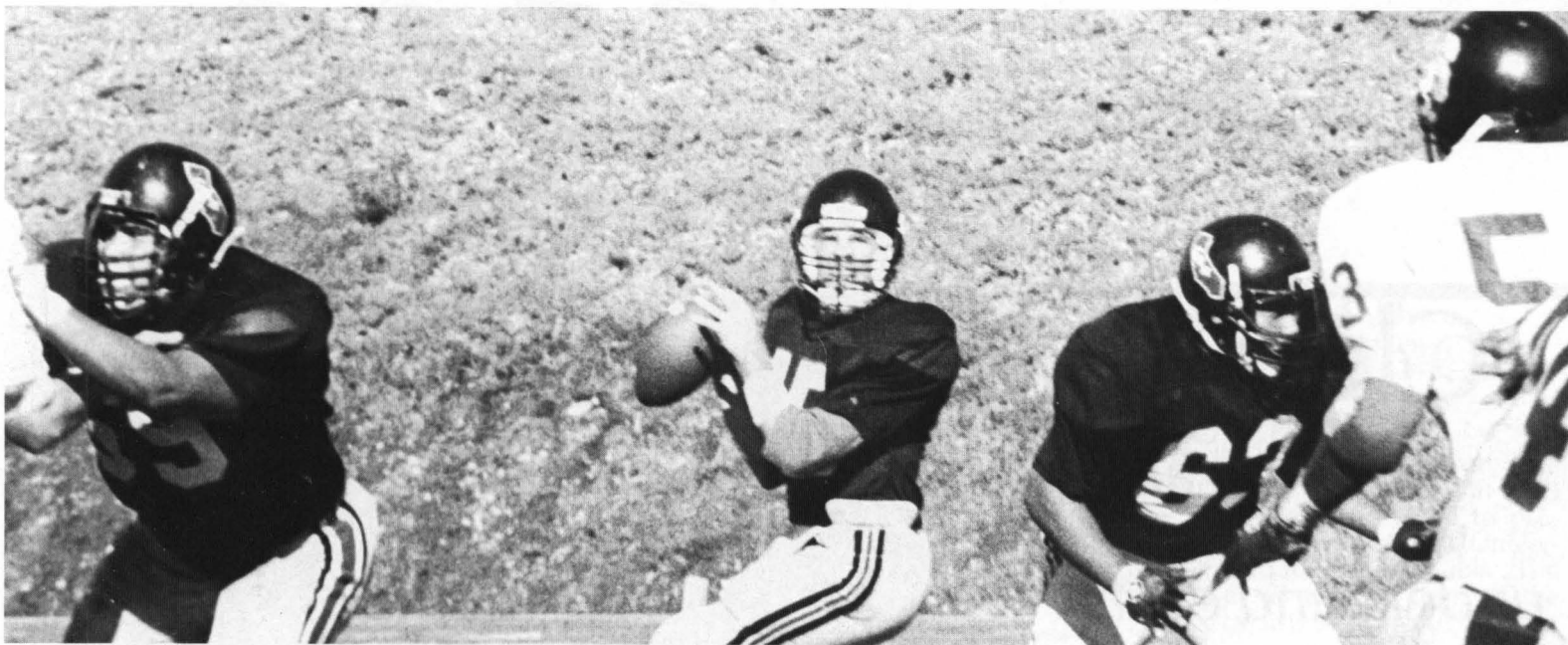
Football

Cal State finished the 1985 campaign with a 6-3-1 overall record. The Pioneers placed third in the NCAC with a 2-2-1 record. The Pioneer defense led the NCAC in allowing an average of 294.8 yards a contest. Cal State broke a school record for rushing defense and ranked 6th in Division II allowing 67.2 yards per game.

Defensively, linebacker Jae Terry broke a school record with 128 tackles. Safety Danny Brown led the Pioneers with 8 interceptions and received All-American honors. Safety Walter Washington turned in a solid junior campaign with five interceptions five fumble recoveries, three blocked punts, and a safety. Washington scored three touchdowns.

Nine players earned First Team All-NCAC honors: Center Casey Ireland, tackle Steve Perez, running back Lonell Conner, defensive end Eric Houston, defensive tackle Tony Valencia, linebackers Joe Terry and Junior Tai, and safeties Danny Brown and Walter Washington.

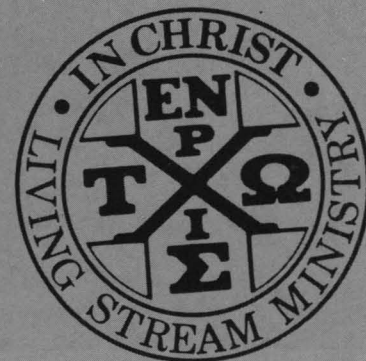
Asian Students Union enjoys year-round fun

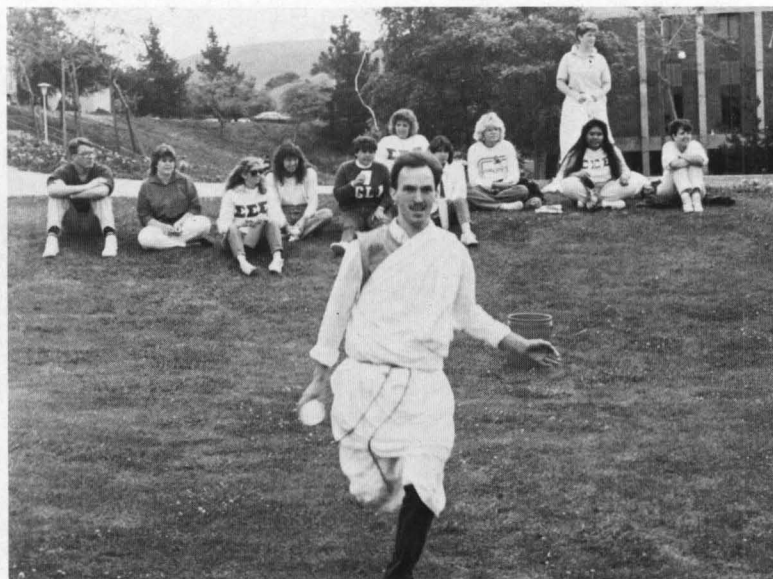

Greek Week



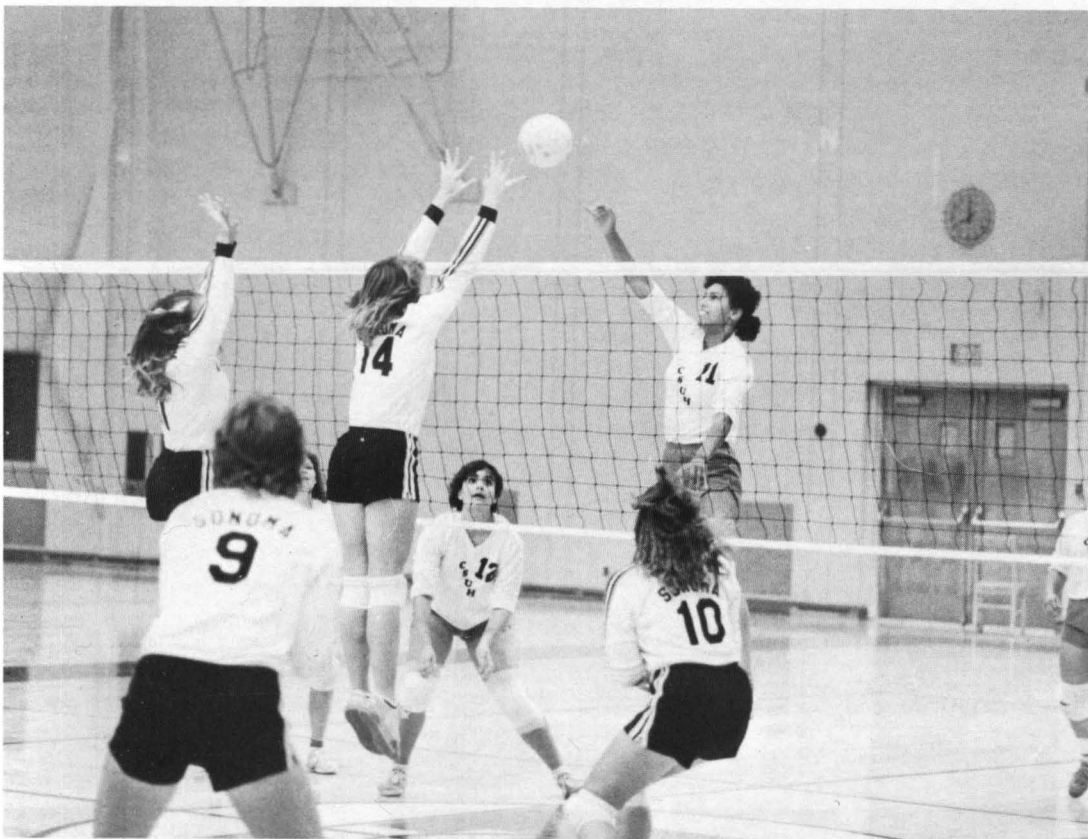

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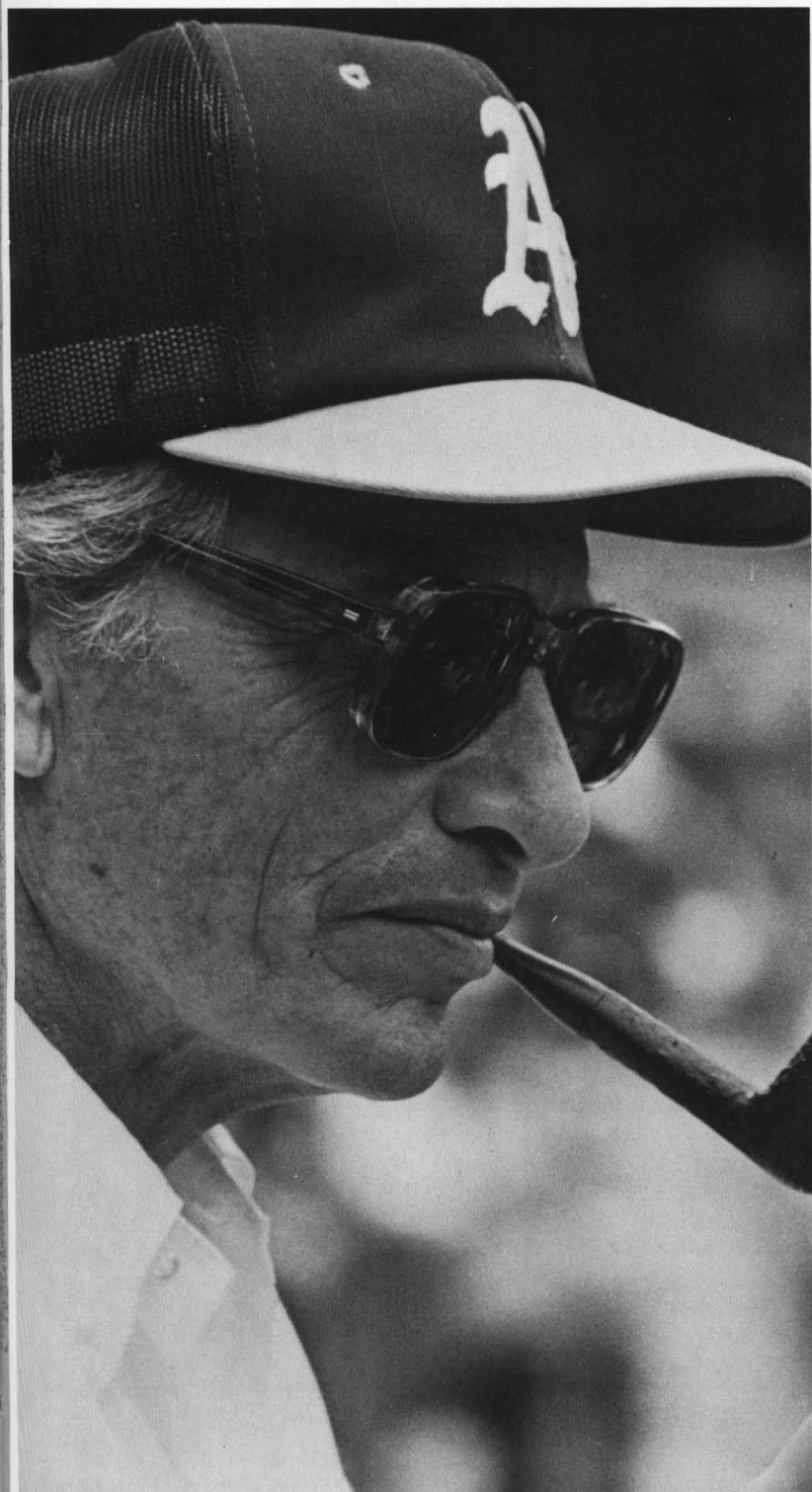

The 1985/86 school year has been an eventful one for the campus media, KSUH, *Escape*, and *The Pioneer*.

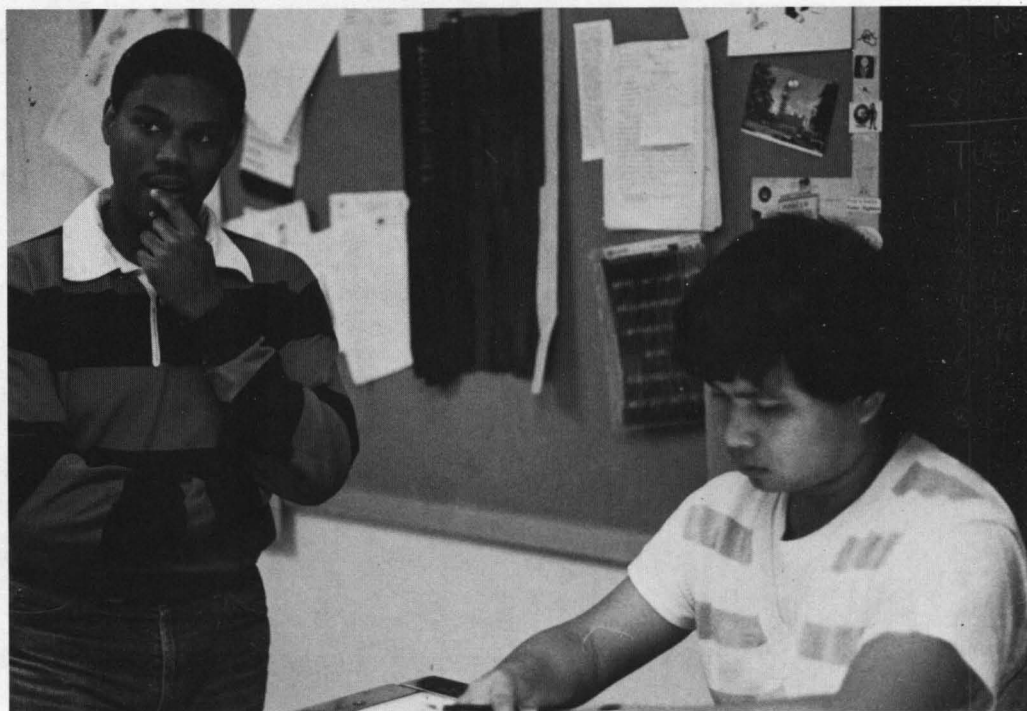
Campus radio station KSUH began broadcasting its signal into the University Union this year. The broadcast marks the first return to the Union since the building reopened from years of remodeling. KSUH broadcasted live from the University Union on April 15. General Manager Dave Corona and staff played various styles of music with occasional interruptions for news updates. KSUH airs weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and its broadcast frequency is 890 on the AM dial. Mass Communication Lecturer Patricia Robinson was this year's KSUH advisor.

The University Union magazine, *Escape* ran away with several awards at this year's California Interscholastic Press Association magazine awards, winning seven out of the eleven categories. The CIPA sponsored competition was held in Irvine, California, with about 25 Cal State University and University of California campus publications participating. *Escape* was honored with an award for general excellence and an award in the 1986 Magazine Sweepstakes, which is given to the magazine that presents a well-rounded representation of category awards.

Cal State student newspaper *The Pioneer* also won two awards from the CIPA convention in competition with other weekly newspapers. Vicki Wong won first place for Best Editorial Cartoon, and Glenn Gehlke won an honorable mention for the Best Newspaper News Story.
