ROBERT A. KENNELLY APPOINTED VICE PRESIDENT, ADMINISTRATION

President McCune announces the appointment of Dr. Robert A. Kennelly as Vice President, Administration, effective immediately. This action is taken upon recommendation of the Ad Hoc Advisory Committee for the Selection of the Vice President, Administration.

Vice President Kennelly, 50, came to Cal State, Hayward in September, 1967 as Interim Vice President, Administration. He had previously served as Associate Dean for Academic Planning in the Chancellor's Office in Los Angeles.

A graduate of the State University of Iowa where he was awarded the Ph. D. in Geography in 1952, Vice President Kennelly joined the Cal State Long Beach faculty in 1952. In 1957 he was appointed Head, Department of Social Sciences and in 1958 was named Chairman, Division of Social Sciences. He was appointed to the Chancellor's staff in 1964.

GEORGE H. PETERSON APPOINTED DEAN OF ACADEMIC PLANNING

President McCune announces the appointment of Dr. George H. Peterson as Dean of Academic Planning, effective June 1. This action is taken upon the recommendation of the Ad Hoc Committee to Select a Dean of Academic Planning and the Vice President, Academic Affairs.

A graduate of the University of California, Berkeley where he was awarded the Ph. D. in Biological Science, Dean Peterson joined the faculty in September 1963, was appointed Associate Dean of Instruction in 1966 and was named Acting Dean of Academic Planning last September.

E. GUY WARREN ELECTED CHAIRMAN OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES

E. Guy Warren, Hayward businessman and civic leader, has been elected chairman of the Board of Trustees of the California State Colleges for 1970-71. He replaces Daniel H. Ridder of Long Beach. Warren has been a member of the Board of Trustees for nine years.

He is the owner of Warren Transportation Company which he founded in 1928, and has served five terms as president of the California Trucking Association. Warren is vice chairman of the AC Transit District, a member of the Alameda County Fair Board and past president of the Western Highway Institute. He was awarded a B.A. in engineering from the University of California, Berkeley in 1923.

ACTIONS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

LOS ANGELES--The Board of Trustees of the California State Colleges took the following actions at its Wednesday, May 27, 1970, meeting:

- Resolved that no action be taken on the proposed revision of grievance and disciplinary action procedures for academic personnel, and accepted the recommendation of the Ad Hoc Committee of the Academic Senators and the State College Presidents that (1) the Ad Hoc Committee be continued with representation of Trustees and Chancellor's staff, (2) the Committee prepare an interim report for the July meeting and a final report for the September meeting of the Board, and (3) the Committee consider all the aspects of the procedures as outlined in attachment D of its statement submitted to the Committee on Faculty and Staff Affairs.
- Approved a plan for accommodating an additional enrollment of 3,200 full-time equivalent community college transfer students; and increased the tuition for foreign students from \$360 to \$600 per year per full-time student effective in Fall 1970-71.
- Increased the tuition for non-resident students (does not include students who are citizens and residents of a foreign country) from \$890 to \$1,110 per year per full-time student effective in Fall 1970-71.
- Resolved that adjustments be made in the Summer quarter to coincide with the fiscal year; approved a plan to finance continuation of quarter system, year-round operation; and further resolved that the reduction of 38 faculty positions has been adopted in the amount of \$430,000 only as a last recourse, and because of its impact on the instructional program the Board requests reconsideration of this funding source by the Legislature and the State Administration.
- Requested the Chancellor to proceed immediately with a study of the overall committee structure of the Board, with particular attention to matters of student affairs, and that the Chancellor present a report to the Board.

OUTSTANDING PROFESSOR AWARDS

Dr. James L. (Lew) Comer, professor of Physical Education, has been selected as Cal State Hayward's nominee for the CSC Trustees' Outstanding Professor Awards. The nomination was made by the Academic Personnel Committee.

The Outstanding Professor Award is given to honor a distinguished scholar who has contributed to the stature of the California State Colleges because of his outstanding nature of his contribution to his field in terms of teaching, research and publication or creative production, which has earned him national or international recognition.

Winners of the cash award will be named prior to the opening of the fall term.

A TIP OF THE HAT TO THE DIVISION HEADS

The imminent reorganization of the College into schools draws attention to the men who have led the divisions.

The senior division head is Dr. Karl Ernst, Head of the Division of Creative Arts and Chairman of the Department of Music. Dr. Ernst, one of the first members appointed to the faculty in 1959, came to the College from a distinguished career as a professor of music in several colleges and as the director of music in the San Francisco Unified School District. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the National Society of Music Education and served as that Society's President from 1964-68. He is a member of the Advisory Board of the National Cultural Center in Washington, D. C. In 1968 he was a Fulbright Lecturer to Australia. His activities at the College have involved him in the development of three departments and in the planning of two major buildings. The present Music Building with its unusual architecture is a tribute to his imagination and to his ability to combine function with excellent design. Dr. Ernst will teach graduate classes in the School of Music, University of Michigan during the Fall term 1970 and will return to a full teaching load at Cal State in January 1971.

Dr. Lewie Burnett was appointed Head of the Division of Education in 1964. He had earlier served as the Head of the Education Division at Fresno State College, but left that job for a year to act as Assistant Superintendent of the Great Neck Schools in New York. He also served as Dean of the College of Education at the University of Toledo. He held a Fulbright lectureship at the University of Amsterdam in 1967-68.

Dr. Harvey Scudder, Head of the Division of Health and Biological Sciences, is a professor of microbiology. He also served as Acting Head of the Division of Science and Mathematics in 1968. He came to the College from an excellent career in the U. S. Public Health Service and the National Institute of Health. He has been profoundly interested in the development of curricula in health services at Cal State.

Cal State, Hayward also has four acting division heads:

Dr. Peter Geiser, Division of Social and Behavioral Sciences; Dr. George Resnikoff, Division of Science and Mathematics; Dr. Richard Rice, Division of Humanities; and Dr. L. Glen Strasburg, Division of Business and Economics.

FALL, 1971 UNDERGRADUATE APPLICATIONS

LOS ANGELES--Chancellor Glenn S. Dumke has announced that applications from undergraduates planning to enter in Fall, 1971, will be accepted beginning Nov. 1, 1970.

A similar announcement was made by the University of California, marking the first time a common applications date has been established by the two systems of state-supported higher education.

Dr. David Kagan, Coordinator of Admissions Services for The California State Colleges, said the uniform date was agreed on to assist students in formulating their educational plans early and to give them an opportunity to consider alternative plans if campuses of their first choice were filled.

The action is consistent with a recent resolution by the Coordinating Council for Higher Education and with discussions with representatives of high schools and Community Colleges.

PROFESSIONAL HONORS AND ACTIVITIES

KARL D. ERNST (Music) has been invited to teach graduate classes in the School of Music, University of Michigan, during the Fall term 1970. He will return to a full teaching load at Cal State in January 1971. During July he will participate in a Seminar sponsored by the International Society for Music Education in Stockholm. Delegates have been invited from thirty countries representative of all continents. During the following week he will attend the Ninth Biennial Conference of the ISME in Moscow. He will present papers at both meetings.

The National Science Foundation, through the National Science Teachers Association, has appointed ROBERT C. WHITNEY (Earth Science) to a team of six science educators who will study facilities for science programs in junior and senior high schools. The NSF grant of \$58,750 provides for trips by each team member to ten to fifteen schools with outstanding science facilities in his geographic region; general meetings of team members in Washington, D. C.; and the final outcome of the study which is to be a publication that will serve as an idea source for the study of science.
