During the recent Disaster Preparedness Exercise the Emergency Services Organization, in conjunction with the Your Neighbors Care Group and the City of Camarillo, reviewed procedures to be followed after a large earthquake or other life threatening event.

The recent spate of light to moderate earth-quakes and the recent discovery of deeper faults beneath the city of Los Angeles underscores the fact that we live in a seismically active area and that we need to be prepared to survive in this environment.

Thus while our present lifestyle has not yet been affected, it is prudent for us as individuals to prepare for the worst case by taking steps to provide for our own survival. Survival Guides have been issued to all Village residents (or are available upon request) and they should be reviewed periodically to remind us to obtain those items we may need in case of emergency.

Typical items would include drinking water, flashlight, street shoes nearby, battery-operated portable radio, etc. A white (I'm OK) flag should be handy too. As additional benefit, these supplies being quickly available will also provide peace of mind in that you have done all you can to be ready.

The Camarillo Daily News has recently run several excellent articles listing his many contributions to the city as a member of the City Council, two terms as major. These mentioned several in particular — his successful campaign to open Adolfo Road to the intersection with Ponderosa and the fact that he was able to obtain public transportation for East Camarillo by offering subsidies combining the Leisure Village bus system with public transportation. Bill was also instrumental in opening the Woodcreek-Upland Road connection over the hill to Lewis and Las Posas. He insisted on the improvements to Lewis Road which is still a very busy highway and a vital freeway connection both north and south. As of the time of his retirement he is still trying to get the new Santa Rosa-101 improvements to move faster.

The above accomplishments were not to benefit just East Camarillo. The whole city has been helped. When Adolfo was opened up it made possible a whole new industrial zone with more jobs and easier access from town. It also has been of great benefit to emergency vehicles and made a short-cut to and from Pleasant Valley Hospital.

Those of us who have lived here long enough can remember when driving to Camarillo from LV meant the freeway or taking Pleasant Valley Road to either Lewis or Las Posas.

Villagers know of Bill's career as a Village leader. He had long been in various types of public service even before he and his wife, Helen, arrived here. Shortly after coming to the Village he served a year on the Board of Directors under Leisure Tech. He was then elected to our first full board and was chosen President. Later he served on the Camrosa Water Board. He was on numerous committees and was a real architect of our present government and its body of rules. His whole life has been public service.

Bill, there's no way that we won't be calling on you for your advice, common sense and experience. You may be able to get in a little more golf and time with your trains, but we need you more than ever. The Village buildings are getting older, inflation is bringing in a whole new series of problems, renovation of certain areas (buildings and landscaping) is an ongoing process.

We deeply appreciate all your accomplishments and all you have done for us in the past, but we're still depending on you, First Citizen.
