

The recent Leisure Village election, held on June 19, attracted the largest number of ballots ever cast in any election for the Board of Directors. This was the first election without cumulative voting.

The proceedings generally went smoothly; however, certain problems

were noted, especially confusion about the use of proxies and absentee ballots. In spite of the written instructions, there were errors such as nothing written on the white envelope; more than one envelope per Leisure Village unit; more than three votes on the ballot; Leisure Village address missing from the outside return address. Unfortunately, as a result, approximately 75 ballots had to be invalidated; the mistakes by these homeowners deprived them of their voting opportunity.

The following suggestions and changes have been proposed by the Election Committee to correct these problems in future elections: 1) Continue the use of absentee ballots but discontinue the use of proxies. This change would require a vote of the homeowners as stated in California Civil Code, Section 7613F. 2) Include the address of the Leisure Village unit in advance on the white envelope, and use pre-sorted mail to reduce postage costs. 3) Set the

deadline for voting earlier, at 5:00 p.m. on the day preceding the annual meeting. This would permit the members of the Election Committee to attend the annual meeting and to announce the final tally at the time. These changes would eliminate the need for a separate Registration Committee and also the expense of printing a proxy and two different ballots, thus reducing the costs as well as the complication of the election procedure.

Communications

There is a way to further improve communications between the Board of Directors and Residents/Homeowners whenever a matter under consideration by the Board is important enough to be treated or covered by an addition to or change in the Rules and Regulations of the Association.

After a new addition to or change in the R & Rs is presented to the Homeowners as "First Reading," at an Open Board Meeting under the classification of New Business, it would be helpful if a Board Member would explain the reasons for the proposed addition or change. Then at a subsequent Open Board Meeting, after the "Second Reading," but before a vote for adoption is taken, a limited opportunity should be made for Homeowners to ask questions about or express objections to the proposal. This should be followed by a public vote, by each Director, for or against the proposal, with or without comment.

This practice is similar to that followed by the City Councils of Camarillo and Thousand Oaks, the Ventura County Board of Supervisors and other entities when passing or rejecting a proposal to create or modify an ordinance. Our Rules and Regulations are our ordinances. They deserve public review before adoption.

Credit Card Scam

Villagers are warned about receiving in the mail pre-approved credit cards with their names and addresses on them. If the resident does not want the unsolicited credit card, he/she is warned to tear or cut up the paperwork and the plastic card before throwing them in the trash.

The local bank has warned the LVA office that several such cards, discarded but not destroyed, were being used by the wrong people. Two such incidents of the unauthorized use of such unsolicited cards were reported last week. The cards were made out to villagers but used fraudulently by someone else.

If you receive but do not want such a credit card, make sure that you DESTROY IT and the enclosed papers. No one wants to pay the bills for another person's fraudulent spending spree.

ILV Wants To Print Original Material



Architectural Committee Activity Report

At the Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors it was reported that the Architecture Committee processed 506 permits in the past year. The committee thought villagers would be interested in seeing the breakdown. It is as follows:

203 fence repair, 71 escrow and lease inspections, 72 new garage doors, 25 new gutters or concrete borders, 12 satellite dishes, 14 new patio covers, 9 patio enclosures, 21 skylights and/or solar tubes, 8 new wood fences, 34 slump stone walls, and 36 Miscellaneous applications.

On average each application required at least two or three site visits by the assigned inspector. This means that approximately 1500 inspections were made in the year.

The committee members who made these inspections unselfishly gave their time to do this work. They deserve your thanks. They were Ernie Slabotsky, asst. chairman; Dan Davis, secretary; Oleg Lopatin, Bobbie Comer, Rudy Regen, Joe Wallace, and Ben Smithkin.

The fence repair on the main drives was a surprise

project which caused quite a bit of excitement. Although it was not a popular happening, it did result in over 200 fences being repaired in just a few months where it might not have occurred without the "graffiti." This surprise required the Architectural committee Inspectors to work overtime to process the application and inspect the work.

At the same time the edict to "lighten up" the village was in the works. This program required our color experts, Bobbie Comer and Oleg Lopatin, to spend many hours analyzing numerous color combinations in order to arrive at a workable solution. The painting of the wood trim in the Village is in the works now. The contracts should be awarded and painting should begin soon.

A statement is being prepared which will explain the procedure we developed for the change from the Norfolk Brown, currently on most of the fences and trim, to the lighter colors. Bobbie Comer explained the procedure to many of the villagers who attended the annual meeting. The color boards are on display in the Recreation Office for your review.

The arrival of the slump

stone wall in the Village has given new life to the appearance of the homes. Since the Annual Report at least 10 more new applications have been received and it is expected that more will continue to be submitted to replace the old wood fences all over the Village.

Lastly, as reported at the meeting, the committee has decided that ALL garage doors will eventually be lightened. Almond is the color for all composite or metal garage doors which come with a factory finish. Each manufacturer's Almond may have a slightly different tint but it will not be required that these doors be painted. All garage doors that have been painted and all new wood garage doors will be changed to Navajo #307 when the contractors paint the trim. This color is from Frazee Paint Co. If residents want to paint doors themselves, a permit can be obtained at the LVA office. Residents Services will do the painting at resident's expense, if you prefer. The price is reasonable. Don't forget to get a permit first.





Villager Has First Book Published

"I didn't think it would be this hectic," exclaimed the diminutive but dynamic woman living in V 17. The tempo of the life of Kittie Templeton has picked up since the publication of her first book in June.

"That phone call was from Barnes & Noble (Book Co.). They want me to schedule several book signing appearances in their stores!" she states in amazement.

Her novel, titled "Righteous Rebel," is based on the true story of Adam Cloud, her great great grandfather, and the Natchez Intrigues around 1790-1795. Her book name is Catherine Cloud Templeton.

Her son and grandson live in Maui.



Leaking Underground Fuel Tank (LUFT)

The fuel tanks in which the Leisure Village Association (LVA) stores gasoline and diesel fuel were believed to be leaking in January 1992. Subsequently, it was discovered the couplings connecting the tanks had leaked. Contractors were retained to dig-up the old tanks, install a new double walled fiberglass tank and build a new "filling station" for LVA use.

Spills must be reported to the Ventura County Environmental Health Division (VCEHD), the agency delegated by the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) to provide oversight for the clean-up of all LUFT sites. The VCEHD indicated to the former LVA Maintenance Supervisor, that consultant specialists in LUFT clean-up could be retained to plan and supervise the: (1) Borehole drilling to identify the depth and lateral extent to which the spill had spread and to determine whether or not groundwater had been contaminated. (2) Clean up of the contaminated earth and/or groundwater.

The Purchase Research Committee (PRC) was asked to find a disposal site for the contaminated mate-

rials that were recovered in the drilling stage. Additionally, a qualified member of the PRC reviewed all of the work and analyzed the reports done by consultants to that time. It was concluded that the contamination was minimal and that the sophisticated suggestions made by the consultants were unnecessary. Several meetings were held with the consultant and personnel from VCEHD to try to reach agreement on a practical, inexpensive way to bring clean up of the site to closure. It also became necessary to change consultants in order to assure a practical solution.

The PRC made contact with officials at the state level to confirm that a more practical solution was indeed possible. However, the VCEHD personnel were adamant that LVA would have to attempt a sophisticated but highly doubtful procedure. LVA verbally appealed that decision and had meetings with regional members of the SWRCB. No agreement was reached. The PRC reached the conclusion that conventional science and common sense indicated that bacteria, which occur naturally in the

earth, would clean up the site better and probably as quick as any of the recommended solutions except total excavation of the site. Excavation of the site would have required demolition and rebuilding of a portion of the Administration Building for a total cost of \$379,000. The VCEHD agreed to drop this option.

Fortunately, the SWRCB had, simultaneously, contracted with Lawrence Livermore National Laboratories (LLNL) to research the problem statewide. The LLNL conclusion agreed with the PRC recommendation for remediation of all sites falling into the category of the LVA LUFT site. The SWRCB, acting on the LLNL conclusion, assigned personnel to the VCEHD for review of cases similar to the LVA LUFT site.

Obviously, the time was right to request closure of the LVA LUFT site. Final closure was granted on March 19, 1997.

California collects a tax on gasoline for use in the Underground Storage Tank Cleanup Fund Program. Basically, the money is used to reimburse residents for costs incurred in

bringing LUFT sites, such as LVA's, to closure. Accordingly, the PRC compiled a report (approximately 400 pages) which included all of the technical reports, water analyses, and proof of payment for all costs incurred during the project. That report was finalized and forwarded to the SWRCB on June 16, 1997. The request for reimbursement was approximately \$119,000.

It should be noted that, while it is believed that LVA has a legitimate request for reimbursement, the SWRCB will analyze our request and decide the amount to be refunded. Further, the SWRCB sets the priority schedule for payment of all requests. Accordingly, it could be several years before any reimbursement is made by the SWRCB.

It is safe to conclude that the efforts of PRC personnel saved the residents of LVA as much as \$300,000. Dick Griswold, the Board of Directors, liaison, played an important role by participating in (and lending moral support during) all aspects of the project.

Ed. Note: Jim Mason deserves credit for being the prime mover in compiling this PRC report.





Bus Services To The Village Explained

Villagers enjoyed the free bus rides to medical appointments for a 3-month trial period which ended June 30. Funds for the trial were a one-time grant from the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging. It is doubtful that more funding will be available.

The bus service for medical appointments outside the city of Camarillo will continue, but will no longer be free. Trips to Oxnard, Ventura and Thousand Oaks will cost \$3.50 each way. Bus service to Kaiser in Woodland Hills cost is \$4.50 each way. Arrangements for door-to-door bus transportation is available Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Call the Camarillo Health Care District, 388-2529. Please make reservations as far in

advance as possible.

The Camarillo Dial-a-Ride program offers rides within the city for only 50¢ each way to LV residents. For reservations call 988-4CAT (Camarillo Area Transit). This service is available from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday. Hours on Friday are 7:30 a.m. to 8 p.m., and on Saturday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. No service is available on Sunday or holidays. Dial-a-Ride is available for shopping, visiting, etc. as well as medical appointments.

LV residents must wear their name badges as identification while riding the bus. Without LV badges, the Dial-a-ride will cost more.

The current bus service is still on the regular, fixed route schedule. Villagers may ride this service free, with your LV badge as identification.







Elderhostel attended by Mary Kovach, president-elect.




The 21st Anniversary Dance held on June 28 was


LV EXERCISE GROUP







Once Upon A Memory: Incident On The River Of No Return

Both my husband and I are "water people" and are intrigued by any activity associated with water. About the time we retired, we purchased a professional type 14 foot inflatable Avon raft looking like a huge oval shaped heavy weight inner tube, to investigate the "white water" of some of our rivers. After practicing on a few California rivers, we succumbed to the appeal of the Salmon River, the River of No Return, in Idaho.

The expedition required a lot of organization. We packed the boat, its oars and rowing rack, camping gear, food, clothing, and other supplies in our Ford Camper. Kay and I drove to Idaho with Lou Whitney, Kay's ever-ready cousin who would act as "go-fer." To tackle the rapids on the river, we relied on our 20-some year old son Douglas, 6'3", weight over 200 pounds, full of muscle and energy. Douglas, however, had job responsibilities, so we purchased airplane tickets to and from Boise, Idaho, to jibe with our river reservations (requirement of the Forest Service in order to spread out and control river traffic).

Plans worked out. We entered the river at Dagger Falls, not far from Sun Valley, Idaho, and floated the first 100 miles in 5 days to the confluence of the North and Middle Forks of the Salmon River. There we met Lou to restock our food supplies. Lou in the meantime, had driven the camper several hundred miles around the State to

reach this remote contact with the river.

By this time, the weather had changed. Clouds covered everything. Rain was falling and was expected to continue for several days. We seriously discussed with Forest Rangers the advisability of continuing the last 100 miles in bad weather, but finally voted to go ahead. Restocked and determined, we left the tiny campground to tackle the river where once we were underway, we had no way of changing our minds—we had to continue.

It rained. Each of us was dressed in short legged wet suits made of thick neoprene rubber, hats, life vests, and tennis shoes. It was cold. The Forest Service had provided each expedition with a map of the river showing the location of the rapids, their severity, and the recommended way of going through them according to the amount of water flowing at the time.

The approved procedure before tackling a rapid was to beach the raft above the rapid and walk ahead to survey what was coming. Kay and Doug usually followed the procedure, and we crossed even the wildest of rapids with no more trouble than getting a little wet. But we were cold, the clouds kept visibility very low, and I suppose the men eventually felt they could just depend upon the map's suggestions.

Late afternoons, we looked for the most accessible campsite we could see. After the boat had been pulled sufficiently out of the water and tied to

available trees for anchorage, camp was made. We had no tent, but Kay strung a rope between two trees and draped a large tarpaulin over it, spreading the ends to a teepee shaped opening. A ground cloth was spread out, over which the sleeping bags were unrolled and the pads inflated. The one-burner gas campstove was started. We had taken a supply of 4-serving size freeze-dried meals which required only adding water and cooking. We were so cold and weary that we subsisted on one package of food instead of the "fancy" meals I had planned. When we had consumed the hot food, we got into the sleeping bags (they did get slightly wet despite "waterproof" packaging), and tried to sleep. Three nights were similarly spent, but not one of us dared complain—we knew ahead of time what we might have to go through. The three of us each lost about ten pounds on the last four day ordeal.

On the final day on the river, our chief worry was whether or not Lou had been able to find our take-out place near Riggins, and how he was surviving the rain. We were OK, but were hurrying to get out. Kay and Doug vied with each other between rapids to row the boat in order to develop a little body heat instead of just floating. I sat forlornly in the rear, too cold even to take pictures, which ordinarily would have occupied my time.

According to the map, we were approaching our

last big rapid, Carey Falls. The map suggested running down the left side of the river, but Kay, upon casual observation, decided that the right side seemed better. We floated down a glassy stretch and at the last moment saw that it flowed over a broad rock

went over the fall, then the bow was lifted up by the wave and we were instantly capsized backwards into the river.

I came up under the boat and swam out, holding onto the ropes which were handy. Doug was close by, also hanging on. I looked



with such volume that the hydraulics caused the water at the bottom of the rock to be depressed, and a standing wave 8 to 10 feet tall roiled up from the hole. Before the raft could be steered away from it, we

for Kay, and saw his head just four or five feet away, but he yelled something about catching the one loose item in the boat, Lou's parka which was floating

RIVERS.....from Pg 15 away. The current caught Kay immediately, and he was gone! Downstream! He had a life jacket and shoes, so I wasn't panicked about him, but he hadn't stayed with the raft!


Doug and I managed to ease the overturned boat to the side of the river where there was a quiet eddy. We found a more or less level rock ledge to stand on, and somehow Doug was able to lift that boat with muscle and adrenalin and flip it right side up. Then it took a few minutes to bail out the water, and check the load. I climbed up on a higher rock and searched down river for signs of Kay. About a quarter of a mile downstream, I saw him sitting on a rock. We waved that we were OK, and Doug and I proceeded on to pick him up—chagrined and all wet, but unhurt.

The jacket which Kay was so concerned about was gone. The strength of the current had carried it away.

An hour or so after our unscheduled dunking, the river canyon opened up and the sun shone! Ahead of us, in plain sight, was the camper. Lou was off hiking, but the essentials were all in place.

There were lessons amply demonstrated on that trip. Be prepared for anything. Have a strong rower. Accept the suggestions of people who had been there before (the map!) Do not allow yourselves to get too tired. If speed is not necessary, slow down and enjoy the scenery.

The River of No Return still holds a fascination for us, but we conquered it once, with only a minor slap in the face for our arrogance.





I have had the opportunity to serve as one of the supervisors of the Jewish Family Service Peer Counselors who meet regularly with some residents of Leisure Village. These counselors have attended a training program led by a licensed Marriage and Family Counselor. Every two weeks they meet for supervision to discuss how they can best help their clients. Their professionalism and expertise are evident from the wonderful, positive feedback we receive from clients and their family members.

Through these peer counselors, Jewish Family Service provides support to people who need to talk confidentially to someone regarding issues they are facing or emotions they are experiencing.

Although issues and concerns are discussed, the privacy and confidentiality of the clients is never

at risk. Last names are not used in supervision discussion to protect the client's privacy. In my brief time working with this group I have been struck by the commitment they have to their clients and the breadth of expertise and information they possess.

Prospective clients call Jewish Family Service where information is taken on their concerns and a peer counselor is assigned. For those who wish a counselor outside the Village, there are three peer counselors who live in the surrounding area.

The service they provide is a contribution to the residents of Leisure Village. There is NO fee for the counseling and Jewish Family Service is non-sectarian. Moreover the peer counselors meet in the privacy of the client's home. Those residents who are interested should call 805-659-5144#8. Help is only a phone call away.
