Update On Buses

Many positive comments are coming in from those who have ridden the new buses. Regulars are exuberant!

Ridership is definitely up. One city engineer reported an increase of 50%. When school starts and the kids start riding on a regular basis, overall ridership should be much higher. There are no plans at present to change the routes or schedules.

Some people are still concerned about where to board the bus within Leisure Village. The bus will stop for you anywhere around the circle on Mountain View or Leisure Village Drive, or down to the east gate. Just position yourself so you can board on the right side from the curb.

What do bus riders like about the new buses? They are new, spic and span clean, air conditioned and have phones for the drivers; the drivers are courteous; and the routes and schedules are good.

There are three buses which are equipped to carry two wheel chairs each. The two smaller buses which carry 15-17 passengers have ramps which let down so wheel-chairs may be rolled in. The larger, 24 passenger, bus has a hydraulic lift on the curb side toward the rear.

Plans are to use the larger bus on Rte. 2, the blue route, while the smaller bus will be used on Rte. 1, the red route.

The third bus will be used as a back-up for preventive maintenance.

In the interest of the well-being of the Village, ILV will do its best to respect contradicting opinions.

With the Founding Fathers of the United States, we believe in freedom of speech. We also believe in the honor and objectives of our Board of Directors and by the same token, respect the achievements of former Directors.

Thoughtful and unemotional discussions, debate, and disclosures, as well as ideas from residents will surely help lead to the amicable resolution of differences.

We hope so.

Donna Duke: Duties Of The Board

At the request of Donna Duke, acting president of the L.V. Board of Directors, ILV (Not the official publication of LV Association) is printing the report she made at the August 2 meeting. For brevity, her remarks are paraphrased except where direct quotes are used. (Ed.)

This month I have the opportunity to speak on duties of the Board.

In the by-laws, Article VII, Item A deals with keeping a complete record of all Association acts and corporate affairs. This Board is expanding the minutes with additional detailed information to reflect accurately our decisions and to enable you to understand the reasoning behind them. "We want to make sure all decisions are included in the minutes." Minutes are posted in the library for your review.

Item B charges the Board to supervise all officers, agents, and employees of the Association to see that their duties are properly performed. We

assure you that the newly elected directors came aboard with detailed knowledge of our Village's appearance, security, and productivity of workers. We have had conversations with many homeowners, and viewed these concerns from a homeowner's viewpoint.

As active Board members, our priorities are to increase productivity, reduce costs, improve our security, and use the best possible system for making purchases and awarding contracts. We are not trying to make waves when we try to change things that need improvement.

"Recommending and making changes naturally make waves... Progress must take place." This Board wants to improve the way L.V. does business.

In conversations with hundreds of homeowners we find that they are outraged over rising Association assessments. Unfortunately, some people have had to move because they could not afford to stay. There are many ways to reduce our costs: we are expecting our Staff to

help us achieve this goal. The Board believes that the budget is just a plan, not authority to spend.

The Board and the Staff must cooperate with each other. The Board must manage the affairs of the Association, and we need to utilize the staff's experience and knowledge in the most advantageous manner. "The resistance we have encountered is a direct result of change. The Association expects the Board to make changes. We know that change is good only if it makes improvements. We must try new methods in order to improve our way of doing business..... Good decisions are based on research and that is exactly what we are doing".

A video tape furnished by a resident showed landscape workers on the job. Review of the video by Board and Staff found workers' performance to be totally unacceptable and reason for dismissal.

Improving labor performance is one area where we can save money. We expect our work force to give us a day's work for a day's pay. Poor performance reflects on the supervisors, the management staff, and even the Board.

"The Board will work with the Staff, committee chairpersons, and the residents to solve our problems. We are working long hours to research ways to reduce costs, improve upon our security, increase productivity, and do the best job possible. We need your support, your patience, and your understanding. If we make mistakes, we will learn from them. We ask only that you give us the time necessary to make changes that we feel will benefit the Association and your pocket book."

Past Boards Defended

The editorial on the covering page of the July 1993 issue of the VILLAGE VOICE (NOT ILV) opens with the statement that the Village voted overwhelmingly for a change in how it's run. I don't recall any reference on the election ballot to a need for changes in how the Village has been run. The fact is that we voted for new board members to replace those who were retiring because it's mandated in the CC&R's.

The article in VILLAGE VOICE did not recognize those who served on the many past boards and devoted the time and energies necessary to best serve the Village needs. As a former board member I'm personally aware of the dedicated efforts needed to keep Village expenses down while at the same time maintaining the high standards we've come to expect.

The editorial talks of rising Village costs, and it is certainly a proper concern for all of us. But there is no way to ignore the fact that

during past years costs have risen steadily throughout the country in every area of need, such as food, shelter, clothing, gasoline, labor, etc. Leisure Village is not in a separate category nor is it in a different world where costs and services can be stagnated at yesterday's level while maintaining the high standards we have come to expect.

The editorial speaks of increased payroll costs. It doesn't reveal that this is due in part to increases in staff made *at the request of past boards* so that we might better handle landscaping problems such as edging, removal of clippings waste, as well as improved control of irrigation resulting in savings in water costs. An employee was added to our office staff, *again at the request of a previous board*, so that we might do a better job in serving the needs of the residents. We have added a person to Security to give increased protection to our people. We've added an employee to Resident Services, but this can't be considered an added cost because it's offset by income to the Village from charges for services rendered.

Each year a budget is presented to the residents. It contains a total breakdown of all past and anticipated future expenses.

It ignores the fact that we have a host of very knowledgeable and dedicated residents both on and off the Finance Committee who devote many long hours to going over these budgets with a fine-toothed comb. These are the watching eyes that protect us from possible excesses. And, in the final analysis, we residents have the last word in our option of accepting or rejecting the budget.

Let's travel back a couple of years to the time when there was a move afoot to change our manned east gate to an unattended automatic gate as an economy measure. Remember? A breakdown of the saving that would have been made by this change came to a big SIX CENTS A DAY PER RESIDENT. In return for that saving, we would have been subjected to the certainty of outsiders entering our Village illegally, destroying the security that is a major highlight of L.V. life. When the facts were known the idea was soundly defeated. WE CHOSE TO SPEND THAT SIX CENTS in order to

leave untouched the fine security we enjoy.

Do we now have another "Pennysaver" in the making? If so, in what direction will it go? Security? Landscaping? Building or street maintenance? Recreational facilities?

Sure we need to watch our money. And past boards have done just that. This present board obviously accepts that as their responsibility as well, and there is no doubt that everyone in L.V. applauds their expressed watchdog dedication.

Re: Piano In A.R.

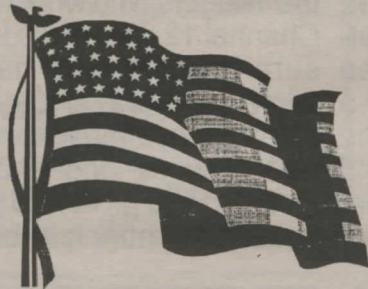

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Scripps Changes ILV Production

Things have been changing at the Camarillo Daily News since its recent acquisition by the John P. Scripps Newspapers, some of which effect ILV. For the casual reader the only changes noticeable in ILV may be the new type faces, but during the production time, the ILV staff has to cope with a number of changes,

Production is no longer done here in Camarillo. (The CDN building has become executive offices and working space for reporters.) ILV typing is done in Thousand Oaks, photographic work is done in Ventura, necessitating tighter schedules and coordination. Scripps is limiting ILV on the amount of film shot each month and the number of pictures to be used for each issue.

Camera-ready ILV pages end up at the Camarillo plant to be run on the presses here. Finally, printed copies are delivered to the Village on publication day and the cycle ends for that month.

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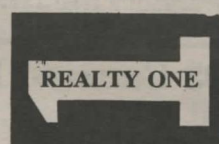

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Report From Security And Safety Committee

Every action of the Security and Safety Committee is directly related to sustaining and improving the physical security and safety of all residents of our great community.

The committee meets on the second Thursday of each month in the Lanai Room at 10:00 a.m. Chief Max Moses, head of the Security Department, brings the latest information regarding perimeter security, vehicle code violations, attempted illegal entries at the three gates and allied incidents to acquaint committee members with the need for constant vigilance in protecting our residents.

One of the duties we are charged with is forwarding to the Board of Directors committee recommendations. Historically, most of the recommendations are approved following a study by the Board, but at times the paper work is returned to committee for revision. We often consult with Chief Moses and Lt. Jim Moore for their expertise in preparing the forms.

The following recommendation, which was approved by the board after revision, may be fully implemented by the time this issue of ILV is in your hands.

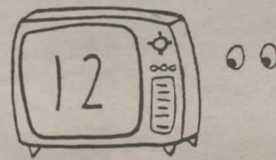
We recommended widening the exit lane for bikers and walkers on the east side of the access road from the Main Gate to L.V. Drive so that when appropriately striped, it may be used by both bikers and pedestrians.

Since there is only one lane of vehicular traffic exiting on the east side of the road, bikers and pe-

destrians are safe. On the west side of the road there are two lanes entering the Village past the Main Gate and there is no provision for a bike or pedestrian path. The west side of this access road is for vehicles only. Security will hereafter discourage bikers and pedestrians from using the unmarked west side.

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Hearing Aid From Telephone Company

Is it becoming increasingly difficult for you to hear all the words and sounds over the telephone? It used to be for Village 20's Lottie Bauch and she decided to do something about it.

"When I first became aware that I couldn't hear what people were saying over the phone," says Lottie, "I researched all avenues. I tried every amplification that GTE had to offer and still had to ask my callers to 'spell,' 'talk slowly' or 'repeat.' I began to feel very frustrated." She continues: "After much searching, I discovered the SUPER-PRINT machine, available to me on free-loan from GTE. This machine has a 20-character display that moves across the machine and also prints the message on a tape."

When one wishes to

talk with Lottie, they first call an 800-number which is answered by an operator saying, "This is California Relay. How may I help you?" Lottie's number is given and the caller quickly learns if her line is busy, if she's at home to receive your message or if she does not answer, you may

leave your message for a return call.

If Lottie is home, you give your message to the operator and Lottie will read it and respond directly by voice over her phone. The California Relay operator stays on the line until both parties have completed their conversa-

tion. "I can't explain the excitement I felt the first time I came home and found the print-out of a message waiting for me," says Lottie with a smile. "I was finally being connected with the hearing world."

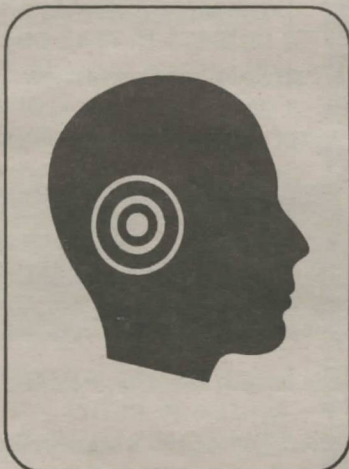
Jack Myers and Jack Bennett, co-chairing the Emergency Services Committee, want to thank Paul Kelwin for his years of devotion to the goals of this committee.

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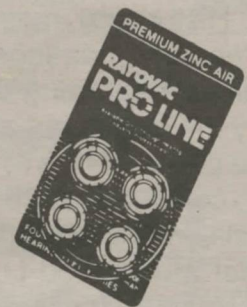

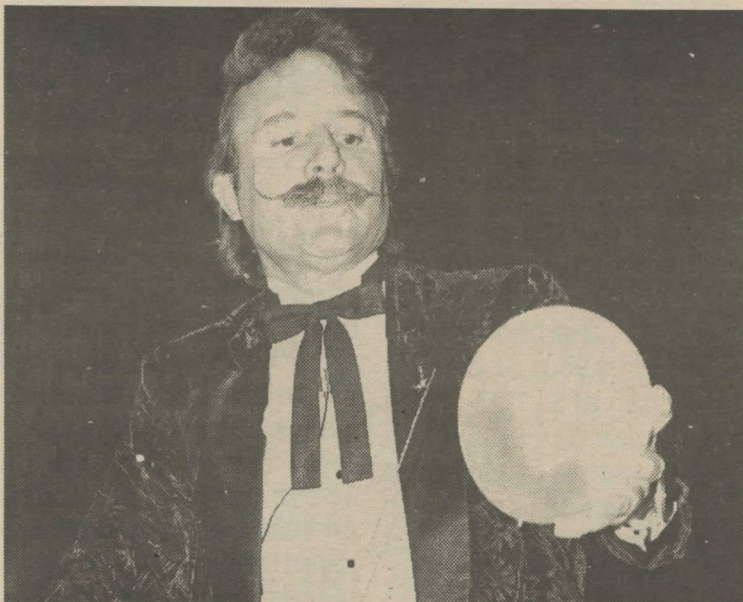

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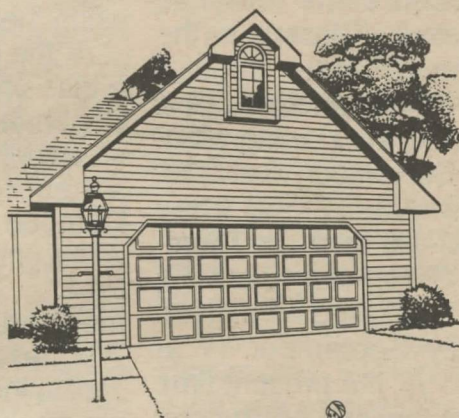
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VILLAGE PAINTERS

THE SAWDUSTERS CLUB



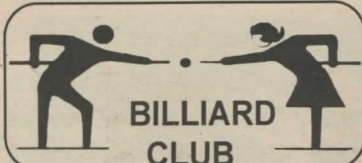

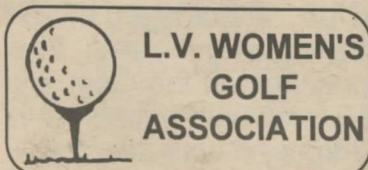
Several more of our members have volunteered to help those less physically able in our com-

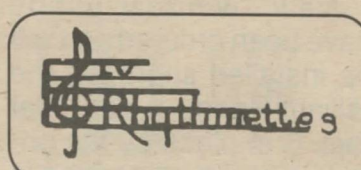
Month end Mixed Tournament honors again went to Donna Duke with a gross score of 62, followed

Irwin Porges handed out a paper he had written on Analysis and Evaluation, in order to discuss literary criticism, particularly stories written by the members. He hopes it will enable them to learn to recognize good writing in all fiction. There was some lively discussion on the ideas in the paper. Irwin assured them that if the guidelines are used each time they analyze, it will, eventually, become clear to them how to properly evaluate.

The readings began with a portion of Jim Rogers' Memoirs, of his depression

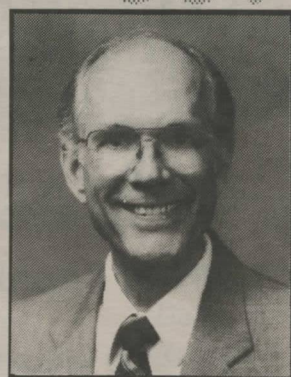
days in Oklahoma. It was so vividly written that a flood of reminiscences was brought back to various members who spoke of their own past lives.

The meetings of the Writers Round Table are on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month in the Lanai Room at 1:30.

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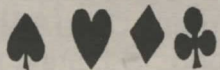
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DUPLICATE BRIDGE

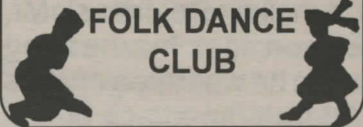

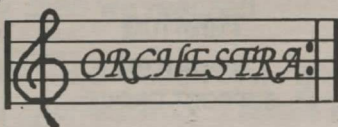
General meeting of the International Folk Dance Club will be Wednesday, October 6, at 10:00 a.m. in the AR.

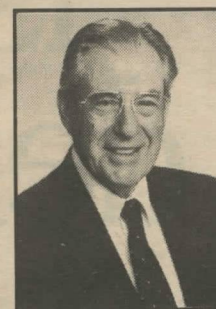
