### **Update** On Buses

Many positive comments are coming in from those who have ridden the new buses. Regulars are exuberant!

Ridership is definitely up. One city engineer reported an increase of 50%. When school starts and the kids start riding on a regular basis, overall ridership should be much higher. There are no plans at present to change the routes or schedules.

Some people are still concerned about where to board the bus within Leisure Village. The bus will stop for you anywhere around the circle on Mountain View or Leisure Village Drive, or down to the east gate. Just position yourself so you can board on the right side from the curb.

There are three buses which are equipped to carry two wheel chairs and 18 on the return trip. each. The two smaller buses which carry 15-17 passengers have ramps which let down so wheelchairs may be rolled in. The larger, 24 passenger, bus has a hydraulic lift on the curb side toward the

Plans are to use the larger bus on Rte. 2, the blue route, while the smaller bus will be used on Rte. 1, the red route.

The third bus will be used as a back-up for preventive maintenance.

### Donna Duke: **Duties Of The Board**

At the request of Donna Duke, acting president of the L.V. Board of Directors, ILV (Not the official publication of LV Association) is printing the report she made at the August 2 meeting. For brevity, her remarks are paraphrased except where direct quotes are used. (Ed.)

This month I have the opportunity to speak on duties of the Board.

In the by-laws, Article VII, Item A deals with keeping a complete record of all Association acts and corporate affairs. This Board is expanding the minutes with additional detailed information to reflect accurately our decisions and to enable you to understand the reasoning behind them. "We want to make sure all decisions are included in the minutes.' Minutes are posted in the library for your review.

Item B charges the Board to supervise all officers, agents, and employees of the Association to see that their duties are properly performed. We

assure you that the newly elected directors came aboard with detailed knowledge of our Village's appearance, security, and productivity of workers. We have had conversamany tions with homeowners, and viewed these concerns from a homeowner's viewpoint.

As active Board members, our priorities are to increase productivity, reduce costs, improve our security, and use the best possible system for making purchases and awarding contracts. We are not trying to make waves when we try to change things that need improvement.

Things have been changing at the Camarillo Daily News since its recent acquisition by the John P. Scripps Newspapers, some of which effect ILV. For the casual reader the only changes noticeable in ILV may be the new type faces, but during the production time, the ILV staff has to cope with a number of changes,

Production is no longer done here in Camarillo. (The CDN building has become executive offices and working space for reporters.) ILV typing is done in Thousand Oaks, photographic work is done in Ventura, necessitating tighter schedules and coordination. Scripps is limiting ILV on the amount of film shot each month and the number of pictures to be used for each issue.

Camera-ready ILV pages end up at the Camarillo plant to be run on the presses here. Finally, printed copies are delivered to the Village on publication day and the cycle ends for that month.

Now as five seventeens draw near, The wish renews itself While I watch children, grandchildren, Even great grandchildren, As they move confidently Towards their own destinies.



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

The meetings of the Writers Round Table are on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month in the Lanai Room at 1:30.

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
