

Ready, Set, Go: LV's Paint Project Begins



The paint project is finally in motion. Board members, both past and present, have researched the issues, agonized over the impact of the project and assumed the responsibility for selecting the colors. Now, the work begins and the new combinations will be visible in Village 19. I am sure there will be much discussion in the coming months as the new colors begin to appear. After proposals, Board discussions, and Town Hall meetings over nearly three years, the Leisure Village Paint Project is about to begin. The Board of Directors approved the color choices, the contracts for paint and painters, and a method to begin that should help all residents understand how this will be implemented over the next nine years - the time deemed reasonable to complete repainting stucco and trim for all 2136 Village homes.

■ Work could begin

As anyone who has ever embarked on a home remodeling project knows, the details can seem overwhelming. To help residents follow the first steps, here is a chart of how LV's New Look will begin.

1. Village 19 is the starting point. Eight buildings (starting with 19208) will be painted, each with one of the approved stucco colors and with an





approved trim color to provide all that could interfere with the work. residents with a sample of the new LV look.

- 2. A storage container will be placed in the RV lot to house the materials for the project.
- 3. Before painting begins, landscape crews will check plants around the houses and cut or pull back growth

- 4. The condition of the stucco in each house will be checked for damage that might need repair before painting.
- 5. Once the painting is complete, Villagers can walk or drive by to see what the chosen colors look like when applied to the homes.


Don, the director, likes to emphasize that he's been an actor for a lifetime. "I have always been chroni-

He studied theatre at Gonzaga University in Washington, met his wife-to-be Diane there, and was 'discovered" by a professor from UC Santa Barbara who, after seeing Don perform, suggested he move south for graduate school. Diane and Don have been in Southern California ever since. He's acted on screen many times – his favorite film experience was with Jeff Bridges and director



Protecting Your Passwords

Leisure Village offers many opportunities to connect with one another. Joining a variety of clubs ranging from sports, hobbies and writing provides us endless encounters to meet new people. Yet another way we can expand our world without ever having to leave our homes is through the internet.

As a computer consultant for Apple products in Leisure Village I am amazed how LV residents use the Net. We log on to websites to stay in touch with loved ones, do our banking online, make travel plans, research medical issues consulting Dr. Google and savor hours of reading digital books. However, these enjoyments can also bewilder us with a lot of aggravation and grief.

Anytime you drive onto the internet highway, you become vulnerable to hackers. Hackers? Yes, those shady types who snatch up your personal data, ransack your precious financial information and hijack your email accounts.

Our private passwords are the vehicle we use to zoom on to the super information highway. Is it any wonder our passwords are the number one target hackers want to pilfer from us?

However, coming up with a good password is the number one frustration I run into with clients.

Let me suggest several rules of thumb for password security to save you precious time and money.

•Never use the same password for more than one account. Think of your passwords as domino tiles lined up next to each other. If one falls, then the rest of them tumble. If a hacker gets into your Facebook account, and you use the same password across all your accounts, then you have handed a crook the ignition key to take off with your private online dossier.

•Treat your passwords as you would your home alarm system. You wouldn't tell a stranger the code to disarm your home alarm system. Keep your passwords as secure as possible. Write them on a piece of paper and hide them in a safe, secured place. Don't rely on your memory to recall a complicated password.

•Stay away from using "easy to guess" passwords. In an article from Mac-Rumors in 2017, the worst passwords computer users often employ are listed: "123456," "qwerty," "letmein," "password," "i love you," "welcome" and "login." A strong password should consist of multiple random words or multiple numbers, letters and characters. Example: D@Mino\$3579

Going online is a great tool to access a treasure trove of information. However, anyone who prepares for a treasure hunt must take the strictest safety precautions for a successful endeavor. Our passwords are no exception.



Spare the Rabbit, Eat Carrots

I learned a lot from my short visit with Diane just down the street from where I live in Village 20, like the term "Victory Garden," Truck Garden Farming and what they mean, and that canning can also refer to "putting up" fruits and vegetables in jars. Her favorite was pickles. I asked her why they didn't call it "jarring." She said it was hard work and, to a nine-year-old it was very jarring, but it was still called canning. Very funny.

Diane grew up in Spokane in the 40's, when it was still rather small and there were lots of friends and family that grew lots of produce. Everybody traded and bartered produce. Diane did a lot of fishing as a kid and was quite an accomplished trout and salmon fisherman.

They also had chickens (which her dad slaughtered) and therefore

eggs...and rabbits. That was the hardest to watch she said - the rabbits. It reminded me of that great scene in the movie "Giant" when the three kids of Elizabeth Taylor and Rock Hudson are visiting their mom's parents in Maryland. They are there for a very long November, where they fed the turkey and even named it. The parents didn't know, but it turned out to be kind of a pet. It was rather difficult, to say the least, at Thanksgiving dinner when the whole roasted turkey was brought out of the kitchen. The littlest boy turned to his grandma with a funny look on his face and said "Dat Pedro????" The kind of prim grandmother says, "Yes dear, that's Pedro." The boy starts crying and shouts to his sister, "Dat Pedro;" the sister then goes "Dat Pedro!!!!!" The whole scene was pretty funny for everyone ... except, I guess, the turkey.

Anyway, Diane shared a very unusual but simple and tasty recipe she



makes from time-to-time with meat or chicken dishes. She calls it

Diane's Honeyed Carrots and Orange

1 lb. of small "baby" whole carrots, 1" cut on the angle 1 orange cut into 8 pieces

2 tbls. olive oil 2 tbls. honey

Salt & Pepper

Fresh or dried dill, or Italian parsley

Now this part is really complicated. You mix the all the ingredients together, place on a baking sheet and roast at 375 degrees for 30-35 minutes. Check after 15 minutes and shake, rattle and roll the carrots around to brown on all sides. Really good with Citrus Grilled Salmon or Roast Chicken Breast with thyme and honey.

I Am Woman, Hear Me 'Fore'

Combine a large portion of outside fresh air, an ample measure of brisk walking, stir in a considerable portion of social interplay, and then pour the entire mixture onto an expansive green pasture that blends a perfect mix of nature and landscape architecture, and one can taste the delicious flavor of a Wednesday morning loop with the Leisure Village Women's Golf Association.

And, here in the best of all worlds, word on the street is, one does not have to be a golfer to play golf.

A vast majority of the 70-80 LVWGA members had not played the game prior to moving to the village, said Pat Turner, club president. "About half our members are 18ers and the other half 9ers," Turner said. By definition, "9ers" are those who play just nine holes of golf and call it a game, while "18ers" opt to play all holes on the course each round.

Additionally, "Fun" tournaments are scheduled for the fifth Wednesday of those months in the year that have a fifth hump-day. "There's usually about four each year, and we have a lunch afterward." A fun tournament can take any number of forms; a scramble game (a scramble, or best-ball, format features team play with all team members hitting a ball from

the same location), a dress-up, such as playing in Halloween costumes. Fun tournaments always include breakfast or lunch on the same day.

Patti Crichton, in charge of WGA club publicity, said a Friday morning mentor service is available, whereby new members can link up with experienced club players for instructional rounds to gain insight and a better understanding of playing techniques, golf rules, and course management practices.

And, if more help is needed, more help is on the way, via a popular set of Saturday morning golf lessons for the beginner conducted by Pat Gunning, LV Mens' Golf Association member. "He has been conducting the classes every six months for the past five years, and he is very good at it," Turner said. "Most of (those attending) are usually raw beginners or they haven't played for a long time."

Weekly Wednesday morning tournament first tee-off time is at 8 a.m., Crichton said. Foursomes are chosen by lottery so that members have an opportunity to play with different golfers each week, and players can choose to play either 18 or 9 hole games. A \$2 prize fund fee is collected from each player to provide small cash prizes awarded best scoring players at each Wednesday morning tournament. New members pay no fee for their first few rounds to establish an official handicap.






