Fitness Center Gradually Reopening!

Villagers can begin to get back in shape now that the Fitness Center has reopened. After a four-month shutdown due to COVID restrictions, the facility is available daily on a limited basis.

Four residents can work out at one time - for 45 minutes per appointment. The last 15 minutes of each session are used by LV staff to sanitize the equipment before the next group checks in.

The Gym hours are 7:30 AM to 12:15 PM and 2:30 to 7:15 PM.

Appointments can be made only by walk-up reservations; no phone reservations are accepted. Residents can sign up outside the Fitness Center. Think of a walk/bike/run to the entrance to make the appointment as part of the workout. The Fitness Center's open hours are determined by the regulations from Ventura County Health Department. eNews and LVTV will provide notice as rules change.

Remember that only Villagers who have been "trained" (as we call it) can use the Fitness Center. "Training" means participating in a short introduction to the rules and equipment in the facility and buying a key fob that is needed to



Staying Fit During Lockdown

working from home, or sequestered in place --- can literally be a pain in the back and neck. When offices were shut down and people transitioned to working remotely last spring, creating an ergonomic workstation was not a priority as many expected to be back commuting within a few weeks. Nor was it easy to maintain a gym regimen without the gym.

A few weeks down the road, chiropractors and orthopedic surgeons saw evidence of abnormal tension on patients with neck, back, wrist, hand, and shoulder problems. "It's because they don't have a normal workspace," stated Dr. Jeremy Simon, chief of physical medicine at Rothman Orthopaedic Institute. Working remotely with improper chairs which do not support the natural curvature of the spine places abnormal tension on the hip flexor muscles. Looking down consistently at misplaced tech machines can cause whiplash, headaches, and muscle tightness.

Zoom calls, whether for work or family connections during the weeks and months of stay-at-home, can be treacherous. Looking at a device with your head in a flexed position

A year of pandemic --- whether can put up to 60 pounds of force on the discs in your neck. Many people may hold that position for hours on end. Note: Sitting at eye level at the computer prevents extra strain on the neck and lessens strain on the back.

> It all comes down to posture! And posture is the most overlooked aspect of health. It doesn't just look bad; it can lead to a variety of health issues beyond headaches and backaches. Think about it—we are very concerned about falls, and in just about every issue of tripping and falling to the ground, loss of balance is involved. Good posture is a significant control factor for maintaining one's sense of balance and it keeps bones and joints in alignment. Beyond the physical appearance of poor posture, there are physical dangers: poor posture affects you at a cellular level; it directly correlates with your mood and affects your mind, your words, and your energy. A straight back does not go-it-alone; the positioning of your head and neck as you walk forward, or remain seated in a hunched position over a screen is a posture-poor habit that soon may become your natural way as the muscles and ligaments are readily damaged, and this in turn causes intense pain.

HISTORIC REFLECTION By Max Copenhagen

Planes, Trains, Ships and Automobiles

First in a series of articles about the from 1861 to 1887 with a station evolution of transportation that led to the development of Camarillo as we know it today.

Pleasant Valley is the name given to the vast coastal plain seen by pioneers from the Conejo Pass. A route to the area from Mexico was established by the Portola expedition in 1769. El Camino Real, The Kings Highway, would connect a chain of 21 missions from Loreto in southern Baja to northern California.

Settlers traveled from the mission in San Gabriel to San Fernando and on to San Buenaventura. Although there were several possible ways to go, the original route was through Potrero Canyon near Cal State University Channel Islands. Another route went over the ridge near Cal Lutheran University to the Santa Rosa Valley. The Butstop at the spring near Santa Rosa Technology and Magnet School. This route was abandoned when the Norwegian Grade was built nearby in 1911. Both routes continued on through the Santa Rosa Valley to the emerging community of Springville on the Oxnard Plain.

The Conejo Pass eventually became the main route. The native Chumash people had a trail through the pass that later served as a trading route for farm wagons going to Port Hueneme. Road work was done by the County in 1902 and the State Highway Department improved it in 1912. It was one of the first national routes established by the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads, designated as Highway 101 in 1926. It was rebuilt and paved in 1935 with its 49 curves reduced to 12. A WORD ON WINE

Australian Shiraz - A Down Under Gem

only 3% of all wine imported to the United States. Ten years later, Australian wine was 20% of the U.S. import market and growing. A big reason was the emergence of a new wine brand, Yellow Tail, a line of accessible wines for under \$8. Named for a wallaby and crafted for the American palate, it was immediately successful in the US.

The success of Yellow Tail enabled Australian premium wines to gain traction in the US market. Long grown in Australia, a "new" variety became popular - Shiraz, the same grape as French Syrah, named with an Australian twist paying homage to the grapes' true origins in Bagdhad over 5000 years ago. A glass of Shiraz is a mouthful of flavor, able to stand up to hearty food like stews, lamb and steaks. A premium Shiraz is aged in oak, adding to the robust style.

The Barossa Valley of South

In 1992, Australian wine was Australia is home to a long tradition of Shiraz wines. Located near Adelaide, the climate is hot and dry, perfect for growing grapes. Shiraz vines were originally planted by German immigrants bringing Syrah cuttings from France in the 1850s. In the 1880s, as phylloxera decimated vineyards worldwide, Southeast Australia was able to protect their vines, and, as a result, Barossa Valley today has many of the oldest continuously producing vineyards in the world.

Ancient vines produce intense flavors difficult to achieve in any other way. The gnarled and contorted vines reflect their years, with twisted and split trunks delivering a precious harvest each year. Extensive root systems tap deep, and the weathered vines are carefully hand pruned and nurtured. Year after year, they reward growers with impeccably balanced and wonderfully

A PINCH OF SALT

Beets, Okra and Brussels Sprouts

One thing you discover at a very early age is your Roasted Beet & Goat Cheese Salad gag reflex. I discovered mine one evening at the dinner (Serves 2) table in Dallas when I was 6. Jen served me a plate with a few weird looking foods on them. First there were these sliced red discs and next to then, some round green balls...yup, beets and Brussels sprouts. It was a miracle they stayed down.

You can probably guess I didn't much care for them...nor the gooey slimy gross-looking okra she gave me the next night. But my mom worked and like a lot of Jewish moms, she was good at making reservations but not dinner. So those 3 vegetables that I grew to despise, of course came from cans, not the ground.

Fast forward about 15 years to New Orleans, Louisiana. (I tried to go to college where I knew there were at least 2 things I liked...food and race tracks.) It was there I discovered okra could be pretty damn great...battered and deep fried or in gumbo, (more on this in the months to come) and even later when I got to California and had crispy fried brown butter tossed brussels sprouts and a fresh roasted beet and goat cheese salad.

2 medium fresh beets

Olive oil as required

Crumbled goat cheese

Fresh chives or green scallions if you must

Arugula or chopped romaine greens

Sushi vinegar or just plain Japanese rice vinegar with a little honey

The rest is easy. Peel the beets, lightly coat them with a good virgin olive oil. Roast in a 375 degree oven for approx. 45 minutes but be sure to check doneness with a toothpick after 30. They are done when they slightly resist the pressure when you poke them with the toothpick.

Remove and let cool for at least an hour. Meanwhile make a vinaigrette dressing with olive oil, rice vinegar, a touch of Dijon, a pinch of salt & lots of pepper. When ready to plate, make a bed of greens. Slice the beets, arrange over the greens, lightly sprinkle with the vinaigrette, add 2 tablespoons of crumbled plain goat cheese, chopped chives of very thinly sliced scallion greens. They add color and a great taste to any spring or summer dinner plate.

Fillmore & Western Railroad. Adolfo Camarillo gave the railroad a right of way along the western edge of his ranch, and the Camarillo depot opened in 1906. It was similar to the depot still in Simi Valley. Stores were built near the depot, and the small town of Camarillo began to grow at the intersection of the highway and the railroad. A name was needed for the new post office. The first suggestion, Calleguas, was rejected because it was hard to pronounce, so it was named for Adolfo Camarillo's Ranch.

The economic success we enjoy in this area is in part due to being located at the intersection of these means of transportation. The Next installment of this series will discuss the 20th century development of all roads leading to Camarillo.

flavored berries. One winemaker noted that the "vines had witnessed the entire history of the Australian wine industry. The roots of these vines are so deep that even on the hottest days, when all other vines in the Barossa have shut down, their leaves are bright. Like sunflowers, they track the sun."

To preserve and protect these vines, the Barossa Old Vine Charter was formed to register vineyards by age. There are four categories:

35+ years - Old Vines 70+ years - Survivor Vines 100+ years - Centenarian Vines 125+ years - Ancestor Vines. www.barossawine.com/vineyards/ old-vine-charter describes each category and includes a listing of specific wines currently produced.

It's possible to find Shiraz wines made from these special vines but do expect to pay a premium. Of course, there's also a wide selection of Australian





Cash is still King, but Low Interest Rates Help

In the real estate business, conventional wisdom says that rising interest rates make buying or selling a home more difficult, and decreasing interest rates make buying and selling easier.

For example, if a Home Buyer wants a 4% rate on a 30-year \$400,000, the monthly mortgage payment would be \$1,900. But if they only qualify for a 5% rate on a 30-year fixed mortgage, the monthly payment would rise to \$2,138. A 1% increase in interest raises the buyers payment by \$238, or roughly 13%.


From a home buyer's perspective, as mortgage rates increase, affordability decreases. In the aforementioned, Home Buyer wants to qualify for a \$400,000 mortgage at 4% interest, but at 5% interest, lenders can only offer the buyer a \$355,000 loan based on his qualifications. A 1% increase in mortgage interest decreases the buyer's purchasing power by \$45,000.

In many of the recent transactions here in the village, cash has

been king. Prices of homes here have continued to rise as multiple offers have buyers out-bidding each other to attain the Leisure Village home they want. A cash offer will generally put bidders higher on the list as the transaction will be easier and more secure without having to rely on a fixed mortgage on a home worth lender to complete the transaction. However, a loan that is "clean," a smaller percentage of the purchase price and without other contingencies will also have the buyer in play during this sellers market.

Ultimately, the prospect of climbing interest rates would force an adjustment to the pricing of homes to compensate for the buying power. There are some indications of the rise in interest rates beginning due to concerns of rising national debt and a slow recovery from the covid economy. We could see those adjustments to home values in our near future.


RACQUET CLUB



It's critical to make sure your essential documents are both secure and easily accessible for you and your family members in case of an emergency.

There are several aspects to storing important documents: Identifying which documents need to be stored, choosing where and how to store them and being able to access them when needed.

IDENTIFYING IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS

Think of the documents you would want to grab and take if you had to evacuate your home. Put those on your list. Important documents also include those you need when big life events happen, like buying a house, making a will, proving your identity or ownership of property, etc.

Here are some categories and a few examples to start with:

- 1) **Vital records**: Birth certificates, passports, driver's licenses, social security cards, marriage license, citizenship papers, child custody papers, divorce papers
- 2) Estate planning: Will, trust, power of attorney
- 3) Property: Deeds to property, mortgage info and statement, vehicle title, stock and bond certificates
- 4) Taxes
- 5) Medical: Medical contact info (doctors), medical history including medications, end-of-life and burial instructions
- 6) **Financial**: Investment statements, retirement/pension plan records, pay stubs, bank records, list of insurance policies with policy numbers and contact details
- 7) Valuable or sentimental photos and letters.
- 8) **Other**: List of usernames and passwords for online accounts, fingerprint/DNA info, inventory of household possessions, military ID/discharge paperwork

HOW TO STORE: The best practice is to mix physical storage with digital storage.

- Physical storage ideas: Fire proof safe at home, safety deposit box, portable fire proof safe, fire-resistant/water-resistant bags.
- Digital storage ideas: External hard drive, USB keychain, secure cloud storage. Consider password protecting your files that have sensitive identity information.

WHERE TO STORE:

Don't put all your eggs in one basket (location) or you risk losing everything at once.

- · Keep copies in a different location from originals.
- Have your digital storage on your hard drive backed up to a secure cloud storage and/or have an external storage device stored in a different location.
- Consider a trusted family member to place a secure form of document backup with, and provide them with how to access your info in an emergency or if you become incapacitated.
