

MEDIA INFORMATION and DIRECTORY

PRESS ROOM: Room 162 in the eastern wing of the gymnasium serves as the press room for Titan basketball. Five telephone lines are available—two at all times and three after the conclusion of radio post-game shows. PRESS TABLES: Primary beat reporters and broadcasters will be located on the south side of the playing floor near the scorer's table. Auxiliary seating and scout seating is available at tables situated along the base lines.

GAME SUMMARY PACKETS: Consisting of halftime boxes, final boxes and play-by-play summaries will be collated and distributed in Room 162 of the gymnasium building.

PRESS/PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective "home" SIDs. Photo credentials must be worn in plain sight at all times. Photographers may shoot only from the designated areas behind both baselines.

PARKING: Parking is available by:

a) Using Lot A at State College and Yorba Linda Blvd. or Lot B off State College Blvd. and paying \$1.50 upon entry for a daily permit, or:

b) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

Parking regulations are enforced 24 hours per day, 7 days per week

BROADCAST SPACE: One table is allocated to each team's designated commercial radio station. Each holds three persons comfortably across the working counter with one cramped seating space available to the rear. TELEPHONES: There is one telephone at the press table -- (714) 773-3970 -- which must be kept free for messages, out-of-town scores, etc. Additional telephones CANNOT be installed at the press table due to the physical limitations of the building. Please call if you have special telephone needs.

LOCKER ROOMS: Are located off the hallway on the north side of the playing floor. Brad Holland will conduct his post-game interviews in the equipment manager's office just outside the Fullerton players' locker room, which is CLOSED to the media. Players will be brought to the office area upon request after a reasonable cooling-off period.

FAX on DEMAND: Fullerton's releases, statistics and most recent box scores are available by calling (404) 399-3066. The Big West Conference is 292#. Fullerton's codes are 1220 for the release, 1221 for notes, 1222 for cumulative statistics and 1223 for the most recent box score.

CAMPUS PROFILE

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies, such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959, and the first commencement (for five students) was in 1960.

The University's 22,500 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states

and other nations. Many students commute each day to and from classes; some come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 700-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, education, engineering, music, nursing, public adminis-



tration, speech and hearing and theater. All told there are 94 degree programs — 44 of them at the graduate level — plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs. Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and co-

room instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain onthe-job experience while continuing their regular studies. Another amenity is the extended educa-

tion program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally-known professional artists to Cal State Fullerton for residencies and public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups. Another is Continuing

Learning Experience, which spearheaded the fund-raising campaign to build a gerontology center on campus.

The Ruby Gerontology Center serves as an educational and research facility for the study of aging and a meeting place for the Continuing Learning Experience.

Through a series of joint ventures started in 1979 with the establishment of the Fullerton Arboretum and continuing with the opening of a Marriott hotel on campus in 1989, the University and the city of Fullerton opened the Titan Sports Complex in 1992. A 10,000-seat multipurpose stadium, an adjoining baseball stadium and a separate track facility are newly completed features of the complex.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State Fullerton has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great institution.

ADMINISTRATION

Dr. Milton A. Gordon, President



Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at

Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as a mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of Pioneer Bank, St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of New Orleans, Louisiana.

Bill Shumard, Athletic Director



Bill Shumard is in his third year of an eventful tenure as Director of Athletics at Cal State Fullerton. He has hired key new personnel and initiated his vision of the role of the athletic department on the campus and in the community while working under drastic budget constrictions handed down by the state and State University system.

Shumard, 42, assumed his post on Aug.

1, 1991. He immediately had to replace two of his associate athletic directors. Brad Holland was appointed men's basketball coach in April, 1992, and Deborah Ayres (women's basketball) and Mary Ellen Murchison (women's volleyball) were hired two months later.

Shumard has instituted a 10-year gender equity plan for CSUF athletics and helped prepare an accelerated marketing plan to showcase the new Titan Sports Complex that features football/soccer, baseball and track facilities. Fiscal integrity has been established as a cornerstone in the department in order to achieve much-needed credibility.

"The challenge before us is immense as we seek to set realistic goals and parameters for our program," said Shumard. "But despite the obstacles, CSUF never has been in a better position to realize its true athletic potential as we enter this new era and take advantage of our new facilities."

Shumard's athletic career terminated as a freshman quarterback at Compton Junior College. He graduated from Long Beach State and is working on his masters at CSUF. Bill and his wife, Kim, live in Brea. He has three sons -- David, 22; Matt, 18; and Mike, 15.



Obstacles and adversity. Grass-roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in seven different sports, a perennial All-Star major league third

baseman, baseball and men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl, the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film and the first player selected in the major league baseball draft?

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of coach Alex Omaley advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional. The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a firstround NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's teams were usually factors in the PCAA race and had national Top 20 rankings and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton, which seemingly specialized in lastsecond wins behind 1992 NBA slam dunk champion Cedric Ceballos, also has competed twice in the post-season NIT Tournament while the women have recently been in both the WNIT and the NCAA fields. In 1991, Genia Miller was selected a Kodak All-America after ranking No. 2 in the nation in scoring and blocked

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972) and 1974) and had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation virtually every year and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while more recently Tami Elliott won 10 All-American awards before suffering a fractured vertebra in her senior season.

shots and No. 7 in rebounding.

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, an all-star fixture with the Montreal Expos who came over to the Los Angeles Dodgers for the 1993 season. Garrido won the College World Series again in 1984 with players

such as CWS Most Valuable Player John Fishel. The Titans won their first six-team regional and finished third in the CWS in 1988 under the direction of Coach Larry Cochell, who in 1990 guided them to a Big West title, a regional championship at Texas and a sixth trip to Omaha. A total of 20 Titan products have played in the major leagues (including 9 during the 1993 season) and now Garrido is back from a 3-year stint at Illinois. He punctuated his return with a share of the 1991 Big West title and a second-place finish in the 1992 College World Series despite losing his old diamond to construction for the new sports complex.

Fullerton had a 13-game winning streak in regional play -- all on the road at Starkville, Austin and Baton Rouge-- snapped in May. Key factors in maintaining that streak were two players on the 1992 Olympic team in Phil Nevin and Jason Moler, although the latter could not play due to an injury. Nevin, the College World Series MVP and *Baseball America's* College Player of the Year, also gained national attention as the first player selected (by the Houston Astros) in the 1992 amateur draft.

A classic trivia question in the making also features a Titan. Who got the last hit off Nolan Ryan? It was a grand-slam home run in the Seattle Kingdome by Dann Howitt, a Titan first baseman in 1986.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a perennial powerhouse, making seven trips to the College World Series and 14 consecutive regional appearances. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and often have been ranked No. 1 in the country.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runner Mark Covert.

Football had its moments, too, at Cal State Fullerton. Dick Coury was the inaugural coach in 1970 and he built an instant winner at the Division II level. The Titans were 27-16-1 over the first four years under Coury and successor Pete Yoder before the growing pains of moving up to Div. I were endured. The program came of age under the guidance of Gene Murphy in the 1980s with a pair of conference championships and four runnerup finishes in a seven-year span between 1983 and 1989. Murphy's products

include veteran cornerback Mark Collins of the New York Giants and muscular tight end James Thornton of the New York Jets.

But economic realities caught up with the program in 1990. The effects of playing murderous non-conference games on the road - at Georgia, at Auburn, at West Virginia, at UCLA, etc. -- took their toll on the won-loss record, the players' bodies and their minds. The Titans fell to the bottom of the standings and the program was suspended at the conclusion of the 1992 season. Plans call for bringing the sport back on a "cost containment" Div. I-AA level to take full advantage of the year-old stadium complex now on campus.

Meanwhile, Coach Al Mistri's soccer program has tried to fill the void in the stadium. A new women's program was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans move as high as No. 3 in the national rankings behind All-American forward Eddie Soto.

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit. While the relatively young institution carved out

of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division

students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became

known that spring afternoon in

1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the elephant mascot to life also has changed as evidenced by the adjacent photo-

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange


> County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was

formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue in uniforms and printing instead of the "reflex" blue of recent years was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange, originally furthered by former Director of Ath-Lynn Eilefson in the mid 1980s.

finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further

change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard. To its alumni of about 100,000, it's simply Cal State Fullerton.

ACADEMIC ASSISTANCE

Going into this decade, universities and colleges around the country are making a concerted effort towards increasing their academic programs in the athletic department. Cal State Fullerton is no exception as the department places a high priority on the education and graduation of student-athletes. The Athletic Academic Services department was established by the University to help ensure the academic success of intercollegiate athletes.

The mission of Athletic Academic Services, according to Director Christine McCarthy, is to provide academic and effective support services to help each student reach his academic goals.

"We want all of our student-athletes to benefit fully from his or her educational experience at Cal State Fullerton," said McCarthy.

The department's many programs and services are directly aimed at this goal. The office is responsible for academic advisement, coordinating study plans, class schedules, study skills workshops, tutoring, study hall, faculty and peer mentoring and referrals to the many campus services available to the student-athlete.

The office is staffed by two full-time workers, McCarthy and Barbara Kempton, and four half-time graduate assistants who serve as academic counselors and peer mentors. Kempton has been at Cal State Fullerton for 27 years, and her knowledge of the campus and the athletic department is immensely valuable to student-athletes who may need help with administrative paperwork and problems.

Student-athletes at Cal State Fullerton take an average of 4 1/2 to 5 years to graduate, and some of that success can be credited to Athletic Academic Services. The staff members assist with selecting and registering for classes, referring students to faculty advisors and tracking and evaluating their progress toward graduation. The office's services are available to all past and current student-athletes.

McCarthy comments, "Not all student-athletes are able to graduate in four years, because of professional opportunities or personal commitments. We developed a re-entry program for former student-athletes who wish to complete their studies, offering them the same services which were available to them when they competed for us."

The office of Athletic Academic Services helps student-athletes feel comfortable in the CSUF environment and McCarthy's experience before coming to the department in July, 1992, helps the orientation process. McCarthy received her Masters in Social Science from Cal State Fullerton in 1987 and has been working in education since 1984. Previous to her appointment in athletics, McCarthy worked for three years as the Assistant Director of the Learning Assistance Resource Center at CSUF before budget cuts eliminated the department. At the LARC, she

supervised 80 student employees who were responsible for the various tutorial, strategies classes, computer skills and study skill programs which were available for the university students. Before coming to Cal State Fullerton, McCarthy was the Director of Student Services at Western State University, College of Law and before that was the Director of Student Services at the University of Phoenix.

COACH BRAD HOLLAND



Brad Holland won rave reviews for the manner in which he revitalized the Cal State Fullerton men's basketball program during the 1992-93 season, his first as a head coach.

On the court, the Titans played hustling, entertaining and winning basketball. At 15-12, they posted the school's first winning record in four years while going 10-8 to finish in a tie for fifth place in the Big West Conference. Off the court, they grew from a disgruntled squad into a close-knit unit.

Holland, an assistant to Jim Harrick at UCLA for the previous four seasons, inherited three returning starters and one part-time performer from a 12-16 team whose top two scorers were seniors. He was able to recruit one player after his April 8, 1992, appointment and that man, Don Leary from Mt. San Jacinto Junior College, turned into the most prolific 3-point shooter in school history.

Despite a dangerously thin bench, the Titans joined Pacific as the surprise teams of the year in the Big West.

Projected as a ninth-place club, they beat every opponent except New Mexico State and capped the year with an exciting 1-point home victory over nationally ranked UNLV. The win over the Rebels was only Fullerton's fourth in 33 tries and its series sweep of UC Santa Barbara was its first in nine seasons.

Attendance in Titan Gym increased due in part to a season-long promotion focused on Holland, who was rewarded when his original three-year contract was extended on April 22 through the 1995-96 season.

"I think we had a successful season," said Holland, 36, who never has been associated with a losing basketball season. "We were close to having a very successful season. It would have been a tremendous achievement for this team to go to postseason play. We were close to doing it. We had some excellent wins. I think we've got something to build on in recruiting."

Success as a head coach is merely the latest positive mark Holland has made on Southern California basketball. He was a basketball and football star at Crescenta Valley High School. He was a four-year basketball letterman at UCLA and played with the Los Angeles Lakers and two other National Basketball Association teams before retiring in 1982 due to a knee injury. He entered private business and also was a broadcaster for PrimeTicket from 1985 to 1988. He began his coaching career under Harrick in 1988-89 and helped the Bruins return to national prominence while compiling a 93-35 record that took them to four NCAA tournaments.

"Brad has been around the game of basketball all of his life," said Athletic Director Bill Shumard upon Holland's hiring. "He learned the game from and has been associated with some of the greats in basketball."

Holland was the last player recruited by Coach John Wooden and became a part of four Pac-10 championship teams at UCLA from 1976 to 1979, two under Coach Gene Bartow and two under Coach Gary Cunningham. The Bruins went 102-17 during Holland's playing career and he was an honorable mention All-America and second-team Academic All-America as a senior. That year he averaged 17.5 points and 4.8 assists and had a .598 field goal percentage, the best ever by a Bruin guard.

The Lakers drafted Holland in 1979 on the first round (the 14th player


chosen) and went on to win the 1980 NBA championship. The rookie guard scored eight points in the decisive sixth game at Philadelphia. He finished his playing career in 1981-82 with Washington and Milwaukee.

Holland is the sixth head coach in Titan history following Alex Omalev (1961-72), Moe Radovich (1973), Bobby Dye (1974-80), George McQuarn (1981-88) and John Sneed (1989-92). He serves as Chairman of District 15 for the National Association of Basketball Coaches' All-American committee.

Holland and his wife, Leslie, live in La Canada with twin daughters Lisa and Kristin, 11, and infant son Kyle.

Bob Hawking


Bob Hawking enters his second year on Brad Holland's staff after two seasons at UC Davis with Head Coach Bob Williams.

Hawking, 44, has deep Southern California basketball roots. He served the previous two years as an assistant at Pepperdine after a long and successful career on the high school level. He was the head coach for 14 seasons at Simi Valley High School where he took his teams to the CIF playoffs nine times and won five Marmonte League championships. His 1987 team was ranked No. 4 in the state and the following year his team won the CIF championship and climbed to No. 3 in the state led by the play of Don MacLean, who went on to become the alltime leading scorer in the Pac-10 for UCLA. Hawking was selected CIF Southern Section AAAA Coach of the Year in 1988 and won similar honors from the Los Angeles Times in 1986 when Simi Valley was CIF runnerup. He was league coach of the year six times.

Hawking began his coaching career at Pater Noster High in Los Angeles before moving to Simi Valley in 1972 as the junior varsity coach. He has served as coach and director for numerous basketball camps and all-star games throughout California.

The playing career of Hawking began at Alemany High School in Mission Hills and continued at Pierce College in Woodland Hills and Cal State Northridge.

Bob and his wife, Jeannie, have three children. Kristin, 15, and Quinn, 11, are at home while son Butch is head coach of the Air Force Academy Prep School in Colorado Springs after graduating from the Air Force Academy a year ago.


Chris Brazier is an experienced but still youthful member of Brad Holland's Titan coaching staff.

Brazier, 33, begins his eighth year as a collegiate coach, his third full season on a fulltime basis. He worked in 1991-92 as a full-time assistant to Ernie Kent at Saint Mary's College in Moraga after one season as a part-time coach at Santa Clara.

Prior to those West Coast Conference assignments, Chris was an assistant for two seasons (1988-90) at West Valley Community College in Saratoga where the Vikings won the Golden Gate Conference championship in 1989-90 after a second-place finish in 1988-89. In 1986-87 and 1987-88 he was at the University of the Pacific, first as a graduate assistant and then earning a promotion to a full-time position after a mid-season coaching change.

Two head coaches directed Brazier during his playing career as a small forward at Montana State. Bruce Haroldson was the coach during his junior year and Stu Starner was the head man his senior season when Brazier was all-conference and the team's Most Valuable Player and Best Defensive Player. Chris received his bachelor's degree in Organizational Communications and earned a master's in Human Behavior at National University in 1990.

Brazier has coached in numerous camps and clinics and worked with the Los Angeles Slam 'n Jam Development League. He is single and lives in Fullerton.



George Tuttle

Versatile George Tuttle joins the Titans' coaching staff for 1993-94 after a busy two years at Sheridan Junior College in Wyoming. Tuttle, 26, served as academic advisor and physical education instructor at Sheridan as well as sports information director in addition to his coaching duties.

Tuttle had the privilege of working under one of the winningest junior college coaches in America in Bruce Hoffman. Together, they compiled a 52-12 record including a 1992-93 season mark of 28-4 and a No. 12 natonal ranking.

He replaces Ed Goorjian, who came out of retirement for the 1992-93 season to help Coach Brad Holland. Goorjian was head coach at Crescenta Valley High School during Holland's illustrious playing career.

Tuttle served one year as a graduate assistant at the University of Texas for Coach Tom Penders in 1990-91. He has worked summer basketball camps around the country and coached on the prep level in Oklahoma and Texas.

Tuttle played on the St. Edward's University varsity basketball team in Austin and was a two-time academic all-conference and all-region selection. He earned his bachelor's degree at the University of Texas and has worked toward a master's degree at the Universities of Texas and Wyoming. He is single and lives in Orange.

SEASON PREVIEW

The second season of the Brad Holland Era at Cal State Fullerton possesses more of the signs of a typical inaugural campaign for a new coach as Holland scrambles to rebuild his second-year roster.

Holland and his coaching staff are the primary constants remaining from a 15-12 season in 1992-93 that included a 10-8 upper division finish in the Big West Conference and featured a sweep of UC Santa Barbara as well as a memorable home finale victory over UNLV. Gone is the entire "ironman" starting five as well as a couple of substitutes.

"The roster was really up in the air, even after classes already had begun," said Holland. "We didn't know how many of our junior college transfers were going to successfully complete their Associate Arts degree works to be able to enroll. All but one made it and he could still make it in December.

"It's obvious, we are going to have a completely new team. We will try to rebuild as quickly as possible and be competitive again. It's been a long summer waiting to see."

Shooting guard Don Leary (Mt. San Jacinto JC, Banning, CA), who teamed with four seniors in the starting lineup last year and averaged 13.3 points while setting several school records for 3-point field goals, suffered academic problems and is not eligible for the 1993-94 season. Backup guard/forward DiJon Bernard also failed to meet minimum academic requirements. That left guard Greg Vernon (University HS, Los Angeles) and forward Todd Satalowich (Rock Bridge HS, Columbia, MO) as the only veterans from last year's team and their *combined* scoring and rebounding averages were 3.0 and 2.9, respectively.

Three junior college transfers and University of Washington transfer James French (El Cerrito HS, Richmond, CA), who redshirted last season, will be counted upon to form the nucleus of this year's squad. Four talented freshmen have arrived and, given the absence of Div. I experience in front of them, will be given every opportunity to break into the regular rotation. The Titans also have some wild cards of sorts in sophomore David Frigout, a 6-9 transfer from Groupe Pigier University in France, and Fred Amos, a 6-7 walk-on from Rancho Santiago JC, who made the squad with impressive work in pre-season conditioning.

"We are optimistic we can be competitive with this group of newcomers," said Holland. "We won't be very tall but will have quickness and athletic ability to rely on. We hope to play an up tempo game and present some problems for people defending us. Of course, we will have problems against people with better height.

"This should be a deeper team than last year and we hope to play eight or nine guys. We look for the freshmen to come in with the attitude that all the positions are open and they have a chance to impact the program right away."

Satalowich appeared in all but one game last year, starting twice for Sean Williams. Satalowich averaged 0.7 points and 1.7 rebounds. Vernon is a three-year letterman who averaged 2.3 points and 1.2 rebounds in 1992-93.

Four underclassmen from last year's squad in addition to Leary and Bernard also left the program. Point guard Sharif Metoyer, who appeared in 22 of the 27 games as a walk-on freshman, has transferred to Long Beach City College. Freshman guard Casey Sheahan, redshirt freshman forward Ray Hooper and walk-on sophomore power forward Andre Toliver, none of whom played more than 32 minutes all season, also have moved on. Bernard averaged 2.8 points and 1.4 rebounds in 24 appearances.

French was a starter as a freshman at Washington but saw his playing time diminish as a sophomore. He averaged 4.3 points and 3.2 assists in 1990-91 and started all 28 games. In 1991-92 he started 9 of 27 games, averaging 3.9 points and 1.9 assist.

The four incoming junior college transfers are Darren Little, 6-7, who averaged 17 points and 11 rebounds at Palomar JC in San Diego; Winston Peterson, 6-6, who averaged 20 points and 12 assists at San Jacinto JC in Texas; Danny Robinson, 6-0, who averaged 12 points and 8 assists at point guard for Sheridan JC in Wyoming; and walk-on Amos, who averaged 13.8 points and 9.1 rebounds while setting school records for blocked shots in a game (9), season (101) and career (140). Jerome Washington, 6-5, who averaged 12 points and 6 rebounds at Mid-Plains JC in Nebraska, hopes to enroll in December.

Three of the four incoming freshmen were high school stars. Chris Dade is a 6-2 guard who dominated the San Diego County vs. Orange County all-star game on June 26 at Orange Coast College in Costa Mesa. The product of El Camino High School led all scorers with 19 points in leading San Diego to a 107-89 upset win. He was San Diego's Div. II Player of the Year after averaging 16.5 points while shooting 58 per cent from the floor and 78 per cent from the foul line. Josh King, a 6-7 small forward, averaged 16 points and 10 rebounds for the state champion runnerup Jesuit High School team from Carmichael. He shot better than 40 per cent from 3-point range his senior year. St. Clair, a 6-0 guard, was the *Orange County Register*'s Player of the Year after leading Sonora High of La Habra to the Freeway League championship.

De Vaughn Wright, a 6-6 forward, was the second man off the bench for Mater Dei High's nationally ranked team. He won two CIF titles.

The 1993-94 intercollegiate sports season marks the Silver Anniversary of the Big West Conference. The league, which began in 1969 as the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) with seven charter members in California, has evolved to an 11-member conference with institutions in five western states. The name change was made in the summer of 1988.

Big West Conference members are nationally competitive and have won 12 NCAA Division I men's championships and 10 NCAA Division I women's championships.

Several major developments have given a new-look to the conference in the past 18 months. Dennis Farrell, who has worked in the conference office in a variety of roles since 1980, was named Commissioner in August of 1992. Fresno State, a charter member in 1969, moved to the Western Athletic Conference and was replaced by the University of Nevada for the 1992-93 seasons. And a football consortium has been created that brought Arkansas State, Louisiana Tech, Northern Illinois and Southwestern Louisiana into a scheduling combine to creater a much broader Big West on the gridiron.

The conference's name was changed to reflect a simpler, more accurate description of the league's 11 member institutions -- Cal State Fullerton, Long Beach State, Nevada, New Mexico State, San Jose State, UC Irvine, UC Santa Barbara, Hawaii (women's sports only), UNLV, Pacific and Utah State.

Basketball success among Big West institutions has been growing over the years and reached its apex in 1989-90 when UNLV won the NCAA championship in convincing fashion over Duke yet couldn't even claim sole possession of the Big West championship. New Mexico State tied the Rebels for the regular season title and actually was the No. 1 seed in the post-season tournament in Long Beach. The league's third-place team, UC Santa Barbara, went on to beat Houston in the first round of the NCAA tourney and help the Big West top all other conferences in tournament play with a .778 percentage (7-2).

In 1990-91, UNLV was ranked No. 1 in the nation all season until losing to Duke in the semifinals of the Final Four. New Mexico State again was ranked nationally, but Cal State Fullerton was the only other team to avoid a losing overall season. In 1992, New Mexico State captured the nation's fancy by advancing to the Sweet 16. Last year, UNLV with new coach Rollie Massimino was left out of the NCAA picture and the conference was represented by Long Beach State and New Mexico State. For the 49ers, it was their first trip to the tournament since 1977.

The Big West Conference has adopted a "FAX on Demand" information system for the 1993-94 season. Conference and individual institutions' news releases, game results and cumulative statistics are available to media by calling (404) 399-3066. The Big West code number is 292 and prompts a directory.



1992-93 IN REVIEW

The Brad Holland Era at Cal State Fullerton began on a winning note as the Titans ignored pre-season prognostications of a ninth-place Big West Conference finish to post winning records both in conference and overall play. The Titans relied on an Ironmen Five starting lineup and tied for fifth with UC Santa Barbara with a 10-8 Big West mark and finished with an overall record of 15-12. The winning season, Fullerton's first since 1988-89, continued a personal streak for Holland, who never has been associated with a losing year in his basketball career dating back to Crescenta Valley High School, UCLA and the Los Angeles Lakers.

New NCAA legislation cut two weeks off pre-season basketball practice, which seemed unfair to all new coaching staffs, particularly one such as Fullerton, directed by a coach who never had been a head coach before. Holland quickly learned that the time demands on a head coach are more diverse than on an assistant but he and his staff got the Titans into game form on schedule.

Fullerton did have the luxury of opening at home but faced a Saint Mary's team that already had a game under its belt but also had lost a starter to injury. The Titans won rather handily, 82-62, and the positive momentum had been started. A trip to the Midwest got off awkwardly when an Iowa snowstorm diverted the Titans' jetliner to Peoria, Illinois, and set up a long bus ride that wiped out practice. But the Titans came out strong against host Northern Iowa, scoring the first 13 points of the game, on their way to a 66-55 victory. Two nights later they started strong again but faded under a brilliant performance by Drake point guard Curt Smith and tasted defeat for the first time, 86-73.

A stubborn Cal State Northridge team hung close the entire game before suffering a 75-68 loss in the Matadors' Gym. Fullerton then came home for two rather easy victories over Eastern Illinois and Chapman to raise its record to 5-1 for Holland's return to UCLA and Pauley Pavilion. With Don Leary hitting his first five 3-point field goal attempts on his way to Fullerton school and Pauley Pavilion records, the Titans played the Bruins to a draw for 25 minutes. UCLA went on a 16-2 run but couldn't put the Titans away until the final minute for a 90-82 decision that left Fullerton at 5-2 heading into Big West Conference play.

The schedule makers did Coach Holland no favor, throwing the first-year coach to the two best programs in the conference and on the road to boot. The Titans' second and third consecutive games on the road with Top 25 teams went as expected as defeats, but Fullerton did hold a second-half lead at UNLV as it held J. R. Rider to a season-low 7 points.

Fullerton got back to its winning ways in friendly Titan Gym with impressive victories over Nevada and Utah State. Then came probably the key week of the season as Fullerton played its "commuting" road games in succession at UC Irvine, Long Beach State and UC Santa Barbara. The Titans got a win at UCI as Leary hit a follow shot in the closing seconds for a 2-point victory. After a 14-point loss at Long Beach State, the Titans regrouped to end their 8-year losing streak at UC Santa Barbara with an overtime victory.

The Titans came home again to beat San Jose State and Pacific in competitive affairs to raise their record to 11-5 and stamp


themselves as the surprise team of the conference, having been picked for ninth place in the pre-season polls.

But that proved to be the high-water mark of the year. The Titans got off to a dreadful start at Utah State and lost by 25 points in their worst showing of the season. They bounced back with a nervous win at Nevada but off-court activities took precedence.

Coach Holland suspended four players including three starters for violating team rules and none of the players were allowed in the building as an 8-man Fullerton team lost to Houston, 77-63, in a non-conference game. UC Irvine then played a brilliant first half and pulled out an overtime victory to split its season series and start a remarkable string of down-to-the wire games for Fullerton.

The Titans came out on the winning side as Aaron Sunderland had a brilliant week in victories over Long Beach State and UC Santa Barbara. The Titans tasted the other side of the coin in one-basket losses at Pacific and San Jose State. Sunderland's and the team's slump continued in an 8-point home loss to New Mexico State but then the point guard redeemed himself with one basket - a game winner with two seconds to play as Fullerton capped a memorable home finale for the seniors and the fans by beating UNLV for the first time in four years and only the fourth time in 33 meetings.

Fullerton's run in the Big West post-season tournament lasted only one game, an 80-68 loss to eventual champion Long Beach State. The Titans lost for the first time in 13 games where they led at the half, letting a 36-28 advantage disappear as the 49ers forced turnovers with a full-court press and converted 24 of 29 second-half free throws.






Greg Bunch played with the New York Knicks in 1979.
