PRESS CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective "home" SIDs. When time permits, credentials will be mailed.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. NCAA rules limit shooting to outside the restraining line enclosing the field and the team areas and these rules, as modified due to the inadequate space behind benches at Santa Ana Stadium, will be strictly enforced.

PARKING: Free, ample and close to western grandstand bearing press box. No credential or pass required.

PRESS BOX: Is limited to working members of the press, radio, television and others whose duties require use of the press area. No one will be admitted without proper credentials (spouses included). Light sandwiches and soft drinks will be provided. Play-by-play reports by quarters, halftime and final statistics, scoring summary and post-game quotes will be distributed throughout the press box, which is located on the west side of Santa Ana Stadium.

FAX/TELECOPIER: One Xerox 7010 will be available on a first-come, first-served basis. BROADCAST SPACE: One booth is allocated to each team's designated commercial radio station. Each holds four persons comfortably across the working counter with standing space available to the rear. Additional needs for radio and all television requests will be handled on an individual basis (read: rooftop).

TELEPHONES: One pay telephone and one usually busy Fullerton media relations business line--(714) 285-0456-- are available in the press box. Additional phones must be ordered through Pacific Bell by calling 811-3204 from California area codes or (818) 576-3204 out of state.

INTERVIEW ROOMS: Do not exist. Interviews must be conducted outside the locker room areas which are located behind the south end zone on the field.

SCOUTS: Professional scouts will be sold tickets in the grandstands (top row south of press box) and provided handout materials upon request at the press box entrance. Scouts from opposing schools will be issued press box passes if space permits in accordance with NCAA rules, but only if requested at least four days in advance.

The University

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing. The main campus is located in Fullerton and a Mission Viejo campus was opened in August, 1989. The latter offers only upper-division and graduate courses.

Classes were offered at Fullerton for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 25,000 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes, although nearly 400 now live on campus in residence halls opened in 1988.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 775-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University is fully accredited and enjoys national recognition for both its array of traditional academic programs and a growing list of independently accredited professional programs, including art, athletics training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing and theater. All told, there are 87 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level — plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students, but also open to community members, is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups, including the Titan Athletic Foundation.

Further examples of community outreach are the Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of aging and a meeting place for the Continuing Learning Experience support group.

Through a series of joint ventures started in 1979 with the establishment of the Fullerton Arboretum and continuing with the 1989 opening of the Marriott Hotel, the University and the city of Fullerton are working to complete an on-campus sports complex in 1992. Already in use are two lighted softball fields. When the main part of the sports complex is finished, it will include a stadium for football, soccer and other activities plus a pavilion for baseball.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State conducts comprehensive fund raising. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great institution.



Administration



Dr. Milton A. Gordon, President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as a

mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is a member of the board of the California Coalition for Mathematics and a member of the Orange County Community Foundation, the California State University Growth Plan Commission, the CSU Commission on the Older, Part-Time Student, the California Admissions Advisory Council, the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

Athletics Department



Bill Shumard, Director of Athletics

Bill Shumard achieved a "lifelong professional goal" on June 14 when he was appointed Director of Athletics at Cal State Fullerton, effective Aug. 1.

Shumard, 40, most recently had served as an assistant athletic director at USC for three years after a 13-year career with the Los Angeles Dodgers.

"I always hoped I would have the opportunity to work at Cal State Fullerton," he said. "Because of where we live (Brea), and having children in the process of growing up, this is where I set my sights. I'm a graduate of the Cal State system (Long Beach

State, 1972) and my desire was to get back to this level.

"An athletic department run with ethical and financial responsibility can mirror a successful university. It can bring people to the university in myriad ways. I believe there are 65,000 Cal State Fullerton graduates living in the Los Angeles area. We've got the opportunity to use this to bring them back to campus. If we have a program that is competitive and makes an honest effort at moving athletes toward graduation, I think that's a lot to stand up and cheer about."

Shumard was part of a five-person team at USC that raises \$7 million per year. His recent projects included supervising 12 regional Trojan Club support groups and staging a dinner in the Los Angeles Coliseum for 3,000 persons to highlight the university's athletic centennial celebration. He also was program coordinator for the Sports Management Institute, a joint venture of the athletic departments and business administration schools of USC, Notre Dame and North Carolina. His other duties included representing USC on various community-related boards and committees and serving as liaison between the Director of Athletics and the Trojan Football Alumni Club.

Shumard's Dodger career began in 1975 as an assistant in public relations and publicity. He became Director of the Speakers Bureau in 1977 and was appointed Director of Community Services in 1981. The title was enlarged in 1983 to include Special Events as he supervised a staff of 15 employees responsible for game and community promotions and all publications as well as coordinating the activities of the Dodger Alumni Association. He also served as co-chairman of Dodger Stadium's 25th Anniversary Celebration, liaison to the 1987 Tournament of Roses Parade, Director of Protocol for the 1984 Olympic Baseball Tournament and on the administrative staff of three World Series, five National League Championship Series and three All-Star Games.

His first athletics position was as Sports Information Director at his alma mater in 1972 and 1973. He spent the next two years at Cal State Los Angeles where he was an assistant professor in journalism and physical education, was advisor to the campus pep groups and served as manager of the Athletic News Bureau.

Shumard's athletic career terminated as a freshman quarterback at Compton Junior College, where he obtained his Associate Arts degree in 1970. Bill and his wife, Kim, live in Brea. He has three sons -- David, 20; Matt, 16; and Mike, 13.

The Big West Conference enters its fourth year of existence since changing its name from the Pacific Coast Athletic Association prior to the 1988 football season. The name is seen as a simpler, more accurate description of the league's 11 member institutions -- Cal State Fullerton, Fresno State, Long Beach State, New Mexico State, San Jose State, UC Irvine (no football), UC Santa Barbara (Div. III football), Hawaii (women only), UNLV, Pacific and Utah State. Fresno State has withdrawn effective July 1, 1992.

When the league was formed in 1969, it consisted of seven charter members, all of which

were located in the state of California. In its 21 years of existence, however, the conference has expanded to include universities from states which are not on nor near the Pacific Ocean (Utah, Nevada and New Mexico).

Quarterbacks such as Steve DeBerg and Randall Cunningham, wide receivers such as Henry Ellard, Stephone Paige and Stacey Bailey and cornerbacks the likes of Mark Collins and John Hendy generally have been the major "export" of the Big West, although Utah State linemen such as Merlin Olsen and Rulon Jones have had major impacts. In 1989 the NFL welcomed the NCAA's leading rusher in UNLV's Ickey Woods, who became a national celebrity doing a sideline dance. In the 1990 NFL draft, Fresno State cornerback James Williams was tabbed in the first round and teammate Ron Cox went on the second round.

Santa Ana Stadium

Cal State Fullerton football returns for an eighth consecutive season to Santa Ana Stadium -- commonly known in its glorious history as Santa Ana Bowl.

Officially named "Eddie West Field -- Santa Ana Stadium," the 12,000-seat facility served as the Titans' home during portions of the 1971 through 1975 seasons while Fullerton was alternating home dates with Anaheim Stadium. In 1984 the Titans returned on a "temporary permanent" basis and won all four home dates.

Located at 602 N. Flower St. between Sixth and Civic Center Drive in central Santa Ana, the Orange County seat, the "Bowl" is about 10 miles south of the main Cal State Fullerton campus and it boasts a tradition as one of the finest stadium sites in Orange County. It was dedicated on Apr. 27, 1932 and has played host to a wide variety of athletic and entertainment events while undergoing numerous facelifts and remodelings. It is also the home field for Rancho Santiago JC and all Santa Ana high schools for football and soccer.

The current structure was built in 1963. It was re-dedicated in 1981 in memory of Eddie West, long-time sports editor of the Santa Ana Register. This year it features 4,300 new seats, more than half with backrests, in the western grandstand.

The two-tiered, enclosed press box can handle two radio play-by-play crews in separate booths, numerous film crews on the roof and approximately 30 writers and statisticians on the lower level. The expected press box phone number is (714) 285-0456.

ON-CAMPUS SPORTS COMPLEX

The long-awaited dream of a permanent on-campus facility for Cal State Fullerton is nearly reality. In July, 1988, the Board of Trustees of the State University system approved the schematic plans for a \$10.7 million complex that will include a 10,000-seat football stadium designed for expansion to 30,000 seats. Also in the project, which is running well ahead of its Spring, 1992 targeted completion date, are a 1,500-seat baseball pavilion, an all-weather running track surrounding a soccer practice field and renovated tennis courts.

An on-campus Marriott Hotel and convention center was the first "phase" of the construction. Its revenue will reimburse the city of Fullerton for the University's portion of the construction cost of the sports complex, which will receive joint use from Titan athletics, city recreation programs and other community tenants.

Nickname and Mascot

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"
Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the

purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what

it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at

more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek.

The mascot outlived the race. In 1963, one elephant charged the crowd causing minor injuries and an early sign of a now-common liability insurance crisis nipped a tradition in the bud.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The

unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987.

When Lynn Eilefson was appointed athletics director in 1982, he furthered the cause of orange because of its uniqueness and brightness compared to the wide variety of blues. Thus, the "Orange Crush" booster group was born and the color remains prominent in most team uniforms. And, finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status

necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard. And that's only the start of the

confusion.

To out-of-staters, the picture clouds quickly because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state — the University of California and the State University system. So, the school has been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, with no hyphens or commas, which is what most of the more than 80,000 graduates recognize. But since there are only two other major institutions known as Titans (University of Detroit and Oral Roberts University), just call Fullerton teams the "Titans!"

History of Titan Athletics

Obstacles and adversity. Grass-roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in seven different sports, a star major league third baseman, men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl and the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film?

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of coach Alex Omalev advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team: and a 1991 Kodak All-America in Genia Miller, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's teams were usually factors in the PCAA race and had national Top 20 rankings and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton, which has seemingly specialized in last-second wins under current coach John Sneed, also has competed twice in the post-season NIT Tournament while the women have recently been in both the WNIT and the NCAA fields. In 1991, Genia Miller was selected a Kodak All-America after being No. 2 in the nation in scoring.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former



Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation virtually every year and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while more recently Tami Elliott won 10 All-American awards before suffering a fractured vertebra in her senior season.

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, now of the Montreal Expos. He won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as CWS Most Valuable Player John Fishel. The Titans won their first six-team regional and finished third in the CWS in 1988 under the direction of Coach Larry Cochell, who in 1990 guided them to a Big West title, a regional championship at Texas and a sixth


trip to Omaha in 1990. A total of 16 Titan products have played in the major leagues and now Garrido is back from a 3-year stint at Illinois. He punctuated his return with a share of the 1991 Big West title despite losing his old diamond to construction for the new complex.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making seven trips to the College World Series and 12 consecutive regional appearances. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and often have been ranked No. 1 in the country.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runner Mark Covert. But football is the name of the game in intercollegiate sports and the Titans have had their moments on the gridiron as well.

Dick Coury was the inaugural coach in 1970 and he built an instant winner at the Division II level. The Titans were 27-16-1 over the first four years under Coury and successor Pete Yoder before the growing pains of moving up to Div. I were endured. The program came of age under the guidance of Gene Murphy in the 1980s and the new stadium complex should add more luster

Head Coach Gene Murphy



Gene Murphy has overcome many challenges in his 11 season at Cal State Fullerton, but he faces his most difficult in 1991 as he tries to hold his program together in the wake of its worst season, severe budget reductions and the loss of several incoming players and promising redshirt players.

The program was in limbo between Jan. 24, when the Athletics Council recommended dropping football, and Feb. 1, when President Milton A. Gordon announced that the sport would be continued on the basis of pledged community financial support.

The salvation Murphy clings to is the construction underway on the long-awaited on-campus stadium, which is ahead of schedule for a 1992 opening game vs. Mississippi State.

"It's an awesome sight, isn't it?" he said to virtually every visitor to the artificial bowl as it was being created. "Last year, when our season was going so badly, a bunch of us would go up there and take a look.

It was a real turn on. In a year of downers, it was our only upper."

A large turnover in his coaching staff will further test the resources of Murphy and his seemingly bottomless pit of enthusiasm. He has brought identity, fun and success in the standings to Titan football while inadvertently establishing himself as one of the traditions of a program about to embark on only its 22nd season. This will be its 12th under the direction of the New Jersey native who spent two decades in North Dakota before migrating to southern California.

Murphy's homespun sense of humor, his ability to turn negatives into positives and his genuine concern for assistant coaches and players have been the constant threads holding together a football program that has outperformed its resources. He has received coaching offers from more established institutions, but he has remained a Titan. He takes a 55-71-1 (57-69-1 with forfeits) record into his 12th year at Fullerton.

While Dick Coury (1970-71) brought Cal State Fullerton football into the world and Pete Yoder (1972-74) steered it through adolescence until Jim Colletto (1975-79) guided it into Division I status, it has been the 52-year-old (on Aug. 6) Murphy who has nurtured it to maturity. He and his staff remodeled an old home for an office complex (Football House), constructed their own weight training facility (Titan Pete's Bulk House in honor of Fullerton contractor Ray Peterson), arranged a fall training camp through the cooperation of Frank Frobisher at Pacific Christian College and even erected their own stadium (Titan Field, on-campus bleachers, 1980-82).

Between 1983 and 1989, the Titans won a pair of conference championships and finished second on four occasions despite playing a difficult non-conference schedule rated anywhere from "ambitious" to "suicidal." The Titans have become ex-officio members of the Southeastern Conference with recent games at LSU, Florida and Auburn and trips to Georgia and Mississippi State on the 1991 slate.

Murphy has kept the Titans competitive despite fighting for southern California football talent against most of the nation's top programs and sharing a municipal stadium with local high schools and a junior college. A schedule tilted heavily in favor of road games has been the result of the stadium situation, which will come to an end with the completion of the on-campus facility spearheaded by former Mayor Dick Ackerman and the City of Fullerton as well as the Marriott Hotel chain.

"The stadium is the final piece in the puzzle," says Murphy, who has paced the sidelines at four different "home" sites during his tenure.

A 225-room on-campus Marriott Hotel opened in October, 1989, and began paying off the construction cost to the city of a \$10.4 million football/soccer and baseball complex that will be utilized by the community as well.

Murphy arrived at Fullerton in January, 1980, but it took until the 1983 season for his freshmen-oriented recruiting program to produce a winning record.

"We had to go back to square one - erecting the stadium, fund-raising, recruiting, building facilities, everything — to build a broad base," said Murphy, Pacific Coast Athletic Association Coach of the Year in 1983 and United Press International's West Coast Coach of the Year in 1984. "And from Day One we had to build the self-image of the Titan program. What we have developed is 'Titan Family.' You win with people. We put up with a lot of adversity, but we do it together and I think it has made us stronger. It's something you have to experience to properly appreciate."

Murphy is second in the Big West Conference in seniority to Fresno State's Jim Sweeney. He left a nationally prominent Div. II program at North Dakota to "throw the football." His early Titan teams featured wide-open aerial assaults and more than a bagful of trick and gadget plays. collectively known as the "squirrel derby" offense. But he has adjusted almost annually to the available personnel.

The 1983 PCAA championship team and California Bowl entrant was built around a stubborn, ball-hawking defense while the 1984 squad put it all together on its way to a UPI No. 20 national ranking: a strong running game to balance an efficient yet deep-striking passing game

and an aggressive defense that was second in the country in creating turnovers. In 1985 and 1988, defense carried the load until young offensive units put things together. In 1986 and 1987, the offense played ball control to keep thin defensive units relatively healthy. In 1989, the Titans re-wrote their offensive record book with an innovative one-back offensive set. Limited experience and numerous injuries combined to make 1990 a stunning reversal of form.

The one constant has been the importance Murphy has placed on special teams play.

"We feel the game is divided into three phases — offense, defense and special teams — and if you can win two of the three, you have a pretty good chance to win the football game. We spend a lot of time and front-line personnel on special teams and don't just give them lip service."

Murphy was born on Aug. 6, 1939 in Jersey City, New Jersey. He was an all-sports star at St. Peter's High School in New Brunswick and earned all-state honors in football (quarterback) and baseball (shortstop). His late father also was a coach and matched wits with the likes of Vince Lombardi at the prep level.

Recruited to the University of Minnesota by assistant Ray Malavasi under head coach Murray Warmath, Murphy soon found himself sitting on the bench behind Gopher star Sandy Stephens. He transferred to North Dakota and as a senior was the All-North Central Conference quarterback.

After obtaining his bachelor's degree (double major of physical education and social studies) in 1962, Murphy served one year as graduate assistant and then coached football, baseball and swimming at North St. Paul High School before returning to UND. He remained there 14 more years — the first 12 as an assistant and then the 1978 and 1979 seasons as head coach.

While he was offensive coordinator, the Sioux won six conference championships and par-

ticipated in three (1966, 1972 and 1975) post-season bowl games. As head coach he won the conference title in 1979 and was named coach of the year as the Sioux went 10-2 and were ranked as high as No. 3 in the Div. II national rankings. His 1978 team was 5-5, giving him a two-year mark of 15-7 at UND and a current career mark of 70-78-1 (72-76-1 including forfeits).

Murphy spent five summers (1967-71) as a "guest" coach with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League. During his Fullerton tenure he also has turned down opportunities to return to Canada.

A holder of two master's degrees (physical education in 1963 and secondary administration in 1977), Murphy served as interim athletic director at Fullerton for much of 1981.

Murphy has two sons. Tim, 25, is in his senior year at Cal State Fullerton and works for the athletic equipment room and sports information office, currently handling the baseball program. Michael, 21, is also a Fullerton senior.

A Glossary of "Murphisms"

As a native of New Jersey, nurtured in the upper Midwest, employed in Canada and now working and living in southern California, Gene Murphy has developed a language all his own. In the interest of better communication, here is a glossary of often-used words and phrases:

"Hail damage in the attic" - questionable mentality or lack of common sense

"Jordanians" - his kickers, either punters or placekickers or both

"Keeper" - a player who will contribute to a winning program

"Little Sisters of the Poor" - school with a lightly regarded football program... an opponent that will enhance your W/L record

"Munchken" - small, tiny person... usually a defensive back

"Norp" - someone from North Dakota

"Sandy Koufax" - a "no-hitter"... a player afraid of contact

"Smash Mouth" - an offensive style of football common to the upper Midwest that makes Woody Hayes look like LaVell Edwards... up the gut... in your face... trench warfare

"Snuse" - smokeless tobacco

"Son of a Buck" - see "stallion," but more omery

"Spudbutt" - physical description of a football player, typically big but slow and indigenous to the upper Midwest... currently being artificially harvested in the Titan weight room

"Squirrel derby" - Murphy's offensive philosophy that carries over into special teams play... men in motion, passes from and to all backs... end arounds, flea flickers, fake punts and gadget plays still to be devised





1991 Season Preview

Transition is the operative word when it comes to previewing the 1991 Cal State Fullerton football season. The Titans are on the verge of closing the book on their vagabond days when it comes to finding a home playing site as construction nears completion on the long-awaited on-campus Sports Complex. Similar major changes are prevalent throughout the program which operates under the cloud of a stormy winter and pending conference realignments.

The constants begin with Head Coach Gene Murphy, about to begin his 12th season with the Titans, who are preparing for only their 22nd season of intercollegiate football. Murphy has two dependable offensive weapons to count on in 1,000-yard rusher Reggie Yarbrough and junior placekicker and punter Phil Nevin. But then the picture begins to get cloudy.

For openers, the coaching staff has been drastically overhauled.

Kirk Harmon returns as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach but also wears an additional title of associate head coach. Veteran Jim Chaney is back but he has relinquished his recruiting coordinator hat for the reins as offensive coordinator. Offensive


backfield coach Hue Jackson left in January for the World League of American Football and had a very successful tenure in London but returns minus the experience of spring ball. Mike Foster returns for a second season but he will oversee the outside linebackers instead of the secondary and be the recruiting coordinator. Rich Sheriff, a part-time or student assistant since hanging up his quarterback's shoulder pads, is a full-time assistant assigned to the wide receivers.

The newcomers are young men with recent Pac-10 experience. Jim Wachenheim takes over the defensive line after a stint at Arizona State. Rick Redden brings his University of Washington bowlring collection to Fullerton and will direct the secondary. The offensive line position was vacant at press time after the July move by newcomer Tom Cable to conference rival UNLV.

The player roster also reflects a lot of newcomers, and, because of academic requirements still to be accomplished during the summer, Murphy won't know exactly who's on board until Fall camp is well underway.

He does know that he will have a very inexperienced quarterback. Sophomore Terry Payne completed 58 of 97 passes for 618 yards in relief of Paul Schulte in 1990 and has one start under his belt. He was challenged in Spring drills by redshirt freshman Chad May and also in the picture are two promising prospects coming back from shoulder injuries. Junior college transfer Trendell Williams is rehabilitating his right, throwing shoulder while sophomore Mike Simmons will make his debut after healing his left, non-throwing shoulder.

Yarbrough will be backed up at the Titans' lone running back spot by letterman Danny Pasquil with squad member Kevin Koontz and West Valley JC transfer Jim Jim Grimes in reserve.

The receiving corps is in flux behind letterman Kerry Reed, the team's No. 2 receiver last year with 37 catches for 467 yards and 2 touchdowns during an injury plagued season. JC recruits Marcus Bridges, Steve Danzy and Frank Davis are expected to press holdovers Saadite Green and Anthony Pack, redshirt Pat Lynch, squad member Victor Prince and redshirt freshman Sheldon Butler. The Y-U inside spots are wide open among JC transfers Robert Bedford, Marvin Reid and Gary Stick and freshman Andrew Hill.

The relative strength of the offensive line hinges on the health of lettermen Jim DiFilippo, Shannon Illingworth and John Cotti. DiFilippo, the starting center at the end of 1990, has been plagued by a chronic shoulder problem and will have to test it under fire in the Fall. Illingworth, a starting guard, is coming back from a knee injury that ended his 1990 season in the opener. Cotti, a tackle, missed the second half of 1990 and part of spring with a knee injury. If they are solid, they will head a veteran group that features lettermen Tim Drevno and Robert Reid, redshirt David Porter, JC transfers Abe Elliott, Pooh Jenkins, Luka Vasilj and Terrance LaCount along with squad members Dave Lamm and Tim Rapp.

The defense has numerous holes to fill and, again, the status of several players is in question. The secondary will have a new look due to graduation and the candidates are numerous led by the brothers Hudson -- Leonard and Bebe -- from Mt. Sac JC. Michael Jones, Howard McCrary, Dan Seymour, Rod Smith, Terry Sullivan and Darrius Watson are the lettermen back. The inside linebacking corps is a strength headed by four veterans in Lorenzo Hailey, Teddy McMillan, Mike Gullo and Chad Lindsay, but the outside spots will be new after last year's injury siege that included among its victims letterman Stan Breland. Also coming back from an injury is starting defensive end J.C. Farrow while the front features veterans in Jagade Freeman and Jamal Jones. Help is needed from newcomers such as Daniel Garcia, Keone Simon and Jeremiah Clark.





Substance Abuse Program

"The epidemic of substance abuse engulfs us as we pick up our daily newspaper. Too often the story involves an athlete whose life has tragically ended or been ruined due to an overdose or a substance abuse-related accident. The very people we admire so much are suddenly revealed to have had a fatal weakness."

The Student Athlete Assistance Program (SAAP) was established in the spring of 1987 to benefit the health and well-being of student athletes in the intercollegiate athletics program at Cal State Fullerton. Designed from the outset to be a preventive rather than a punitive program, the SAAP has three major components.

First and foremost is EDUCATION. The obvious key to prevention, with upbeat, up-todate, honest and informative presentations, it is of utmost importance. Conscientious attempts are constantly made to keep improving the efforts and progress has been charted.

The second component is TESTING. Although somewhat controversial, a fair and sensitive random selection urine-testing program has been designed and implemented. ALL athletes are subject to random selection and/or referral for cause. Periodic testing is done throughout the year with the analysis being performed by American Clinical Laboratory in San Diego.

The final component is TREATMENT. Any athlete testing positive or self-disclosing use of any banned substance is required to participate in an appropriate treatment

process. This usually includes counseling and additional educational modules. The program is committed to assisting athletes with problems or potential problems and ensuring that the teams placed on the field or floor are healthy and competitive.

While the need to continually monitor and improve the SAAP is recognized, success has been achieved in just three years. The percentage of positives has continued to decline.

The response by the athletes has been overwhelmingly positive and supportive. It is felt that this is due, in large measure, to the sensitive and confidential manner in which the program is administered.

"We learned a lot during the first year of drug education," said Dr. T. Roger Nudd, who coordinates the educational portion of the program. "Most athletes knew the legal hazards and the pharmacology of the most common drugs, but they were often misinformed about the effect of an athlete's drug use on his/her family and friends, on teammates and ultimately on society. As a result, the 1991-92 program will focus on those areas."

The program is administered with the complete cooperation and involvement of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. The SAAP coordinator is Paul K. Miller, who also is Director of Disabled Student Services. Dr. Nudd serves as the university Substance Abuse Education Officer and frequently is called upon to speak to off-campus groups on this subject.

1990 in Review

Individual accomplishments, both personal and statistical, became the focus of the Titan football team in 1990 as it suffered through the worst year in the program's history.

A team lacking depth and experience to begin with was stung by injuries, not so numerous or serious as they were concentrated -- on returning starters, the secondary early in the season and the defensive line late in the year. Add to that malady a foreboding schedule calling for nine road games including five in a row and more than 20,000 air miles, and you have the recipe for failure in the won-loss column.

Offensively, despite only two returning starters, the Titans continued to rull up yardage with their one or no-back offensive sets. They averaged 247 yards per game in the air and 101 on the ground., Untimely turnovers kept the scoring average down to 18.6 points.

Defensively, the Titans had trouble stopping anybody. Opponents averaged more than 500 yards per game with 60 per cent of that coming in the air. Special teams also were below par as opponnts had better averages in almost every categroy except punting, where Phil Nevin improved to 40.1 yards per attempt.

The Titans won only their opener, overcoming a stubborn Div. II Sonoma State team, but began the injury siege losing running back Deon Thomas and guard Shannon Illingworth for the season and wide receiver Kerry Reed and defensive back Mike Jones for a month.

Back-to-back-to-back games east of the Mississippi produced deteriorating results. The Titans were overwhelmed by national power Auburn but threw a scare into the Tigers' fans by rallying to within 31-17 in the third quarter. Fullerton led at the half at Mississippi State, 13-6, but couldn't score in the second half behind back-up quarterback Terry Payne. The travel apparently caught up to the Titans in Ohio where they saw a 10-0 lead disappear in a flurry of missed tackles in a 48-17 loss to Akron.

Fullerton really came close to winning only once, losing at Long Beach State on a lastsecond field goal after a fluke fumble in the closing minutes.

Fullerton opened a season at home for the first time since 1982 and the Titans overcame a stubborn Sonoma State team but paid a high price in injuries.

The Div. II Cossacks never led and finished with a Titan defensive record minus 21 yards rushing, but pulled to a 17-17 tie in the third quarter when James Solley intercepted a Paul Schulte pass and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown. The Cossacks, who had trailed 17-3 in the second quarter, had the momentum after forcing a Fullerton punt and taking over on the Titans' 49-yard line. But a fumbled exchange and a dropped pass forced a punt. Reggie Yarbrough, forced into fulltime duty when Deon Thomas suffered a careerending knee injury in the second quarter, put the Titans ahead to stay with an 80-yard touchdown run.

Fullerton took advantage of a short Sonoma punt and Nuygen Pendleton's 14-yard return to launch a 20yard TD drive later in the quarter. Schulte passed to J.J. Celestine from 7 yards out for a 31-17 lead.

The Cossacks suffered Mike Gullo's punt block and a missed field goal, but still got back into the game when Pendleton fumbled a punt. John Spear passed to Deangelo Mitchell for a touchdown to make it 31-24 before the Titans negated it with a 3-play scoring drive capped by Schulte's scoring pass to Richard Harrison.

Fullerton played the nation's No. 2 or 3 ranked team in front of 77,500 partial Southerners and came away with what was considered a moral victory when the Titans won the second half, 14-7.

It took until the third quarter of their third game against a Southeastern Conference foe for the Titans to score a touchdown and they celebrated by scoring another less than three minutes later on an "immaculate reception" type play to make things uncomfortable for the Tigers and their fans at 31-17 with the fourth quarter still to play. Twice in the next few minutes the Tigers fumbled the ball only to recover it themselves. Meanwhile, Greg West, subbing for injured Nuygen Pendleton, fumbled on a punt return to set up the final Aubum touchdown.

The first Fullerton touchdown came on a routine "out" pattern in the comer of the end zone to J.J. Celestine to cap a 49-yard, 5-play following a Bob Baiz fumble recovery.

After the Tigers ran three plays and punted, the Titans struck on third down when Schulte's pass intended for Celestine bounced off some hands and finally Celestine's leg. The ball caromed high into the air and Reggie Yarbrough grabbed it practically in full stride and outran the secondary to the end zone to complete a 66-yard scoring play that stunned the Tiger faithful.

Fullerton flirted with more than just a moral victory in its second game in as many weeks at a Southeastem Conference site. The Titans grabbed their first lead ever over an SEC foe and held it until midway through the third quarter when the host Bulldogs erupted for two touchdowns in a span of 94 seconds.

The Titans started strong as a 43-yard pass from Paul Schulte to J.J. Celestine carried to the MSU 13. But Reggie Yarbrough fumbled at the 18 and the Bulldogs marched to a field goal.

Another 43-yard pass play, this time to Richard Harrison, got the Titans moving again and they cashed it in with Yarbrough capping a 56-yard drive. The second quarter saw Schulte go out with a shoulder injury but Terry Payne guided the Titans to a pair of field goals, the last a 47-yarder to beat the halftime gun.

MSU had to punt on its first possession of the second half and the Titans marched to the MSU 35-yard line before punting, too. From then on, it was all MSU. The Bulldogs drove 80 yards for a touchdown but trailed, 13-12, when the PAT kick was wide. Fullerton ran three plays and punted and Tony James returned it 51 yards for a touchdown, the first of its kind against Fullerton since 1982.

Payne hooked up with Harrison for a 34-yard pass play on first down but he fumbled and the Bulldogs marched 66 yards for a clinching touchdown.

One of the most dramatic momentum swings in Cal State Fullerton history doomed the Titans to a loss at Akron that was surprisingly lopsided after the relatively strong outings at Auburn and Mississippi State.

Quarterback Paul Schulte was headed for the record books after completing 7 of his first 10 passes for 183 yards still in a first quarter the Titans were leading, 10-0. But Phil Nevin missed a 32-yard field goal that looked good to everyone but the officials and the momentum swung. The Zips, who had punted on their first three possessions, gained 28 and 31 yards on their first two runs toward a field goal. On the ensuing kickoff, J.J. Celestine fumbled the ball away and Akron converted the miscue into a game-tying touchdown one play later.

Fullerton ran three plays only to have Nevin's punt blocked. Akron recovered on the Titans' 11-yard line and three plays later the Zips led, 17-10, never to look back.

Any attempt at a rally was thwarted immediately after intermission when the Zips converted one of a record-equalling five Schulte interceptions and a 28-yard Nevin punt into two quick touchdown drives for a 34-10 lead that was threatened only briefly by Reggie Yarbrough's 63-yard scoring dash on a draw play.

Fullerton made its seemingly annual visit to Fresno for the opener of the Big West Conference only to commit untimely fumbles to thwart a possilbe upset of the host Bulldogs.

The Titans took the opening kickoff and marched quickly to the Fresno State 10-yard line where center Bill Huston and quarterback Paul Schulte misconnected on the snap with the Bulldogs recovering at their 12-vard line. It was the first of three lost fumbles by Schulte with the others occurring at midfield and the Fresno State 12. The Titans also missed a handoff inside the Fresno State five and had to settle for a Phil Nevin field goal and the game ended with Danny Pasquil fumbling in the Bulldog end zone after catching a 24-yard pass from reserve Terry Payne.

Offensively, the Bulldogs balanced the passing of Mark Barsotti with the running tandem of Aaron Craver and Lorenzo Neal. They drove 88 yards in 10 plays on their first possession for a touchdown and marched from their 7 to the Fullerton 7 to set up a field goal that gave them a 10-0 lead going into the second quarter. After Nevin's field goal made it 10-3, Fresno State retaliated with an 8-play, 75-yard TD drive aided by two major Fullerton penalties.

Fresno State iced the outcome with an 8-play, 46yard TD drive following Schulte's midfield fumble late in the second quarter. The game was Gene Murphy's ninth in Bulldog Stadium since 1981 counting the 1983 California Bowl.

Fullerton's 5-game road trip came to a halt in the Sam Boyd Silver Bowl, where the Titans couldn't handle punt formation, another snap near the opponents' goal line nor Rebel newcomer Hunkie Cooper.

The game swung in the first quarter after Fullerton had taken a 3-0 lead on Phil Nevin's 54-yard field goal, which tied for the second longest in school history. The Rebels, forced to punt on their first possession, moved 78 yards in five plays to take the lead for good at 7-3. They got the ball back on the Fullerton 19-yard line after Nevin was sacked in punt formation, trying to throw when the other 10 men on the unit had heard the planned fake called off at the line of scrimmage. Cooper, who also would play running back and wide receiver, went 18 yards on a keeper for the touchdown.

Fullerton ran three plays and tried to punt again, but Nevin couldn't handle a low snap and was tackled on the Fullerton 19-yard line again. UNLV settled for a field goal this time and led, 17-3. A 15-play, 80-yard scoring drive on the next possession gave UNLV a 23-3 edge.

Fullerton was on the verge of making a game of it again in the second half. A 75-yard scoring drive on the Titans' second possession of the half cut the deficit to 23-10 and the Titans appeared on their way to pulling within one score early in the fourth quarter when they drove to the Rebels' 4-yard line. But again Schulte fumbled the snap and UNLV recovered. The Rebels would score again to easily snap a 3-game losing streak to the Titans.

A record aerial bombardment by Troy Kopp sent Fullerton to its sixth consecutive loss despite its return to Santa Ana Stadium, where the Titans had won 7 games in a row and 21 of 26 in the Gene Murphy era.

Kopp set several Big West Conference and school records on his way to a record-breaking season for the Tigers. Paul Schulte countered with the best day of his career to date but his 296 yards and 3 touchdowns paled in comparison to Kopp's number of 515 yards and 7 TDs. Pacific's 747 total yards and 540 passing yards both were the most ever against a Fullerton team.

The wide open affair was up for grabs early in the third quarter after Fullerton drew to within 33-31 on J.J. Celestine's third TD reception, which tied the CSF single-game record. Howard McCrary's interception at the UOP 19-yard line set up the score. But Kopp drove the Tigers to touchdowns on their next two possessions to open the gap. It was back on the road for the Titans and their longest trip of the nine -- to Honolulu, where they had won only once in nine previous trips. Any thoughts of an upset win in 1990 were quickly dashed when the Rainbow Warriors scored on their fourth offensive play as quarterback Garrett Gabriel scampered 51 yards into the end zone. Before the quarter was over, Hawaii had two more TDs as the Titans threw two pass interceptions to help set up scoring drives of 72 and 41 yards.

A switch in quarterbacks by Hawaii seemed to give Fullerton momentum after Walter Santiago was unable to move the Warriors as Gabriel had. A 12-play, 58-yard drive capped by a TD pass from Paul Schulte to Kerry Reed got the Titans on the scoreboard and a short punt and pass to J.J. Celestine had them poised to pull closer from the UH 38-yard line. But Schulte was sacked on consecutive plays and the Titans had to punt. Jeff Sydner returned the kick 31 yards to set up a 6-play, 58-yard TD drive by the Warriors as Gabriel returned to hit 3 of 5 passes for 54 of those yards.

Hawaii, which would overcome five lost fumbles, erased any doubts about the outcome when its third quarterback, freshman Michael Carter, ran 45 yards on the first play of the half to set up a 42-yard field goal.

The best day of Paul Schulte's career was marred when he furnbled the ball away at the Fullerton 44-yard line with 2:14 to play and the Titans trying to ice a 35-34 advantage. Schulte's passing total of 343 yards was the second best in Titan history.

Fullerton set the tone with a 16-play, 88-yard TD drive to open the game. They followed with drives of 76 yards and 73 yards but Long Beach stayed close with big plays. Gerald Woodyard turned a short pass into a 64-yard score late in the half and Jeff Exum hauled in Freddie Leslie's 73-yard bomb to pull Long Beach within a point on its first second-half possession. The Titans pulled out to an 8-point advantage and were poised for more when Phil Nevin tried a 49-yard field goal. But the kick was blocked and the 49ers scored on the next play to make it 28-27. They got a TD to lead, 34-28, but the Titans regained the advantage 75 seconds later. Nevin missed a 32-yard field goal midway through the fourth quarter that allowed the 49ers to go for a field goal on their final drive. It took seven plays and included a 49er holding penalty, a fumble by Studer recovered by a teammate and a personal foul call on the Titans that moved the ball from the 20 to the 10-yard line to make the game winner easier for Sean Cheevers.

Fullerton proved no match for the eventual conference champions in San Jose. The Spartans ran up more than 500 passing yards on their way to a total offense figure of 670 yards.

There was never any doubt as to the outcome. The Spartans drove to a pair of touchdowns on their first two possessions as quarterback Ralph Martini completed his first 8 pass attempts. In between, Paul Schulte went 0 for 3 for the Titans and Phil Nevin punted. A fumble recovery by Darrell Bruce and a pass interception by Terry Tramble foiled two San Jose State advances but the Titans' offense could not take advantage. By halftime, Martini had completed 23 of 30 attempts for 340 yards and the Titans could muster only 97 yards of total offense.

Schulte was knocked out of the game late in the second quarter after a 33-yard completion to J.J. Celestine. Terry Payne relieved as he had done at Mississippi State. His first pass was completed but then he was sacked and his second pass attempt was intercepted, setting up San Jose's hurry-up offense for Sheldon Canley's third TD run of the game and a 37-0 halftime lead.

Payne had more success in the second half. He drove the Titans to their only score with his hurdling 10-yard run down to the Spartans' 2-yard line setting up Reggie Yarbrough's touchdown run with 6:15 to play.

Utah State spoiled Fullerton's homecoming with a balanced showing of the Aggies' improved team. Roger Grant ran the ball, Ron Lopez passed it, Rod Moore did both and the defense controlled the Titan attack, which was under the direction of redshirt freshman Terry Payne.

Payne played with poise from the beginning in his first start, engineering a 13-play, 94-yard drive that gave Fullerton an early 7-0 lead. When Utah State countered with a ground-oriented drive and Grant touchdown run, Payne had the Titans marching again as the first quarter quickly expired. But so did the Titans' hopes for an upset when James Mullins was stopped on both third and fourth down inside the one-yard line. The Aggies made it a 14-point turnaround two plays later when Lopez hit flanker Rod Moore with the second longest touchdown pass in Utah State history.

Fullerton ran three plays and punted on its next two possessions and the Aggies responded with 67 and 46yard scoring drives for a 28-7 lead. The Titans nibbled into it with Phil Nevin 43-yard field goal but the Aggies would not be denied in winning for the first time in four tries at Santa Ana Stadium. In fact, the Aggies scored on every possession except their last one of each half as the clock expired.

Fullerton found solace in the first career touchns for seniors Sean Beasley and Gary Lendennie.

The worst season of Cal State Fullerton football ended ignominously in Las Cruces as the Aggies snapped numerous streaks of futility with their victory. Most notably, they ended the nation's longest losing streak at 27 games, leaving that dubious distinction for Fullerton at 11 in a row. It was only the Aggies' second Big West Conference victory, both coming at home vs. Fullerton. The goalposts at both ends of the stadium came down as excited fans celebrated a 24-point fourth quarter explosion and the first home win since 1987.

Quarterback David Chisum, a product of Sunny Hills High and Fullerton College, looked like Ralph Martini of San Jose State, completing all 10 of his first quarter passes as the Aggies marched 87 and 67 yards to touchdowns on their first two possessions.

Meanwhile, Fullerton twice ran three plays and punted before gaining a first down late in the quarter, which ended with NMSU holding a lead in total yardage of 196-31. The Titans tried to make a game of it when Reggie Yarbrough, who later in the game would become the fifth Titan in history to surpass the 1,000yard rushing mark, scored to cut the deficit to 19-9. Paul Schulte's pass attempt for the 2-point conversion was broken up and that was Fullerton's last gasp. The Aggies' offense scored twice before linebacker Brian Carter picked off Schulte and went 72 yards for a touchdown that cemented the demise of New Mexico State's losing ways and prolonged those of the Titans.

Titans in the Pro Ranks

The growth and development of the Fullerton football program can be seen quite graphically in the output of players into the professional ranks in the recent seasons. Despite being shut out in 1991, the Titans have typically had multiple selections in the annual NFL draft with 16 players chosen in the past seven years after a total of only three Titans were picked in the previous 14 years.

In the 1990 draft, two Titans became Falcons in consecutive rounds as offensive tackle Reggie Redding and running back Mike Pringle went to Atlanta in rounds five and six, respectively.

Three physically unique members of the defensive wall were tabbed remarkably close together in the draft of Apr. 24, 1989. Alex Stewart, a transfer from Fresno CC and USC who had limited playing experience but was built like the model for a body-building trophy, went on the eighth round to Minnesota. On the ninth round went A. J. Jenkins, a down lineman with linebacker quickness, to Pittsburgh, and Jerry Leggett, a linebacker the size of a tackle, to New Orleans.

The 1988 draft ranked among the highest ever for Titans as tight end Jim Thornton was tabbed by the Chicago Bears on the fourth round and wide receiver Todd White went to the Philadelphia Eagles on round No. 7. Only second-round picks Daren Gilbert (New Orleans, 1985) and Mark Collins (NY Giants, 1986) rank higher than Thornton, who came to Fullerton as a quarterback.

The zenith was reached in 1986 when four Titans were chosen in the first eight rounds. Collins went to the Giants on the second round; wide receivers James Pruitt (Miami) and Corn Redick (Philadelphia) on the fourth and seventh rounds, respectively; and offensive tackle Hank Goebel to the Rams on the eighth round.

Actually, the list would have been more impressive had fullback Todd Gerhart and linebacker John Nevens not signed USFL contracts prior to the NFL draft.

Titans have done more than just sign contracts and make rosters. Both Bobby Kemp and Collins hit the jackpot early, playing in the Super Bowl as rookies. Kemp started for the Bengals in a losing cause against

San Francisco in 1982 and Collins saw considerable action in a winning effort against the Broncos in January, 1987. The former PCAA Defensive Player of the Year also gained a berth on the NFL All-Rookie team and has gone on to earn All-Pro consideration and, more importantly, a second Super Bowl Championship ring. Thornton became a starter as a rookie and began cashing in on endorsements in Chicago with extensive exposure in the Sears Big and Tall Man's Spring Catalog.

Lucious Smith played defensive back in the NFL for several seasons with Buffalo, San Diego and the Rams and Vince Gamache was the regular punter in 1986 for the Seattle Seahawks. The Titans also have made a good showing in the Canadian Football League led by recent graduates Damon Allen (Edmonton and Ottawa QB), Greg Gary (Hamilton LB) and Eric Emery (British Columbia LB); the WFL and USFL; NFL strike squads and Arena Football, where Wade Lockett was one of the top players for the Los Angeles Cobras and Quinton Knight was a regular for the New York Knights.

Among the administrative ranks, mention must be made of Don Andersen, the first "sports publicist" at Cal State Fullerton. After also helping to promote the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History" as a student, he went on to become the SID at USC, public relations director for the World Football League and vice president of the Seattle Seahawks. He currently is executive director of the Orange County Sports Association, which stages the Pigskin Classic and the Freedom Bowl. Bob Bowser, SID in 1970, went on to work for the Washington Redskins and Pat Mooney, a former assistant athletics director, was the Director of Advertising for the Great Western Forum in Inglewood.

Radio Broadcasts

Steve O'Hara was appointed Director of Broadcasting and Sales for the Cal State Fullerton athletics department on July 18 and begins his duties on Aug. 1. He will produce, engineer and broadcast all Titan home and road football and men's basketball games as well as a supplemental package of selected baseball and women's basketball games.

O'Hara, 38, had been the play-by-play voice of Weber State's Wildcats in Ogden, Utah for the past three years. He also hosted a nightly sports talk show and hosted the "Weber State Coaches Show" on KOOG television in Salt Lake City. Prior to his stint at Weber State, O'Hara worked two years for Eastern Washington University on KEWU. He also covered regional high school and junior college events for three years on KMWX in Yakima, Washington, and also did Northwest League minor league baseball.



O'Hara replaces John Rebenstorf, who left this summer after a decade with the Titans to become the play-by-play voice of UCLA football and men's basketball on KMPC.

"We were fortunate to attract a person of Steve's caliber for this position," said new Titan athletic director Bill Shumard. "His broadcast experience coupled with his ability to sell has prepared him to do several key things for our department. With the impending dedication of our new on-campus playing facilities, marketing and sponsorship opportunities have never been greater for Cal State Fullerton. With the addition of Steve to our team, we can now broaden our sales efforts to take advantage of these opportunities."

Fullerton's athletic events are heard on KMNY (1600 AM). This is the third year of a five-year contract between the athletic department and the station, located at 2300 S. Mills Avenue in Pomona, 91766. The general manager is Buz Schwartz at (714) 627-1600.

TITAN PETE'S BULK HOUSE

A monument to the success of Gene Murphy's coaching and entrepreneurial skills rests a few yards to the north of the Football House -- "Titan Pete's Bulk House."

Named after former Booster Club president Ray Peterson, the "bulk house" is Fullerton's eight-year-old weight-training facility. Built by donated labor and materials and specially designated monetary gifts, the "bulk house" is the symbol of the "growing" Fullerton football program.

Unable to consistently recruit the polished, large linemen necessary to compete on the Division I-A level, Fullerton builds its own -- by recruiting lanky high school seniors with large frames and the desire and dedication to spend countless hours in the "bulk house" to build themselves into Big West championship caliber physical specimens.

Three prime examples of this process are former offensive tackles Daren Gilbert and Hank Goebel and tight end Jim Thornton. Gilbert and Goebel were high school basketball players in the 225-pound range. They ended their Titan careers in the 275-pound range and as NFL draft picks -- Gilbert on the second round to New Orleans in 1985 and Goebel to the Los Angeles Rams on the eighth round in 1986.

Thornton came to Fullerton in 1983 as a 200-pound quarterback. Two years later he was converted to tight end and by 1988 he was a 250-pounder playing in the Hula Bowl and later was a fourth-round draft pick by the Chicago Bears.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Willie Nelson's hit recording "On the Road Again" in the early 1980s has become the Titan football theme song while awaiting the construction of an on-campus stadium. Coach Gene Murphy has taken his team to most of the airports in the western United States and many in the east as well as his teams have played in 16 states outside of California and set foot in airports in another six (Texas, Tennessee, Georgia, Pennsylvania, Washington, Missouri) getting to some of them.

In his 11 seasons, Murphy is 28-14 at a combination of four home sites (5-6 Titan Field; 1-0 Anaheim; 1-1 Glover; 21-7 Santa Ana), 27-56-1 on the road and 0-1 on a neutral site (California Bowl in 1983).

The construction of a Marriott Hotel on University property is the first concrete (pun intended) step towards a long-awaited on-campus stadium that will permit the scheduling of more home games beginning in 1992. Mississippi State, Colorado State, Temple and UTEP are some of the future visitors as well as Army in the next century.

The ratio of road to home games was much worse in Fullerton's first five years of Division I-A play, when the Titans played only 17 home games including just two each in 1978 and 1979. The all-time breakdowns:
