Trash Day Changing in A Few Short Weeks

November 1 is approaching fast. On that date, we will not use the in-ground vaults any longer for trash. Most of us will store the new trash bins in the garage. I know some people dread the idea, but I lived for ten years in a place where I had to keep both bins, recycle and trash, in the garage. In the summer, my garage regularly baked, reaching indoor temperatures of 90° to 100° or more. The suggestions that are listed below result from that ten-year experi-

ence; some of them are from a little research on the Internet.

- I used high-quality, double-walled, burst-resistant trash bags with odor control built in. There are many brands that offer these options, and they really help with odors.
- If you do not want to use the brown bins in the Recreation Center east parking lot for food waste, use a resealable container and keep it in the freezer. Freezer bags can serve the same purpose. Set a reminder to take the frozen food waste to the trash container

• Thoroughly rinse bottles, jars and cans before putting them into

the kitchen recycle bin. I lined the recycle with odor-control bags too.

ILV Celebrates 50 Years of Life in the Village

Do You Remember When... or Wish You Did?

In 1979, LVA's Board of Directors approved a new fiscal plan which changed the Village monthly assessments. The 1979-80 plan increased the monthly assessments on fourteen models, reduced the monthly assessment on two models, with no change on nine models. The unlucky fourteen saw the assessments increase by \$.50 - that's right, fifty cents. The two reductions (Del Mar and El Dorado I) were also \$.50 ...less.

Here are some examples of the 'new' monthly assessments for 1979-1980: The Coronado 2 car garage models went from \$79.50 to \$80, the Balboa model increased to \$68.50 from \$68 and the La Jolla jumped to \$97 from \$96.50.

Remembering Village Fun and Great Golf

It didn't take long for Edith and Reg Dowsing to decide where to retire. In 1975, after living in Toronto and Torrance, Reg's career with Mattel Toy Co. and raising three children, the couple took one look (literally) at a house in Village 11 and said, "This is ours." And it was - for the next 42 years. They loved the dances, potluck dinners, the Stoners and, especially for Edith, the golf course where she was the Champion for years. In fact, the annual award given by LV's Women's Golf Association is the Edith Dowsing Trophy. Check it out; it's displayed in the Rec Center Atrium.

Edith remained active on the golf course and in Village activities for more than a decade after Reg died in 1999. She celebrated

her 100th birthday in 2016 at a gala party with family and friends in the Garden Room. She passed away in 2017. Her son John and his wife Martha Harris live in the Village, keeping that Dowsing tradition secure.

Sharon Green

"We used to glean vegetables from what was left in the gardens and share them weekly with Villagers and, sometimes, with people outside the Gate, too," recalls Sharon Green, as she describes what she recalls as the "warm and caring" atmosphere of Leisure Village that she has known since 1980. That was the year that she and her husband Al bought their home in Village 41 although strictly speaking, they bought a plan, not a house. "I used to stand across the street from the site and watch

Like so many Village Pioneers, Al and Sharon didn't know about Leisure Village until a friend suggested they look at it because Al was about to retire from Boeing. As soon as their house was completed, the Greens jumped in with

VILLAGE TREES – The 44 trees that were identified as being a threat to residences have been removed. We had 3 inches of rain in a 12 hour period during the hurricane and, luckily, the predicted high winds did not occur. We could have experienced more tree problems, but thanks to the pro-active actions on the part of the board, we did not.

PAINT PROJECT – The original whole house stucco and trim paint

project is underway in Villages 6, 8 and 17.

LV Website – Starting with the August Issue, the Village Voice is now available on-line on the secure log-on portion of the web site. Another reason to sign-up on the secure web site. There is an update to the Residential Directory in process. The Communications Committee continues to work on new features for the secure portion of the LV website.

ROOFING – The roofing contract from last fiscal year is now complete. A new roofing contract is

going out for a competitive bid.

STREETS – The pavement rehabilitation project was approved by the Board. The contract is for the resurfacing of Villages 8, 11, and 14, and for Leisure Village Drive from Village 40 to Santa Rosa Road (East Gate).

CONCRETE – The Village maintains the concrete in the common areas, driveways, sidewalks, gutters, etc. The Village staff is in the process of inspecting the concrete areas within the Village in preparation for a contract bidding cycle.

WATER COMMITTEE – At the next Water Committee meeting on Monday, September 11th at 3PM Calleguas Water District will present a summary of their long term plans – Visitors are welcome.

The Board has determined that legacy plant watering systems will be required to use non-potable irrigation water. The Village will provide the service to convert.

TRASH BARREL IMPLEMENTATION

- Our agreement with Harrision is that the Village will stop using the in-ground vaults and convert to bins for our garbage waste by November 1st. The distribution of bins will start the week of October 6th. The bin size will be the size the resident selected, if no selection was made the residence will receive the smaller, 32-gallon bin. Once a residence has been provided with a garbage bin, the inground vaults will be screwed shut to prevent usage. The Village is preparing a communications campaign to inform residents of the roll-out plan.

Our Constitution-A Reason to Celebrate

In 1955, the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution petitioned Congress with a resolution to set aside September 17-23 to be dedicated for the observance of Constitution Week. The annual celebration was established when signed into law by President Dwight D. Eisenhower on August 2, 1956. The NSDAR is committed to encouraging study and educating the public about the Constitution and the men who framed it.

Your Conejo Valley chapter has been working to provide the community with visual reminders of the Constitution itself. We have bulletin board displays in the Thousand Oaks, Newbury Park and Camarillo libraries.

There are free Constitution Week bookmarks in our Leisure Village library. The mayors of Thousand Oaks and Camarillo have issued proclamations, official public announcements, declaring September 17-23, 2023 as Constitution Week.

Our Constitution is one document made up of four pages; 4,400 words; 7 Articles (outlining powers); 27 Amendments (first 10 are the Bill of Rights); and 39 signatures. You might have heard the phrase, "That's unconstitutional" or "That's my constitutional right!" Many times Americans believe that sayings and phrases are in our Constitution, but they really aren't. Use Constitution Week of September 17-23 to resolve to be better informed and responsible citizens. Read the Constitution!

both feet: golf, square dancing, bridge and mahjong ("Sometimes I'd win; sometimes I wouldn't," she laughs.) "We were very active," Sharon says smiling. "We had so many friends."

Sharon is 96 years old, still living in that house she watched being built. Life is quieter now since Al passed away. She and her daughters have traveled to Iceland, Scandinavia and Russia. But mostly she likes being home became - in that house that was built for her – and in the Village that she still describes as "beautiful, peaceful, and safe."

"I was a 22-year-old lifeguard," Shelly Runge laughs as she describes the first job she had in Leisure Village. Thirty-two years later, Shelly is Facilities Manager for the entire Recreation Area (including that pool). "It doesn't seem that long," she says. "I still look forward to coming to work."

In those first years, she was more enforcer than lifeguard. "I was busy reminding people about the rules,

The Bee's Knees About Your Knees

over 55 years old will experience knee pain sometime in their lifetime. Some common causes of knee issues include trauma, arthritis (most commonly osteoarthritis), malalignment of the kneecap (patellofemoral syndrome), sprained ligaments, strained tendons and soft tissue, cartilage tears and tendonitis. The good news is some lifestyle changes, better shoes and appropriate exercises can make a difference and decrease knee pain and increase function. Sometimes Physical Therapy is indicated to provide education and exercises as well as some hands-on treatments to hasten the healing process. Kinesiotaping by a physical therapist can also help knee pain and swelling in many individuals.

The knee joint is not a simple hinge joint but a complex joint that

Approximately 25% of people bends and straightens, along with some gliding motions, and kneecap (patella) movement in a soft tissue groove. This joint is most affected if walking in poor footwear and if we weigh more. In fact, for every 10 pounds of weight that is lost, approximately 50 pounds of loading is taken off our knee joints as we walk and bear weight.

If you experience knee pain, try using cold/ice first for 15-20 minutes while elevating your leg in a supported and comfortable position. If the knee pain tends to move around to different places and bothers you when you turn over in your sleep, you may have malalignment of the patella (which would need to be diagnosed by your physical therapist or physician). Usually going down stairs and curbs increases knee pain more than going up stairs. If your knee pain flares, avoid any activity or exercise that makes it worse, but don't rest too long as the knee needs to move and walk. If knee pain continues and doesn't improve, contact your physician for diagnosis and guidance. If your knee feels better wearing a knee sleeve (especially for walking and weight bearing activities), purchase one with an open knee and keep the patella in the knee opening for best fit and function.

Some good general exercises for our knees include walking in the pool, walking with high end running shoes on land, and mini wall squats. Don't do any exercise that increases your knee pain or modify the exercise you are doing so it is tolerable. When you walk and turn around, lift your feet, and don't pivot on your feet as this causes torsion/twisting on the knee and increases risk of falling. When you go to our wonderful for the use of this information.

gym in Leisure Village, you can do the pulley weight machines for your hips, leg press and bending your knee with light resistance in the comfort zone if tolerated. If you go to other gyms with weight machines, don't go on the knee extension machine with weights because it can stress your patella.

If we take care of our knees they should last us many years, but some of us might need a knee replacement surgery to fix knee arthritis, so we can function for many years more. If you think you have end stage arthritis, contact an orthopedic surgeon for a consult.

I wasn't even sure what a lapidary room was," she said. "I just knew it was a rock room and I was going to go play in there."

They took classes to learn how to use the equipment, a requirement for access to the room. Since then most of the equipment has been upgraded, she said. There are

There are products specifically designed to reduce odor in trash cans. Most stick to the wall or on the underside of the lid.

- Using one or all of the above listed items, insects were not a problem. However, I kept bug spray handy. I used one that created a perimeter and repelled pests. There are varieties of bug spray that are pet and child friendly.
- I kept some sort of disinfectant spray, like Lysol, handy for those unexpected odors. I sprayed it in the bin, not in the air.
- Keeping the bins clean is important. There are businesses that will do that for you on a call-bycall or scheduled basis. A quick search on the Internet turned up three in our area.

The Poop Problem

Over those ten years I had a big dog most of the time. Poop in the yard and poop from walks had to be dealt with. So ...

• The EPA says that the most

environmentally friendly way to deal with dog poop is to flush it down the toilet (without a baggy, of course).

- A dedicated kitchen-size trash can kept in the garage with a tightfitting lid and odor-control bags can help with poop. I tied my dogs' poop in small plastic baggies. Most people here in LV do the same. The little baggies help contain odors too, especially when inside a larger, odor-control bag and receptacle. Again, I transferred the contents to the trash bin at the curb on pick-up day. Vented dog-poop receptacles with air filters are out there.
- Another option that I found on the Internet is a diaper pail. Diaper pails are designed to hold waste without stinking up the house. In the piece I read, this was highly recommended for apartment dwellers. Like frozen food waste, one must remember to take it out to the curb and put it in the trash bin on collection day.
- Sprinkling baking soda or a catlitter-deodorizing product into the can or pail will help absorb odors

before they come out. Dog poop is acidic. Baking soda is an alkaline compound that can help neutralize the smell.

Most of this was necessary only in summer. Most of the year there was no odor. Is any of this perfect? Probably not. What in life is perfect? But, with a little effort, you do not have to have a stinky garage just because the trash bin is in it. And I can testify to that with ten years' experience.

sophisticated saws and polishing wheels and safety shields and goggles.

When they came in, they discovered mounds of rocks the men in the facility had cut and polished.

"The guys would put them in settings, but I wanted to do an odd shape and there were no settings for those," Howarth said. Someone told her about a man who taught wire wrapping so they contacted him and he agreed to teach them.

"When he was finished he said, 'that's all I can teach you, you guys have gone way beyond me," Howarth said. She got books, started copying things and improvising. She started teaching and her students included Hillesheim and Fil Barton, whose idea it was to form a club they called The Stoners.

Black has only been coming for six months but admitted she really found a passion for it. She was eager to learn wire wrapping but was told to wait for Howarth, who was on vacation, to return. But her vacation kept extending.

"Being a bit on the impatient side, I said I can't wait for Aleta," Black said. "My collection of rocks was starting to get a little big." So she went online and watched some you-tube videos. "I started what I thought was simple and I would watch it over and over," she said. "Then Aleta came back and I asked her for advice."

"I said you're better than I am already — there's nothing I can teach you," Howarth said. Now Black is teaching classes herself.

"I kind of have the bug so bad I have a little work table next to the bed," Black said. 'My husband knows if I turn to the side, I'm working on something."

They use many different types of wire from sterling silver to galvanized aluminum which is great to work with, they said. Also, most people who have allergies to metal can wear aluminum, Howarth said.

They usually start with three wires, wrapping around the front, back and sides of the stone, the wires coming together at the tip forming a bail for the necklace to go through, they explained. The left-over wires can be bent and curved into shapes to form the design.

Black showed a piece where she had woven the wire like thread to go around the edges.

"We are all a little different in design and wire wrapping," Hillesheim said. They go through phases in the different stones they like, including jasper, travertine, serpentine, calcite, aventurine, fluorite and quartzite. Sometimes they have no idea what it is except that it's beautiful, they said.

Hillesheim said she likes obsidian. "You can polish it until you can see your face in it," she said. She wants to try more pieces with petrified wood and was wearing a necklace she made from pieces of lapis lazuli.

"If something catches my eye, and I get an idea, that's what I do. If I think I can do it, I try it," she said. When she got tired of jewelry, she started making mixed media paintings using shapes of rock.

"For me the most enjoyable thing is finding the most interesting pieces people have left behind and what I can make out of it." Black said.

And designs don't always work out as planned.


"Aleta taught me a very good lesson," Black said. "She said to me, 'remember, people don't know what you meant to make.' That kind of freed me a bit."

"I am not an artist," Howarth said. "I am more a copy and tweaker, sort of a precisionist — which is one of the nicest things about this, you do not have to be an artist. If you are an artist you'll get very creative and do different things like she does, or she does," she said, indicating the other two. "But you don't have to be an artist to do this."

Classes are taught in the lapidary room on Tuesday and Friday afternoons and Thursday evenings. For information, contact Black at 949-287-1206.

THE NATURAL VILLAGE

What's Up Rabbit?

The question has been asked around the Village; "What happened to all the rabbits?" It is not covid, but rabbits are suffering from their own deadly disease this year.

Rabbits and hares are small mammals in the family Leporidae. Although once considered rodents, rabbits have been found to have some traits rodents lack, like two extra incisor teeth. When the Spanish explorers arrived here in the 1700's, there were so many wild rabbits, (conejo in spanish), they used the name for the place. Easy to hunt, they were a mainstay of nutrition for Native Americans. There used to be lots of rabbits in the Village, munching happily on the golf course; but I have not seen any this year. The coyotes must be very hungry.

North America's rabbits are at risk. The problem is Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease, RHD, a highly contagious and fatal disease that is caused by a couple of viruses. RHD Virus Serotype 1 affects domestic rabbits and wild European rabbits. RHD Virus Serotype 2 affects other species of rabbits, including wild jackrabbits and hares and wild American cottontails.

The disease originated a decade ago in European rabbits, which comprise most domestic rabbits sold in the U.S. RHD is endemic in Europe, Australia and parts of Asia and Africa. Considered a foreign animal disease, cases caused by RHDV1 occurred in the United States in 2001 and Canada in 2011. A newer strain, RHDV2, emerged in France in 2010 and has since spread across Europe and Australia. It arrived in Canada in 2018, leading to cases in domestic rabbits in Ohio and Washington. In 2020, a widespread outbreak of a genetically

different strain of RHDV2 emerged in wild and domestic rabbits in the southwestern U.S. In February 2023, it was detected in domestic rabbits in Sacramento County and in wild jackrabbits in Santa Clara County. The new variant, RHDV2 is a particularly severe disease with a mortality rate of 90%+ and it has all but wiped out wild rabbit populations across Europe in the last few years. Climatic variables like changing temperature and precipitation are not likely factors. RHD is not contagious to humans, dogs or cats

As the population of rabbits drops, it can be devastating to other

wildlife. Wild rabbits are part of our wildlife food chain and predators like coyotes and mountain lions depend on them for food. Rabbits tend to have a big impact on their environment because they are primary herbivores. As rabbit populations deplete, not only do predators lose a valuable food source, but the plants they graze may overgrow, increasing fire hazard. It is not yet known if the impact of the virus will be ecological change. Residents are asked to report dead rabbits they may come across and to disinfect their shoes and wash their hands.



company and the music." By the way, singers can bring their own music or suggestions for the group. Questions? Dorene's number is 781-248-3144.



Disasters don't plan ahead, but YOU can!

In a disaster, local officials and first responders cannot reach everyone immediately. You and members of your community need to be prepared ahead of time.

Be prepared at all times to shelter in place.

September is National Preparedness Month, increase your readiness weekly.

Week 1: Make a Plan. Plan ahead and talk about how you, your family and friends will respond and communicate during and after a disaster.

Week 2: Build Kits. Gather supplies that will last for several days after a disaster for everyone living in your home. Don't forget to consider the unique needs each person or pet may have in case you have to evacuate quickly. Have kits at home, in your car and at your workplace. Update your kits and supplies regularly.

Week 3: Prepare for Disasters. Limit the impacts that disasters have on you and your family. Know the risk of disasters in your area and check your insurance coverage. Learn how to make your home stronger in the face of earthquakes, storms and other common hazards. Act fast if you receive a local warning or alert.

Week 4: Teach youth about preparedness. Talk to youth in your life and prepare them for emergencies so they know how to respond. Plan what to do in case they are separated from others. Reassure them and help them feel capable of responding in a variety of situations to reduce the chance of panic.

Earthquake Readiness

Home preparation before an earthquake:

- Place earthquake putty under fragile keepsakes on shelves to help hold them in place.
- Do not hang heavy items near beds, couches and any place people sleep or sit.
- In pantries, closets & shelves, store large, heavy, breakable or messy items on the lowest shelf closest to the floor.
 (example: in the pantry, think of items like soy sauce, oil or syrup and anything liquid, heavy or messy and place those at the bottom to reduce the messy damage that would come from them falling to the ground,
- Use earthquake straps to anchor top-heavy, tall and freestanding furniture to wall studs to keep them from falling over (bookcases, china cabinets, etc.)
- Have fire extinguishers handy. Fire is a common hazard after earthquakes

During an earthquake:

- DROP, COVER and HOLD ON
- Pick safe paces in each room of your home & workplace (under a large piece of furniture or against an interior wall away from windows learn about the 'triangle of life.')
- Practice drop, cover and hold on in each safe place so that it comes naturally.
- If you are in bed, stay in bed. Curl up, hold on and cover your head.
- If you're outside during an earthquake, try to get as far away as possible from buildings, power lines, trees and streetlights as possible.
- If you're in a vehicle, pull over to a clear location and stop. Stay inside with your seatbelt fastened until the shaking stops. After the shaking stops, avoid bridges, overpasses and ramps that may have been damaged.

<u>Lightning Readiness:</u> Until historic lightning occurred in August 2020, lightning wasn't something many Californians talked much about. According to National Geographic, between August 15-19, over 20,000 lightning strikes occurred in CA, which contributed to hundreds of fires.

- Surge protection Protect electrical equipment and appliances with surge protective devices (think TVs, computers, appliances, and any life-sustaining devices that rely on electricity.)
- "When thunder roars, go indoors!" Seek shelter in a substantial building or a hard-topped metal vehicle as fast as you can.
