

USC honors Prof. Emeritus **Bill Himstreet**





was appalled by the recent decision of the LV Board of Directors, announced in the Village Voice, to discontinue the contract for pest services for ants, spiders and snails. I trust that many of you will agree with my reasons, stated here, for the reinstatement of these services, and will join me in this appeal to our Board.

The reasons for Board's action, given to me, were (1) that this will save \$20,000 per year, and (2) that not many homeowners availed themselves of this service. From now on, any homeowner requiring this

service will have to call a spraying contractor and pay for it.

The fact that not many homeowners required this service last year is not a good argument. Very few of our homes go up in smoke; does that mean we should not have fire insurance?

Let's examine the financial aspects. My call to the contractor listed in the Village Voice revealed that the charge to a homeowner

Deadlines for next month

for a single spraying is \$40 for one pest (e.g. ants), or \$49 for more than one pest. If you sign up for monthly sprayings (four months minimum), then the charge is \$28.50 per visit, or \$94 minimum.

The stated \$20,000 sav-

ings per year equals an assessment reduction of less than \$10 per year per home. If you have an invasion of ants (as many of us do some years) and/or snails or spiders, your cost of spraying will be equivalent to at least four years of

above savings - probably more. This means that if the invasion of pests occurs more often than once every four to six or eight years, you will lose on this deal.

But it's much worse than that! These pests are not very considerate; unless controlled, they tend to move from home to home. If my neighbor's home has been infected, I must depend on her to pay for spraying, or I will have to. So this must not happen to me or to my neighbors in less than eight to 16 years, or we all lose on this new deal!

In real life, it's still worse. Think what it means for us homeowners to have to call the spraying contractor individually. In this day and age, I dread to think! Will they want to come? How soon will they show up? Will the price they quote today increase? Who wants to bet?

Ants, especially, have always been a problem here - near epidemic attacks have arisen in some years in the past. We, i.e. the Association, should shoulder collectively the responsibility for controlling this, especially since some of these problems do and will affect the common areas. Indeed, some of the invasions of homes by ants, snails or spiders do come from, or at least involve, the common area.

I appeal to the Board to please reinstitute the con-

was reading the most recent issue of "Inside Leisure Village" the other day, and, as per usual, there were letters that invited all residents of Leisure Village to put aside differences and start working together to make this place where we live the very best it could be. They were letters that embodied reasons why Leisure Village was the best place where the writer had ever lived, and, unfortunately, one that criticized both our current Board president, Carol Sweeney, as well as the Board's costly and indiscriminate use of lawyers to obtain legal advice.

I'm sure that Carol can speak for herself, but, as a Board member, I refuse to sit quietly and keep my mouth closed when I see such uncalled-for criticism, particularly when, in my opinion, it is completely unjustified.

Your Board of Directors has received sufficient positive legal advice justifying our security's use of flashing lights and sirens within the confines of Leisure Village, a completely private entity. In an emergency, not only do minutes count, but even seconds can be the difference between life and death. The time factor is what's most important. That being the case, then the use of flashing lights, as well as the expeditious use of sirens when it becomes necessary, certainly makes good sense to me.

No doubt, we have all heard, both in letter form as well as verbal form, the many praises being given on behalf of our security.

are concerned, in my humble opinion, it's better to be safe than sorry. I think that all residents of Leisure Village are cost-conscious, but, when involved with legal matters, since practicing law without a license can have very serious consequences, I feel that the hiring of an attorney to do the investigation of any and all legal ramifications is not only necessary but completely justified.

This letter is about rumors, which is defined as "unverified information of uncertain origin usually spread by word of mouth."

While serving on the Board and still active in the Women's Club Trading Post, the Village was in dire need of storage space. It was the Board's decision to make space in the annex by removing some shuffleboard courts. Then a member of the PRC was put in charge of constructing storage spaces for various clubs and the Rec Center, which was done by erecting several

steel fencing cages. But since the trading Post needed a higher structure to stack stored items, the PRC Rep installed three rows of barbed wire along the top of the cage. Several residents complained to the Board, and the Board, not realizing the impact of this addition, had it immediately removed. Rumor had it that I ordered this type of addition, which was totally false.

Later, our GM resigned to accept a better position, and without an Office Manager, it was felt that Board members should cover the office and support the staff when decisions needed Board approval. I was the only one willing to spend the necessary time in the office. I did not direct daily operations, nor did I interfere in their daily workings, and I certainly did not micromanage.

I felt these two rumors needed to be clarified once and for all, and only mention this to show how hurtful and destructive rumors can be.

Why are the Emergency Information Survey Sheets important?

The LV Emergency Services Organization (ESO) and LV Security are attempting (and training) to be prepared to deal with emergencies such as toxic chemical spill, earthquake,

fire, power outage, etc. Depending on the type and severity of the emergency, certain people in the Village may need immediate assistance, and others may be capable of giving aid.

For example, suppose the electricity is off for a prolonged period of time. Some of our people depend on oxygen for survival. Some of the oxygen systems use electrical power to produce the needed oxygen. Your garage door will not open automatically if the electrical power is off. Do you know how to open your door manually? Are you physically capable of manually opening your garage

Information Survey sheet is the vehicle used to inform the ESO and LV Security of your limitations or needs and your capability to offer

help to others. When your Village Coordinator asks you to fill out (or update) the LV **Emergency Information** Survey sheet, please comply. It's for your own good.



The monthly meetings are an excuse to have some good entertainment for the evening.







High school unification issue has two sides

An article appeared on March 21 in your paper, Inside Leisure Village, regarding the unification issue. There are always two sides to every story.

I am a parent with two young children in the Pleasant Valley School District (PVSD). As such, I am very concerned with the educational opportunities available for them in the future. I have done much

cation issue.

In 1992, 1998, and again in 2002, the PVSD Board of Trustees hired Mr. Terry McHenry to study the feasibility of unifying the district. Mr. McHenry, in all three studies, stated that although feasible, there are three main issues that remain to be dealt with.

1. The housing of the approximately 750 Camarillo students currently at Rio Mesa. Some ofthe options articulated in Mr. McHenry's report include:

a) Year round school at Camarillo High. This would contradict the Camarillo Unified Committee's coordinated curuculum theory.

b) Modifying an existing middle school and reconfiguring the district back to K-6, 7-9, 10-12. This would be a challenge, as the feasibility study clearly states that

bond funds for modifying a school to accommodate older students.

c) Keeping those students at Rio Mesa, even if PVSD unifies. This means that those students would be ineligible for sports, and their parents would have even less control of their children's education, as they would no longer have any stake in Oxnard Union High School District (OUHSD), also contradicting the coordinated curricu-

lum theory.
2. The "Poison Pill," the lifetime health benefits of Oxnard Union High School District. If we were to unify, we would have to negotiate assets and liabilities. If we take an asset as large as Camarillo High School, we will also be responsible for a "fair share" of liabilities, as well. The responsibility for

the lifetime health benefits of OUHSD teachers could be as little as 22 percent or as high as 37 percent of \$1.6 million per year.

3. The racial distribution. There are nine criteria that must be met in order to unify. Criterion 4 simply states that "the reorganization of the districts will not promote racial or ethnic discrimination or segregation." If Camarillo were to unify, according to numbers

given in the latest study, it may appear to promote segregation.

The above issues have not changed in a decade, and satisfactory solutions have yet to be offered. Additionally, Mr. McHenry reports that traditionally, the community groups seeking unification have been responsible for the financial burden of getting this issue

The warbirds will arrive on April 28 at approximately 3 p.m. and will be available for tours and rides until they depart around 2 p.m. on April 30.

The Collings Foundation (www.collingsfoundation.org) is a nonprofit Educational Foundation (501-C3), founded in 1979. Since

1989, a major focus of the foundation has been the veterans' "Wings of Freedom Tour.

This tour showcases a fully restored WWII Consolidated B-24J Liberator named "Dragon and His Tail" to pay tribute to the veterans who served in the Pacific Theater of Operations. The tour also features the Boeing B-17G Flying Fortress "Nine-O-Nine," the companion of the B-24 in thousands of

wartime bombing and reconnaissance missions.

The "Wings of Freedom Tour" has two goals: to honor our veterans, letting them know they have not been forgotten; and to educate the visitors, especially younger Americans, about the planes and World War II. to the ballot. Why, then, are some board members insisting the district foot the bill for this endeavor in an atmosphere of budget short-

The Camarillo Educational Design Committee, an ad hoc committee researching building a new high school for Camarillo, will be presenting their findings to the OUHSD on April 30 in Council Chambers here in Camarillo.

If OUHSD builds a high school, the bond that will be required will be eligible for state match funds. If PVSD

builds a high school, a bond also will need to be passed. The difference is this: OUHSD is eligible for state match funds; half the needed amount spread between approximately 260,000 taxpayers. PVSD, if unified, may not be eligible for state match funds; the entire amount would be carried solely by the taxpayers of Camarillo.

Do you not think it is appropriate to tell people that these points exist? If, after viewing both the pros and the cons of unifying, voters want to sign this petition, then they have done so with full knowledge.
