It kind of has because now I know that working hard here in the U.S is not easy and people who own citizenship should value that and go to college and receive a degree and not get involved in bad things. I say this because many young teens are dropping out of school or not going to college and I feel they should feel lucky they are given the opportunity to live in the U.S and have the chance to be someone in life
