
Flood Control Progress Report

A field inspection trip was held recently to determine if the widening and deepening of the Conejo Creek channel upstream from the Highway 101 bridges was completed to the satisfaction of the Ventura County Flood Control District. I have received information that this work was conditionally approved.

The next step will be to determine by photogrammetry new elevations of the stream bed and our levee to determine if the levee now meets the Federal Emergency Management Agency requirement of three feet (3') of levee freeboard above a theoretical 100-year flood elevation.

If the hydraulics study indicates our levee meets the Federal requirements, an amendment to the Federal Insurance Rate Map will be requested. If the study indicates the levee still does not meet the requirements, Pardee Construction Company will be obligated to place additional material on the levee to meet required elevations. It is my understanding that all the engineering work, plus any additional construction work, if necessary, will be done at no expense to the Leisure Village Association.

A public forum to discuss the transportation of rocket fuels was held in the Oxnard City Hall on Dec 28. The program was sponsored by Assemblyman Jack O'Connell and consisted of presentations by 5 experts concerned with the various aspects of handling and transportation of toxic materials, primarily rocket fuels.

We in Leisure Village need to be aware of the potential for danger from an accidental spill of these kinds of materials and to examine the steps


LV Nominating Committee Is Actively Seeking Qualified Candidates

C-SPAN I and II

On Jan 4 I had the pleasure of presenting to the Leisure Village Board of Directors 101 checks payable to LVA, totalling \$2,245, to cover the cost of bringing back C-SPAN I to Leisure Village TV receivers.

Board member Jack Rogers accepted the donations and announced that the new dish antenna was ordered in Dec. Installation will have been accomplished by the time this issue of ILV appears in Jan.

Donations were made by 99 individuals and two clubs, the Current Issues Forum and the Live Dance Band group.

In my presentation I stressed the importance of receiving C-SPAN II, which covers proceedings of the U.S. Senate, where

ratification of treaties takes place. It will be recalled that C-SPAN I reports on proceedings of the House of Representatives. Both channels broadcast from the same satellite.

After the Board meeting I was authorized to continue the solicitation of funds, for the purpose of obtaining C-SPAN II. The goal here is \$1,600.

With help from the clubs, there should be no difficulty in achieving this sum.

EDITORIAL

January is a time for re-evaluation of needs and priorities, particularly in relation to financial responsibilities. For several months Leisure Village Board of Directors has been attempting to alert us to the necessity of a considerable and unavoidable increase in Association fees. A substantial deficit has already occurred in the 1987-88 budget due to unexpected escalation in fees for sewerage, water, trash collection and cable TV.

We, as homeowners, have elected a Board of Directors to make decisions pertaining to our welfare. Most of us are also aware of the continued rise in prices in other areas besides those mentioned. The more we have, the more we have to pay for — and we have much here in Leisure Village.

Although this is written prior to the January 15th presentation of the proposed budget, ILV feels that the present Board has devoted several months of study toward meeting the crisis that faces us. Therefore, our Editorial Staff wishes to go on record as fully supporting whatever decisions must be made.

UPDATE

The prepared budget for 1988-89 has now been presented to the Association. There no doubt is much in it which will be cause for concern and controversy. But we as homeowners must face facts. We have become used to the good living. We particularly have to protect our investment. We do not want our property values to go down.

ILV applauds our Board, too, for recognizing the intense and professional help that our volunteer Finance Committee has contributed to this task.

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
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
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


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Organ Club To Sponsor Cabaret Night

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YNCG Supplementary Medical Insurance

About 60 people attended a very informative program on Medicare insurance supplements. Conclusions arrived at are as follows:

No company will accept us for a group policy, but if we all get an individual policy through Y.N.C.G. we can get all the paper work done for us.

For about \$100-\$150 per year more than we are paying at the present we would get a policy that will pay 100% of reasonable charges from our doctors on all Medicare approved procedures. That is, no out of pocket moneys after Medicare pays its part.

The fee for your present age group would continue as long as you live.

No one can be canceled.

A 60-day overlap of policies would be necessary to cover any current medical problem.

Two years ago our group had between 300-500 people. Today we are down to 63.

Hartford will probably cancel us in the near future and/or raise our fee an incredible amount because of this.

The policy benefits we have now can be purchased elsewhere for about one-half our present cost.

If we can get 80 or more of our group and additional people, we will have clout to obtain more benefits and be reinstated with the 40 doctors of the Anacapa group. No paperwork, no bills, no out of pocket payments after premium and Medicare \$75 deduction is paid.

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

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

we can take to protect ourselves in the event of a spill.

During the presentations it was shown that, on the basis of experimental programs conducted by the Lawrence Livermore Laboratory, fumes from spilled products generally float along the ground and are dispersed by winds. Concentrations of these products in the atmosphere decrease with distance from the spill yet can remain at toxic levels even 1-1/2 miles from the spill site. It appears that a 30-minute

period would be available for evacuation of the Village based on a wind velocity of 5 MPH blowing from Highway 101.

At present no rocket fuels are being transported along Highway 101. In the past, 2 to 3 truckloads per month were being shipped to Vandenberg Airforce Base. Shipments are now being routed through Santa Barbara County. Assemblyman O'Connell is planning to introduce legislation to prohibit permanent use of Highway 101 for the transport of rocket fuel. However, since other hazardous materials can be transported by tank truck along Highway 101, we must continue to look to our defenses against injury from a spill of all toxic materials.

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

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
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
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
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Birds of Leisure Village

When the Chumash Indians lived in Pleasant Valley, the land was mostly semi-arid desert, watered by winter rains but seldom having even a trace in summer. In some places the water table was high enough for shallow wells so the natives thrived. Birds and animals that could live under such conditions also thrived: the ground squirrel, the cottontail (conejo), coyote and deer among the animals. Birds such as the owl, hawks, condors and doves were plentiful, and one that was like no other, the roadrunner.

Over the years since 1769 when civilization began to come to Southern California many of these have been pushed back or have been completely lost to the area.

A few hardy ones still exist here; new-ones such as the linnet have come with the population and a few such as the red-winged blackbird have been helped by our irrigation.

Sometimes animals seem amazingly human in their actions. Last week just west of the main gate and across Santa Rosa Road I saw the largest and most beautiful roadrunner that I have ever seen. He stood absolutely still just below the hill which is most unusual for a runner. His long tail was cocked saucily and he was carefully checking with his eyes every cactus and tumbleweed near him. He looked exactly like a house-hunting husband to me, and he looked as if he was just about ready to say, "I'll take it."

Preserving Social Security and Medicare

When the Congressional summit took place recently to consider the pressing problem of reducing the national deficit, every government program was carefully scrutinized to slash operating costs except one — Social Security. The reason for that is quite simple. Social Security is vigorously supported by the most powerful lobby in the nation — senior citizens. We have the clout in any election to defeat a candidate or put him into office. Politicians get the message: hands off Social Security.

Voters 65 and older outnumber teenagers for the first time since 1972, when 18-year-olds got the right to vote. Of 178 million Americans eligible to vote in 1986, more than 50 million are 55 years and older. Adding to that clout is the fact that, traditionally, older people are more likely to show up at the polls than younger ones.

Overall, the generation aged 65 and over has grown 11% since 1980. It is interesting to note that at the time of the 1980 census, half the total U.S. population of people over 65 lived in only 8 states, seven of which had more than a million people in that age group. Those states were, in order, California, New York, Florida, Pennsylvania, Texas, Illinois, Ohio and Michigan.

Those numbers would be meaningless if they were not accompanied by a determined will to do something with them. There are many fine senior organizations whose very size and lobbying power in Congress and state legislatures guarantees senior representation. Largest of these is the A.A.R.P. with a membership of 25 million. It has a legislative committee in every state and a

group of 20 registered lobbyists on Capitol Hill.

The burning issues of Social Security and Medicare will demand our attention in the 1988 election because of their impact on the 65 plus generation.

Only last month, Congressman Elton Gallegly issued a timely report to the senior citizens of the 21st District. In it Gallegly reassures us that he is working to protect the benefits seniors enjoy from a safe and solvent Social Security and Medicare system. Health care coverage to protect 31 million senior citizens and disabled Medicare recipients from "catastrophic" doctor and hospital bills is now being studied by a House-Senate conference committee which will try to resolve differences between each chamber's version. Medicare Part A benefits will be financed

through an income-related surtax. This tax could be as high as \$580 per person in 1988 and would increase each year. Medicare Part B benefits would be financed through increases in monthly premiums that would increase each year as the cost of the program rises. That monthly premium is expected to be \$25 in 1988.

It is obvious that our health care costs will continue to rise in the years ahead. We seniors must monitor the voting records of our representatives in Congress to make sure that they will protect our best interests.

We have the political clout and we must continue to exercise it constantly — at the ballot box and in a never-ending flow of mail to our elected officials to let them know where we stand.

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
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

had many roadrunners but I've not seen any so close to us before. The new housing development there has taken great toll of chaparral habitat. Almost surely that beautiful bird is a 'displaced resident' and may die if he cannot find someplace to go. I hope that our hill across the street will be hospitable to him and his mate.

For those of you who may not be familiar with the road runner, he is unique. A member of the cuckoo family, he can be as long as twenty-four inches. His head is roughly crested and his long straight tail is almost as long as his body. He has very strong legs and often prefers running to flying. Indeed one of his charming habits is suddenly to appear in front of your car on a country road and run there with great strong strides for some distance. When he tires of his game he will hop to the side and seem almost to be laughing at you as you resume speed.

Roadrunners are reputed to mate for life. Once I personally saw evidence of this at my brother's house in Lake Isabella where there was a nesting pair. Someone shot the female and she died. Her mate came to the roof of a shed next door almost everyday with a tidbit, often a lizard. He'd carefully lay it down and call. Then he'd pick it up and display it, lay it down and call again.

Finally after more than a year he came no more.

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
