Over 200 Leisure Village veterans, spouses and honored guests were present on a lovely Monday morning, January 3, 2000, for the Veterans Memorial dedica-

tion service. It was an emotional dedication to many of the veterans, spouses and friends with memories of World War II, and the Korean, and Vietnam wars.

Credit should be given to President Ed Vasquez for this idea and most of the work in the implementation of this memorial. This 2-by-2 foot ceramic plaque is mounted on a 3-by-3 foot, 3600 pound granite rock that has been place behind the flag pole in front of the Recreation Center. Only 45 ribbons in colored ceramics represents the medals awarded to a limited number of our Leisure Village veterans and it is a story of the dedication of veterans of all the services who were there to protect us in that war time. There are about 800 veterans or veteran's spouses in the Village.

Leisure Village Board President Caroline Pratt introduced the honored guests which included Navy Commander Andrew Barton, Navy Honor Guard, Camarillo Mayor Bill Lieberman, Councilman Mike Morgan and Cmdr. Dave Tennessen of the Camarillo Police Department, Ret. Army Col. Warren Eastman, resident of

the Village, made the closing remarks.

Commander Barton of the Naval Air Station at Point Mugu described the memorial as "a reminder of the courageous men and women who have served in al branches of the services. The Silver Star is the highest reward." The plague included ribbons for World War II, the Korean and Vietnam wars.

President Ed Vasquez presented an moving dedication speech. Col Paul Kirschner, retired army and retired Navy Chief Ben Racowsky unveiled the plaque. Mike Shapiro, Leisure Village Treasurer, said "that this memorial dedication was one of the finest presentations during his time in Leisure Village."

Thanks go to Robert Hasen and Fred Ervast for their assistance in forming the plaque and to Miriam Hasen for singing "Wind Beneath My Wings" during the ceremony.

Voters League Brings **Pros and Cons** Feb. 18 to Village Forum

California's "love af-fair" with direct democracy will flare anew in March when voters will be asked to decide on as many as 21 ballot measures, addressing everything from same-sex marriages to the state's dilapidated parks.

Two representatives of The League Of Women Voters of Ventura County will discuss the pros and cons of each ballot measures in the AR at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, February 18. It is to be clearly understood that the League does not support or oppose any political party or candidate, nor does it show partisanship toward any measure. Their mission, as nonpartisan political organization, encourages the informed and active participation of citizens in government, and influences public policy through education and advocacy. Topics on the ballot will include tobacco tax, school bond votes, Indian gambling, congressional term limits and juvenile crime. There will be time for questions.

Just fill out the paperwork and send it to the Board for approval. Isn't the Board busy enough already? Or do they want more and more control over Village functions?

Homeowners must decide, if the drive to encourage slumpstone walls is to be passed, should this amendment, muddy as it is presented to us now, be passed or do we defeat the entire amendment?

The drafters of this proposed amendment may have ulterior motives. Some of us may not accept this amendment with the extra baggage written into what was originally a popular measure.

Thanks to Your Neighbor's Care Group and especially to Sandy Okum, about two hundred Villagers got the good news about Pleasant Valley Hospital's Seismic Upgrade and Renovation Project which will bring the facility up to the State's newest earthquake code. Fortunately FEMA will pay 90% of the seismic upgrade which will strengthen the building in every way. During this process, it will be possible to expand many of the facilities, add several modern fast elevators and complete the entire third floor. It is expected

that every aspect of the hospital will be improved. During construction, the hospital will continue to operate in the normal way. The project should start later this year and finish by the end of 2002.

The second part of the meeting was an introduction to the housing facility adjacent to R-N Market on Santa Rosa Road. given by personnel of Marriott's Brighton Gardens. The facility for retirement living offers studio apartments, one bedroom and two bedroom apartments on a rental basis. Three meals a day are served in a large dining room and many other amenities are included in the monthly fee. For

those who require more help on a daily basis, there are Nursing and Rehabilitative Service. those with Alzheimer's and related memory disorders there is a Special Care Unit. Move-in time will be some day between May 15 and June 15.

After both presentations, many questions were asked by villagers and answered by Bill Clearwater of Pleasant Valley Hospital and Stan Main for Brighton Gardens. It was an informative evening. Refreshments were furnished by Marriott.

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

Ventura County needs a Supervisor with experience in financial management. I know that one voice of reason can make a difference, and with your vote, I will be that voice!



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
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Cal. Sr. Leg Lobbies For Sr. Issues By Joe Ellenbogen V. 16

When it comes to legislation on behalf of seniors, there is a great disparity between wishful thinking and reality.

Of the more than 1,000 bills Governor Gray Davis signed into law last year, those specifically designed for seniors were difficult to find. And in Washington, despite the rhetoric, real progress on Social Security, Medicare and Universal Health Care, is just that—talk. Taxes, Education, Environment, Crime, Guns, Consumer Issues, Cars and Drivers—all seem to have priority. Nevertheless, the California Senior Legislature, in its annual legislative session held in Sacramento in October, considered more than 100 proposals offered by the 120 member organization, each of which would improve the lives of California seniors. After 4 days of debate and balloting, the CSL prioritized the top 10 state and top 4 federal proposals. Those, and other proposals which did not make the top 10 and 4, are currently being lobbied to seek sponsors amongst the Legislative members in the Assembly and Senate in order to eventually find their way to the Governor's Desk and into law. The interest which Leisure Village residents are showing in the soon-to-be completed and occupied Marriott Brighton Gardens assisted-living complex outside the Leisure Village gate, is an indication that as seniors age, additional services are required. Many Leisure Village residents already have taken up occupancy in other such facilities as theVentura TowneHouse.

For many years Leisure Village was represented in the California Senior Legislature by the much loved and respected Joe Gaynes who also served on one of the early Leisure Village Boards. Joe died this year and his wise, dedicated efforts are difficult to replace. Since Leisure

Village is home to the largest number of Ventura County seniors, it seems fitting that the County be represented in the California Senior Legislature by a Leisure Village resident. It is hoped that one will step forward as a candi-date at the next CSL elec-Through the courtesy of Ventura County Senator Senior Warnagieris and Genie Wheeler, Ventura County Star columnist and former Senior Assemblywoman, Inside Leisure Village offers the following sum-mary of the top CSL proposals:

1. Would authorize use of unclaimed an decedent's estate for which there are no heirs to provide affordable housing for persons over age 62 with an income of \$50,000

or less.

2. Provides for relief from prescribed fare box ratios for rural counties so elders can receive more transit assistance

3. Would establish a statewide respite care program for caregivers of the frail elderly and others needing 24hour supervision.

4. Would establish a statewide elder abuse reporting number.

5. Would establish an annual fee to be paid by long-term care facilities to be ombudsman training and meeting new elder abuse reporting requirements.

6. Would expand Medi-Cal benefits to cover the costs of long-term care in an individual's

home.

7. Provides Alzheimer's Caregiver Training and Certifica-

8. Would provide for pharmaceutical expense relief for Medi-Cal and Medicare qualified se-

9. Would ensure funding for Area Agency on Aging programs so they would continue despite delayed approval of the state's budget.

10. Would preclude seniors from signing legal documents when they are under the influence of mind-altering drugs.

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





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GERONTOLOGY RESEARCH MEETING

In August 1999, approximately 90 Leisure Village volunteers participated in a special research project to study the possible effects of positive or negative emotions on memory.
