Progress Towards New TV Antenna

Several members of the Leisure Village Association, including four Board Members, attended an administrative hearing at the Ventura County Gov-ernment Center on October 14 regarding the LV cable TV antenna.

The purpose of this hearing was to receive final public input concerning the installation of a 6 foot diameter parabolic antenna atop the existing 60 foot tall tower located on Camrosa property on Presilla Road in Moorpark.

This installation is opposed by residents of the area surrounding the tower because of aesthetic concerns. The hearing officer stated that all other concerns have been met to the County's satisfaction and that the only remaining issue is the visual impact on the area.

LVA General Manager Bob Cullati outlined the reasons why the association wants this project to proceed, including the better reception to he ob-

We can only promise to do our best with the space available.

Thanks to our Board, all homeowners now have knowledge of the very generous Union contract covering our 40 landscape workers. We are also aware of the exorbitant demands of this Union which are even more incredible since unemployment is high and people are grateful to have jobs. Thousands line up for a handful of \$5 per hour jobs at new Wal Mart and Fedco stores.

The Board has advised us that it has at least six more negotiating sessions with the Union. Fortunately for all of us who pay the bills, this indicates that

this Board is unwilling to accept the Union's unbelievable demands. This Board is delivering on it's promise to control expenses, as evidenced by two comments at the Oct. 4th meeting that two portions of the 1994/95 budget are being presented with no increase or even a decrease.

All of us should demonstrate full support to our Board by phone, personal comment or letter. When the Union realizes the full extent of this support they may come to their senses and act in a realistic and reasonable manner.

Former Officers Voice Concerns

This statement, signed by former officers and board members of Leisure Village Association, represents a consensus of at least eighteen of our colleagues. Several were out of the Village at the time of printing and unavailable for signature, but agreed to the sense of this communication at a recent meet-

An impulsive, off-hand comment, made by a ranking director was subsequently denied, yet a tape of the open board meeting clearly refutes the denial. We are entitled to the truth, not evasiveness and equivocation, but honestly admitted errors may be tolerated.

Then, the same director, at a recent meeting, followed by printing in the Village Voice, released the initial demands made by the union representing forty landscape workers, quoting percentages too high to be the basis of agreement, but used only as a negotiating tool. It is well known, however, that See LETTERS.....Pg. 3

when a union is trying to obtain an increase of five cents per hour for its members, for example, the typical original demand may be twenty or even thirty cents per hour.

The Board had to be aware of this Union practice, but chose to publicize the Union demands, thus frightening our membership into believing they were facing a large increase in their monthly Association dues.

The mere fact that this information was made available to our residents was, in itself, unethical, and presented an inaccurate picture of what will finally result from our union negotiations. LVA has had several prior negotiations with the same union which resulted in a stable, responsible and loyal work force that has served us well for many years.

Open discussion of bargaining talks was subsequently halted upon the advice of our labor negotiating law firm.

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
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

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
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CHANNEL 12

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
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Recalls Search For Landscape Contractor in 1988

Contracting out for mowing and pruning by Leisure Village frequently comes up among villagers whether at association meetings or over the bridge table. The following six paragraphs are from an article dated June 4, 1988, which was written by our landscaping staff and given to the L.V. Board of Directors and pertinent committee members.

"In March, 1988, the Board directed the staff to develop bid specifications for contracting for mowing, pruning, and weeding, but excluding the golf course and irrigation system. These latter two tasks would be accomplished by L.V. employees. This bid specification was reviewed by the Buildings and Grounds and Architectural/Landscaping commit- months. Several of the tees and their rec- crew members were reommendations were incorporated in the bid specification."

"The staff was, also, directed to develop a realistic estimate of LV costs for doing the work per the bid specs. This was done, resulting in an estimate of

\$771,800."
"Bid specifications were sent to four contractors in April '88. Only three bidders came to LV to conduct a 'walk-through' of LV.

"In May, 1988, one bid was received of \$855,000. Another contractor wrote to us to advise that they were not bidding due to their concern of being involved with the union to which the remaining landscape employees of LV belong.

"In addition to the bid received being \$83,000 per year greater than our costs, the Association would lose the flexibility our work force gives to do other tasks."

The other tasks that we would not be able to do if the landscaping was contracted are: tree and shrub

replacement, spraying for ants, installation of drains, replanting/replacing sod/ seed along walks or space areas, and weed control applications. One major task that we would lose is the ability to respond in emergencies such as tree damage from high winds, damage to landscaping due to flooding, etc. It should be noted that in the past five years we had one flooding situation and three wind storms. None of those tasks were included in the outside contractors' bid package and would be considered extra work for extra cost. Under these circumstances, it would be unwise to consider contracting our Landscaping services.

At present the mowing crew is mowing five days a week during the warm cently added to the pruning crew with plans that the Village will be pruned three times a year. Emergency and hazard problems are being taken care of by a crew of three men until the cooler weather comes. Tasks which were being kept up on the 4 day mowing schedule with Fridays for doing extra tasks will fall into place starting approximately November 1. When villagers speak of contracting for mowing and pruning services and how much more we pay than other condo groups, is it not possible that they are comparing apples and oranges? We have a great deal of landscaping where other condos may have


