President's Community Service Honor Roll

CSU Channel Islands (CI) was named to the 2009 President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll. This university-wide distinction is the highest federal recognition a college or university can receive for its commitment to volunteering, service-learning, and civic engagement.

Seven hundred institutions of higher learning were named to the Honor Roll for exemplary service to America's communities. The award recipients were announced by the Corporation for National and Community Service, in collaboration with the Department of Education, Department of Housing and Urban Development, Campus Compact and the American Council on Education.

Since its inception 6 years ago, CI has been committed to making service learning and civic engagement an integral part of its curriculum and student life. The university has reached out to the community to form reciprocal partnerships that have provided real benefits to the community and the campus.

CI partners with many community-based organizations who play an integral role in our student's education. In 2009 these partnerships resulted in CI students completing 14,000 service hours, volunteering, and/or participating in service-learning or civic engagement projects. Using California's calculated rate of \$22.00 for each volunteer hour, CI students gave \$319,060 of economic benefit to the community in 2009.

Service Learning Student Survey Results

In AY 09-10 students were surveyed on various aspects of their service learning experiences and community contributions. A total of 275 students completed this survey. Following are combined results (Fall/Spring):

- ♦ 45 freshmen, 39 sophomores, 56 juniors, and 120 seniors participated in a course with a service learning component
- ♦ 6,766 hours were served by these students.
- \$154,197 of economic benefit was contributed to Ventura County (based on the Bureau of Labor Statistics value of volunteer time \$22.79/hour for California times the number of hours).
- 23 faculty members offered a course with a service learning component.
- 9 programs offered a course with a service learning component. Many of the courses are a requirement of the major.
- ♦ **40** course sections with a service learning component were offered. Courses included: Art, Business, Chicana/o Studies, Communication, Early Childhood Studies, Education, English, Environmental Science and Resource Management, Liberal Studies, Management, Sociology, and Spanish.
- 98% of students would like to see more service learning courses offered.
- 97% of students reported they learn course content better when connections to real-life situations are made.
- 95% of students strongly agreed or agreed that service learning showed them how to become more involved in the community.
- 90% reported the agency contributed to their course learning.

Model United Nations

As part of the CCE's effort to promote engagement in the global community, the Center co-sponsors with the Political Science program a Model United Nations (UN) team. By learning about global issues, students have a raised awareness about the challenges we face as a community.

The CSU Channel Islands Model UN team formed in Spring 2008 and has competed in four events each year since. Thus far, our students have won six awards for Distinguished Delegate, Outstanding Delegate, and the Research Award. These events have been funded by Instructionally Related Activities (IRA)funds.

Model UN is a simulation of the UN's committees. Students step into the shoes of ambassadors from UN 12-1 member states to research and debate current issues receon the organization's agenda. While playing their roles 490.

as ambassadors, student "delegates" make speeches, prepare draft resolutions, negotiate with allies and adversaries, resolve conflicts, and navigate the Model UN conference rules of procedure - all in the interest of mobilizing "international cooperation" to resolve problems that affect countries all over the world.

In fall 09, students competed at the American Pacific Model UN conference in Anaheim and the America West Model UN in Las Vegas. This past spring, they competed at West Model UN in Santa Barbara and Far West Model UN in San Francisco.

We have been awarded IRA funds for fall 2010, and will attend Northwest Model UN in Seattle, November 12-14. Each spring semester, students on the team receive credit for a course on the Model UN, POLS 490.

Spotlight on Service: Just a little effort can make a difference in a child's life

The mortgage/foreclosure crisis has contributed to the increase in homeless families in Ventura County. Many families have found themselves homeless and the resulting impact on their children's education is vast. The capacity to learn when a child's family has lost their home is difficult.

In AY 09-10, with the efforts of the Sociology program, over 40 CI students tutored with School on Wheels, a non-profit organization whose mission is to provide academic support to homeless children. CI students were paired with a homeless student, met with their students at several public libraries and two Boys and Girls Clubs in Ventura County, and provided over 350 hours of academic support. Twelve CI students have continued working with their students after their service learning project ended.

Because of their complex living situation, it is challenging to quantify the changes made by the children and youth who are tutored. Many tutors communicate with their students' teachers which is helpful in gathering information about a student's progress.

One CI student heard from her eighth grade student's teacher who has known the student since sixth grade and

has observed several changes this year since he began being tutored.

To quote his teacher, "Although the work is challenging for the student, he made the **only** 100% on a social studies test in class this



week (February 2010). The student has dramatically turned himself around, is taking class notes, and pays attention in class.

It is this type of impact that makes School on Wheels personally grateful to have the opportunity to work with CI faculty and students, and the service learning program and staff. This partnership has created an opportunity to observe the university students grow as they in turn nurture a positive learning experience for school aged children who are experiencing homelessness.
