(0:00-1:50)	Chavez discusses the U.N. Women's Conference organized to unite third-
	world women around the globe. The conference was attended by numerous
	Chicana groups of California. Although they initially expected to all join
	together as women, they discovered that the conference was divided into
	an "official" conference and "tribune" conference. Because they were not
	government-appointed representatives, the Chicanas were directed to the
	secondary tribune section.

(1:50-3:15) The conference (IWY Tribune) made Chicanas realize that they were part of a larger global struggle of women. By 1975 the women began to look to an international identity that reached across the border to fight for Chicanas, Mexicanas, other Latinas, and women around the world. A feeling of "global sisterhood" emerged that united women by their similar experiences.

(3:15-4:18) Another result of the Mexico City conference (IWY Tribune) was the Chicana's new connection to women of Latin American countries. Not only did they learn of new views, they also became aware of torture and assassinations of women leaders. Although Chicanas were oppressed, they still had basic rights as US citizens, and they gained a new perspective when comparing their experiences to the physical violence against women

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in other areas of the world.
