#### FINCH TO DELIVER SAN DIEGO ADDRESS

LOS ANGELES -- Robert H. Finch, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, will deliver an address on higher education June 3 in San Diego at the invitation of Chancellor Glenn S. Dumke of The California State Colleges.

The Secretary will speak at a noon luncheon in the Convention Center at the Town and Country Hotel in Mission Valley. Approximately 500 guests are expected.

"It is a great pleasure to me that Secretary Finch, a distinguished Californian and a past member of our Board of Trustees, has accepted my invitation to address a California audience on issues involving higher education," Chancellor Dumke said.

#### HARMON ELECTED TO COLLEGE OF FELLOWS, AIA

LOS ANGELES -- Harry Harmon, Vice Chancellor in charge of physical planning and development for The California State Colleges, has been elected to the College of Fellows of The American Institute of Architects.

His election is a lifetime recognition for outstanding contributions. Mr. Harmon will be formally invested during special ceremonies at the AIA's annual convention in Boston June 21-25.

"I am pleased that this distinctive award has been accorded Mr. Harmon by his architectural colleagues, and note that only 957 of AIA's 23,300 members have ever been so honored," Chancellor Dumke said.

"As a member of my staff since 1962, Mr. Harmon has developed the Division of Physical Planning and Development for the 19 State Colleges and is instrumental in the preparations for three additional campuses," he said.

## ESTABLISHMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL CAREER FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM PROPOSED

A program of fellowship grants for persons preparing for environmental careers to pursue graduate and professional study would be authorized by S. 3809, which was introduced by Senator Gaylord Nelson.

The Commissioner of Education would be authorized to allocate, award and pay cost-of-education allowances for students receiving fellowships to continue graduate work in ecology, hydrology, chemistry, biology, and engineering related to control of environmental pollution.

Institutions of higher education would be awarded grants and contracts for part of the cost of developing or strengthening programs of graduate or professional study which include: education of persons for environmental careers, expansion of opportunities for persons to undertake graduate or professional study in preparation for environmental careers, and certification to the Commissioner of Education that the school will only recommend students for fellowships who are seriously considering an environmental career.

Authorization of \$50 million for fiscal 1971, \$100 million for 1972, \$150 million for 1973, and \$200 million for each succeeding fiscal year would be provided to carry out the provisions of the measure.
