

Afonso Zamora and Carlos Zatate, the two reigning world bantamweight champions, have signed to meet in a 10-round bout at 2 p.m., Saturday, April 23, at the Fabulous Forum.

The bout will be shown at the San José Civic Auditorium on

closed circuit T,V.


Weight for the bout has been set at 120 pounds and each titleholder will receive a guarantee of \$125,000.

This is the first time since the World Boxing Association and World Boxing Council were formed that two champions have set in a non-title match.

Zamora, the WBA titlist, is unbeaten in 28 fights—scoring 28 knockouts. He won the championship at The Forum, March 14, 1975 when he KO'ed Korea's Soo Hwan Hong in four rounds.

Zarate, the WBC monarch, is unbeaten with 44 wins, 43 knockouts. He acquired his title May 8, 1976, stopping Rodolfo Martinez in nine rounds at The Forum.

Both boxers live in Mexico City.
The bout will be a co-promotion between The Forum and Pronesa of Mexico City.

# Noted Chicano Poets to Appear At SJSU

Lucha Corpi Hernandez and Abelardo Delgado, two noted Mexican-American poets involved with Chicano studies and literary efforts, will appear at a free public reading Wednesday, April 20, at San Jose State University.

The reading is slated for 8:30 p.m. in the Umunhum Room of

the Student Union.

Hernandez, a native of Mexico and an Oakland resident for the past 12 years, has written for two new journals, "De Colores" and "Fuego de Aztlan," and her poems have appeared in two published anthologies, "The Other Voice: Third World Women Poets" and "Fire Flight: Three Latin American Poets."

A graduate of the University of California at Berkeley, she has taught English to Spanish-speaking children in Oakland public

schools since 1973.



Delgado has published four books of poetry, including "Mortal Sin Kit" and "Chicano: 25 Pieces of a Chicano Mind" and collections of prose. Listed in the International Who's Who in Poetry, Delgado has long been active in Chicano political and social movements.

A graduate of the University of Texas at El Paso, he teaches in Chicano Studies at the University of Utah.

Hernandez and Delgado are the seventh and eighth poets to appear at the Campus-Community Poetry Festival, a series of public readings by well-known, contemporary poets sponsored by SJSU, the Fine Arts Commission of San Jose and various other city and University organizations,

Following them will be William Sylvester, former director of the Electric Poetry Workshop in Buffalo, N.Y. He will appear at a free public reading at 8:30 p.m., Wednesday, April 27, in the Umunhum Room.



Period Drama. A Universal Release of an Alberto Grimaldi Production. Written and directed by Frederico Fellini. Music by Nino Rota. Stars Donald Sutherland. Running time: 180 minutes;

MPAA rating: R.

Fellini's newest film is here! It is his first film in two years since the Academy Award winning Amarcord and turns out to be well worth waiting for. Fellini has tackled and condensed Giocomo Cassanova's life that he personally wrote in twelve "short" volumes and turned it into one of Fellini's best works.

The story concerns the famous Cassanova who literally 'got it on' with everyone who was any one during 15th Century Italy, The film takes our "Hero" from young manhood to his deathbed, during the run of the film we see Cassanova go from one 'fling to the next with nary a 'crack' inbetween. In fact he is such a

horny character that the "crack of dawn" isn't safe. But with all that Cassanova has he is never happy. He is a man that has everything and anything except all that is real. In fact on his death bed as he remembers his life the 'real' things that came to him in his life he through away for fear of letting 'something better go by'.

The film is beautifully directed by Fellini, unlike some of his more avvant garde film of the past, 8 1/2 and Jiulette of the Spirits in particular, he goes on a simple drama narrative, not using any heavy symbolism. As for Cassanova himself, he is superb. Donald Sutherland turns in a powerful performance, something very different from the characters he has done in the past. All in all, Fellini has done a marvelous job and in such in simple straight forward way.







Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Thank you for inviting Mai and me to join you on this very pleasant and significant occasion. And thanks to my good friend, Dr. duction.

You know, in spite of what some people say, John is a mighty fine gentleman. A mutual friend of ours told me he had back trouble and went to see the good doctor. Our friend was quickly cured and felt very grateful. He kept looking for John's bill to come in the mail. A month passed. No bill. Another month. Still no bill.

Finally one day he ran into John at a Lions Club meeting and said: "Say, how come you never sent me a bill for that treatment?"

John said: "It is my policy never to ask a gentleman for money."

And our friend replied: "That's very flattering, but how would you manage if I don't pay?"

"Well," John answered, "after a certain time I would conclude that you're not a gentleman—and then I'd ask you for the money."

Seriously, it's good to see John and many other friends tonight and to take part in your installation ceremonies.

After a typical week in Sacramento hearing about all the problems we face in California, it's a pleasure to be among such nice people involved in such worthwhile organizations as the Latin American Lions Club.

I think it is symbolic of what's good about our country and our state that there are so many successful business and professional people heer tonight—living proof that this is still a land of opportunity.

But even more significant is the fact that you are here as porticipants in an organization dedicated to volunteer service to your communities and to your fellow men,

And it's good to see your wives here with you, backing you up in your club endeavors. I'm reminded of the story of the young man who was in training to sell vasuum cleaners. His boss suggested that he go home and try out his sales pitch on his wife. The next morning the boss asked him how he got along.

"I did what you told me," the young man said. "And when I finished, I asked my wife, well, what do you think? Would you buy it?' She said, 'Yes.' Then I asked her why. She replied, 'Because I love you.'"

I'm sure it's not just because love you that your wives came along tonight, and it was certainly not to hear me speak. I believe it's berause they appreciate the importance of your participation in this

organization.

Many people who don't belong to service clubs, and perhaps a few who do, fail to realize the really vital role that organizations such

as this play in our society—not just to its members, but to the

community at large.

Service clubs were invented in America early in this century and are now spread around the free world—and, in my opinion, they do a lot to help promote the spirit of freedom in this country and

many others.

Why do I believe that? Well, there are many reasons. First of all, there are the stated aims and ideals of the clubs themselves. They promote high standards of personal and business conduct based on the Golden Rule: Do unto others as you would have them do unto you. Even though we may not always live up to those ideals, the fact that we try helps create the mutual faith and confidence which enable a free society to function.

You may have heard the story of the mother who was trying to get her little boy to behave himself.

"Why don't you be good?" the

mother asked.

"I'll be good for a quarter," re-

plied the little boy.

And his mother said, "A quarter? Why can't you be like your father—good for nothing?"

It's the good we do for nothing, even when there's nothing to be gained—doing right just because it's the right thing to do—that's what makes a free society possible. Without the self discipline of its citizens, total discipline would have to be imposed by the state.

The second great contribution of clubs such as yours is that their primary purpose is to encourage service to the community among its members. The spirit of volunteer service to our fellow men has never been more important to our way of life than it is today.



It used to be that people who needed help could count on family, neighbors and friends, or the philanthrophy of private business. But as our complex and social problems became larger and more complex, we came to depend on government to solve them as well as to take care of the less fortunate among us.

Today it's popular to complain about big government and high taxes. The truth is, they are simply the price we pay for the material benefits technology has given most Americans. And. I daresay, few of us would want to

give them up.

Many of the things we used to do four ourselves we now ask government to do for us. Much of it can't be helped. But if we are to slow or reverse the trend towards big government, more private volunteer efforts will be needed,

By encouraging the spirit of volunteer service and supporting worthy causes such as aid to the blind, your club is doing a great deal to make our communities better and happier places to live.

Service consists not only of spectacular deeds but the number of small courtesies and acts of helpfulness a person is able to do. Thomas Carlyle once said: "The race of life has become so intent that the runners are treading upon one another's heels, Woe unto the man that stoops to tie his shoestring."

We are living in such a fast age that we do not take time to pause for little kindnesses, words of praise, thoughtful deeds, the friendly smile, the warm hand clasp, the pleasant hellos and farewells which make life worthwhile for those around us.

We must not underestimate the importance of little things. A decimal point can change a hundred to one. The tiny germ, which cannot be seen by the naked eye, can destroy a life.
