Exhibit Curators Statement

"Black Spartans (1907-1948)" represents ongoing research in SJSU Special Collections & Archives identifying documentation of Black experiences throughout SJSU history. This exhibit is the first of several installments.

Much of the information we have comes from the Spartan Daily student newspaper and the La Torre yearbooks. With too few exceptions, Black Spartans' stories are not told in their own words but from the perspectives of their majority white classmates. This is reflected in the language and focus of the articles. We invite you to read critically.

The Black Spartans featured in this exhibit pursued their educational goals while contending with institutionalized racism and other major crises of the 20th century: two World Wars, the influenza pandemic of 1918, and polio. Locally, "the deed to virtually every home in San Jose" included restrictions against Black and Asian residents known as "restrictive covenants" (Spartan Daily, February 16, 1948, page 2). On campus, blackface and minstrel shows were a regular part of student events.

"Black Spartans (1907-1948)" is an invitation to the community to join us in surfacing these stories, ensuring these histories are preserved and presented in a way that honors these students' lives. Contact us at special.collections@sjsu.edu to participate.


Artist Statement

The "Black Spartans (1907-1948)" exhibition is a homage to Black culture and history at San José State University and the Bay Area at large. Until recently, the significance of Black bodies in Bay Area history (as well as U.S. history) was overlooked. Unless it was associated with the struggles of civil rights leaders, athletes, or celebrity-personas, the story of a graduate from a state school wasn't valued because we weren't part of the mainstream culture. As a Black Spartan myself, I was deeply connected to these individuals that started out just like me. I saw a reflection of myself and my community throughout the process of making these mixed media portraits and came to realize how important it is to know your history because it becomes a catalyst for knowing who you are.

My work explores the intricacy of identity and the role culture, tradition, and history play. These portraits are embodiments of our Black Spartans, they are visual representations of the colorful and captivating lives they led. Through this work, I hope to influence other artists and individuals to take part in researching and finding out the infinite layers of what it means to be Black. Our history is beyond our struggle. We are the blueprint.



Don Presley attended San Jose State College from 1937-1940. Presley was active in several sports, including football, heavyweight boxing, and track and field. In 1938, Presley and fellow Black students William Lewis and Lloyd Thomas performed the "Truckin" dance craze of the time as part of the Spartan Revue. That year he and his dance partner also won "Leading Campus Dancers" at the Press Club contest at the Student Union. In 1939, he lettered in Varsity Football. After graduation, Presley had a short career as a professional heavyweight boxer, from 1940-1941.

The State frosh piled up the impressive total of 78½ points while the Palo Alto contingent could only make 32½ Santa Clara took third with 13; Menlo fourth with 9, while Mountain View brought up the rear with 3. One unattached athlete, Don Lindsay of San Jose high school took five points with a first place in the 880.

THREE FOR DON

Giant Don Presley walked all over the opposition with initial places in the shot put, discus, and low hurdles, and took a third in the high barriers behind Les Steers of Palo Alto and his teammate Staley.

Harvey Brooks accounted for one of the double wins for the day with a twin killing in the 100 and 220 yard dashes. Brooks also ran the anchor lap on the winning 880 yard relay team.

VASCONCELLOS, INC.

The Vasconcellos brothers, Ed and Hank took their usual share of the points. Hank finished right on the heels of Brooks in the 220 and was second to his brother who won the broad jump. Ed also placed second to Steers in the high jump. In winning the broad jump, "Tick" Vasconcellos moved out into the ozone for a distance of 22 feet 834 inches before coming to earth.

Captain Vin Ruble with a mighty blaze of power at the finish broke the tape in the mile run ahead of Janovich of Mountain View.

The lead had wavered back and forth between the two all during the race. Janovich led coming around the final turn but Captain Vin turned on the heat to win by two or three feet.

TODD CRACKS JAVELIN MARK; SPARTANS WIN P.A.A. CROWN AS THIRTEEN RECORDS MADE

PRESLEY HEAVES 56 POUND WEIGHT FOR BEST MARK ON PACIFIC COAST IN 15 YEARS

SPARTAN FIELD, May 29.—Shattering the former P.A.A. javelin mark by more than 32 feet, and breaking his own school and field record by a good three feet, San Jose State's Lowell Todd stole high honors here today in the biggest track and field meet ever held on the local cinderpath—the Junior Pacific Athletic Association championships.

Along with Todd's heave of 219 feet 3½ inches, which rates among the top four in the United States, big Don Presley gathered plenty of honors with a second in the hammer throw, fourth in the shot, and an unexepected first in the 56-pound weight.

The outstanding fact is that Presley, competing for the Spar-

State Star Throws Spear Out 208 Feet To Regain Old Form

Presley Bests Own Shot Record, Takes Second In Weight; Collins Fourth In 440

Returning to form, Lowell Todd featured San Jose State's participation in the annual Pacific association track and field championships Saturday at Edwards stadium, Berkeley, with his record breaking javelin throw of 208 feet 6 inches.

Amassing fifteen points, the Spartan squad finished fourth in the scoring behind the Olympic Club, California, and Stanford in that order.

Todd, in winning the spear heaving event, bested throws by Waterbury and Mottram of the Olympic Club and Jones of Fresno who all beat the Spartan ace in dual competition earlier in the year. Todd's javelin throw breaks the P.A.A. record of 204 feet set by Friedman of the Olympic Club in 1931.

Don Presley not only bested his own college shot put record by a foot in taking third in the event but also took second in the 56-pound weight behind Gordon "Slinger" Dunn of the Winged-O. In the 56-pound weight, Presley was easily out in front with two throws of 31 feet 11½ inches until Dunn uncorked one to beat the best by only three-fourths of an inch.

Presley's new school record in the shot is 48 feet 7½ inches and was bettered only by Allee of the Club and Stan Anderson of Stan-

Owen Collins picked on some real competition and finished fourth behind Mallott of Stanford, Blackman of the Club, and Modisette of Camornia in a new record for the quarter-mile of 47.4 seconds.


Charlie Bendeich finished fourth in the broad jump with a leap of 23 feet 31/4 inches.

In answer to your claim that Bill Van Vleck is not the only mustached boxer in the United States and that Don Presley should have been included, I give you the following information:


- 1. Two weeks ago Presley's mustache was snipped off by his football team mates. You should know that.

- 4. You could never classify his four (4) wisps of brush hair as a mustache. His upper lip always looks barren and deserted.




The Spartans took a minor share of the prize money as the



Warmerdam of the Olympic Club who won the event at 14 feet 5½ inches, attempted to break the world's record, but three trials at the height of 14 feet 11¾ inches found it too high for even Warmerdam to clear.





Track Team Places Third; Don Presley Breaks Own Mark

VASCONCELLOS COPS FIRST PLACE IN BROAD JUMP

BLACKSTONE STADIUM, Fresno, May 18.—California
Collegiate Athletic Association track and field performers
went on a record-breaking orgy here tonight as Fresno State
swept to the team title by scoring 67 points, 25 more than
the second place winner, San Diego. San Jose was third with
371½ points.

37½ points. Highlight of the meet from the San Jose standpoint was

the outstanding marks chalked up by big Don Presley, Spartan three-sport star.
Presley broke his own CCAA shot put record by over a foot when he threw the iron bulb 49 feet 434 inches. Later in the evening he got off the best throw of his life in the discus, only to lose the title he won in 1939 by one inch to Davis of Fresno. Presley spun the platter out 139 feet 111/2 inches.

Vin Ruble successfully defended his half mile crown in the mediocre time of 1:57.7. Last year the slim Spartan set the conference record with a 1:55.5 and he was out to crack the mark tonight but a slow first 220 kept him from breaking the record.

LEAPS 23' 6"

Co-captain Ticky Vasconcellos broke the existing CCAA broad jump mark with a leap of 23 feet 61/2 inches, ten inches short of his best 1940 mark. John Peek captured second spot in the event, three inches behind Vasconcellos.

Tony Sunzeri, after clearing 13 feet 6 inches in the pole vault, injured his heel and was hampered in his attempts to jump 13 feet 9 inches. Bob Hoffman of Fresno went on to take the first place belt buckle, and in doing so set a new meet record. Hoffman's mark of 13 fet 9 inches broke the record of 13 feet set last year by Sunzeri and Finn of San Jose.

GRANT SECOND

Ed Grant, throwing between leaps in the high jump, took second in the javelin behind the tremendous throw of Larry Sundahl of Fresno who threw the willow wand 222 feet 934 inches to break the conference record by more than 40 feet.
